Graham Plans Extension for N. Y. Crusade

NEW YORK, June 4 (AP)—Billy Graham announced last night that his New York crusade has been so successful it will be extended through July 21—three weeks beyond the original closing date.

The jubilant evangelist also told an enthusiastic Madison Square Garden crowd of 17,000 that he plans to preach his June 30 sermon from the Polo grounds and his July 1 sermon in Yankee stadium.

When Graham takes his revival into the open air he could present at once in the Polo grounds, home of the New York Giants, and to 60,000 in the home grounds of the champion Yankees.

An estimated 350,000 persons have attended Graham's sermons since he started his crusade. As of last night, when 501 persons made "decision cards," 12,145 "decision cards" have been received.

—The Rev. Walter Smith, a Graham "team" member responsible for the crusade, said that the interest in New York from churches in the city is "unprecedented."

He said that the crusade is so successful that he can keep the Garden full through July 21.

About 8,000 seats are reserved for the crusade. All seats are free.

Graham's sermon last night touched on what he termed "a very delicate subject," the commandment "Thou shalt not commit adultery."

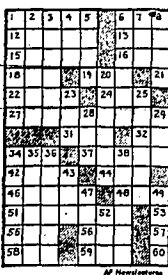

Director Sees Idaho Health Unit Advance

POISE. June 4 (U-P)—Dr. John L. Butler, director of the Idaho division of mental health, said yesterday that the department has "moved significantly" in the last two years of its existence.

Butler said in an interview, "but we have not yet solved the problem of problems are financial, but he said the financial problems lie a lack of understanding of the mental health program."

In Canyon county, a program designed to keep mental patients out of jail has been set up. In Boise, a new mental health center is under construction and is expected to be completed by late this year.

The division got half a million dollars less from the 1955 legislature than the smallest of the three alternative budget requests it submitted.

Butler conceded that some people in the mental health movement in Idaho have become discouraged because of such setbacks, but added that "more are optimistic than pessimistic."

He noted that the five-million-dollar mental health budget for the current biennium, although far short of what the division sought, is an increase of 25 per cent over the 1953 appropriation.

"Nothing in the area of mental health contributed significantly to the difficulty between the board of health and the director," Butler said. This was a reference to a controversy which brought on the ouster of State Health Director L. J. Peterson and a legislative reorganization of the board.

Gov. Robert F. Boyle has not yet appointed the members of the reorganized board or a successor to Peterson. Butler praised Boyle as a supporter of mental health, noting that he substantially increased, in his recommendations to the legislature, the amount of money appropriated for mental health by the present biennial budget.

The trouble in Canyon county is symptomatic of a statewide problem, Butler said.

"Throughout the state," he added, "mental patients who have committed no crime are being held in jail."

The Canyon County Mental Health association raised funds to finance a room at Caldwell Memorial hospital in which persons could be kept before being committed to state institutions.

The room was opened almost a year ago, but has never been used for the intended purpose. At a recent meeting in Caldwell, county commissioners and the hospital administration concluded that the difficulty lies in lack of trained personnel and money to hire the needed help.

"It takes more than just a room," commented Butler. "You get a good facility and they still use the jail."

China Boy Scouts Give Flag to U. S.

TAIPEI, Formosa, June 4 (U-P).—Chinese Boy Scouts from yesterday presented an American flag to U. S. Ambassador Earl B. Hanklin to replace the standard torn down and trampled by Chinese rioters in the anti-American riots May 24.

A delegation of nine Scouts told Hanklin "we deeply regret the unfortunate incident" in presenting the flag. They thanked the United States for its aid to nationalist China.

Cuban Planes Attack Rebels In Mountains

HAVANA, June 4 (U-P).—Cuban air force bombers are attacking suspected rebel hideouts in the mountains of southeastern Cuba in a government "extermination campaign," it was reported today.

The insurgents are held up in the Sierra Maestra mountains in Oriente province where Cuba's crack U. S.-equipped first infantry division was alerted this week-end to spearhead ground operations.

Police at Bayamo in the heart of the rebel-infested province reported the arrest of an American citizen, identified as William C. Leonard, 21, a native of Virginia now residing in Miami, Fla.

Police said Leonard told them he was trying to reach the hideout of rebel leader Fidel Castro to persuade Charles Ryan, an American youth, to return home. Ryan, 20, was one of three American youths who ran away from their homes at the U. S. Guantanamo naval base to join the Castro rebels. The other two since have returned to their families.

Mideast Anti-Communist Pact Grows Powerful in Comeback

The Baghdad treaty against communist penetration in the Middle East has made a remarkable comeback.

In fact, the five-country alliance is stronger and potentially more important now than it ever has been since it was signed in Baghdad, Iran, in February, 1955.

It started out as a purely "paper pact"—the loosest of all the free-world alliances against communist aggression.

It was threatened with a complete break-up after the British-French invasion of the Suez canal zone last November.

But the meeting of the Baghdad treaty members which started in Karachi, Pakistan, Monday, appears to mark a turning point which will strengthen allied ties in the whole area of Asia from Turkey to Pakistan.

The Baghdad treaty members are Turkey, Iraq, Iran, Pakistan and Great Britain. Their alliance is called officially the Middle Eastern Treaty Organization.

The United States, which sponsored the treaty, refused to join it. At that time, the Eisenhower administration did not want to involve itself so closely in Middle Eastern affairs.

An attempt to include Jordan in the treaty caused a crisis in that country's government.

That materially weakened the treaty. The fact that all its members but Britain are Moslem nations, and that Iraq is a member of the nine-nation Arab league, nearly caused the break-up of the pact when Britain joined France in the canal invasion.

The four Moslem members boycotted Britain, and held meetings without inviting Britain to take part.

But Britain is back at the current Karachi meeting. The United States, which had limited its part to being represented by an observer and to joining the economic committee of the pact, formally joined the military committee at yesterday's opening meeting. That means that except for admitting it, the United States is now practically a full member of the pact.

At the meeting as an American delegate, in addition to Deputy Secretary of State Loy Henderson, is Gen. Nathan F. Twining, chief of the staff of the air force, who is bound to succeed Adm. Arthur W. Radford

as chairman of the joint chiefs of staff.

The delegates are discussing the formation of a formal military agreement, which will be signed at coordinating their defense organizations.

It is possible that Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi may be named before long as supreme commander of the treaty organization.

It is possible also that within the next few months Jordan may be invited again to join the treaty. This time, after the victory of young King Hussein over his pro-Russian, pro-Russian political enemies, he may find it possible to accept.

If the present trend in the Middle East continues, it is just possible that pro-western Saudi Arabia and Lebanon may be brought into it.
