Mystery Body May Be That Of Frogman

PORTSMOUTH, England, June 10 (AP)—British pathologists performed an autopsy today on the handless, headless body of a frogman in hopes of solving a major mystery of the cold war.

American Policy on Red China Frozen On Points of Trade, Admission to UN

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—American policy on red China, having gone full circle, is frozen now. The Eisenhower administration shows no signs of thawing it, but it may have to.

Time was when this country not only wanted its hands off China, but also wanted to see the red Chinese get out of the mainland. He couldn't do that, however, without American help. So the U.S. has been in a quandary ever since the Chinese took over the mainland, apparently with nothing to look forward to except dying.

But American allies like Britain are getting fed up with the red Chinese. They're beginning to assert themselves. Britain, for instance, recognized this red as the legitimate government of China from the moment they smashed Chiang in 1949.

But it switched under President Truman, when the Korean war began, and the Truman policy is being continued by President Eisenhower.

This country still refuses to recognize the red Chinese as the real government of mainland China. It still refuses to agree to let them into the United Nations.

It takes the position that Chiang's Formosa government is the only legitimate government of China.

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

When there are several children in a family, it soon becomes evident that they are different one from another and must be managed differently for the best results. Occasionally there is one child markedly different from the others. While they are bright, learn easily, get high marks in school and win general approval, this one learns slowly if at all, gets poor marks and is the source of much worry to the parents.

One such child has difficulty in learning to read. He sees "a" backwards and says "aw." When this happens, it would be well to have the child's eyes examined by an eye specialist. The "eye and ear" physician. Some times this condition disappears as the child progresses, but in the meantime the child loses precious learning time and is subjected to most unhappy experiences at home and in school. It is best to get help for him from the specialists.

Another different one is the child who cannot "do arithmetic." Usually this is one who is slow about learning and using language. He needs practice in talking and reproducing short stories such as the fables. He needs to have numbers introduced by the use of objects. Problems in arithmetic should be deferred until he masters language, oral and printed.

Then we have the big, strong, physically healthy child who will cheerfully hammer and saw, dig and sweep and polish and clean but who will rebel at any pressure put on him to study or to work out a problem. When he is forced to sit at his desk, at least, go through the motions, he is bad-tempered, scowls, has a headache, loses schoolwork and is subjected to most unhappy experiences at home and in school. It is best to get help for him from the specialists.

British Plans For Selling to China Blasted

NEW YORK, June 10 (AP)—The Committee of One Million, a group opposing the admission of communists into the United Nations, charged today that the British decision to increase trade with Red China was a step towards "strengthening the aggressive power of the Peking regime."

The committee issued a statement which it said was aimed at "those nations abroad who have indicated that they are to drop trade relations with communist China."

It was signed by the committee's steering committee—Jenna, Paul Douglas, D. H. and Alexander Smith, Jr., N. J.; Rep. Walter H. Judd, R., Minn.; and Francis E. Walter, D., Pa.; Joseph C. Grew, former ambassador to Japan, and Charles E. Jones, former ambassador to China.

The statement warned that trade with Red China was "trading with the enemy" and was "a direct contribution to the destruction of a free economy" because of Red China's massive military buildup.

"Throughout history trade with the enemy, whether the actual or potential enemy, has been considered the lowest form of treason in all cultures and all nations," the statement said. "It is a betrayal of the trust which the world has placed in the United States, and it is a betrayal of the American people."
