# Senate Approves Soil Bank Plan Another Season

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—A marathon senate session and some sharp vote switching gave the administration's soil bank program a new lease on life Wednesday and provided hundreds of millions of dollars for payments to farmers. The senate unanimously passed Tuesday night a \$668,912,157 farm money bill and sent it back to the house for the 780 management vote. But the 780 management vote came only after several weeks of strength on specific issues during a 13-hour session.

Senate Leader Lyndon B. Johnson called the senate back to extra duty Wednesday with the 780 management vote for the 1937-38 annual appropriation bill. One of these would provide \$5,212,000 for 20 miscellaneous conservation agencies for the fiscal year ending July 1. The other carries \$65,700,000 for the labor and education and welfare department for the same period.

# Dam Battle Renewed in U.S. Senate

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—Sen. Lyndon Johnson, D., Tex., said Wednesday the controversial Idaho canyon dam bill would be brought up in the senate "over the opposition" of Republican opponents. The underwater rocket is a missile much faster than the torpedo, Kimball told newsmen at a meeting of the American Rocket society and the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

"It is launched under water, it travels under water and it can strike its target under water," he said. "We are making three rockets now."

Kimball would not say whether such a weapon has been fired, remarking that he did not know about the secrecy status of the project.

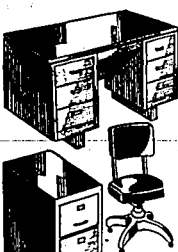
## Judgment Given Widow, Children

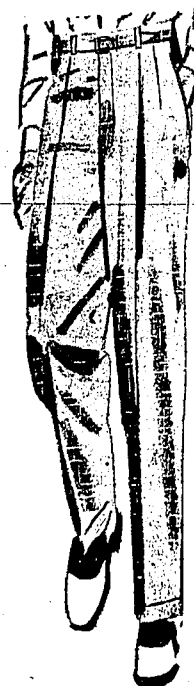

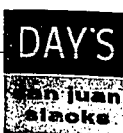

## Stock Market Balance Regained After Brief Hysterics Over "Upset Stomach"

NEW YORK, June 12 (AP)—Live, there a man who has never had an upset stomach?

But when one particular man eats the wrong delicacy for dinner a flash flood of selling hits the stock market. And businessmen here and abroad ponder what President Eisenhower's indisposition, if it had proved serious, could do to business prospects.

Fortunately the hysteria was quickly over and calmer judgment took over the rule of the stock and other markets.

What caused the flash flood? The answer appears to lie in that fragile thing—confidence. And in the dread of any period of uncertainty. And in the underlying and still current puzzlement as to which way business is really going. At the moment it is in delicate balance, which confidence is maintaining and uncertainty could tilt.

The way a piece of blueberry pie shook up the stock market brings up the basic question of how firmly are business trends tied to any uncertainty in Washington—even when that monetary uncertainty involved the most powerful man in the world.

Many businessmen hold that the health of industry and trade in this country is strong enough to survive

any jolt to confidence caused by the indisposition of a popular president.

But the weight of the presidency is great in these troublous times. The battle of the budget is nearing the crucial stage in Congress. Flaming fire are many international negotiations—all the way from disarmament to specific tariff questions affecting a handful of firms.

So the stock market reacted first and reflected later. Observers of the stock market scene report that this time most of the selling appeared to be by the professionals—the in-and-out traders trying to cash in paper profits that uncertainty might threaten.

The great mass of stockholders, the people all over the nation who have a few or many shares tucked away in strong boxes, sat tight. Businessmen mostly waited to see and took the long-term view.

The nation's economy has been running along remarkably smoothly. The soft spot here and there have been offset by all-climbing business elsewhere in the economy.

Because few lost their heads when the soft spot appeared, confidence in the soundness of the economy has been the ruling factor. Consumers have gone right on spending for what they want—even if those

things aren't always the products that some businessmen would like consumers to want.

Businessmen have gone right on planning for future expansion to meet the foreseeable needs of a growing and prosperous population.

Governments—federal, state and local—have stepped up their spending to meet these same needs.

In the midst of all this show of calmness and confidence, the stock market remains nervous. With prices averaging out at a high level, it is sensitive to every rumor, to every possibility.

## State Budgets Meeting Resistance as Economy Attitudes Gain More Ground

CHICAGO, June 12 (AP)—The trip-the-budget fever that has boosted political temperatures in Washington this spring has not proved contagious in state legislatures across the nation.

A United Press survey showed today that costs of state governments are increasing at a faster clip than those of the federal government and that budget-cutting drives similar to the attack on President Eisenhower's budget occurred in only three states.

Budgets presented to 1957 legislatures are up 10 to 20 per cent over last year. And the survey showed that the average state budget has increased by 81 per cent over the pre-Korean war year of 1949.

The 1957 federal budget of \$113 billion, on the other hand, represents an 81 per cent increase over the 1949 budget of \$62.5 billion. Expenditures of \$113 billion are up 166 per cent in 1949.

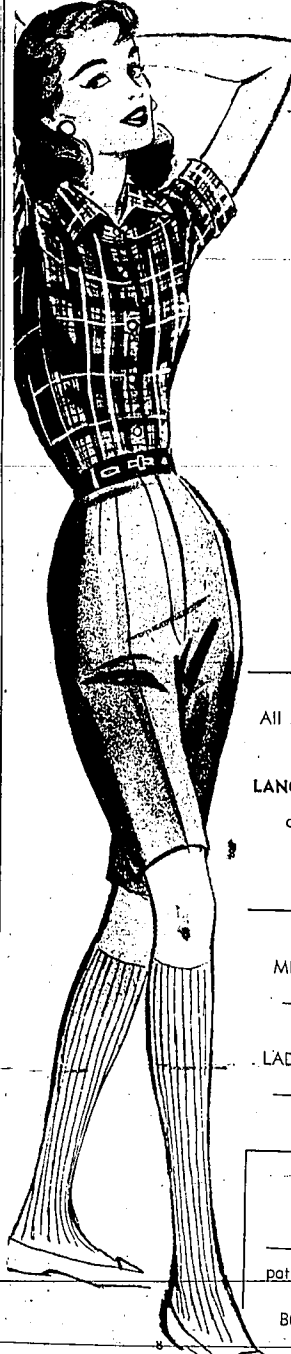
Economists have done a lot of talking in the states but only in Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Massachusetts have governors and legislatures squared off in budget fights as turbulent as the money disputes between Eisenhower and the congress.

Most state budgets reached all-time highs. The nation's biggest this year is in California where Gov. Goodwin J. Knight asked for almost two billion dollars. New York state's budget is 1.6 billion dollars but that includes only a portion of the 1957 \$5,000 on a rabbit show and a "short

course in rabbit breeding." paper suggested it was unnecessary to meet rising costs. Many state legislatures have voted no action in the sales tax and Utah extended its sales tax to cover but not income taxes. Missouri and Indiana and Idaho raised gas taxes. Indiana and Ohio boosted cigarette taxes. Missouri, South Dakota and Ohio raised income taxes. Missouri and Texas raised liquor taxes. Missouri increased its liquor tax. Iowa lowered its tax and states. Massachusetts, Connecticut, Illinois, Minnesota, Nevada, Ohio and Tennessee.

Map and yardage table give you a rough idea of what 102 contestants face in the 57th Open championship of the United States Golf Association.

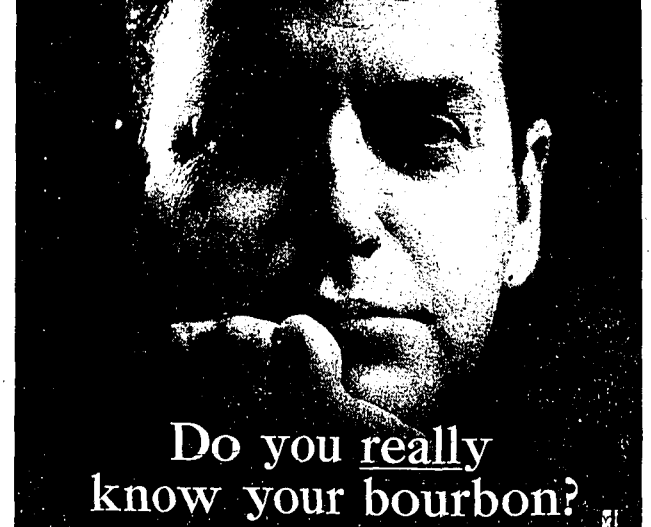
## Weather May Figure in Open Golf Tourney

## Minor League Fund Is Second to Local Help

ST. LOUIS, June 12 (UP)—The major league fund for aiding minor league baseball clubs isn't a handout proposition and there must be evidence of home town support before a grant is made. That's the philosophy of Bill DeWitt, overseer of the \$500,000 fund the majors set up recently to aid distressed lower classification teams.

"I don't want to save too many clubs," DeWitt said. "I want them to save themselves. If townpeople aren't behind the operator of a club then there's no point in giving him money. We don't want to force baseball on any community. We want to preserve baseball in communities which are willing and able to support it."

DeWitt is a close-knit manager of the New York Yankees who was expected to be with the money.

The former president of the St. Louis Browns and assistant general manager of the New York Yankees won't state how many sinking clubs the fund has righted where it's been applied.

He believes that if a club owner wants to announce that he's been given a grant that his business DeWitt expressed fear that public announcement would only increase the number of requests he might receive.

He will not say how much of the fund has been dispersed or what percentage of requests for aid were granted.

The former front office man blames losses from rainouts—particularly in the Southwest—for prompting a goodly number of requests for cash.

"The weather has really knocked us out of the box," DeWitt said. "If the weather had been good and attendance wasn't then we would be a lot more concerned than we are. DeWitt figured out that 123 minor league teams are eligible for aid. Eliminated under fund rules are clubs owned by major league teams. No loans are made, only grants.

So far no triple AAA or double AA club has come to DeWitt for money.

DeRosier had a record of no wins and one loss here, but had allowed 27 earned runs in the 21 innings he pitched.

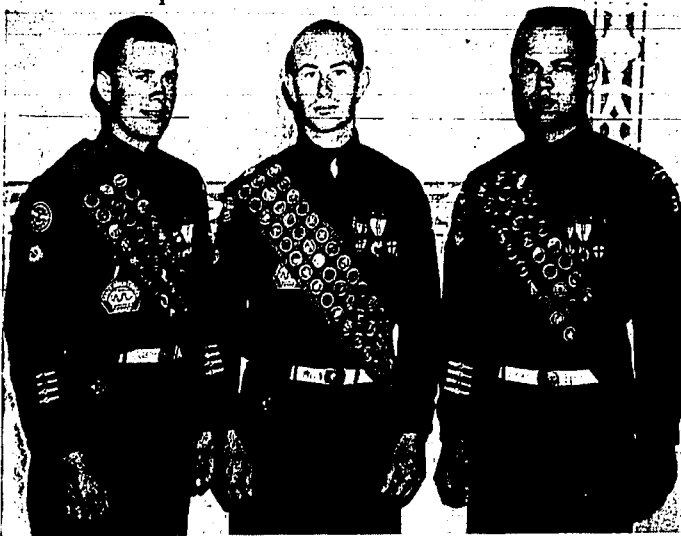

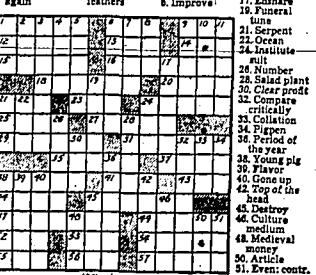

# Secrecy Drape Is Dropped on Frogman Case

CHICHESTER, England, June 12 (AP)—British police announced today that the case of the headless frogman in wartime secrecy on direct orders from the government and Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

There were hints the U. S. navy might be involved.

A day and night guard was mounted at the mortuary where the body lay and a coroner's inquest was expected to adjourn immediately without a statement.

The body was generally believed to be that of former Navy frogman Lionel (Gus) Crabbe, a naval hero who disappeared beneath the Soviet cruiser Orskanok during last year's Baltic maneuvers and Nikolai Bulgakov's visit.

**Wife Called**

Mrs. Margaret Crabbe, 43-year-old ex-wife of the royal navy commander, was summoned to Chichester for the inquest, and a possible identification of the body which has lain beneath the waters for 14 months.

But any official findings remained secret and the British press fell back on the speculation which has marked the case since the beginning. The Daily Express said Crabbe had died while carrying out a bush-hunt assignment for the U. S. navy.

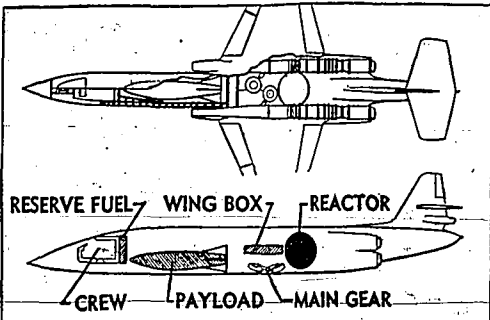
**Never Confirmed**

Crabbe's death was officially confirmed. The admiral admitted he disappeared while diving near the Soviet cruiser Orskanok in the secret war against the waters—and he was "presumed" to be dead.

Today Daily Express correspondent Ian Fitcher reported from Washington that Crabbe had approached U. S. navy headquarters in London offering to examine the hull of the Orskanok on the navy's behalf. He said the navy agreed and that Bulgakov had left.

Doctors studied the body yesterday and during the night to see whether the frogman had died by accident or violence. There had been speculation he was killed by Soviet frogmen who caught him swimming beneath their ship.

# Profile of Atomic Airplane

# Proposed Atomic Plane Will Possess Long, Slender Lines

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—The nuclear-powered airplane of the future probably will be long and thin, with the crew riding far up in the nose, well removed from the engines. It will have a smaller tail than conventional planes. Its wing structure will be simpler, cleaner and more efficient. Its windows will be mainly at the front of the cockpit.

The atomic power plants themselves probably will be housed within the airplane fuselage or the main body, instead of being suspended from the wings in pods as in the case with many large jet-powered aircraft.

The airplane, virtually free of combustible fuel tanks, will be less vulnerable to antiaircraft fire than current planes, and the crews will be better protected.

This first look at the probable form of the atom-powered aircraft now being designed for the air force was contained in drawings and a 26-page report recently made public.

The report was prepared by Clarence L. Johnson of Burbank, Calif., vice president for research and development of the Lockheed Aircraft Corp.

# "Water, Water Everywhere"—But McElmore Still Thirsty

LONDON—For a country surrounded by water, and on which water falls a good deal of the time, England is very stingy with the water-tap.

When I was on the Libyan desert a few months back, 350 miles from London, and surrounded by sand as far as the eye could see, water was much harder to get than it is here in London.

I don't remember being thirsty out there with the camels, but here in London I'm as thirsty as a bird dog in a field half the time. The English just don't drink water. They can do longer than a storage battery on one glass. Oh, maybe they don't drink it in public. As children I suspect they are taught to drink water behind closed doors, or when no one is looking.

This poses a problem for visiting Americans. We drink water by the gallon.

English-restaurant waiters just don't require the word "water." You might just as well ask for your glass of chicken soup (well, umquagany, or any other silly word that comes to mind). I have even written it out for them, and still had them look at me with an in-

comprehensible stare.

Cateridge had it right in "The Ancient Mariner" when he wrote "Water, water, everywhere, nor any drop to drink."

Famished Americans can get bottled water in restaurants. The better restaurants, that is. They have a good supply of it, but as most of it comes from France or Italy, it costs quite a bit, and most of us are not accustomed to having our checks topped up with a water charge. If a man's real thirst he can drink more at a meal than he pays for a month's water supply at home, even in summertime when the lawn has to have a soaking every day.

Mary and I have thought about carrying canteens. They can be packed at army surplus stores for little or nothing, but we still haven't worked up enough courage to walk into a nice restaurant and plunk our canteens down on the table. Call it false pride if you will, or lack of assurance, but we just can't seem to do it.

Also, a canteen would be a nuisance. We lose enough things as it is, without having to keep track of our steps to hunt for lost canteens. Of course, we could wear them as belts around our waists, but that's not really enough as it is. I've been marching around looking like a fool wearing a canteen and belt. I suppose you know enough about it to understand how well it works. I guess, would you like to try it?

What we are doing now is to keep our thirst as low as possible. I find that in our mouths always. I find that it would help, and it does. I don't know what it is doing to the rest of our teeth, but I don't know that it is a nuisance to have to wait for Hyde Park every morning for a can of right-sized pebble.

Also, I suppose we look a bit odd walking through the city with our little hairpins, now and then trying to see another. "Here's a dandy one. Try to find one for me tomorrow, too."

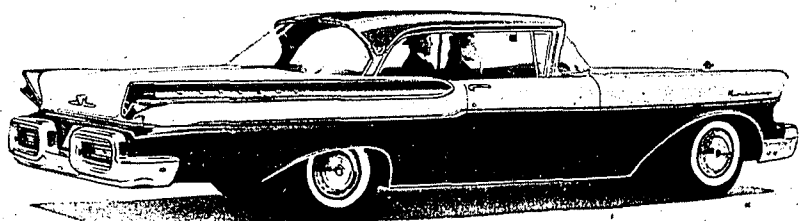

## Moon Voyage May Be Made In Five Years

AMERICAN scientists will be able to land an unmanned rocket on the moon within five years after launch of the intercontinental ballistic missile, the president of the American Rocket Society said Tuesday.

The statement was made by Robert C. Truax, one of the nation's leading rocket experts, as the society opened its four-day, semi-annual meeting.

The only thing which stands in the way of "Operation Moon," Truax said, is the question of whether the government is willing to put up the necessary money.

The moon program, the ARS said, would cost about 100 million dollars a year.

"This sounds like a lot of money," he admitted, "but if you break it down, it amounts to about 10 cents per cigarette."

The 30-year-old navy engineer, who led the way in setting the navy's liquid propellant program in motion, said the only navy man working on the moon five years after launch would be a highly trained astronaut.

Truax said that if the same resources and energy being expended in the current earth satellite and rocket programs were directed to the moon, it would be possible to land a man on the moon in 15 years.

He also said that there were many practical reasons for developing space satellites and trips to the moon, such as worldwide television coverage, weather information and military aspects, but to most scientists the magnet is the moon.

The delegates of the 44 locals, representing the largest single council of the union with 135,000 members, voted unanimously for Beck's resignation and endorsed Vice President John T. Scaudry, Chicago, 60, Chicago, for the post.

In an acceptance speech, Scaudry told the council he wants the job "only if I can handle the work according to my own way of thinking."
