

Russian Offer to Stop Bomb Tests Lauded by Allies

LONDON, June 17 (AP)—The United States and three other western powers Monday hailed Russia's plan for a controlled ban on nuclear tests as an important move toward a partial disarmament agreement. The American delegate, Harold E. Stassen, told the five-power United Nations disarmament subcommittee his country is ready to move toward the position of other governments in order to further the quest for a limited treaty. Stassen said he will shortly present proposals of his own with the aim of speeding the search for an agreement. The Russians Friday proposed a two or three-year suspension on all nuclear tests and agreed to admit international teams of inspectors into the Soviet Union.

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Israel Making Fresh Charge Against Egypt

Lewell officials accused Egypt today of planning submarine warfare against Israeli ships bound for the Gulf of Aqaba.
Jerusalem dispatch said the "Raiders" had detailed three submarines to the Egyptian navy and indicated they would operate against Israeli and "other" shipping in the Red sea approached to the Gulf of Aqaba.
Egypt's relations with the Arab world was worsened. An Amman dispatch said the Jordan government last night ordered its embassy in Cairo closed today.
The step was short of a formal diplomatic break but emphasized the critical nature of relations between the two former allies and virtually marked an end to the Arab solidarity proclaimed last spring.
Jordan's decision was announced after a four-hour cabinet meeting attended by King Hussein—the first he has attended since the split developed.
In Damascus the Saudi Arabian embassy denied a newspaper report of a split between King Saud and his brother, crown Prince Faisal, Saudi Arabia's premier and foreign minister.
The report, in the Damascus letting Arafat Alami, said Faisal left the country with his family except for his eldest son, Interior Minister Prince Abdullah.
The general deterioration of Jordan-Egyptian relations was climaxed last week by Egypt's expulsion of Jordanian Ambassador Rifaat. The Amman announcement on closing the embassy said a small consular staff would be left in Cairo.

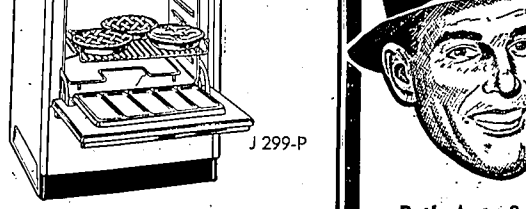

Senate Girds To Do Battle On Writeoffs

WASHINGTON, June 17 (AP)—The Senate today girded for a battle in the Senate this week. The Democratic leadership plans to introduce a bill on Wednesday authorizing a bill for a federal dam in the Snake river basin, Idaho and Oregon.

Democratic leaders of the high dam, which would flood the sites of three licensed power companies, are hoping the tax writeoff will erase the 10-year margin by which a similar bill was defeated last year.

The office of defense mobilization is leading "accelerated amortization" certificates to Idaho Power company, which has a federal power plan for a dam which would flood the federal project.

The bill would permit the company to write off in five years, as depreciation for income tax purposes, 65 per cent of the cost of the dam, and 30 per cent of the cost of the dam, estimated at \$100 million.

Democratic leaders of the bill to revive lagging interest in the Snake dam case, the nation's biggest private-revenue public power project.

They asserted that the Republican administration had handed a private utility a \$30-million-dollar bill after backing the Snake dam on grounds it would cost taxpayers nothing.

Bills were introduced to restrict the writeoffs to industries making defense material and to cancel Idaho Power's.

Hearings held. A Senate Judiciary subcommittee plans more this week in the Idaho Power tax writeoff case. The subcommittee is headed by Senator J. Lee Smith, D-Tenn., sought to prove among other things.

The subcommittee was well aware the certificates were being issued; they were issued by the secretary of the Interior. Senator Smith, D-Tenn., sought to prove among other things.

He said the "loss" to the nation would total \$34 million dollars. In this case, he said, the government each year would have to borrow money at 4 1/2 per cent interest, and also borrow money to pay the interest.

Senator Watkins, R-Utah, who led the fight against the Snake dam, said the bill would make a speech this week in an attempt to knock down that "well-known propaganda device, the compound interest figure."

Opposite View. Watkins contended the nation would lose more from the federal dam than from the Idaho Power project. He said the statement filed with the Federal project would cost the government to build a \$851,000,000 over the next six years, only \$100,000,000 additional.

Watkins said the federal tax revenue to the state of Idaho would be \$400,000,000 additional. "Supporters of the high federal dam are conducting a propaganda campaign throughout the country on the basis of an inflated loss of \$851,000,000 through the Idaho Power tax writeoff."

Watkins said the use of simple interest instead of compound interest would reduce the "loss" to about 16 million dollars. He added that the dam would benefit the nation through industrial expansion, increased employment and increased payment in full of Idaho Power taxes.

Egg Purchase Plan Is Halted. WASHINGTON, June 17 (AP)—The government will withdraw from the egg market after tomorrow. The agriculture department announced that an experimental program inaugurated last fall to help bolster sagging producer prices will be halted.

The agency said it is stepping aside because it expects egg prices to drop a normal season upward soon. Such a price increase would correspond with a normal seasonal decline in egg production.

The department has bought nearly 15 million dollars worth of shell and dried eggs under the program. They are donated to the school lunch program and to eligible public institutions, as well as to needy persons.

Inflation, Dreaded Monetary Disease, Strikes—but Only Slight Case so Far

WASHINGTON, June 17 (AP)—Closer to home a pocket of nuclear fallout or the effect of tobacco smoke on the human lung is that beautiful item, the United States dollar.

It is not pretty to contemplate the possibility of physical deformities among humans caused by nuclear fallout. There is nothing attractive about lung cancer.

The beautiful United States dollar is going to look as bad as either or both of the foregoing if the present trend of creeping inflation continues. Inflation is a college word which doesn't mean much to living Americans because they never have been up against what the word signifies.

The word signifies a situation in which money goes bad—so bad that shopkeepers don't want it, so bad that waiters prefer a cigarette to money as a tip, bad enough that a man with a pocketful of dollars might die of starvation while gazing into a food store window.

Millions of persons now alive and a great many thousands but recently dead have experienced that kind of inflation. China, France and Germany are notable among the nations which have gone through the inflation wringer.

When inflation really gets going in a national economy it outruns everything. Not even the most generous employer, with the fairest purse can raise his employee salaries fast enough to provide a living wage. The first babies to whimper for food, and finally to starve to death are the children of persons on fixed incomes. The first adults to go are pensioners and others whose incomes also are fixed.

Inflation is deadly stuff, like cancer and, maybe, more than fallout deformities. The inflation of currency is reflected in a steadily decreasing purchasing power of money. It can be a slow and gradual process as presently in the United States, or
