BERKELEY, Calif., Sept. 5.—Don't let anyone's ears tell them what your best identification is, experts say. 


## Mysteries of Nature's Water Balance Being Explored by World Researchers

TORONTO, Sept. 5 (UPI)—Our air holds only a 10-day supply of water to keep a human alive and nothing more—everlasting.

If the suddenly dried out, as you might wish on a muggy, hot summer day, you would thirst to death.

There's really little water in the total atmosphere surrounding the earth, and it's not evenly distributed. Dr. R. C. Butcliffe, a British weather forecaster, has just come from the University of Bergen, Norway, today told the International Geophysical Year conference in Oslo that the amount of turbulent air over the ocean is about one-third of that over land and over mountains.

These are some of the results of research on the oceans and air during the International Geophysical Year. Scientists of 64 countries are seeking to solve puzzles of the earth's water balance. That means—the exchange of water between the oceans and continents—and how it affects the soil and plants, the air and the weather.

What has been learned about the earth's water balance is that the oceans are not the only source of water.

An understanding of the exact mechanism of water exchange in the atmosphere was described by Dr. Moby, by Dr. R. C. Butcliffe, a British weather forecaster, who spoke at the conference.

Dr. H. H. Moyle, oceanographer of the University of California, said that the air suddenly dried out, as you might wish on a muggy, hot summer day, you would thirst to death.

The knowledge could lead to better methods of forecasting or controlling weather conditions in other trouble-prone areas.






