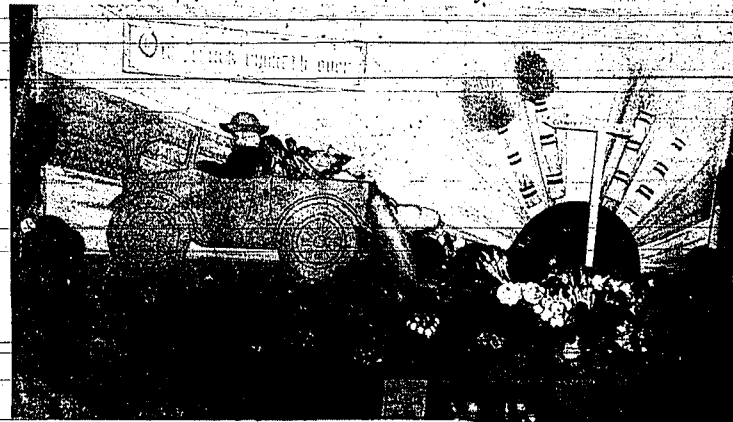

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

"We are about to place our little son, aged 4, in a nursery school so that he can learn to be among other children his age and some of the family object because of the associations he will have with children of dubious social standing. Mrs. and Mr. Angelo Patri, playmates, and supporters of this age."

"Associations, in my opinion, is important at any age and especially so in childhood when so many fundamental experiences are being brought to bear on the young ones. The fundamental experiences I am thinking about are those of right attitudes, manners, speech, appropriate values related to character. These are highly important to a child of 4 and also to the adolescent."

By social contact—through play, color, race, religion, the wealth of the group are meant in the words "social standing." I have not found these fundamentally important. What mattered was the standards of the families concerned as to general behavior, attitudes toward other people and other ways. A child from a family whose attitudes to those not so well off as they, to those who live in an apartment instead of a house, who speak another language than English, is snobbish and will be snobbish in his turn. That is no good.

The child who comes from a home of low standards in morals and manners, who uses bad language, who knows no difference between "mine and thine" is bound to be a poor associate for other children.

We have to consider the fact that the child who is brought up to learn from each other than from their parents, that is what makes parents look carefully at the associates of their boys and girls. All children have a tendency to be drawn toward the unusual. A child who comes from a good-mannered family of strict codes is likely to be interested in the doings of one who has no such restraints on his behavior. He is inclined to copy them at least for a time.

A watchful parent can soon tell what influence an association is having on his child. His manners, his speech, his attitude toward life and doing all concerned are to be congratulated. When it is not, when it is plainly a lowering of home standards it is time to act.

In selecting the nursery school, the dancing class, any association with other children one should consider the potential influences involved.

Children should be taught respect for other people's property at an early age. Parents should be careful not to let their children play with toys belonging to other children. To obtain this, Mrs. Angelo Patri, 100 West 14th St., New York 14, N. Y.
