GOP Battling Mistakes for Political Life

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—Political life who unhappily assert the party organization and sitting new evidence of what they believe to be wrong.
All of this, of course, is cited more in anger than in logic. This latest complaint is similar to but not identical with those which have pertained to the Republican Party since its administration in 1953. The evidence that the top men in the administration cannot or will not play politics for keeps.
For example, the Republican Party was reorganized a fortnight ago by Wisconsin voters who elected William Proxmire, a Democrat, to the U.S. Senate. Joseph P. McCarthy's senate seat, Wisconsin is normally and traditionally a Republican state. Proxmire defeated McCarthy, a Republican, and a Republican candidate in Wisconsin. The election was a severe blow to the Republican prestige and prospects.

Received News
The new Democratic senator-elect hurried to Washington, took his seat before adjournment and stayed on to adjust to his new environment. Good thing he did too. The department of health, education and welfare telephoned Democratic Proxmire a couple of days ago to report that "he had a blood-clot, a substantial one, in a hospital in Port Washington, Wis."
This good news, elsewhere unknown, was transmitted by Proxmire to his Wisconsin constituents. He said that he was getting results mighty fast, what better evidence could there be than the government's check for more than \$1,700,000 shortly to be received?
Port Washington is in Wisconsin's 11th congressional district represented by a Republican, William K. Paul, now in his fourth term. The department did not advise Proxmire that the United Press was informed of his allegation to his district of funds to build a hospital addition. Neither did the department call Wisconsin's Republican Sen. Alexander Wiley. It was a good deal all around for freshmen senators.

Somebody Goofed
It was bad for the Republican party in Wisconsin, however. This incident is not precisely typical nor did it suggest that Secretary Martin, a member of the health, education and welfare department, is a boob. This latter is entirely possible and, perhaps, probable.
The incident is an example of what the political press mean when they complain that the top people in the Eisenhower administration do not or will not play politics. They mean the legitimate, petty kind of politics which goes off at the polls. It is not often that a government department would tip-off a Democratic member of congress that a chunk of federal money was about to fall into the lap of deserving constituents. More of a problem is that the Republican department heads fail to make sure that Republican congressmen will be tipped off in time to let the voters put home here any available good news from their good Republican friends in Washington.

There is a defeatist attitude in the upper Republican ranks. It seems to be well founded.

Ernst will discuss park problems with some 250 park service officials expected for the week-long meeting.

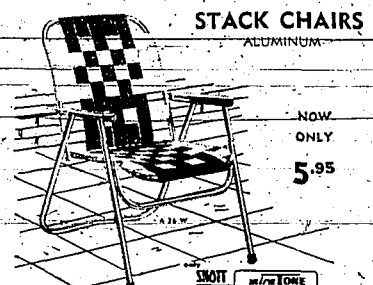
800-Foot Plunge Kills Utah Miss

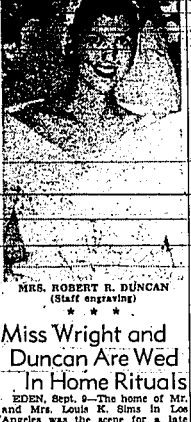
