

U. S. Softens Position For Crisis in East

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11 (AP)—The United States today placed its military and political strength behind a policy of seeking a settlement in the Middle East.

Officials said this country has important strategic reasons for the policy, a cooling-off of the crisis provoked by pro-Soviet forces in Syria.

The move for the time being is a tactical move, officials said, to ease the situation in Syria.

Keep the situation in Syria flexible but not formally writing Syria off as a Soviet satellite. This would allow Syria, if it chooses, to ease its ties with Moscow.

Avoid any action which might pressure the United States to intervene in Syria with armed force.

Undercut Soviet propaganda attributing "war plans" against Syria to the United States.

Assure Israel that the speeded-up delivery of previously programmed aid to Jordan, Saudi Arabia, Lebanon and Iraq does not jeopardize Israel's security.

The new American approach to the Syrian crisis is in sharp contrast to tactics followed by the Eisenhower administration only a few days ago.

A series of administration actions and statements sounded the alarm bell. Official statements voiced deep concern and the possibility of American intervention under the Eisenhower doctrine or within the United Nations.

Under the Eisenhower doctrine, the administration threatened to dispatch to the Middle East a "fact-finding" force.

President Eisenhower, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and Undersecretary of State W. Averell Harriman met at the White House last Tuesday in extraordinary session to discuss the Syrian crisis.

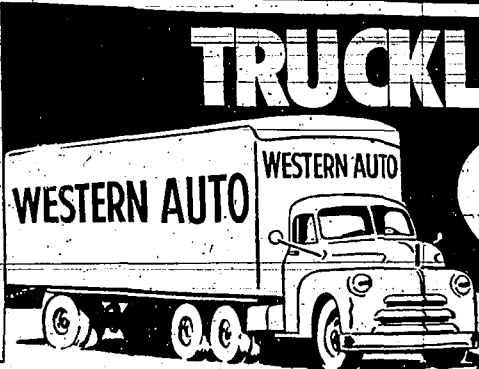

"Like" Affixes Signature on Refugee Law

NEWPORT, R. I., Sept. 11.—President Roosevelt signed the new immigration law today, but he called it "regrettable" legislation.

The measure, while making improvements in present practices, is a disappointment in that it fails to deal with many of the serious inequities inherent in the immigration and nationality act.

The President signed the bill in a statement accompanying his approval of the bill.

The law will affect the bill because it put into effect some of his recommendations to congress last January.

Still Restrictive
But he objected to the failure of congress to grant permanent residence to Hungarian refugees, and the fact that the bill did not establish policies on admitting refugees and escapes from persecution and oppression.

The bill allows 50,000 aliens, over and above present immigration quotas, to come into the country during the next two years if they can establish "hardship" cases.

Eisenhower wanted a much broader overhaul of the immigration law. He said today his recommendations of last January should be "promptly considered" by the next session of congress.

No-Golf

The President signed the bill in his small office here on the Newport navy base. He decided, too, that because of heavy early morning rain he would not play golf today.

The new law will permit an unlimited number of foreign nationals to be admitted by Americans in the next two years if they can establish "hardship" cases.

'Language Links' Theory Gets Little Support in Experiment

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—A critical blow has been aimed at the attractive theory that because many of the same associations were primitive, wordless brutes, there have to be similar sounds in all languages which mean similar things.

The theory is that these brutes, the makers of the first words, that they made words by imitating the natural sound of the thing they wanted to name, and that many of these sounds would be the same no matter what caves or trees our ancestors inhabited.

For instance, the word "grunt" suggests the sound which the act of grunting produces. In science, when you have a theory you try to prove it or disprove it, and this theory got some "good" testing "grunting" from the following experiment:

—Eighty-six English-speaking persons were asked to guess the meanings of 42 words from Hindi, Czech, and Chinese on a basis of how they sounded. With some words, success ran as high as 97 per cent.

So the experimenting psychologists, R. W. Brown, A. H. Black, and A. J. Horowitz, reported to their colleagues that this was "indicative of a primitive phonetic symbolism deriving from the origin of speech in some kind of imitative or phonological linkage of sound and meaning."

But now comes Yvonne Brackbill and Kenneth B. Little of Stanford University to say Brown, Black and Horowitz made a number of experimental errors (which make their theory more doubtful).

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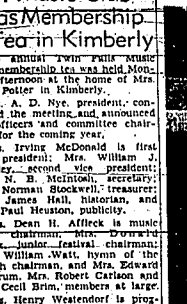
