# U.S. Will Not Cease A-Testing Until Agreements Are Reached

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Sept. 30 (AP)—The United States declared today it will continue nuclear atom testing until the Soviet Union agrees to stop producing atomic and hydrogen weapons. In a speech before the U. N.'s 12-nation disarmament commission, U. S. Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge challenged the Kremlin to accept such a ban on stockpiling weapons if it really wants to end the nuclear tests. Soviet Delegate Arkady A. Sobolev insisted on an immediate and unconditional end of the tests.
