Trial Ends as Jury Remains In 'Deadlock'

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 2 (AP)—One of the most sensational courtroom dramas in movie history—the trial of the accused assassin of President John F. Kennedy—ended today in a "deadlock" after the jury failed to reach a verdict in the 13th day of deliberation.

The trial came to a sudden end yesterday when the much-confused jury revealed they were "hopelessly deadlocked" 7-6 for conviction. Supreme Court Justice Earl Warren ordered a mistrial and set Oct. 10 for a new trial which will take place in a new courtroom.

Whether the new trial will take place remains a big question mark. The prosecution had vowed to "fight to the end" for a conviction but the defense maintained a new trial "will be a shameful waste of the taxpayer's money."

The jury's deadlock came after six weeks of dragging out the trial, during which the prosecution had to prove its case through the limelight and the defense had to prove its case through the limelight.

Seaton Views Possible Uses Of Sea Water

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MADISON, Wis., Oct. 2 (AP)—Secretary of the Interior Fred Seaton has expressed hope the nation's growing demand for water will be met in 15 years through the conversion of salt water.

"There is a reasonable expectation," Seaton said last night, "that the cost of converted water will be brought down to 60 cents per thousand gallons for even less."

Water may "well be our No. 1 domestic problem within a relatively few years," Seaton told almost 400 members of the American Forestry association. It is unlikely the expected demand in the years after 1975 can be met with additional reservoirs, he said.

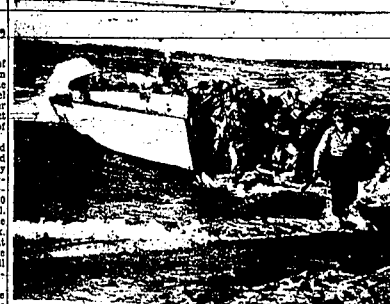
Blast Is Fatal

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Benson Avers Farmers Have Pricing Right

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Benson says he believes farmers have just as much right as manufacturers to control the flow of their products to markets.

But they should do the controlling on their own and not look to the government to do it.

The secretary gave these views at a news conference yesterday. He has been asked if it were possible for farmers to produce and sell in a "free market" in competition with manufacturers who "limit their sales to hold up prices."

Benson said that any controlling of farm markets should be carried out through farm cooperative and marketing agreements. The marketing agreement is being used now quite extensively in the sale of fruits and vegetables. Under them, only the better quality portion of the affected crops is allowed to move to market.

They have the effect of keeping quality and low quality products off markets—where quality often depresses prices for the quality product.

BOARD WANTS Lower Scales For Supports

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Benson said yesterday the national agricultural advisory commission wants the Eisenhower administration to press congress for authority to provide lower price supports for surplus crops.

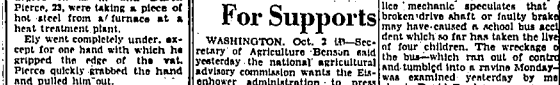

20 Dams Being Recommended For Northwest

PORTLAND, Oct. 2 (U.)—Twenty dams costing more than two billion dollars are needed to utilize the water power in the Pacific Northwest, according to a report by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

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Prestige Loss Pondered by Dixie Demos

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (AP)—The evidence is piling up that Dixie leaders are thinking hard about the fact that the south is being called a political backwash.

The influence of Southerners in the councils of the Democratic party is being questioned by the new votes cast for Republican presidential candidates have gained to influence them for the southern point of view.

What, to do about all of this is something Southern Democratic spokesmen and office holders must now consider—along with the significant fact that the new Negro vote in the south may be coming up with new leaders and new office holders.

The direction of Southern political thinking was indicated last week by James W. Byrnes of South Carolina, a qualified spokesman for his state. South Carolina is one of those in the south committed by its legislature to defy racial integration in the schools by every legal means.

He served in the house and senate, as associate justice of the supreme court, as secretary of state and, more recently, as governor of South Carolina.

At Greenville, S. C., last week, Byrnes snipped out a pattern for Southern political action and objectives, as follows:

"Notwithstanding the political gloom which now surrounds us, the South may be referred to its place in the councils of the nation if its leaders, forgetting all political differences, will now begin to organize for a united South."

"You may be sure that, under present conditions, no man south of the Potomac will be placed on the presidential ticket of either party unless that man is willing to betray his people."

"But if you organize and let the people know that you are not in the bag for either political party, we may have some chance of securing written pledges that will assure some respect for the U. S. constitution and a greater respect for local government."

"That's about it. Byrnes' prescription is that the South find a political alliance within which it may regain a substantial voice in the making of national policy. It seems more likely that the South will go it alone politically than establish the political alliance Byrnes suggested."

The natural policy which the South most urgently desires to establish would relate to the overall problem of race relations, what Sen. Richard B. Russell, D. Ga., termed the commingling of the white and Negro races.

Neither the Republican party nor the non-Southern elements of the Democratic party would be likely to welcome an alliance on those terms. The Negro vote outside the South is too important for either party to do with the South or civil rights or on state's rights either.

U. S. News and World Report estimates in its current issue that 4 million Negro voters look a balance of power in 14 states outside the South—those 14 states—Maryland, with 14 per cent of Negro voters; 4.6 per cent of Negro voters. The others are Delaware, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Michigan, Missouri, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania and West Virginia. Those 14 states cast a powerhouse of 281 presidential electoral votes. Needed to win: 269.
