The white boys and girls straggled out of the front door of the school minutes after the 9 a.m. bell rang for the change of classes. They massed in the curbing and began shouting to other students peering from windows and doorways: "Come on you chickens! You dirty chickens!"

Harshness of Arab Attacks

Not Expected

The Arab states had been expected to make a show of unity in the U. N. general assembly but the harshness of their remarks to the United States and the West was something of a surprise. In the United States and Syria, Saudi Arabia has been advocating moderation. Wednesday, however, her minister of state made an embittered statement in the United Nations assembly. He said the Arab states were preparing for some dangerous adventure. He said that Russia was pouring arms into the Middle East to prepare advanced bases for itself. A suggestion is for itself. Arab national honor, he said. He denied the right of other nations to be interested in the affairs of the Arab states, saying that he labored at efforts by either side to draw the Middle East into the cold war.

At one point he denied the right of the United States and the West to interfere or to join in international declarations regarding the Middle East. But at most points he held the Arab states to the rights of Western imperialism.

He denied Arab relations with Russia, and criticized Britain and France. All of this indicates that American relations with even the most friendly Arab states are extremely delicate. And the Saudi Arabian delegate made it clear they will get away from the West continues its efforts to hold Syria up before the U. N. as a horrible example of dealings with Russia.

In this connection it is notable that only Arab member of the United Nations has just returned to his country with a message of solidarity with Syria in Arab matters, which means primarily opposition to Israel.

The whole business raises a serious question as how long the United States will be able to maintain her position on her pro-Arab, pro-Israel, pro-France, pro-British, and communist letter-rotter.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3 (AP)—Two members of the tax-writing house ways and means committee said Wednesday they have not given up hope for a tax cut next year despite prospects that the government surplus will be smaller than first forecast.

In separate interviews, Representatives Macchione, D. Mich., and McCarver, D. Pa., said they expect the committee to review closely the new budget bureau figures at general hearings in January.

Macchione said that even if the committee determines that the government financial situation will not permit a general income tax reduction, there ought to be some selection of cuts in taxes to take care of the deficit.

Blockade May Cause Reds to End Holdouts

SAN MARINO, Oct. 3 (AP)—A total blockade of this tiny state by Italian troops threatened today to starve Communist leaders out of the government.

Communist leaders denied the blockade and said they would not surrender and said they would not give up to a provisional government set up in a half-built factory by Christian Democrats.

"We will die here rather than give up our ground," a red spokesman said.

Within Italy

This 35-square-mile republic, the world's oldest, is situated near the Italian coast completely within Italy. It depends on food, manufactured goods and a \$250,000 annual subsidy from Italy for survival.

When the Christian Democrats government Tuesday and both sides started arming their followers, Italy ordered federal police to seal off the island and contain any eruption of civil war.

Good Position

The Christian Democrats were in a more strategic position to get supplies. Their headquarters were only 50 yards from the border—the communist-held palace is six miles from the border.

Informal sources said the communists would start leaving the island within two or three days.

Clemency Denied Convicted Killer

BOISE, Oct. 3 (AP)—The state board of pardons denied clemency Wednesday to a lifer who entered the Idaho penitentiary 17 years ago for killing a law officer in Postville.

The convict is Britt Hargrave, 26, 1940, on a conviction of murder in the first degree. Hargrave was arrested following a gun battle near the Idaho State college campus.

The board, operating its October meeting, acted on 10 cases. It denied clemency in four of them, committed one sentence, gave four final releases and passed one case to a future meeting.

Newsman Charged as Paper Digs Into Police Corruption

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 3 (AP)—The police reporter and city editor of the Courier-Journal, the fraud jury indicted a real estate developer and two county police officers. The indictment charged Howard A. Burkland with drunk driving and money. Zimmerman and Capt. Carlos Johns are accused of failing to arrest Burkland, and Zimmerman is charged with taking money from him.

Barry Bingham, president of the Courier-Journal and Louisville Times, issued a statement which described the piece of paper as "simply a receipt obtained by a county police officer . . . from a man who had alleged a criminal attack upon him by the son of the chief of police."

He said, "To have failed to publish the details when they were made available to us would have amounted to a gross betrayal of public interest . . . if these charges were brought for the purpose of intimidating these newspapers into suppressing unfavorable facts, now or in the future, the effort will fail."

The paper is signed by Delph Bigham, Vine Grove, Ky., acknowledging receipt of \$100.75 from Layman and three youths and waiving further claims of damages in a scuffle in March of 1956, during which the three youths and Walter Layman, Jr., son of chief, are alleged to have robbed Skazas.

The four boys were indicted on robbery charges as a result of the inquiry, and the chief—who resigned last month after the newspaper printed the story and a photograph of the receipt—is charged with willful neglect of duty in intervening to prevent arrest and prosecution of his son.





Terror Grips Residents as Island Arises

ANGRADE HERIOTSMOON, Astoria, Oct. 3 (AP)—A volcanic island, 100 feet high, rose from the sea near here today to the accompaniment of violent explosions and the prayers of frightened people.

The island, shrouded in whitish smoke, was seen at 120 feet above the sea and is nearly 1,000 feet in diameter. Each hour the island increases. The sea there is 40 fathoms deep.

The island is 70 miles west of Angra de Heriots and only a few hundred yards from the island where 25,000 residents fear they will suffer the fate that befell Pompeii.

The bishop of the island started on Sept. 25 when severe earthquakes were registered near the island. Two days later, huge underwater explosions tore the surface of the sea, and some rocks and sand were blown into the air.

Sgt. John Bradley, manager of the island, said that on Sept. 27, 8, air force television set radio station at Lajes air base on Terceira Island, flew over the volcano and reported a lowering pillar of white smoke billowing up to 1,500 feet from a black crater.

As we got closer the air became saturated with the smell of hot sulphur," Bradley reported. "The water was dark and a yellowish glow for two or three miles surrounding the phenomenon."

On Sunday, when the volcano was first reaching the surface of the ocean, authorities evacuated 1,500 people from Capota and another 1,000 from Norte, hamlets a few miles away.

In the streets of Norte, capital of the island, at the opposite end of the island by 11-mile island, people prayed in the streets. An image of the Virgin of Fatima, patron saint of Portugal, was carried from a church in a procession from the threatened village of Capota.

Governor Cool to Joint Prison Idea

OLYMPIA, Wash., Oct. 3 (AP)—A suggestion that Pacific Northwest states jointly construct a maximum security prison at a cool reception from Gov. Rosellini Wednesday.

The suggestion was made by the governor of Wyoming.

In answer to questions from newsmen, Rosellini said the new maximum security building at the state prison will take care of Washington's maximum security confinement needs for the time being.

He said State Sen. Neil Holt of Tacoma made a similar suggestion to the legislative council some time ago but it was not acted upon.

Quemoy Absorbs Artillery Beating

TAIPEI, Oct. 3 (AP)—The Communist Chinese artillery on Hsiao Tung Island shelled the national Chinese-held offshore island of Quemoy yesterday afternoon, the national defense ministry said.

The shelling caused no casualties and little damage, the ministry said. It was the first Communist shelling since Aug. 31.

Red's Rocket Plan Is Told To Scientists

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3 (AP)—The Soviet Union has opened up somewhat on some of its rocket plans for the present International Geophysical year (IGY).

A Russian scientist, A. M. Kozlov, started an eagerly attentive audience of international rocket experts last night with a full description of work on a Soviet "meteo-logical" rocket.

Kozlov described a "meteo-logical" rocket which normally rises to an altitude of 85 kilometers (about 50 miles). He promised the Soviet would give details at a later conference on a new rocket which operates up to 200 kilometers.

Kozlov revealed, with pictures, that the nose and body of the meteorological rocket are loaded back to earth with two separate parachutes and frequently land within a radius of one kilometer (about five-eighths of a mile) from the launching tower.

He said that at a high point of the rocket trajectory, the parachute on the head of the rocket has a stabilizing effect which prolongs the instrumental observations which are being made.

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Official Seeks Alterations in Law on Labor

BOISE, Oct. 3 (U. S. —) Secretary of Labor Mitchell Wednesday called on state labor chiefs to work out broad-er state programs in such areas as workmen's compensation, minimum wage laws and supervision of union welfare funds.

"The actions that states have taken in recent years in improving laws to improve the welfare of workers are inspiring to all of us," he said, "but the closer a unit of government is to a problem, the more and righter will be its solution," said the secretary in a prepared speech.

But, he said, states need to strengthen their side of the federal-state partnership in dealing with labor and welfare problems.

The speech was prepared for the final day session of the National Association of Governmental Labor officials convention here.

Not Present

Mitchell said he would not attend. His speech was read to the 200 labor administrators from 12 states, U. S. territories and Canada by Newell Brown, Washington, assistant secretary of labor.

"The field of labor legislation, the states are particularly well equipped to carry much of the burden," he said, "and the federal government is particularly well equipped to provide the funds for the federal government should do only those things which the people cannot do for themselves."

The secretary's address noted that in the past year 22 states or territories raised their unemployment insurance benefits.

"I am very sorry to say that only one, Vermont, has passed a bill," Mitchell said, "but he felt it was 'highly important' that congress should consider extending the coverage of the federal minimum wage before 'further future increases make expansion difficult.' The new bill at an hour federal minimum took effect last spring.

The convention Monday heard its legislative committee recommend JAGLO support of a bill extending the at an hour minimum into the service trades, chain stores and other large interstate employers.

Law-enforcement, supervision of union health, welfare and pension plans, he said, have been proposed by the administration.

"This would leave to the states matters of regulation which are exclusively the responsibility of the states—auditing and supervising of funds," regulatory matters have been adopted in New York, Washington, Connecticut, California and Wisconsin, he said.

Disappointed

Mitchell said "I was disappointed by the lack of support by state labor departments of our legislation to provide grants-in-aid to states for the improvement of safety programs."

"If there is a feeling in some states that federal aid is not the best answer to the alarming problem of industrial health and accidents," said Mitchell, "then I would welcome any suggestions for a better course of action."

Mitchell said he thought more state mediation service should be furnished for minor labor disputes.

"It is my opinion such knowledge and on-the-spot mediation produces the best and quickest settlements," he said.

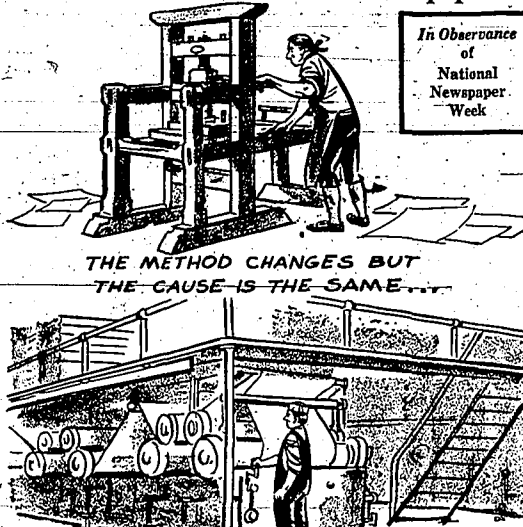

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Visitor Avers Russians Are In 'Isolation'

NEW YORK, Oct. 3 (AP)—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt said today that Russian people live in "isolation" from the mainstream of world events and do not get a fair picture of the world as it really is.

Writing in her column, "My Day," Mrs. Roosevelt said that she had cut out of the world as it is, and that she had spent the last week from a 27-day tour of Russia that included an interview with communist party boss Nikita S. Khrushchev.

"It is practically impossible for the people of the U. S. to believe that isolation such as exists in the Soviet Union can really exist anywhere in the world today," she said.

"The only newspapers that can be bought in Russia are the communist ones, the communist German papers, the communist French papers and the English Daily Worker."

Mrs. Roosevelt said one of the Soviet newspapers she saw ran all sorts of plans for the celebration of the 40th anniversary of the Russian revolution, and only 21 percent of the world news.

She said the only news about the United States she read was "that we have refused to allow our Negro children to go to school with our white children in Arkansas and Tennessee."

"When I pointed out to anyone that this particular difficulty involved only a small segment of the U. S.—seven or eight states, at the most, out of 48—and that this is not a fair presentation of news from the U. S., I was usually met with the remark that the individual with whom I was speaking knew nothing about the world," she wrote.

"That is the refuge of all intelligent people," she said, "the Soviet Union who want a quiet life."

Baggage, for both, is another one that sticks to my memory like a leech, and an "m" for with, I find of late to give up "m". I like the U. S. I would more like "with" than "with" does. Steak with potatoes. Ham with eggs. Milk is very catching.

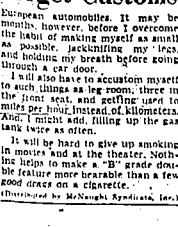

I am working on getting into big American cars whenever I have a chance. The technique is radically different from entering the small ones.
