HAILEY, Oct. 10.—Condition of Eugene Farnworth, 19, Carey, and Stanley Sparks, about 50, was reported not critical by the Hailey Clinic hospital Wednesday. Farnworth and Sparks were injured in a car-tractor accident which resulted in the death of Leland Smith, 26, Carey farmer, at 7 p.m. Wednesday. Smith was riding on a trailer behind a farm tractor which was struck from the rear by an automobile driven by Farnworth about one-half mile south of Carey.

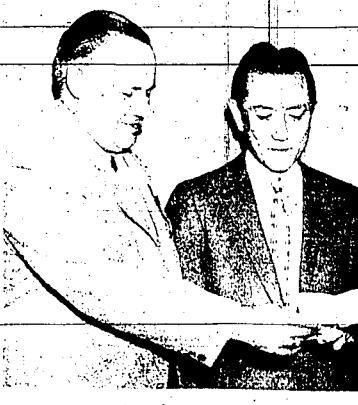

Sputnik Beeps Along Merry Rocket Viewed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—Sputnik's beeping rocket, circling in space with the Russian satellite, was confirmed by an observation team scanning radar scans over New England. Scientists called it the first visual fix in this country though there have been previous sightings reported from individuals. The satellite continued in its orbit, emitting radio "beeps."

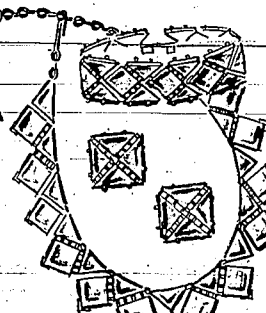
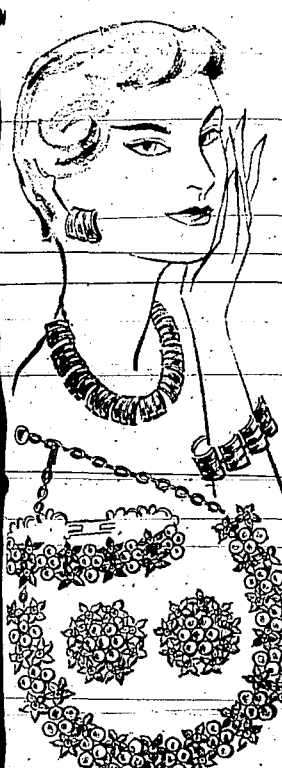

Whalers Ply U. S. Waters After Years

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10 (AP)—The "Thar she blows" is being heard once again off the Golden Gate.

The once-famous U. S. whaling industry is staging a comeback. Three sturdy boats based at nearby San Pablo have revived the quest for whales, a search that played a large part in the romantic and economic fabric of America.

The boats belong to the Del Monte company of San Francisco, headed by Otto Wetsch, a fisherman for 35 years. He says the whaling operation is the only whaling station in the country.

New Demand Felt

Wetsch's company last year began the rejuvenation of an industry that began dying out in the last century. The development of kerosene, gasoline and electricity eliminated the need for whale oil in lighting and heating the nation's homes and factories.

Now, modern technology has helped revive the whaling industry. The company, borrowing a phrase from the meat packers, says it is "cutting everything but the squeal" in marketing the 56-foot, 100,000 pound mammals.

Hunt Starts Early

The hunt begins at dawn when the five-man boats head out the Golden Gate for the hunting grounds in the cool gray waters between San Francisco and the Farallon Islands 25 miles offshore.

The 56-foot boats are equipped with harpoon guns in the bow. As in days of old, the gunner is the key man. When a whale is sighted, it is his alter ego which determines whether the boat returns to port with a catch worth \$2,000.

The harpoon has an explosive attached to it, but it doesn't always hit the whale right away. Wetsch said last year, a 56-foot harpoon dragged a boat for five hours before it did.

The boats stay out until they catch whales. The catches are then towed by the fall to San Pablo where they are landed out of the water and cut down by men wielding razor-sharp knives attached to long poles.

Uses Valves

As in the old days, the blubber is boiled down to oil. But instead of being used for heat and light, it is sold to manufacturers of paints, soap and lipstick. Ranchers feed it to cattle.

Milk farmers and pet food producers buy the meat and anything that is left over is put in the grinder and sold for chicken feed.

Wetsch doesn't discuss his whaling business in terms of dollars. He just says 200 whales have been bagged so far this season. April through October, and always as low as this is a pretty good haul.

United Nations, Oct. 10 (AP)—A resolution that would eventually reduce to 20 per cent the U. S. share of the U. N. costs was approved Wednesday by the General Assembly's finance committee.

The vote on the U. S. 23-20 resolution was 43-17, with 17 members including the Soviet bloc abstaining. Approval by the full assembly is thus virtually assured.

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Eisenhower, Governor Settle Down to Waiting Game in Little Rock Dispute

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Oct. 10 (AP)—The real issue in Little Rock is not the admission of nine Negro students to Central high school.

It is whether, when and how all of the public schools of the South shall be integrated.

Both sides know that this has become a test case which will set a precedent of far-reaching importance. The reason why President Eisenhower and Gov. Orval E. Faubus can't agree on terms for withdrawing federal troops is that they have exactly opposite ideas of what the precedent should be.

Eisenhower believes Little Rock must demonstrate the readiness of the United States government to use whatever force may be necessary to prevent violence from blocking the final decrees of a federal court.

Faubus believes the nation will learn from Little Rock that the "federal intervention" of a Southern school can be accomplished only by sending federal troops to the scene and keeping them there for a very long time. He thinks the White House has found it impractical to pay this price.

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That would permit the early withdrawal of federal forces.

This pledge would be to use the national guard, when it is returned to state control, to protect the nine Negro youths from any violence as they attend classes at Central high school.

The president now is counting on the forces of moderation, now being mobilized in Little Rock by church, business and civic leaders. He is hopeful that their efforts, including a city-wide prayer service to be held this Saturday, will create a climate in which local authorities, backed up by the majority of law-abiding citizens, can cope with any threat of violence.

Once Washington is persuaded that moderates are in control of the situation, the paratroopers of the 101st airborne division may be sent back to Ft. Campbell, Ky.

The Arkansas national guard could be held under federal control for a while after the paratroopers leave, with some of its units mobilized at nearby Camp Robinson on quick call.

The departure of troops from Central high school would not mean that the federal government was pulling down its guard entirely. There is another army in Little Rock—a multi-racial army of FBI agents, possibly the largest group of them ever assembled for an assignment of this kind. They will keep a close watch on Central high school long after the troops are gone.

If trouble develops, the government will move swiftly in the federal "coast" to "obtain" injunctions against the mob leaders.

Anyone who violated such an injunction could be arrested and imprisoned for criminal contempt.

A federal judge can try a criminal contempt case very quickly; no jury is necessary.

This is Washington's present strategy, according to competent sources here.

Like all strategy, it may be upset by what the other side does. Its most vulnerable point would appear to be the assumption that Little Rock moderates, belatedly aroused, will be able to clamp the lid on Faubus's box of racial passion which has been opened here.

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Pocatello's Ballot Mark Threatened

POCATELLO, Oct. 10 (AP)—An unofficial count of 3,413 ballots in Tuesday's municipal election here made the voting the second largest in history for a Pocatello city election, city officials said today.

They said the figure was topped only in 1956 when 3,553 Pocatello residents voted for their first city commissioners.

City officials said enactment of a new dog leash ordinance which voters approved overwhelmingly in the Tuesday election might have to wait until after Jan. 1 if the present commission decided to leave the matter to the incoming commissioners.

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Two Pictures Drawn of Law For Unionism

CALDWELL, Oct. 10 (AP)—Spokane described as-called right to work legislation both as a destroyer and a lifesaver of labor unions Wednesday in the first public debate since the start of a move to pass such a law by initiative in Idaho.

David Doane, Boise attorney and co-initiator, said "Laborers will be happier under right to work legislation and management will be too." He said labor unions actually would become more attractive under such legislation and proper because more laboring men would want to join them.

Doane took the affirmative side of the question: "Resolved: that it should be illegal to require union membership as a condition of employment."

Opposing the question was Charles R. Smith, director of region 20 of the AFL-CIO. Smith said he considered the law restrictive and added he thought it should be titled the "right to destroy labor unions" law.

He said the proposal would "weaken bargaining rights of employees, so management could pay any wages and declare any hours that they desire."

Legislation Wants Funds
Also appearing on the platform, but not taking sides in the debate, was Rep. George R. Crookham, Jr., of Canyon. Crookham said he felt any such law should be supported by adequate funds to carry out its provisions. He said, contracts, under which labor should be "enforceable on both sides."

Smith's assistant in the debate at the College of Idaho was Darrell Doane, secretary of the Idaho Federation of Labor. Doane was assisted by Fred J. Smith, executive secretary of the Idaho Freedom to Work committee.

The Freedom to Work committee recently began asking Idahoans to sign petitions requesting that a right-to-work law be placed on the 1958 election ballot.

Advocates for the action was Dr. Lester McCreary, College of Idaho co-ordinator.

Students Get Damage Bills
BOISE, Oct. 10 (AP)—Boise Junior college officials today billed 28 students for the cost of damages to the college of Idaho football stadium.

The students were identified as those who took part in a raid on the stadium. Damage in the raid consisted of torn-down goal posts and a "B" burned in the turf of the football field.

"We do not tolerate destruction of property or vandalism on the part of our students," Boise Junior college President Eugene B. Chaffee said in announcing "the action."

College Vice President W. L. Gotwalt said a check for damages would be on the way to the College of Idaho today.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—The Library of Congress braved itself today for the onslaught that is sure to come: The rush by song writers to get their first with a song mentioning the Russian satellite, the Sputnik.

"It's a little too early," I guess," Richard MacCartney of the copyright division, said. But MacCartney isn't selling short the nation's song writers.

For evidence he can point to the 18 early bids which need only the barest announcement that "this country was planning a satellite to burst into space. How were they to know that Moscow would get there first and that to be real hip their masterpieces should have a Russian accent?

But they did their best. Already copyrighted are such works as "Satellite Baby" by Jerry Hoffman; "Sputnik" by Raymond R. Hopman; and "Satellite Satellite" with the Hoogie Bree, which required the combined talents of Sam Poerner and Vincent Warren Baling.

There have been uncynical parodies with titles like "Shuffling Off to Mars" or "Racing With the Sputnik."

But, men, let's face it. Getting a good rhyme for Sputnik is something few song writers can do. The Sputnik Institute. To add to the problem is the pronunciation. Is it spoo, like in ju? Or spoo, like in ju?

Either way it's a mess as this sample will prove:
"You are so cute, chick,
Under this Sputnik."

Army Blamed For GI's Case
HONOLULU, Oct. 10 (AP)—A Veterans of Foreign Wars senior vice commander says reprehensible in Japan from the GI raid incident, were unnecessary. He blames the U. S. army for most of the trouble.

John Mahan of Helena, Mont., the VFW official, went to Japan to represent the organization at the trial of army Sgt. J. C. William S. Girard, who killed Mrs. Naka Sakai with a blank cartridge as she was picking up blank scraps on a U. S. firing range.

Mahan said if the army had been immediately to Mrs. Sakai's family, apologized and offered to help, the Japanese people might never have demanded Girard's trial in Japanese courts.

Mahan left last night for Washington to report to legislative representatives of the VFW.

Soviet Chiefs Frustrated by U. S. Attitude

By United Press
Soviet communist leader Nikita S. Khrushchev is showing signs of frustration over United States attitude to his bids for high-level talks. It might be thought that Khrushchev has every reason to be happy over Russia's military and diplomatic situation.

Russia has succeeded in establishing a foothold in Syria by sending that country weapons after arming Egypt. The American diplomatic position in the middle east can hardly be called good at the moment. Russia has announced the successful testing of the "ultimate weapon," the intercontinental ballistic missile.

And now it has made history by launching an earth satellite which is hurrying round the world at the rate of 18,000 miles an hour.

U. S. Vice President Richard M. Nixon said that the United States still shows no sign of wanting to talk things over in a top-level conference with Khrushchev and Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev.

U. S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles has been holding for months that would welcome another "summit" conference in which "President Eisenhower and Premier Khrushchev" would meet.

Now Khrushchev has disclosed that the Soviet government tried to get the United States to invite Marshal Georgi K. Zhukov, Soviet defense minister, to Washington and that he was turned down.

Khrushchev made this disclosure in an interview in Moscow with James Reston, chief of the New York Times Washington bureau.

Khrushchev was pretty bitter about it. "That is a bad thing," he said. "We are a proud nation and we do not want to go down on our knees to arrange these things."

The Russian bid stemmed from a statement Eisenhower made at a press conference in Washington on July 17, when he was asked whether a meeting between Zhukov and Reston would be useful.

"It might," the President said. "There is no harm in trying experimentally in order to bring about better relations."

But the President added a warning that such meetings might raise high expectations and there would be a bad reaction if the expectations were not realized.

It develops that the Russian leaders did not pay sufficient attention to this qualification.

Dulles bluntly said: "The Soviet embassy in Washington advised Secretary of State John Foster Dulles that an invitation to Zhukov to visit the United States would be accepted. Dulles refused to make the invitation."

It is evident that Khrushchev, like other Russian leaders, does not realize how important obstacles to any such invitation.

"The first is that Russia shows no sign at all that it is ready to enter in good faith high-level talks on disarmament," the Middle East or any other big East-West issue.

"The other thing is that Zhukov or any other high Soviet leader who visited the United States would be left in no doubt that he was unwelcome to many people. The danger of hostile demonstrations would be great."

"This, it may be added, is true also of such communist leaders as President Tito of Yugoslavia and communist leader Wladyslaw Gomulka of Poland, with whose governments relations are good."

General Says U. S. Heading To Subjection

PHOENIX, Oct. 10.—A retiring general said last night the United States must meet the challenge presented by the Russian satellite or "be at the mercy of the Soviet Union."

Dr. Robert L. Scott, a decorated World War II pilot who was a commander of Luke Air Force base, was speaker at a banquet of the Phoenix Executive club here Oct. 31.

His achievement has been to achieve something that the United States has been unable to achieve—to start a new era on the Pacific.

He said, "If necessary, let's get out of all three branches of the service. Let's pull out from each of the points enough forward looking to form a missile corps."

Scott said he was not criticizing the navy or the army, and that his forces had held up free generation after generation. But he added to changing conditions in the world.

Being Eastern
Scott said the Russian satellite was "a hunk of more than a hunk of iron." He referred to a statement attributed to a navy spokesman that the satellite was "just a hunk of iron."

Scott said the satellite "spunk" future devices which can cancel the world.

Scott, who retired from the navy last month, also derided the "service rivalry," and intimated that such rivalry could have retarded the development of a satellite. Scott was author of the book, "God Is My Co-Pilot."

Giant Rocket Being Tested For Big Trip

MEMPHIS, Ala., Oct. 10.—A rocket described as a four-stage test is being tested at Redstone Arsenal in preparation for a hoped-for record jump of 4,000 miles into space, the Birmingham News said today.

The device resembles a cluster of six pipes dangling behind a giant balloon and will be launched from a rocket stall in the Pacific within a few weeks, the News said.

Newsday's Steve Yates described the device as a four-stage rocket which will be boosted by the balloon.

The over-all length of the rocket was reported as 1,000 feet. The device is to be borne aloft by a 1,500-foot, 200-foot diameter balloon developed by General Mills and tested on June 28, the story said.

The rocket will start off from the air—exactly how is not disclosed—up speed until stage four will be upward as 15,000 miles an hour a six-by-four-inch instrument package weighing under 10 lbs.

The rocket will slow down until it reaches zero velocity at approximately 4,000 miles up.

Reds Dishing Out Accurate Satellite Data

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—It's mainly true what the Russians say about their spy satellite, Sputnik 1.

That was the verdict of U.S. scientists after the Soviet earth satellite, Sputnik for short, had whizzed around the earth 100 times.

Six days after its launching somewhere in Russia, 155-roughly unobtainable as a satellite, a fellow traveler around the earth "is still going strong."

Sputnik is moreover, shaping up as an extremely valuable tool for scientists of the world even if it never utters another "beep." Already American scientists think they have enough information about the orbit to assure precise photographic observation of the Soviet moon in the days and weeks to come.

Research Tool

This, they say, will enable them to calculate such things as pressure hundreds of miles up, and the shape and size of the earth over which Sputnik is flying.

Both U.S. and USSR scientists agreed in 1955 to send up instruments-bearing artificial moons during the International Geophysical Year (IGY), which ends Dec. 31, 1958. The project was not scheduled as a race into space.

The U.S. painstakingly designed its program from scratch. The Russians enlisted the aid of military rocketry. The United States as of Oct. 4, 1957, had progressed to the point where it felt ready to send a completely instrumented satellite into an orbit around the earth some time in early autumn.

But at 6:30 p.m. EDT on Oct. 4 the word was flashed from Moscow that the Russians had launched their Sputnik No. 1. The Russians said Sputnik was circling the earth at an altitude of 560 miles every 96 minutes, traveling at a speed of 18,000 miles an hour. They said Sputnik was a sphere about 23 inches in diameter and weighing about 184 pounds. They said it would stay up days or months.

There was some skepticism at first about the weight—184 pounds. This country plans to launch 50-inch moon laboratories weighing 21.5 pounds. It has designed a three-stage, launcher weighing 22,000 pounds.

Powerful Rocket

To get an 184-pound satellite into orbit would take launcher weighing 250,000 to 300,000 pounds—some on the order of, but more powerful than, the intercontinental ballistic missile which the Russians said in August that they had successfully tested.

Skeptical as to the weight of Sputnik—more than 184 pounds—soon vanished along with whatever other reservations Americans may have had about the genuineness of the Soviet achievement.

The Russian announcement caught U.S. scientists almost totally unprepared to track the Soviet moon. The White House said it was not surprised, but the scientists were.

By 9 p.m. yesterday the U.S. IGY radio tracking system was in full operation. It had been tracking the Russian moon and had calculated its speed at 18,000 miles an hour. This didn't mean the Soviets were giving out bogus figures on that first day when they said Sputnik was flying at 18,000 miles an hour.

What it meant was that, possibly for the first time in either hemisphere, Sputnik's true velocity was being calculated.

The U.S. scientists also figured that the moon's average height above the earth was around 400 miles.

The Russians originally said Sputnik was circling the earth every 88 minutes. They later corrected this to 96.3 minutes. American scientists have further refined the period to 96.2 minutes. This means Sputnik circles the globe just under 15 times a day.

Chuck Roasts, Ham Featured For Week-End

The thrift-conscious housewife has found several "attractively priced" meats to choose from at her neighborhood supermarket this week. Leading food chains are offering "special" chuck roasts, leg of veal, smoked chicken hams, roast turkeys and pickles for frying.

Chuck Reduced
Chuck steak is being offered at greatly reduced prices here and in other markets. The meat is a one-time product and that's why it's so cheap. It will be back where it was before the general price rise. The same holds for bacon. The general price for pork chops is up this week. Hence, the meat is being offered at a price that is a little below the retail price of large cuts. A whole pig, eight or even a dozen since last week, and medium-sized eggs are also low.

Potatoes Plentiful
Outstanding buys of the week are potatoes, peaches, cucumbers, hunched or topped beets and turnips.

Sound Marketing Practice Is Urged

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Oct. 10.—The dairy industry, as well as agriculture, must build its reputation on lower production costs and development of expanded outlets.

"We cannot build markets by price-cutting out of them," he added. "Initially high prices overstimulate production and impede the normal flow of the product into consumer use. They seriously damage competitive position and long-term markets for any product."

Consumers Borrow More, for Different Reasons, This Year

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—Consumers are borrowing more money for different reasons than a few years back. They borrow for a longer time and for different reasons.

These are findings of small loan companies across the nation. They deal with some 10 million families a year for a total of about five billion dollars.

Their reports line with the findings of the federal reserve board on the total volume of personal loans, and by other financial firms. The board figures put personal loans at 7.5 billion dollars, almost one billion above the total a year ago.

The National Consumer Finance Association queried 100 men in 26 of its member companies in 17 states and the District of Columbia on changes in the last few years. All report a shift of emphasis from emergency or remedial borrowing to convenience or better living borrowing.

A typical report is that of a St. Louis loan company. In 1933, 100,000 dollars in new loans were accounted for 12 per cent of its loans. This year they are only eight per cent of the total. In 1933, 100,000 dollars in new loans were accounted for 12 per cent of its loans.

A small loan executive in Phoenix, Ariz., reports an "increased use of consumer loans for buying goods and services to improve living standards or to make life more satisfying and enjoyable. More loans are tied in with the workers' leisure time for travel, vacations, do-it-yourself projects and hobbies."

In Portsmouth, Va., an executive reports 40 per cent of the loans are for payments on house lots and home appliances. In Columbus, O., half of the new loans are on merchant recommendation for the purchase of goods and services.

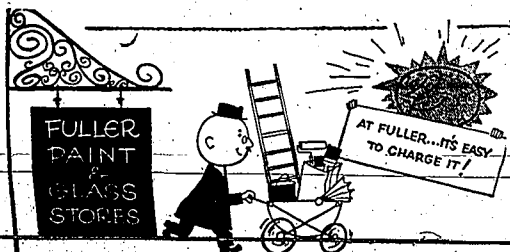
