 WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—British and American scientists discussed today over whether the Russian satellite-Carrier rocket is hurtling toward an early doom.

Dr. Fred L. Whipple said, "It will stay up for at least two months," and that the satellite will remain in the sky longer than the rocket which propelled it there Oct. 4. Whipple said the rocket's life expectancy could not be forecast at this time.

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Styling Marks '58 Chevrolet Truck Models

Fresh styling and chassis improvements mark the 1958 line of Chevrolet trucks with a major innovation noted in the assigning of names to each of the three weight classifications — the Apache, Viking and Spartan.

Olen G. Jenkins Chevrolet has the Apache, Viking and Spartan trucks on display for public inspection.

The expanded, diversified line of trucks is featured by a new 150-horsepower and more powerful and durable sizes.

New front end styling includes modern dual headlamps and redesigned grille, hood and fenders. The new line lists 12 new models for a total of 128, up 10 per cent over the number available in 1957.

For the first time, Chevrolet will assume body production responsibility for three forward control "step van" models. The same warranty and parts service will be extended to these bodies that now apply to company-built pickups, stakes and cab-chassis models.

The Apache is a light-duty model with gross volume weight ratings up to 5,000 pounds and available on two different wheelbases. The medium-duty Viking, with gross volume weight ratings up to 2,500 pounds, is available on 12 wheelbases. The Spartan is the heavy-duty model, with gross volume weight ratings up to 25,000 pounds and offered on nine wheelbases.

Five basic engines are offered in the 1958 line topped by the new large V8 specifically designed for heavy truck use. The compact engine is available only in the two largest series as standard equipment.

The high power output of the engine is derived from its unique design. The completely machined combustion chamber is located wholly within the cylinder bore. The top face of the block is machined in a 14-degree angle to the centerline of the bore instead of the conventional 90 degrees, inclining the head more toward the horizontal. The top of the cylinder provides more space for larger valves in staggered arrangement and central location of the spark plug.

In line with its improved engines, Chevrolet also is offering many improvements in chassis components. On all heavy-duty models, cast axle wheels now are standard and air brakes are optional, except on the schoolbus. The air-over-hydraulic brake system is extended to include medium-duty models for the first time.

The new trucks carry a more massive look. A varied sheet metal design gives distinction to models in each weight class, although frontal styling of all models is substantially similar, except for the step-van. Exterior changes have functional as well as style values. Modern dual headlamps extend line visibility up to 60 feet further.

Attractiveness of exteriors is matched by new amenities inside the roomy cabs. Vinyl is featured in standard cabs with optional trim and appointments available. Attention has been given to many interior details. The accelerator pedal has been re-angled for driving comfort. Hood-lift effort has been reduced from 55 pounds to 10 on the larger models. Generator capacity has been stepped up 20 per cent on most models.

Mansfield Says GOP Gains No Advantage in Dixieland

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—Senator Mansfield, D-Mont., disputed today GOP National Chairman Alcorn's claim to a net Republican gain from handling of school integration at Little Rock.

"I disagree with Mr. Alcorn that either party will benefit from this issue," said Mansfield, a vice chairman of the Democratic national committee and assistant party leader in the senate.

Alcorn conceded Republicans would lose some strength in the South, but claimed a net GOP gain in the Northern big cities where Negroes sometimes hold the balance of power.

He referred to the use of Arkansas national guard troops by Gov. Orval Faubus in a way which at first kept

Negro students out of Central high school there.

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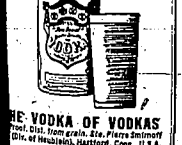

Solon Claims Air Force Was Fraud Target

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 17 (AP)—Evidence that General Motors corporation overcharged the government two million dollars on a jet plane contract is in the hands of the U. S. attorney general, Rep. P. Edward Hebert, D., La., said yesterday.

Hebert said U. S. Comptroller General Joseph Campbell forwarded the evidence in a letter to Attorney General Herbert Brownell. The letter brought up a question of civil fraud and added: "You may also wish to consider the possibility of criminal liability."

"Misrepresentation"
"It is our belief that there was a misrepresentation of material facts to the air force in connection with a contract between General Motors and the air force for production of F-84 jets in GM's Kansas City plant, the letter said."

Campbell's wife in Washington said that he is out of town and she did not know his whereabouts. A spokesman for the justice department said no comment would be made until today.

Hebert is head of a house armed forces subcommittee that conducted a hearing on the contract earlier this year. He said the comptroller general notified him of the forwarding of evidence and the justice department could take appropriate action.

The subcommittee had reported earlier that profits to General Motors on the contract ran 17 million dollars over what had been anticipated, according to evidence produced at the hearings.

A Democratic member of the subcommittee commented during the hearings that there was evidence "that on the part of the air force and cunning on the part of General Motors."

Hebert issued a statement which said:

"The comptroller-general has informed the department of justice that the claim against General Motors is based on the grounds of misrepresentation of cost prices to the air force, a question of recovery for civil fraud and the possibility of criminal liability on the part of the contractor (GM) or its employees."

Bank Sues to Gain Refund For 'Mistake'

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Oct. 17 (AP)—The Bank of Arkansas today filed suit in federal court here to gain a refund from a couple who found \$11,240.87 entered in their account through error and promptly went ahead and spent it.

To make it worse, the bank said in a suit brought against Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Alexander, the Alexanders withdrew \$2,800 of the money that was theirs and deposited it with a competitor, the First National Bank.

The \$11,240.87 was erroneously deposited to the Alexanders' account Aug. 8. The same day the Alexanders opened their account with the bank and deposited only \$114.80. At the end of August, the Alexanders got a statement showing they had \$11,240.87 in their account.

On Sept. 6, according to the suit, Alexander bought a airplane, paying for it with a \$4,500 check.

Three days later, the suit charged, the Alexanders cashed a check for \$1,930 check for a new automobile, which was registered in Mrs. Alexander's name.

On Sept. 10, the Alexanders opened an account in the First National Bank with a \$2,800 check on the Bank of Arkansas.

The Bank of Arkansas honored the checks for the airplane and automobile, but the First National Bank refused to cash the \$2,800 check until it discovered the error.

The suit charged the Alexanders intended to defraud the Bank of Arkansas and demanded a judgment of \$11,240.87.

It also asked for a writ of attachment against the couple's assets to establish their liability for the First National Bank for the \$2,800 deposited there.

New Advances by Science Can Do Much for 'Stroke' Victims

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Medical science is beginning to break the "iron grip" of the paralytic stroke. The sudden, unexpected rupture or clotting of a blood vessel in the brain no longer means all riders' victims must spend the rest of their lives in helpless stupor.

Now nine out of ten of these patients can learn to walk again. And three of these will be able to continue work.

This is encouraging outlook offered to the two million U.S. victims of stroke and other diseases of the brain-blood-vessels. They are treated in a pamphlet recently released by the National Heart Institute of the public health service's National Institute of Health.

Immediate, highly skilled medical treatment is the key to this dramatic rehabilitation success. Often within 24 hours after a stroke, doctors begin the painstaking massaging of the damaged limbs. If the patient's speech has been impaired, therapy is started almost at once.

These specialized treatments combined with expert nursing care and encouraging, optimistic attitude by the doctor and patient's family have paid large dividends in rebuilding worthwhile lives for those who were once doomed to years of crippled idleness.

Recent stroke victims are not the only ones who are benefiting from modern therapy techniques. Successful treatment has been extended to the stroke victims some people who suffered strokes years ago can be helped.

With special treatment, there are very few of these patients who can't be helped a little bit. And some can be helped a very great deal.

Special clinics have been established in hospitals throughout the nation to care for stroke patients whose cases are too serious for successful home treatment. And hospitals which don't have such therapy centers are starting to build them.

Many doctors are beginning to specialize in helping stroke patients and other disabled persons regain the use of their arms and legs. This type of physical medicine is becoming a standard course in U.S. medical schools. The result is that country doctors can give expert treatment to patients who can't afford the benefits of large medical centers.

Notable gains also are being made in the treatment of other cerebral often cause poor memory and other mental afflictions common to old people. Many times the symptoms become so acute that permanent hospitalization is required. Today, however, some of these patients are able to return home.

Although most of the victims survive stroke attacks, cerebral vascular disease still causes enough deaths each year to rank as the number three disease killer. Last year it totaled 177,110 fatalities.

That's why medical research teams are intensifying their efforts to prevent the disease from striking in the first place. So far they have found no exact cure.

But progress has been made in preventing or treating heart conditions.

U.S. Prisons Joining Parade Toward Suburbs With 'Camps'

WASHINGTON (NEA)—The old-fashioned type of prison is disappearing. Instead, inmates build roads, plant trees, maintain the grounds of air force bases, carry out pest control projects and fight forest fires.

The number of convict labor camps is increasing throughout the nation. Confinement of inmates in the great outdoors instead of within towering concrete walls is becoming a regular feature of prison management.

This revolution in convict confinement is revealed by Myrl E. Alexander, assistant director of the federal bureau of prisons.

"The labor camp is here to stay," Alexander declares. "Prison officials are learning that more and more inmates can be handled in this manner at less expense to the taxpayer and with increased training and training values for the inmates."

He says that within the last year new camps were constructed or planned by the state prison systems of Michigan, Pennsylvania, New York, Massachusetts, Wisconsin, California and Ohio.

At the camps no one swings a sledge hammer on the rock pile.

That's soon after he returned to camp. He took off after the prisoner was recaptured, police asked him why he hadn't escaped during the fire. He answered that it wouldn't have been right for him to run out on his job.

One of the most remarkable features of the outdoor prison camps is that they are virtually unsecured. None of the prison officials carries a gun. Almost all a prisoner has to do to escape is wait until no one is looking and then simply walk away.

"In spite of this," Alexander says, "each camp has only about two or three inmates a year who turn up missing."

The secret of this low escape rate is a modern classification system which enables prison authorities to pick the men best suited for camp work. Men are not assigned to prison officials believe will try to escape or will not benefit from the outdoor project.

In addition to their value in rehabilitating prisoners, more camps are being constructed because of the low costs required to build and operate them. Since few guards are needed, more men can be assigned to the important jobs of training and educating the prisoners.

The Russians say the Lenin will be the world's most powerful icebreaker—while engines generate 44,000 horsepower and capable of cruising 12 months without refueling.

Dock Leaders Ask More Use Of Machinery

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 17 (AP)—A program looking to full use of labor-saving machinery with maximum protection for the work of the dock workers was adopted here yesterday at a caucus of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union.

The unanimous action, taken by 114 delegates representing locals of the west coast, Hawaii, Canada and Alaska, marks the first time the union has adopted an official position on mechanization.

Approved was the report of the union's coast labor relations committee, which recognized that mechanical improvements are an inevitable trend here to stay, and welcomed the learning of hard labor performed in the past.

Among the provisions sought, the report emphasized the shorter work shifts and no reduction in wages.

The report embodied a short-term study of mechanization made by representatives of a private firm held in San Francisco last April. It is contemplated that information developed will be used to determine what will take place between now and next spring when another caucus will be held to determine wage, welfare and other specific contract demands.

The present longshore agreement expires next June 15.

Burley Obtains Garbage Unit

BURLEY, Oct. 17 (AP)—A public trash collection system collection truck has been added to Burley's refuse collection system.

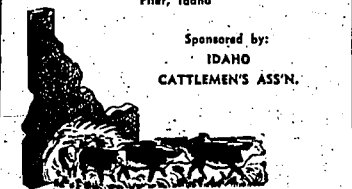

Syria Continues to Live on Strife as Tension Builds up

Syria's present regime, a strange mix of military dictatorship without a viable dictator, has reported a vast deterioration of the Middle East situation, and requested the U.N. to consider a claim that Syrian security is being threatened.

The Middle East situation indeed is deteriorating. In fact, it seems headed for an explosion again, before long. Statements of Western policy makers in the past few weeks coupled with the NATO maneuvers in Turkey, have given the Syrian regime the ingredients for a new fiery view.

The Middle East needed calm more than anything else. It had become fairly evident to Western

observers in Damascus that an easing of tensions would be a formidable weapon against excesses by the Syrian dictatorship.

For about a couple of weeks, the regime itself experienced cautiously with a period of calm. It received King Saud on a mission of peace-making among the Arabs and even went so far as to make overtures to learn the unending tension between Syria and Iraq.

But the Syrian regime was born of turmoil and chaos. The measures it uses to keep itself in power would have no more excuse without the evidence of outside danger. In this, the regime is lucky. It can point to "pressures" from the West and these in with popular terror over Iraq. The emergency mea-

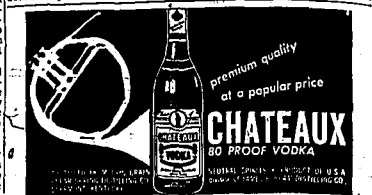

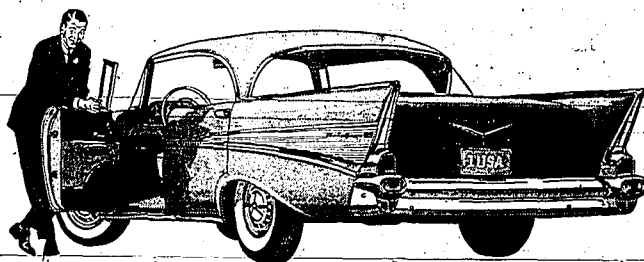

Tiniest' U. S. Baby Making Steady Gains

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Oct. 17 (AP)—A baby believed to be the smallest ever born alive in the United States is gaining weight steadily in her foster home at St. Joseph's hospital here.

Linda Marie Winchester weighed only 1 1/4 ounces when born July 31. Today she weighs two pounds, 11 1/2 ounces.

The nurse said Linda couldn't breathe at first and had been tube-fed only one teaspoon of formula every three hours and soon she was eating five teaspoons during the same period.

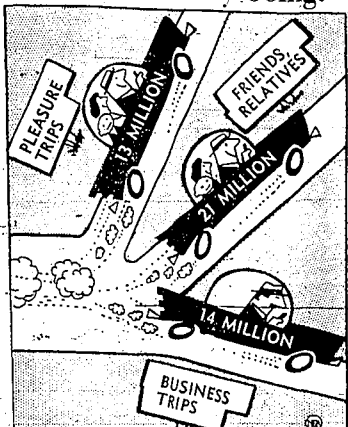
And the nurse said that since Linda has started taking a nipple, she has been able to have her on the bottle and away from the tube altogether in about two weeks.

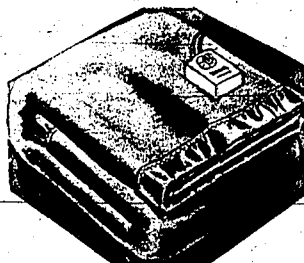

Larson Given Fresh Post in GOP Shakeup

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—Arthur Larson, one of the bright young men of the Republican party, is being replaced as chief of the U. S. information agency in an apparent move to placate congressional budget critics.

Larson's shift to a new post was disclosed at a time when the U. S. is faced with one of its greatest challenges in conducting the tremendous propaganda victory scored by Russia in announcing its Sputnik and other scientific advances.

The White House announced yesterday that Larson, whose agency's funds were severely cut last year after a bitter congressional budget battle, will be replaced by George V. Allen, one of the state department's top trouble shooters.

Sometimes called the philosopher of modern Republicanism, Larson will become a special assistant to the President. He will be in charge of "special projects in international affairs relating to United States propaganda efforts."

Allen, a career diplomat and presently U. S. ambassador to Greece, headed the original "Voice of America" radio program. His later was expanded into the USA.

His appointment, which is subject to senate approval, will be subject to Republican on the senate foreign relations committee.

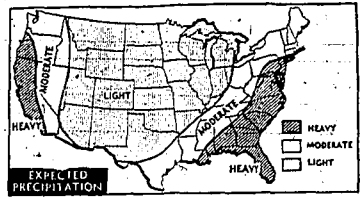

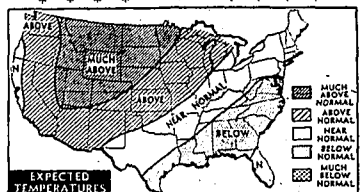

Usual Duties In Electronic Kitchen Easy

CHICAGO 16—An electronic kitchen that does just about everything for food except chew it was displayed at the Modern Living Exposition here.

An appliance manufacturer showed a kitchen which enables the housewife to sit at a control panel, and by pushing buttons have coffee, toast, fried, food cooked, floors scrubbed, and more.

A control panel in the center of the room doubles as a dining table. In the center of the panel, a closed circuit television screen enables the housewife to check on happenings in other rooms of the house.

A tape recorder, equipped with a timer, prompts her: "Time to start dinner." This involves pushing buttons to open cupboards, raise and lower drawers and shelves, and expose a hidden sink. A push-button also produces recipes and menus on a screen.

Meals are planned just-bake fashion in this kitchen-of-tomorrow, which the manufacturer said will be available eventually. The housewife can push buttons and lamb chops are carried from their storage space in the kitchen on electronic tracks to an area that prepares and cooks them.

The table top of the dining area is cool to the touch, but the heater keeps the food warm at the table. Beverages are stored in cupboards and dispensers in the wall, and both hot and cold beverages fill your cup, again at the push of an electronic arm.

Ice cubes are dispensed at will the same way.

Another device peels, dices and slices vegetables and fruits automatically after the work is done.

Greases and refrigerants descend from elevated positions in the wall like "small elevator cars—exposing temperature-controlled shelves for cooking and freezing."

If the housewife wants to do a little of the work herself, she has at her disposal a "mixing area" which provides all the apparatus for baking a cake. After she has finished, the device whisks the pans away to be cleaned and returned to their places in the wall.

When the family finishes a meal, a serving cart comes to the table at the flip of a switch. Once loaded with dirty dishes, it ascends back into the wall, washes the dishes and puts them away. A food buffer and water give a similar performance.

Labor Cost Rise Is Pricing Home "Out of Market"

CHICAGO 16—The continued rise of labor costs in home construction has driven prices home-owning out of the range of the average working man, according to two building experts.

Others rose to complain. One priest demanded the government free Bishop Kung of Shanghai, jailed two years ago for "rightist plotting." Another cried out: "Do you expect us to help infect Catholics with atheism-for that is your ultimate aim, nothing but that."

Not only is he showered with gimmicks, Richardson said, he also gets calls from insurance men and other salesmen, all believing he is interested in their product.

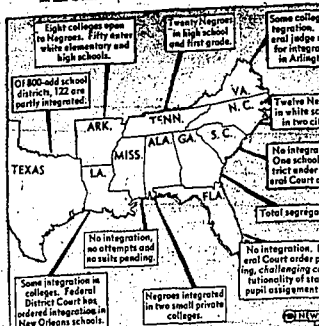
Worker Killed in Milling Accident

Pay for Road Design Given Smith's Okay

MOORE, Oct. 16 (AP)—Attorney General Gordon W. Smith gave Idaho's financial officers a green light today to pay a California firm for the services under a contract for engineering of an eastern Idaho highway job.

Smith said in an official opinion that he believes the \$120,000 contract between the state highway department and the Karl F. Tuttle engineering company, Inc., of Alhambra, Calif., is legal.

Smith, on his advice, State Treasurer Ruth G. Moon signed a check for \$61,333 as first payment to the Tuttle Auditor Rulon Swensen said he would draw an additional state check for some \$10,000 today as second payment.

The state board of engineering examiners has challenged the legality of the contract in a third district court complaint asking among other things that Swensen and Mrs. Moon be restrained from proceeding with payment.

The various defendants—including the state highway board, the Tuttle company and Mrs. Moon—were until Nov. 1 to appear in court to the complaint. Following the deadline, the court will take the complaint under advisement.

The engineering board contends that the contract calls for the company to engage in the practice of engineering, which a corporation cannot be licensed to do under Idaho law.

The attorney general agreed with the board concerning the law, but said the contract does not call for the corporation to engage in engineering. Instead, he said, it stipulates that the corporation shall hire Idaho engineers to do this part of the work. And he said, the corporation has done this on the job.

The contract, awarded July 25, covers engineering of a stretch of the new, 10-mile Interstate highway system from Blackfoot to Loo.

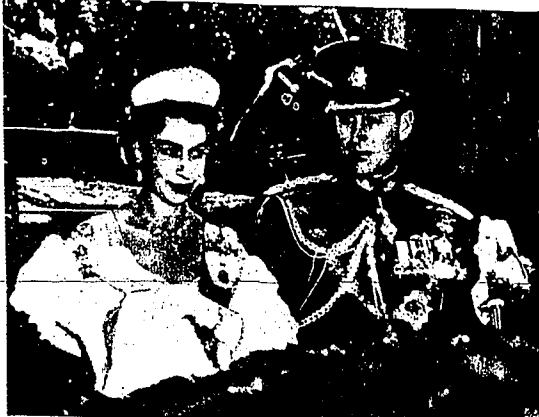
