# Zhukov Given Only Routine Honor by Tito

MARSHAL GEORGI K. ZHUKOV's treatment on his visit to Yugoslavia may indicate that he is not really a contender for top Soviet leadership. Certainly, it seems to indicate that President Tito—who ought to know Zhdanov as Khrushchev for the Nov. 1 spot in the Kremlin.  
Zhukov went to Yugoslavia in his capacity of Russian defense minister. He was returning a visit made to Russia by Gen. Ivan Gomanek, Yugoslav state secretary for defense.  
Officially, at least, Zhukov was treated as the defense minister of any other country would have been. During his 16-day stay, Zhukov saw Tito just once. That was when he went to Tito's summer home in the Slovenian mountains for a day of hunting and for a reception.  
The rest of the time, Zhukov was entertained in Belgrade as the guest of Gomanek and other high officers and was taken for a tour around the country to inspect military installations.  
It seems entirely unlikely that Tito deliberately snubbed Zhukov. But it seems unlikely also that he would have paid so little attention to a man who, he thought, was breathing down Khrushchev's neck in a bid for leadership.  
Zhukov, of course, is as much a communist as Khrushchev is. He also is a member of the communist party presidium which rules Russia. Zhukov's report probably saved Khrushchev in the Kremlin dispute which resulted in the ousting of Georgi M. Malenkov, Vyacheslav M. Molotov and Lazar M. Kaganovich from the government and the presidium. At that time Zhukov was expected to alternate to full membership in the Presidium.  
There have been reports ever since that Zhukov's close ties to the armed forces, was the real power in the Kremlin and that he might supplant Khrushchev as No. 1 man in the Soviet collective leadership.  
These reports may prove to be correct. But Zhukov's visit to Yugoslavia did nothing to substantiate them. The routine manner of his reception brings to mind the treatment of Russian experts before the Kremlin dispute that the Russian armed forces were involved in politics and that Zhukov had no political ambitions.  
Belgrade dispatches reported before Zhukov's arrival that he would try to sell Tito the idea of making Russia his sole source of arms. Instead of getting weapons from the United States, and that Tito was planning to buy arms from the United States. After Zhukov's visit, the dispatches said that he seemed to have accomplished little if anything in Belgrade.  
It is true that during his visit he negotiated the communist puppet government of East Germany. But that hardly was a matter with which Zhukov was concerned.  
One interesting thing about Zhukov's visit is that he went from Yugoslavia to Albania, the little communist satellite country on the Adriatic sea.  
Russia has built up a formidable naval base there, at Sasebo, including facilities for submarines which could operate in the Mediterranean. It is possible that the visit to Albania was to inspect the base and to inspect the visit to Yugoslavia.

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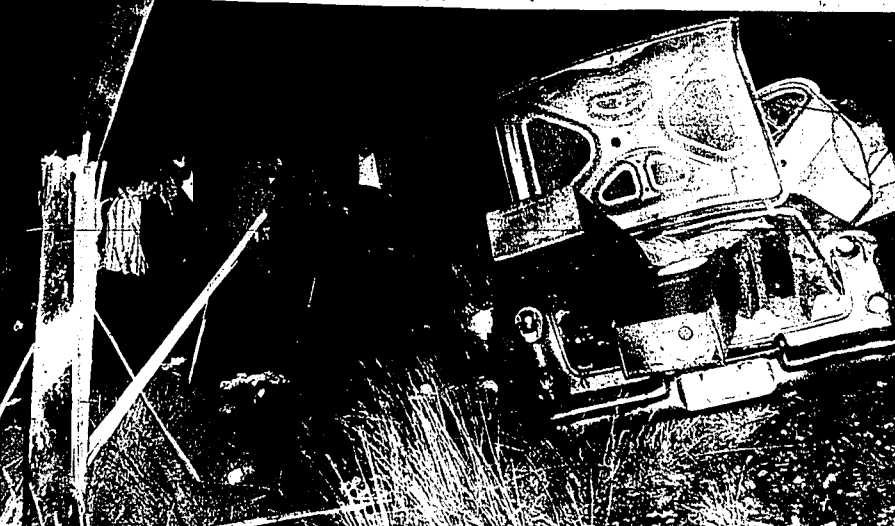

# New U. S. Attorney General Is "Country" Boy Making Good

WILLIAM F. ROGERS, slated to become the next attorney general, is a former small-town boy who first made good as one of Thomas E. Dewey's assistant attorneys general in the nation's biggest city.  
President Eisenhower announced Wednesday that the socially popular Rogers had been picked to succeed Herbert Brownell Jr., when the latter steps down 21 weeks hence.  
Rogers has served as deputy attorney general since 1952.  
The 44-year-old Rogers brings to his new job a distinct advantage not enjoyed by his predecessor. He is well liked on capitol hill by both Northern and Southern congressmen.

# U. S. Is 'Have Less' Nation, Expert Notes

BOISE, Oct. 24 (U.P.)—The U.S. was described as a "have less" nation in critical and strategic materials yesterday during a National Resources Conference here.  
Army Col. John T. Goodley told some 300 civilians and military men that U.S. industry depends on foreign sources for more than 75 per cent of the materials that would be essential should a war emergency occur again. He said this country is not yet a "have not" nation, however.  
Goodley urged federal and state governments to continue to encourage prospecting, exploration and development of U. S. and western hemisphere resources.  
He said that with six per cent of the world's area and six per cent of the population, the U.S. uses approximately 50 per cent of the world's minerals and 30 per cent of the oil.  
Stockpiling would help meet national security requirements for critical materials, Goodley said.  
Air Force Col. R. B. Puckett described emergency power and fuel needs. He said the demands of war would be supported by present electrical energy generation capacity which would grow to "practically unlimited" proportions with the application of atomic energy.  
Army Col. J. H. Weike said U. S. agriculture produces more than adequate supplies of basic food, and lacks neither raw materials, fertilizers or land.

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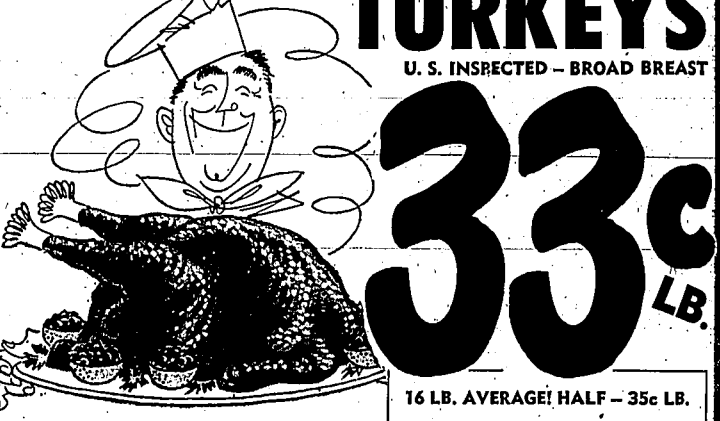

# First Private Atomic Power Plant Opened

Electricity powered by U. S. private industry's first nuclear power station went "on the line" today at the Vallecitos atomic laboratory.

The General Electric company and Pacific Gas and Electric company joined forces in producing 4,000 kilowatts of electricity that represented the first commercial use of atomic power in the United States.

The power was produced at General Electric's Vallecitos laboratory, 40 miles east of San Francisco. Ben J. Osterman, Jr., manager of the GE reactor installation, withdrew the reactor control rods which permitted nuclear generated steam to be fed to the turbine generator.

The electricity flowed into Pacific Gas and Electric's transmission system covering northern and central California.

Norman R. Sutherland, president of Pacific Gas and Electric, said the test is an example of "what this nation's private industry can do with the peacetime atom."

It is the first of a great many nuclear-electric stations the industry is building throughout the nation, he said.

More costly than coal, Sutherland said that at present it costs more to produce atomic electricity in America than from oil, gas or coal and falling water.

"But the ultimate depletion of known deposits of fossil fuels is inevitable," he said. "This project will hasten the day when A-plasma becomes more economical in America."

The atomic energy commission test is an example of "what this nation's private industry can do with the peacetime atom."

Primary purpose of the Vallecitos project is to use it as a pilot for the 180,000 kilowatt Dresden nuclear power station yet scheduled in this country. The privately financed plant is to be completed in 1960.

# Nullity Asked For Elections

QUETZALA, Oct. 24 (AP)—The Guatemalan army last night asked the government to nullify last Sunday's presidential election.

The army said it was "taking transcendental decisions" to settle the election crisis.

# Ice Problem Is Reported Solved

BELFAST, Northern Ireland, Oct. 24 (AP)—Britain's national aircraft company has lifted the major problem of being on the Britannia jet air.

The company's new chairman, Rear Adm. Sir Matthew Slaty, said today.

# Navy Contract on Missiles Awarded

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—The navy announced yesterday it has awarded a \$22.5 million contract for development of its intermediate range ballistic missile called Polaris.

The contract, largest of four in the Polaris program, was awarded to Lockheed Aircraft Corporation.

Lockheed developed the missile under a previous \$20 million contract at the Sunnyvale and Palo Alto, Calif., plants.

This, said the navy, will extend work through the balance of the current fiscal year, ending next June 30.

# Diphtheria Rages

SINGAPORE, Oct. 24 (AP)—Toxic diphtheria is raging in Singapore and the city health officer, Dr. H. R. Morrison, has urged all children to be inoculated at once.

Morrison said that from January this year there had been 400 cases of diphtheria and 40 deaths. He said there were only 455 cases with 59 deaths during the whole of last year.

# New Antibiotics Spawn Races Of Super-Germs in Some Cases

WASHINGTON (NEA)—A germ is thumbing his nose at doctors right inside their own medical fortresses—the hospital.

The reason the little monster can be so brazen is that shots from the enemy's antibiotic arsenal just offend his choler.

He's a super germ. In addition to alarming physicians, his uninvited arrival inside laboratories and sick rooms has placed them in an embarrassing position. Doctors are discovering that unknowingly they are largely responsible for creating him in the first place.

A veterans administration physician explains that when doctors inject antibiotics, like penicillin, into their patients, some of the strongest germs build up resistance to the drugs instead of dying.

These microbes then pass on the immunity to their offspring. Thus, through the years an army of germ-resistant-to-one or more of the antibiotics has been formed.

Since hospitals use these drugs to a great extent, they have become natural breeding grounds for the super germs.

The VA doctor points to alarming evidence of super germ infiltration in a Washington state hospital to show the threat which could face other medical centers.

Washington physicians report that within three and half months, 100 out of 120 patients developed bacterial infections after being admitted to the hospital. The infections contributed to the death of 21 of these patients. Within two months after returning home, 20 others became infected. Later one died.

Tests revealed that germs involved in these cases had some degree of resistance to one or more antibiotics. The cases included pneumonia, breast abscesses, infections of the skin, surgical wounds and burns.

Doctors report the germs can live in dust on blankets and mattresses. It is also believed some of the Washington state hospital patients may have been infected through intravenous injections.

The VA physician says that even doctors and nurses are possible carriers.

# New Regulation Urged by Pilots

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—The Airline Pilots Association (ALPA) proposed today that airline flight engineers be required to train pilots so they can take the controls in event of "cockpit heart attacks."

In a statement issued here, ALPA President C. N. Bayen said that by requiring the third crew member on airlines to be a qualified pilot the public would be adequately protected in the event one of the two regular pilots became incapacitated.

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# Trial of 'Red Spy' Is Near Final Stages

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—Accused Soviet spy Rudolf Trapp, 40, is expected to go to trial today to face the witness stand in his own defense against charges that he transmitted to Russia vital U. S. defense and atomic secrets.

The 55-year-old Russian intelligence agent preferred to let the case go to the jury as it was presented by the government, the court-appointed attorney, James B. Donovan, said.

Donovan, "the reporters' defense" would call no witness. He said he had reviewed direct and cross-examination testimony given by a score of government witnesses with Abel and "it was Abel's own choice not to testify or to call witnesses in his defense."

The government concluded its case by introducing in evidence a variety of hollowed-out objects found in Brooklyn photographic studio. These included a yellow pencil containing 18 microfilm, a tin of shaving cream containing a tiny 25-page code book, two tin canisters, a cork tumbler, flashlight batteries and brass cylinders.

Good Repel. David Levine, an artist who shared the David and Abel, said the mid-mannered Russian had a reputation for being a Brooklyn friend of the man of honesty and integrity. He said he had not seen Abel since May when the accused spy told him he was "going somewhere for my sins."

The government read into the record a transcript of a deportation hearing August 1937. Abel admitted that he was a Russian citizen who had crossed into the U. S. from Canada. He said he "would accept deportation."

The jury of nine men and three women will hear summations and the judge's charge before retiring to decide Abel's fate.

# Faubus Avers 'Hesitancy' to Accept Guard

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Oct. 24.—Gov. O. E. Faubus said yesterday he had not accepted the \$250,000 federal national guardmen, and it appears their status may be that of civilians.

The governor said he had consulted with advisors versed in military law. "It seems to be a very definite possibility," he said, "that the federalized, Arkansas troops are no longer under the command of the state."

"Always before they have had to be discharged as soldiers and re-enrolled as civilians," he said. "I would accept the guard back."

"Maybe they have found a new name," he said. "The governor said he would consider the status of the guardmen. He said he did not know at this time if he would accept the federalized troops."

Conditions "might want to make some conditions," he said. "One of the conditions might be that the federalized troops be paid the same as the state troops."

## Litter Advised On Fowl Pens

Litter your chicken house with sawdust, wood shavings, or ground cornmeal, says C. W. Daigh, Twin Falls county agent.

Litter on the floor means the flock will be healthy and productive, according to Robert Miller, poultry specialist at the University of Idaho.

Daigh explains that litter serves two purposes. First, dry, clean litter results in production of clean eggs, and second, it keeps the house warm when heat is essential.

In order for litter to do its work properly in winter, Daigh says it is important that it be dry when placed in the poultry house. It is best to spread it early enough that the birds can break it up by the time cold weather arrives. Small pieces have more ability to absorb water. The more moisture the litter takes up, the drier the house will be.

Daigh said he could recommend Black's program on the basis of poultry experience in this area. The litter cover should be built week by week. By the time severe cold comes the cover should be eight to 10 inches thick.

The county agent added that many kinds of materials are suitable.

## Little Shrimp Make for Big Industry on Great Salt Lake

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 24 — State officials opined today that control of some of the smallest of sea creatures is about to come under the purview of the state fish and game commission.

The organisms, tiny flecks of brown in the shallow Great Salt lake, are brine shrimp. And collecting them is getting to be a lucrative business in Utah: Four firms are already at work patrolling the shrimp for sale to aquarists and hatcheries as fish food.

The lake has been under the control of the state land board, which licensed the four firms. But recently, board Director Lee E. Young got to wondering.

He wrote the Utah attorney general asking about a transfer of jurisdiction over the business to the fish and game agency, noting that the tiny shrimp "are definitely not a wonder."

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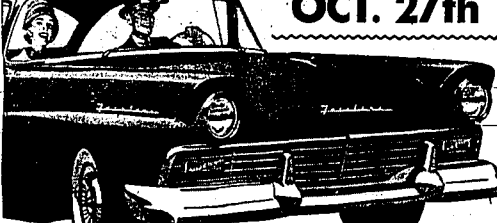

## Benson Lands In Hawaii on Global Jaunt

HONOLULU, Oct. 24 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson arrived here last night on the first phase of an 11-nation tour which he described as "purely a trade tour to further examine the possibilities of increasing the export of all American farm products."

Benson said he was surprised by Attorney General Herbert Brownell's statement from office that he might be the next to withdraw from the cabinet.

"I'm still on the team," he said. "I'll not pull out yet."

Benson said he appreciated the tight federal budget facing President Eisenhower, but denied that his tour was designed to see where anticipated cuts in agricultural appropriations could be made.

"This tour is primarily designed to see if we can increase the export of American farm products," he said. "But I'll also look into various agricultural aid projects in each country."

Benson, his family, and a personal staff of five men arrived at Hickam field from Lexington, Ky., aboard a special military air transport service C-54 at 3:30 a. m. EDT.

Gov. William Quinn and members of the agriculture division of the University of Hawaii and Mormon elders warmly greeted the secretary.

The Benson party is scheduled to leave Honolulu Friday for Tokyo, where they will spend three days.

## U. S. Families Find Thrift Is Tough Lesson

CHICAGO, Oct. 24 (AP)—Here it is National Thrift week and the average American family is about three months away from bankruptcy.

This dim view of family finances comes from H. H. White, executive secretary of the National Thrift committee, and Jack Olson, an insurance executive.

Their comments were based on a recent survey conducted by leading insurance companies on the financial status of middle class Americans.

White, vice president in charge of the disability department of American Life Insurance Co., said that 90 days from disaster, financially speaking.

Mrs. White and Olson said few families accumulate a financial cushion to carry them beyond a three-month period if the breadwinner should lose his job or get sick.

"We're living from pay day to pay day," said Mrs. White.

She said this creates marital discord, and tension and anxiety among the children.

"In many cases the family's paycheck is tossed for a lateral pass the minute the breadwinner gets it," Olson said. "It's cashed or deposited, and the money must be paid out at once to cover bills and current expenses."

"Families in this situation have a financial sword of Damocles hanging over them."

Despite continuing inflation, Mrs. White and Olson said, there are concrete steps the average family can take to build savings.

Mrs. White said the first need is for a practical budget based on the obvious fact that "outgo must never exceed income."

"A business soon goes bankrupt if it can't get up on a sound financial basis," she said. "Adequate reserves set aside systematically for future exigencies," she said.

## Soviets Claiming Track for Sputnik

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—The Soviet earth satellite isn't really flying over other countries according to Moscow radio. The countries are getting under sputnik.

Reacting to charges that sputnik was violating national sovereignty by flying over countries without permission, the broadcast said:

"The Soviet satellite does not violate the sovereignty of any country for the simple reason that it is not flying in the atmosphere above other countries. Rather, it is in the territory of these countries which, as a result of the rotation of the earth, is moving—so to speak—under the satellite's orbit, which is constant in relation to the earth and the stars."

## Reed Intends to Seek Vote Again

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—Rep. Daniel A. Reed, N. H., who has served longer in congress than any other present Republican member, says it is his "most intense wish" to seek reelection next year.

The 62-year-old lawmaker said he was not formally announcing his candidacy. "I never do," he said. "I just run."

There had been a report that Reed had decided to resign or at least not seek reelection.

He is senior Republican on the house ways and means committee, which originates tax legislation, and was chairman of the committee in the Republican third congress. He has served in congress continuously since March 4, 1919.

## Graham Is Set to Resume Campaign

NEW YORK, Oct. 24 (AP)—Evangelist Billy Graham returns today to begin the final phase of his four-month crusade to save New York.

A Reformation day service at the Polo Grounds Sunday afternoon will highlight the drive, a program which will be climaxed by a testimonial dinner in Graham's home Monday night.

The revival's schedule also includes meetings with college and university groups and an appearance before a long-range group at Town Hall Sunday night.

# Border Between Syria, Turkey Still Is Calm Despite Furor in United States

ON THE TURCO-SYRIAN BORDER NEAR LAKEDERUN, Oct. 24—All is calm and quiet on both sides of the Turkish and Syrian border. On neither side can you see any of the alleged "reveling activity" that has turned the border situation into a major issue for the United Nations.

It is true that Turkey has military installations along the border zone, but they appear to be no more, no less than normal precautions for self defense.

There is no air of tension or excitement among Turkish troops or the Americans who for almost 10 years have been in place in the modernization of the Turkish army, under the U. S. aid program.

In fact, the commander of the Turkish garrison at Lakerdun was off on a picnic when visiting foreign newspapermen arrived to see him.

Here is the report of UP Correspondent Dieter Schmitt who left Lakerdun by way of the Northern Syrian town of Aleppo.

"No large scale troop concentration, or movements are visible on either side of the Syro-Turkish frontier."

"Peaceful farm activity goes on in the area."

At the border post the Syrian authorities allowed me to pass without fuss or trouble.

"A four-mile no man's land separates the Syrian and Turkish frontier stations, and the Turks too allowed me to pass with a minimum of formality. One not unpleasant custom on the Turkish side is that the travelers must take a cup of thick Turkish coffee with the top official."

"I saw no Turkish troops until I was about 25 miles inside the Turkish border, but unannounced anti-aircraft emplacements closer to the frontier indicated that the Turks would be prepared in case of emergency."

Correspondent Russell Jones, who moved south to the frontier area around Iskenderun from the Turkish capital at Ankara reported.

"The Syrian border is only 10 miles as the crow flies from Iskenderun, a major Turkish port and military base. But there is no excitement among the local population, the Turkish army or members of the American training teams."

"The surrounding countryside is full of military installations, both Naval and army. And the roads are filled with brand new American trucks."

"But the crews of the few gun positions that could be seen from the roads were slouched in typical peacetime posture."

"There is no doubt that this area is well armed against any contingency. Dual purpose 80-millimeter guns point both to the sea and up to the sky. Four-barreled 20-caliber guns were spotted around all the posts."

"In a depot on the outskirts of Iskenderun, hundreds of new jeeps and trucks were part of a long convoy on the road to Adana, about 85 miles to the west and farther away from the frontier."

"Many of the vehicles still had the U. S. aid program 'hands across the seas' stickers plastered on them. Instead of regular license plates many had only numbers scrawled on them with chalk."

"This is only one of the many places where the United States is helping to train and equip the Turks."

"Despite denials at Ankara headquarters of the U. S. economic aid program, American soldiers are stationed at Maridin, Nusaybin and Qamishli along the Syrian border. And at Trabzon and Samsun on the Black sea."

# Navy Reports Accuracy for New Weapon

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—The navy reported yesterday that its Sidewinder infrared all-weather missile is so accurate it can shoot a flare-pot off the wing of a drone target plane.

The navy at the same time permitted the General Electric company, producer of Sidewinder guidance and control units, to outline for the first time officially just how the Sidewinder is guided by an infrared detector.

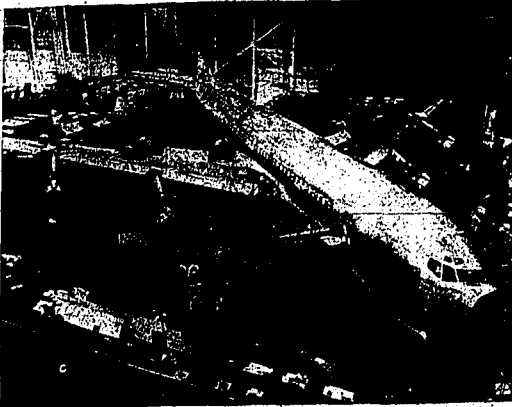
H. W. Koenig, general manager of G-E's light military electronic equipment department at Utica, N. Y., said in a prepared release, "Sidewinder seeks out the hottest target in the sky. In warfare, this would be the hot engine of an enemy aircraft."

In a navy accuracy test the Sidewinder, fired at a target plane bearing a flare-pot on one wing, sought out not merely the drone aircraft itself but the flame coming from the mouth of the flare-pot. Other details of the test were not given.

Developed at the Naval Ordnance Test Station at China Lake, Calif., and named after the deadly desert scorpion, the Sidewinder is operational aboard aircraft of the 5th and 7th fleets.

It is capable of supersonic launching and is highly accurate even at altitudes above 50,000 feet, the navy said. It is also simple enough for navy technicians to load and handle without specialized training.

# U.S. May Have Pint-Sized Satellite in Orbit Around Globe Before Year's End

BALTIMORE, Oct. 24 (AP)—Gleeful spinning Sputnik may cross orbit shortly with an American satellite—the gold-plated, instrument-stuffed moon of Operation Vanguard but a modest sphere with a radio voice.

The full U.S. answer to Russia's pioneering satellite is not expected to swing aloft until March, equipped for a serious chore of scientific space exploration.

But the government says that come December, testing of the three-stage Vanguard launching rocket will have reached the point where any of four experimental vehicles could—pop—a pint-sized sphere into the frontier currently pre-empted by the Soviet space travelers—Sputnik and its companion rocket.

Because of this possibility, each of the four test rockets will carry tiny, 6½ inch balls furnished with radio transmitters. Should one, or all, achieve orbital speed and altitude, scientists around the world would be able to track them by radio.

The March firing, however, will be the first of six fully instrumented satellites the U.S. plans to launch before the end of the International Geophysical year Dec. 31, 1957. Each will be a 20-inch sphere, about the same size as Sputnik, but weighing only 2½ pounds, less than one-tenth of Sputnik's announced weight.

Before the March shots, final step-by-step tests must be completed on the intricate giant rocket designed to carry the satellite 200 to 1,400 miles into space.

This has been the progress of Project Vanguard.

TVO-Test Vehicle Zero, fired last Dec. 8, was a single-stage test using a Martin Viking rocket. Fired from Cape Canaveral, Fla., it rose vertically a short distance, then was turned slowly toward the horizontal and, guided out over the Atlantic ocean, TVO, designed to test equipment and instruments, reached a peak velocity of 4,000 miles per hour and a peak altitude of 125 miles before plunging into the ocean about 180 miles from the launching point.

TVI—Test Vehicle One, was fired last May 1 at a high altitude separation test. A Viking rocket was used for the first stage and a medium-sized propellant rocket, similar to the one planned for the third stage of the actual launching vehicle, was the second part. Again the big rocket rose vertically a short distance, then was turned slowly toward the horizontal and shot out over the Atlantic.

By the time the Viking's fuel was exhausted, it had reached a peak velocity of 2,500 miles per hour and had coasted to the peak of its trajectory, about 120 miles above the ocean. At that point, the smaller rocket riding in the nose of the Viking was fired in a horizontal direction until it was spent and fell into the ocean.

TV2—Test Vehicle Two, is next in the series. Fired yesterday, it is the first with the external appearance of the final launching vehicle. But except for some test instruments, the main purpose of TV2 is to test the first stage engine under actual flight conditions, to evaluate performance of some of the other Vanguard instrumentation and to allow the government to work out the aerodynamic and structural studies.

Next on the agenda are the four test shots, TV3 through TV6, which the government says are scheduled to begin in December. Any of these rockets could propel the four-pound aluminum sphere it will carry into an orbit. But Vanguard engineers at the Glenn T. Martin airplane company in Baltimore say this is only incidental to the objective of this phase of the test program.

Both the TVO and TVI strikes have been highly successful. Martin engineers say TVI "proved beyond a shadow of a doubt, the essential soundness of the design for separation and spin stabilization of Vanguard's third stage"—the rocket which will launch the satellite.

Martin adds that all major components, including the engines for the three rocket stages, have individually met or come close to the desired specification of a vehicle capable of orbiting the planned satellite.

Long before Sputnik made its spectacular debut Oct. 4, Vanguard spokesmen said the first actual U.S. launching attempt would come in the early part of 1958. They insist the Soviet "first" has not changed the U.S. programming, except to heighten its importance. Sputnik is a practice and a chance to work the ropes out of their ground tracking equipment.

Few Vanguard engineers would deny there are short cuts to putting a satellite into an orbit around the earth. But being a scientific endeavor from the start, they add that there has been no call for a crash program or a race with Russia.

Aside from the hurt dealt U.S. pride by the Russian test Vanguard officials say they feel it did nothing to detract from the scientific achievement and the quips of their people who have ranted it "Project Heavensguard."

Total cost of the program is now estimated at 110 million dollars, 10 million of which is being paid by the National Science Foundation and the balance by Uncle Sam.

New Plymouth colors for 1958 are described as generally softer and more elegant, with 15 solid color options and 44 two-tone combinations.

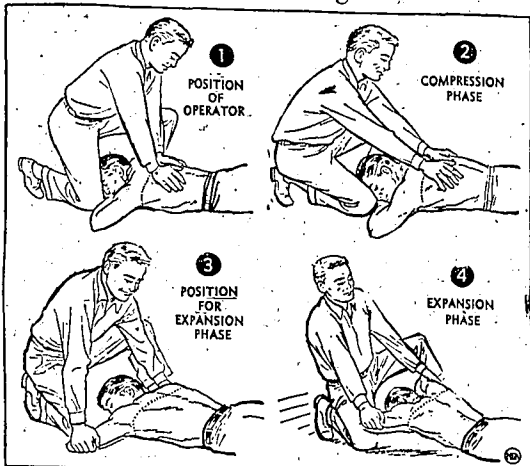

## Happy Fat Man Has Problem: Envy of His Dieting Friends

NEW YORK, Oct. 24 (AP) — Even happy fat man has a major problem in life—how to put up with the envy of his dieting friends.

They begrudge him each mouthful of water, which he consumes; each pound by which he outweights them; and each time they take him as a personal insult.

If a fat man were to take it as a hope to the fat in only all the fiber thrown at him, he would quickly worry himself to a skeleton. At this point, of course, his friends would start exclaiming solicitously, "Gee, how pale, you don't look good—you look off too many chins."

The fat man has been the target of medical concern since Hippocrates, father of medicine, observed 400 years before Christ.

"Fat men are more likely to die suddenly than the slenderer."

But throughout all history the fat man also has been the butt of slanderous attacks that are based, not so much on concern for his welfare, as upon envy of his well-being.

It is true that Shakespeare did point out some of the virtues of the portly when he quoted Julius Caesar as saying, "Let him have men about me that are fat, sleek-headed men, and such as sleep o' nights."

But Shakespeare dealt from the bottom of the deck, too.

He had Hamlet say, "Oh, that this too solid flesh would melt, thaw and resolve itself in a dew!" And in "Love's Labor Lost," he wrote:

"That purchase have lean pale, and almy bits."

"Make rich the ribs, but bankrupt galle the face."

unfamiliar attacks on the fat man:

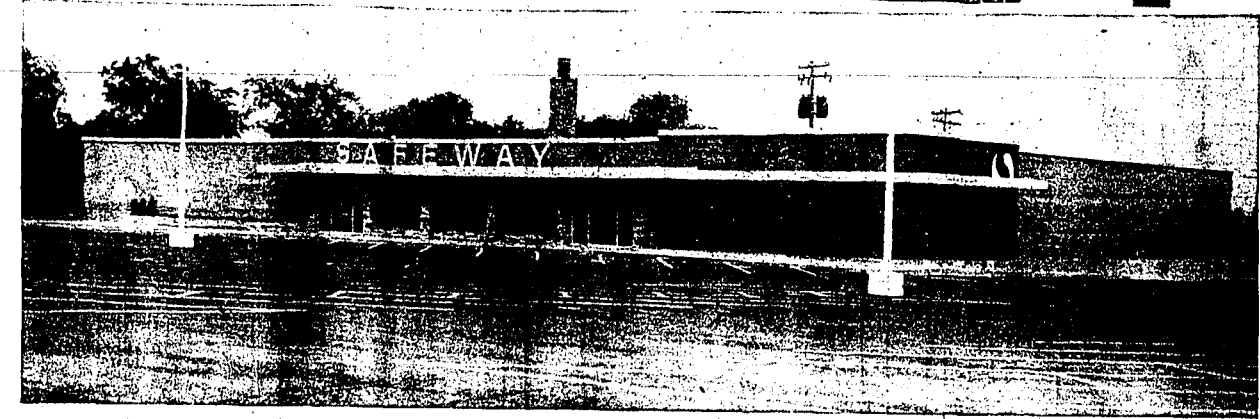
