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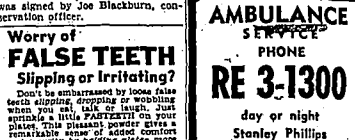



Likewise, the dreaded alfalfa caterpillar can be killed by spraying with a virus.

30 Are Added On Death List For Outbreak

Flu and its complications claimed about 30 more lives during the past 24 hours, but there was evidence the outbreak was on the wane in some areas.

A United Press tally shows the first case of Asian flu was reported in the country last summer showed at least 400 deaths blamed on flu and complications, chiefly pneumonia.

New York state continued to have the highest fatality rate with 120 deaths. Pennsylvania reported 82 fatalities.

Elsewhere, there were 37 deaths in Michigan, 24 in California, 21 in Illinois and Louisiana, 15 each in Iowa, Washington and Wisconsin, 11 in Utah, 10 in Colorado, 9 in Hawaii, 7 in Connecticut, 6 each in Indiana and Kentucky and 3 each in New Jersey, Tennessee and Oregon.

The state of Washington reported 11 of the new flu fatalities, and the state health department estimated there were 47,000 cases of influenza and other respiratory ailments. There was no estimate of how many of the ill were stricken with Asian flu.

Also in the Pacific Northwest, the case in the flu continued to climb and health officials said it was approaching the level of the 1918-19 epidemic. A second death was reported at an Oregon state home for the mentally retarded.

In the east, flu reached epidemic proportions in northern Ohio, in Maine and Philadelphia, pe at the latest he said to be ill by the epidemic.

However, the incidence of flu was reported on the decline in such states as California, Illinois, Massachusetts and Mississippi.

The University of Illinois declared a campus epidemic earlier this month infected about 70 per cent of the students. The university said the illness became so severe that an ice rink was turned into an emergency hospital to treat the sick.

Mild Weather Pays Visits to Eastern Areas

Mild autumn weather returned to parts of the eastern section of the nation today, with the greatest warming felt over the Southeast.

Overnight readings climbed in as much as 22 degrees in Birmingham, Ala., and Greenville, Tenn., as compared with the night before when temperatures in much of the Southeast hovered near freezing.

Warmer weather also showed in the northern plains and the southern Rockies where overnight temperatures registered in the relatively mild 40s.

Light rain accompanied the warm weather over the Ohio and lower Mississippi valleys. Rain also hit the state of Washington, where it fell in advance of a storm center pushing into the Pacific Northwest.

Weathermen predict a series of showers will continue today over the Northwest, spreading into the northern section of the country. Showers or snow flurries also are expected over the eastern Great Lakes region and scattered showers are forecast for the middle Atlantic coast and eastern Ohio valley.

Mostly partly cloudy skies are predicted elsewhere across the nation.

Cooper said the group's first objective would be to appraise the extent of existing pollution problems and contact all agencies and organizations engaged in carrying on studies or research on the subject in the state.

Final actions will be taken at the meeting of the State Chamber of Commerce board of directors in Boise Nov. 26, he said.

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Inventor Gets AEC's Award In Atom Work

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—Dr. Ernest O. Lawrence, inventor of the cyclotron, "atom smasher," today was named winner of the atomic energy commission's \$50,000 Fermi award for 1957.

The noted scientist and director of the University of California radiation laboratory at Berkeley was cited not only for the cyclotron development but "for his many other contributions in nuclear physics and atomic energy."

The award was established under act of 1954 "for especially meritorious contributions to the development, use or control of atomic energy." Lawrence is the third scientist to win the award.

First winner, in 1954, was the late Enrico Fermi, one of the great pioneers in the atomic field. After his death, the general advisory committee to the AEC decided that henceforth the award would be named in honor of Fermi. The second winner, in 1956, was the late Dr. John van Neumann, a member of the AEC.

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Graham Given N. Y. Farewell At Testimonial

NEW YORK, Oct. 29 (AP)—The churches that sponsored Billy Graham in an evangelistic crusade that turned out to be the most impressive in the nation's history bade him a sentimental farewell Monday night.

Graham was given a testimonial dinner by the Protestant Council of the City of New York, an organization of about 2,700 churches in the metropolitan area that brought the evangelist here to pump new religious vigor into both the ministry and the laity.

The evangelist was thanked for preaching 120 sermons that resulted in nearly 60,000 "decisions for Christ" following his Madison Square Garden rallies and meetings elsewhere in the area.

The council considered the Graham crusade so successful that it has embarked on a program of continuing evangelism, budgeted at a million dollars a year.

The dinner was attended by members of Graham's crusade "team" of 25 workers, ministers from the area and members of the New York crusade executive committee that raised nearly two million dollars in private donations to conduct the crusade.

In his farewell address to the group, Graham warned again, as he did repeatedly during his crusade, that unless the free world "picks up the Christian flag" the flag of the communist hammer and sickle "may win the world."

"There are two answers to life," Graham said. "One is the Marxist answer. Communism offers people something and it has dedicated people working for it."

The other answer to man's problems, Graham said, was to be found in Christianity, but "the communists may win the world unless we have an equal dedication for the principles for which we stand."

"The Christian system," Graham said, has its own "dynamic cause" that should be properly exploited. "That cause is the dignity of the individual."

U. S. Schools Aid Measure Pigeonholed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30 (AP)—Federal aid for school construction, twice turned down by Congress in the last two years, has been quietly ticketed for a house committee pigeonhole at the 1953 session.

A decision to drop the school aid fight temporarily was disclosed today by Rep. Cleveland M. Bailey, D., W. Va., chairman of the house subcommittee on general education.

Politics, the bitter school segregation issue, and Democratic irritation with President Eisenhower's leadership in last session's school aid battle were all factors contributing to the decision, Bailey said.

Speaking to a reporter, Bailey asserted that as chairman of the house subcommittee controlling school legislation he intended to

sit on the bill at the next session of Congress which opens in January. "The administration had its chance last year," Bailey said, referring to the 208-203 House vote which reflected most of the administration's proposals.

On this vote, 111 Republicans and 97 Democrats teamed to kill the bill. Against killing it were 77 Republicans and 126 Democrats.

"First of all, the Eisenhower administration wants to make a political issue of school grants," Bailey asserted. "An election year is a bad time to play politics with school needs."

Aussie Sales Kill Hope for Wool Boosts

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30 (Special)—The wool payment program started in April of 1955, USDA has indicated that some 110 million dollars in the 1956 support level vanished when wool markets in Australia, which has a third of the world's production, opened weak in August. A drop in prices also followed in New Zealand.

The results on prices on the U. S. domestic market: A dip of several cents down to about 31 cents per pound.

One USDA official says, "With the weakness in world markets, we figure we'll be lucky to keep the support figure at 62 cents. The way things look now we have a light situation on our hands by the summer of '59 (when the program concludes)." The outlook for mohair, in contrast to wool, continues rosy. USDA has gone through the motions of setting a support figure of 70 cents on it, confidently expects to continue to have to make no payments. The prices have never fallen since the program started.

Solar Energy Is Being Used For Products

NEW YORK, Oct. 30 (AP)—A dream of centuries—to harness the sun's energy and put it to work for man—has become a reality in the 20th century with a host of new solar products running the gamut from clocks to stoves.

The sun is the most abundant source of energy there is, it is the only source guaranteed to last as long as the earth does.

Experts say each year enough solar energy falls on this country alone to equal the energy output of one of the 100,000 coal or 2,000 oil production at current rates.

But except for scattered uses throughout the ages, such as the Greek use of sun-mirrors to make things hot for their Roman enemies and a French admiral's success in melting platinum in the 18th century, this tremendous store of energy has gone untapped.

The reason is simply that before this century the know-how wasn't there to make the machinery required to collect the energy.

Even now, scientists say we're just at the beginning. An authoritative research group, National Scientific and Research Corporation, says solar collectors must be solved, solar machines are complicated and expensive, efficiencies are low and, of course, the sun doesn't shine 24 hours a day, so methods of energy storage must be devised.

But what's been accomplished so far is impressive. A solar clock that runs for as long as three weeks after a few hours exposure to sunlight is being marketed by General Time Corporation of New York.

Sell laboratories of Murray Hill, N. J., has used a solar battery to energize rural telephone lines.

Atomic Corporation of Chicago introduced a portable radio which operates on a solar battery.

Window awnings operated by a tiny solar-sensitive cell instead of the usual hand crank were brought out by Automatic Awning Company of Chicago.

Jet-Rite, Inc. of Englewood, N. J., has designed a solar still to change salt water into fresh water; a solar water heater to produce hot water and a solar oven that will cook an entire meal for a family.

Some of the most promising applications of solar energy those in which moderate heating is required. This would include heating homes, providing energy for air conditioners, dehumidifiers, or heating and distilling water.

World Unrest Last Year Now Hitting Sugar

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30 (Special)—The news behind USDA's announcement of an acreage cutback in beet sugar plantings is traceable to the world unrest over the Suez and Hungarian crises of a year ago.

USDA has cut beet growers from 930,000 acres this year to 915,000. Mainland cane producers will stay at 290,000.

The doubling of world sugar prices, and their recent deflation, also were caused by excited buyers when the Suez and Hungarian crises were brewing, say USDA officials. Added to this was the threat of the East coast shipping strike.

USDA raised the market quota from 10 million tons to 12 million in June and, as high as 12.2 in July. When the world market broke in July and August, USDA backed down to 9.2 and finally to 8.6 million this month.

Lawrence Myers, USDA's sugar chief, thinks the original estimate of 8,600,000 set last December for domestic consumption "is about where we'll end up." In fact, as of Oct. 10, distribution already was running 100,000 tons behind the 1956 figure of 8,604,000.

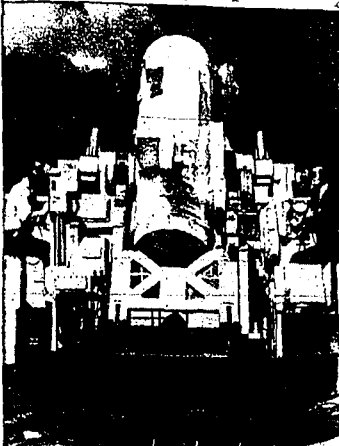

Missile Rocket May Be Visible 4 in Family Dead In New York Fire

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Oct. 30 (AP)—Nearly everyone on the face of the earth should be able to see the Russian satellite rocket in early December, an astronomer said today.

The rocket's orbit will lie in the twilight band of the earth during these days and will be "highly visible" between Dec. 1 and 3, Karl B. Henrice said.

Hence, senior astronomer at the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory, said the rocket will be visible over New England and many other areas of the United States on the evening of Dec. 1.

"It will be glowing much brighter," he said, "because it will be much closer to the earth."

Hence said that everyone from southern Canada to Argentina and from Great Britain to South Africa should be able to see the rocket in either evening or morning passing between Dec. 1 and 3.

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Bodyguard for Anastasia Held By N. Y. Police

NEW YORK, Oct. 30 (AP)—Albert Anastasia's bodyguard, Anthony Coppola, was held in \$50,000 bail yesterday as a material witness in the gangster's assassination. The district attorney's office said, Coppola's life is in danger, too.

Assistant District Attorney Alexander Herman told General Sessions Judge Abraham N. Groer, who ordered Coppola held:

"If this man walks out, it may very well be the beginning of open warfare by the hoodlums in this city."

Coppola was strangely absent last Friday morning when two masked gunmen waylaid Anastasia and shot him to death as he relaxed in a barber chair in the Hotel Park Sheraton.

"There's nothing on earth I fear," remonstrated the 40-year-old Coppola. "I was just a friend of his... I haven't an enemy in the world, and I thought Mr. Anastasia had'st and either God or fate have mercy on his soul wherever he is."

However, Herman declared in court:

"From what I have learned from police officials, I am convinced this man is in immediate danger of meeting the same fate as the subject of this investigation."

Coppola has received considerable attention from authorities, especially with evidence that someone apparently fingered Anastasia to the slayers—Herman said.

Coppola talked by telephone to Anastasia less than two hours before the slaying.

Some people may still be saying on Madison avenue. "We could call our gadget 'Bocchiale,' since it will be trust move in the very best circles. Or 'Rover Boy.' Or 'G. S. for 'Space Ship' chys-ricism." Nope. You can hear the groans already, from here to Moscow. We could go back to the old myth, but with Thor, Jupiter and the other rockets already whooshing off, that fight has been pretty thoroughly ploughed too.

For it. Remember the bombers of World War II: "Wabash Choo-choo," "Little Eva," "Dag-Dag Daddy." To say nothing of those which caused some "stagnals" to blush and turn away. When all's said and done, though it will be hard to beat "Sputnik." You must have heard the story about the fellow who went into court, and asked permission to change his name. "What's your name now?" inquired the judge. "Mike Spunitik," confessed the petitioner. "I set what you mean," chuckled the judge.

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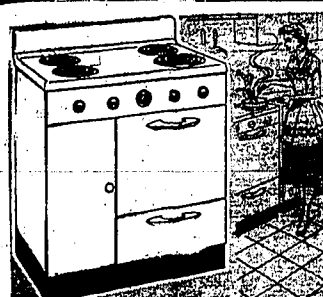
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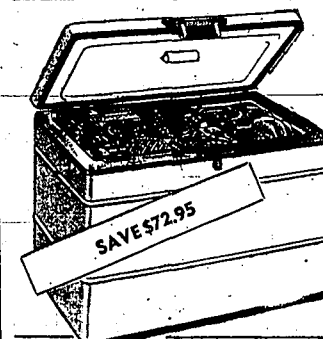
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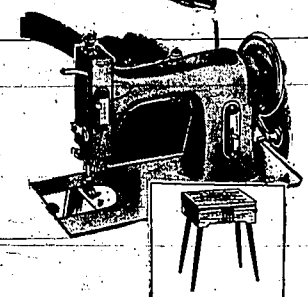
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Reclamation Meet in Phoenix: Facing Problems of Expansion

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (Special)—Members of the National Reclamation Association from 17 western states will roll into Phoenix, Arizona, for their annual convention Nov. 6, 7 and 8.

There'll be plenty of gaiety, many diversions. But the serious business at hand will not be overlooked: How to justify an annual outlay at the level of 200 million dollars by the federal government for bringing new

irrigation service of the Library of Congress at the request of a delegation of non-western congressmen headed by Rep. Ralph W. Gurnea, R., N. Y.

The study concluded at one point that current outlays are not based on sound business principles. Western leaders fired back replies and they were printed in the October issue of the magazine.

But the fact remains that USDA officials are looking with increasing concern at the federal reclamation programs, which are adding to the total U. S. farm output at the nearly rate of about five per cent.

Interior department officials plead

"not guilty" when the finger of suspicion is pointed at them. They furnish water for some six million of the total 32 million acres of irrigated land in the U. S., an overall tilled area of 400 million acres.

Interior officials plead that many of their crops—fruits, nuts and fresh vegetables—are not in surplus and aren't under USDA price support programs, anyhow. Outlays for their crops actually put under price supports, according to their studies, come to less than one per cent of the total federal expenses for such purposes.

Federal reclamation projects also provide power and water for indus-

try and municipalities, aside from agricultural purposes.

The 20 million acres of farm land irrigated "privately," however, are less defensible in the eyes of USDA officials. Their critics have learned much from techniques practiced by reclamation engineers over the years. These acres also are surplus all over the map of the U. S. and contribute directly to surplus problems.

So, while federal reclamation functions have a glorious past and a secure present, the future seems to present many problems.

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U. S. Women Are Defended By Firm Aide

CHICAGO, Oct. 30.—A package engineer today came to the defense of American womanhood.

"We've heard a multitude of accusations that imply our womenfolk can be hood-winked, bamboozled and otherwise film-flashed by pretty packages," said Jerome W. Mitchell, vice president of the Walter Frank organization.

"Well, I just want to say this isn't necessarily so," Mitchell said. "Any one who thinks a woman can be tricked into buying something she absolutely doesn't want just doesn't know much about women."

Mitchell said his interest was aroused by recent publication of psychological studies that claimed women are influenced into buying products by the design and color of the package.

"This is true at times," Mitchell said in an interview. "But let's not get into the world of black magic. Some of these reports say women subconsciously choose a product because they're drawn to it by some strange psychological appeal that they themselves don't understand."

Mitchell is in charge of design and development for his company and he indicated that most members of his staff believe in the scientific criteria must be the basis for package design.

"Some imply that package engineering is used for mystical evil packages are developed in some thing akin to sorcery rather than by study of basic merchandising and marketing factors," Mitchell said. "Even a woman's product need not be in a pretty package if market testing indicates otherwise," he said.

Packaging of products for sale in supermarkets offers the best evidence that a beautiful box doesn't always assure a sale, he said.

"You can have a comparatively ugly duckling package, from the standpoint of color and design, but if the use can be clearly seen and the price is right, chances are good that it will go into the lady's shopping cart."

Packaging, Mitchell said, is an art and a craft and a science rolled into one. "It isn't any business for half-baked generalizations about buying motives," he said. "Let's not underestimate the intelligence of American women."

Poor Signups Are Reported For Soil Bank

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—(Special)—Agriculture department officials are startled by the poor signups by winter wheat growers for the soil bank, which already is in so much trouble that it may be scuttled permanently next year.

The bank is generally credited with having done a good job this year in reducing wheat surpluses. It kept some 175 million bushels from being grown, aided in bringing the total surplus figure below the one billion mark.

But this was achieved by putting a total of 12.8 million acres (10.7 of it in winter wheat) into the bank. The new winter wheat signups total 3.8 million—or just a third of the 1957 figure. USDA reports that the total number of agreements, however, remains high. It's up 140,000 or 75 per cent of 1957.

USDA blames these factors:

(1) Improved moisture conditions in the Plains states. Kansas, for example, is down from 4.5 million acres to 650,000. Colorado down from 1.3 million to 300,000. New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma have about half their '57 figures and drought-stricken Missouri actually is down 1.5 signups from 130,000 to 225,000.

(2) Limitation of \$3,000 on payments per producer per farm for 1955 as against none last year.

(3) A new feature of the bank forcing participants to "take" crops. Many farmers are still farm to prevent the spread of surplus disease to other crops.

One USDA official ruefully says, "I suppose this signup is better than nothing—but just how much nobody is willing to say."

AEC Reports Process Plans On Atom Fuel

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—An atomic energy commission official has suggested a possible low-cost plan for business to process the fuel elements of nuclear reactors.

Presently this processing is done at AEC sites. Nearly all of it is done at the chemical processing plant on the national reactor testing station in eastern Idaho.

The AEC announced in Washington yesterday that it would continue to do the job for an indefinite period, but a survey showed that the chemical industry was not yet ready to do it.

Still Doubtful

More than half the uranium in a fuel element is still good for further use after the element has been "spent" in the reactor.

Charles G. Mahley, chief of the commercial development branch of the division of civilian application of the AEC, suggested what he called "packaged" processing plants which would recover the good uranium left, and also radio-isotopes.

Widely Used

Radioactive isotopes are widely used in many phases of industry and research. Their use is even increasing.

Many packaged plants would be small, located at the reactor site and handle that one reactor's used fuel elements and by-products.

Mainly spoken at the annual meeting of the atomic industrial forum, he said the major factor that makes construction of small processing plants attractive was revenue from sale of the by-products.

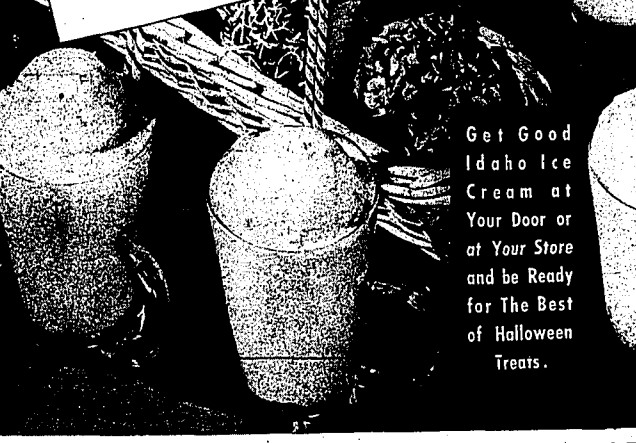

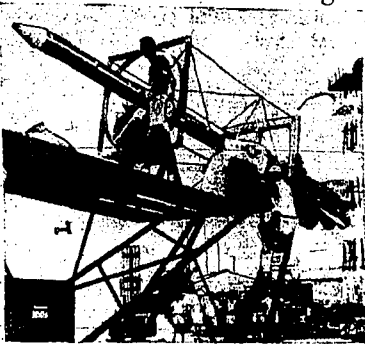

Idaho Ground Water Storage Increased by Spring Runoff

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30 (Special)—Thanks to above average rain and snow last spring, ground water storage in Idaho increased last year while it continued to decline nationally.

The annual summary of interior's geological survey released this week on the change in water resources since September, 1956, shows water levels rose in the Dry Creek area, parts of Oakley valley, northern Ratt River valley, Boise valley and the Snake river plain in Butte and Jerome counties.

Water levels in the eastern Snake river plain in Jefferson county dropped on the average about two feet. The report said this indicated a lowering of the water table over much of the blue lake basin because of heavy irrigation withdrawals.

Declines also were recorded in wells at the Minidoka project, North Side Pumping division in Minidoka county, southern Ratt river valley in Cassia county, Rathdrum tract in northern Idaho and in the Moscow basin in Latah county.

In western Washington, water levels also rose but levels in northern Utah remained steady.

Columbia river runoff measured 112, 111 per cent of an average established between 1921-45. It averaged 160,100 cubic feet after adjustments were made for the seven major power reservoirs in route. Peak discharge was 705,000 cubic feet on May 22, the earliest high water day since 1949. Lowest daily discharge was Sept. 13 at 78,000 cubic feet.—The runoff was

measured at The Dalles in Oregon. Storage at Bear lake was measured at 1,202,000 acre feet, compared with 804,200 a year ago. Storage at the seven reservoirs on the upper Snake river reached a total of 1-15,800 Sept. 30. Last year 1,281,000 acre feet were stored the same day.

In summer runoff, from April to September, 4,308,000 acre feet was measured for Snake river near Hells, Ida. At The Dalles 80,750,000 was measured for this same period.

Runoff on the Salmon river for the six summer months was measured at 7,910,000 acre feet at Whitecloud, Ida.

Expert Claims U. S. Heading To Rent Plan

CHICAGO, Oct. 30.—Joseph J. Thurn, marketing and merchandising expert, says the nation is heading toward a "rental economy."

"There's a revolution coming in our distribution system," Thurn, vice president of Design Dynamics, Inc., summed it up this way: "Industry's biggest problem is getting the goods to the consumer."

"In an age of gadgets and mass production, installment credit has become about as far as it can go."

"Consumers will have to rent instead of buy to consume the flow of goods from the nation's factories."

"Ride of ownership has become a curse," Thurn said. "It's an economy fetish, and we'll have to get rid of it."

Actually, he said, "our whole concept of ownership is false."

"If a man buys a car and lives 30 months to pay, he doesn't really own it until the final payment," Thurn said. "Then, the chances are he'll trade it in and so on."

"It's not that different from renting," he said.

Thurn said the "rental revolution" already is on the march.

The automobile rental business, for example, has tripled in the last few years, he said. "Last year 150,000 consumers rented cars."

Thurn said companies have found it most economical to rent fleets of cars, trucks and other heavy equipment rather than tying their capital up in ownership of items which become obsolete in a few years.

"The leasing agency has greater purchasing power," Thurn said. "It can save on the purchase price by buying at the factory in quantity."

Thurn said the switch from ownership to control of goods will benefit the individual consumer just as it has large firms.

"The time will come," he said, "when most of us will rent our cars and our major appliances."

"This will widen the area of what we can afford, and it will apply to all home levels."

"Instead of confining himself to the limited sphere of what he can own, the consumer can broaden his living in terms of control."

"In other words, he will live better for less money."

Police said the bomb attack in the Knesset chamber yesterday by a damaged young man appeared to have no political implications. However, they were not ruling out the possibility that the assailant, Moshe Ben-Yanor Druk, may have been used as a tool by some political group.
