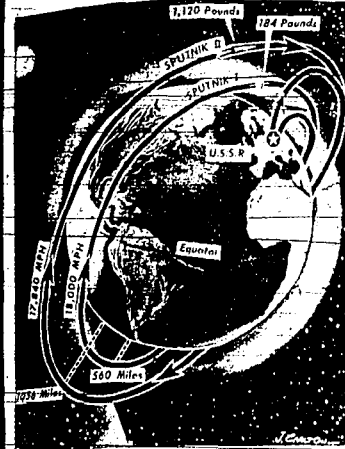

U.S. Reviews Policy Toward Economic Aid to Two Nations

The United States is reviewing its policy toward Europe's two "underdeveloped" communist countries.
In both instances, the review centers on economic aid.
Poland, which under its communist leader Wladyslaw Gomulka has refused to pursue the "peace with honor" policy, is likely to get no aid.
But aid to Yugoslavia may be changed because of President Tito's recognition of the East German puppet regime.
A Polish mission opened negotiations in Washington last week for credit of up to 200 million dollars to help in surplus agricultural products and machinery needed for industrial development.
But Josip W. Stjepanovic, U.S. ambassador to Yugoslavia, has been ordered back to Belgrade from a special tour of duty in Washington to find out just where Tito stands.
In the view of Washington officials, Tito has been a little too friendly toward Soviet Russia in recent weeks.
"But does not mean that there is a belief that Tito will again become a puppet under Russian domination. He is too smart for that. But he is supposed to be neutral."
The balance between Russia and the United States, the balance has been tipped by the recognition of the East German puppet regime.
Poland tried to get 300 million dollars from the United States, but this year, after receiving 100 million, it is asking for 50 million dollars.
New Poland is trying to get the remaining 200 million dollars.

Court Advised Manslaughter Fine Remitted

Manslaughter. He was sentenced to a term in the penitentiary and fined \$1000. Earlier this year he was paroled. However, prior to the time he was released, the board of corrections remitted the fine during the Jan. 1 hearing.
The law states that manslaughter charges result from the death of a woman patient from whom Rose, then an obstetrician physician, had performed an illegal operation.
In October county officials learned Rose was living in Burley, Idaho, according to county records, he had paid the \$1000 fine.
In the district court on Oct. 31, on Nov. 1, Rose was served with the order to appear in court.
Shortly after the order was served on Rose, District Chairman L. E. Cooney called Rose to the court and said the fine had been remitted. Silver said Clapp also had been remitted a copy of the order remitting the fine. He then suggested Clapp call Cunningham.
The law states that the show cause order Cunningham pointed out. "The Idaho state board of corrections failed to comply with the law, imposed upon me by section 20-232, Idaho Code, in that the board of corrections did not cause the clerk of the district court the action taken by the board until after the show cause order was issued."
By an act passed by the state legislature the state board of corrections is composed of three members. They are L. E. Clapp, chairman; M. J. Fawcett, vice chairman; and H. P. Fawcett, secretary.
The three members of the board are not elected to office but are appointed by the governor. Clapp is referred to as the board and technically he is the board.
The state board of corrections was formerly known as the state pardon board. The board is authorized to set by statute at six years. On the expiration of a term, the governor responds or appoints a member.

U.S. Weather Brings Rains; Snow-Mantles

A wide variety of weather covered the nation today—rain, snow, and warming and cooling trends.
Rain and drizzle were reported over a broad chunk of land extending from eastern New England through Louisiana, and far north as Kansas.
A cold-overcast line of rain fell at Alexandria, La., during the night, and other light rains were reported in the lower Great Lakes region and from the mid-Atlantic coast to southern New England.
Snow flurries whirled in central and southeastern Kansas. More than a foot of snow was expected through the mid-Mississippi valley to the upper Great Lakes, and temperatures in the mid-Mississippi valley dropped as much as 10 degrees in a 24-hour period, some temperatures rose 20 degrees in Minnesota.
Rain alone was expected today over most of the area westward from the Rockies to the Pacific coast. Generally warmer weather was forecast for the northern portions of the nation between the Rockies and the Ohio valley.
Tows and Nebraska are due for snow as well as rain, while Texas and the Gulf states get another warm-up today. It will be warmer in California, along with showers in the south, while cooler temperatures are expected in Virginia and Pennsylvania.

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

This is the time in the school term to check on the progress of the children—whether they are in elementary or secondary school. It is time to scan the report card closely.

If there is the slightest doubt that the child is making a success of the course, have conference with the teacher and decide what the child needs to make better headway.

Then attend to it day after day until the difficulty is cleared.

Sometimes a parent agrees to follow up on the teacher's suggestions, does so for a time and then, having other things on his mind, forgets all about the matter. Until next report card time and then the trouble has become irremediable.

If there is so much as a hint that the child needs the attention of a physician that must be attended to promptly. If his vision or hearing is in question have them tested and treated accordingly.

If the teacher says something like "the child needs to study more," it does not always prepare his lessons and his homework is careless. He can do the work if he puts his mind to it. Ask the teacher to get you an outline of the month's work and then see that the child has each day's work done and done well.

Children in this situation need supervision of some sort while they study their lessons for the next day. They need help. For example, the teacher of social studies said, "Take the next seven pages of the text book for next lesson." The pupil makes a note of this and forgets all about it, or in a great hurry, re-ports card time and then the trouble has become irremediable.

Over the homework notes—show the child that all the words on those seven pages are not important to the points they make and help him find those important points and fix them in his mind. This is the first step in learning to study profit-

ably and few pupils seem to get it. Make certain that this child has time and place, light and quiet for study. Never mind his plea for the radio and the "T.V. If you do this, your child in school days, and keep at it until he becomes second nature with him, you will have smoothed his path to learning.

We've been hearing a lot of reports like that lately from men who make it their business to drive and find out why better roads don't always mean safer driving.

They come up with some good ideas, too, for taking the monotony out of cross-country driving.

But one sure-fire way of making certain the driver stays awake and alert at the wheel, no safety engineer has mentioned.

That is, take a couple of lively youngsters in the back seat of the car.

Having survived any number of long trips with small children I can vouch for the fact that a couple to kids may not make a trip restful, but they definitely will keep it from ever becoming monotonous.

Dad, at the wheel, couldn't possibly slip off into dangerous reverie or drowsiness with a couple of kids in these pitifully short trips.

Every 10 minutes they are sure to ask either "What time is it?" or "How much further do we have to go, Daddy?"

So Dad is kept alert checking first the speedometer and then his watch. Also, stops are frequent when there are kids along on a trip. One wants a drink, another a nap, one at a filling station.

In between stops Dad is called on to make Jim move over and give Sis more room, or to pinky Sue quit kicking Jim or stop hounding the come books in her corner, etc.

There's another safety factor about traveling with kids. You don't decide you can make 400 or 700 miles before looking for a place to spend the night.

The kids start looking about mid-afternoon and by that time even Dad is worn-out. To get out of the quarters of the car he says, "Maybe we would want to stop and get an early start tomorrow."

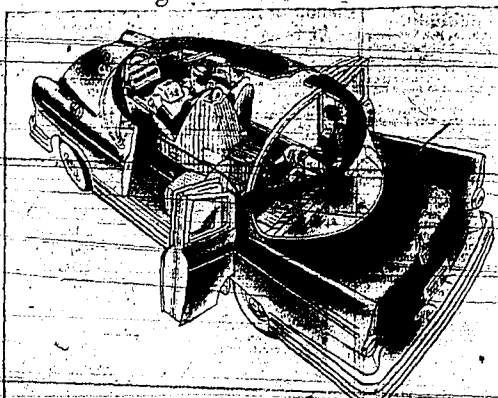

Disarmament Is Keynote of Queen's Talk

LONDON, Nov. 8 (AP)—Queen Elizabeth II has pledged the British government to work for world disarmament so that the advance of science shall not be "retarded by the fears of mankind."

Her speech, opening the 1951-52 session of parliament, came as a surprise. It hurried through space overhead and the Russians were threatening to boycott all disarmament talks with the West.

Ex-president in evening gown and wearing the glittering imperial crown, Elizabeth gave the 44-minute speech and members of parliament and a broad review of the conservative government's legislative program and foreign policy.

"They will pursue their endeavors to achieve U. N. agreement on disarmament, mindful that at this momentous time, the advance of science into the unknown should be inspired by the hope, and not retarded by the fears, of mankind," she said.

The queen's speech, written for her by Prime Minister Harold Macmillan, conservative government, made no direct reference to the Soviet Union's sensational scientific accomplishments. But it was clear what she was referring to.

The speech proposed that women be given the right to become peers and vote in the house of lords, a right now reserved for men.

It said the government would take "all steps necessary to maintain the value of our money, to preserve the economic basis of full employment by restraining inflation."

Her speech was the signal for the start of a full-scale debate between the conservatives and opposition socialist in the house of commons.

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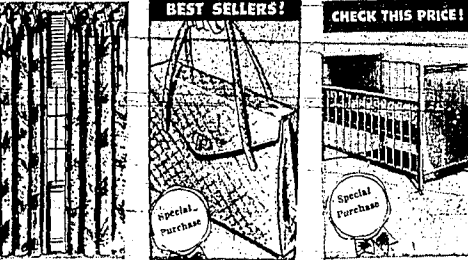
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
