Three Airmen Face Charges In Check Ring

ST. FRANCISCO, Nov. 7 (AP)—A grand jury indicted three airmen as members of the Pacific Air Force base forger ring yesterday for allegedly forging \$150,000 in bad U. S. treasury checks.

Accused on a count of conspiracy were 1st Sgt. Theodore Barry, 28, Louisville, Ky.; Sgt. Charles A. Evans, 21, Dyersburg, Tenn.; and Alvin J. James R. Hoyle, 21, Rushford, N. C. Each of the other counts concerned only one or two of the defendants.

Barry could receive a possible prison term of 85 years and a total fine of \$15,000 if found guilty of the charges. Evans faces total possible terms of 30 years and Hoyle, 25 years.

The indictment charged that Barry, a clerk in the base finance office made out fraudulent vouchers causing checks to be prepared for the payment of transport air force personnel. The indictment charged that Barry forged and passed three checks, partly through the use of a restaurant, which he bought for the purpose.

Assistant U. S. attorney Donald B. Constant said more than 300 bad checks already have been discovered but said the ring passed at least 400.

Barry and Evans now are free on bail in Denver and Hoyle is free on bail from federal court here.

U.S. Industry Cost Is Heavy For Research

NEW YORK, Nov. 7 (AP)—The U.S. government and industry are expected to spend at a 10-billion-dollar a year clip on scientific research and development.

And Sputniks are likely to impinge a rocket-like climb in that figure next year, especially in the aerospace share, which is now about one-third.

Basic Research Gets Help
The government is doing more than half of the spending on basic research—the pure science that is the most important result of the present most complicated year, a combination of pure science and engineering.

Washington some time back that the Russians were pulling ahead in pure science research brought a sharp reaction from the defense establishment.

Industry is putting some 4 to 6 percent of its 10 billion dollars a year into basic science activities. For example, University of Chicago gets about 1 1/2 million dollars a year from corporations for basic research.

Some government officials estimate that only 10 to 15 percent of total government research spending of more than 3 billion dollars a year is for basic science.

But the National Science Foundation says that the defense department funds basic science hard to determine. The foundation divides federal government research spending into 40 percent on development and application of it to specific objectives.

The defense department, and the atomic energy commission spend 85 percent of the federal research dollar.

Radioactive Metal Is Set for Delivery
IDAHO FALLS, Nov. 7 (AP)—A half-ton piece of metal "cooker" in an atomic reactor for four years will be given off as much gamma radiation as a half pound of radium.

The piece was removed from the reactor at the Atomic Energy Commission's Idaho Falls reactor testing station Oct. 21.

Ex-Defense Secretary Relaxes Despite Soviets' Two Sputniks

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—Charles E. Wilson, former secretary of defense, is apparently relaxed about the launch of the Russian satellite Sputniks.

Wilson said he didn't care whether the Russians beat us into outer space. That was what they were reportedly going all-out on their satellite program but before they had pushed a baby moon into space.

Now they've launched two Sputniks, proving they are far ahead of this country in satellite development. Asked by phone at his Detroit home how he feels about it now, Wilson said:

"We're getting too worked up about this. This is not a weapon business. This is a scientific business. Nothing is going to drop out of the satellites on us."

And he added that maybe it's a good thing—and will do us some good—for the Russians to be ahead in this because sometimes we get too confident about our ability to be ahead of everybody.

"We've been asked him—and Wilson's answers—at a news conference he held Nov. 17, 1954 while he was still secretary of defense. Wilson said that they were studying earth satellites and space ships."

Wilson: "I like to go to get my feet on you know, down to earth. I have enough problems on earth."

Question: "Is there such a study under way at the present time?" Wilson: "In this space business? On no."

Question: "Forrestal wrote about it. There was a study in 1942. Has it been discontinued or is it still under way?"

Wilson: "You are going back too far for me. I don't know of any such study."

Question: "Well, there have been several published reports—that the Russians have given priority to the establishment of a space satellite."

Wilson: "I would rather they go to the moon, some other place than come over here."

Wilson, recently denying a charge that he had blocked funds for this country's earth satellite program, said the defense department was "interested in the project but basically it was not the defense department's business."

He said the satellite development was "a project of the National Science Foundation and the Academy of Science" and that when the science foundation "ran out of funds," the defense department put up some money to help.

Three States Pay Big Sum In U. S. Levy

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—The U. S. Treasury today announced that the three Rocky Mountain states during the last fiscal year.

This amounts to about \$41.17 for every man, woman and child in Colorado, Montana and Wyoming, and an increase of 47 per cent from tax collections during the previous fiscal year.

During the 1956 fiscal year, the collections in the three states totaled \$200,878,000.

Collections in the individual states amounted to \$23,200,000 in Colorado, compared with \$18,100,000 the previous fiscal year; in Montana, \$18,776,000 compared with \$12,891,000; and in Wyoming, \$58,908,000 compared with \$58,878,000.

The federal revenue service, reporting this today, said total collections for the country were \$80,172,000,000, up 10 per cent from the previous fiscal year.

This included \$49,810,000,000 from individual income and employment taxes, up four billion dollars from the previous year, and \$21,331,000,000 in corporation income and the state taxes. This figure was up 251 million dollars from the previous fiscal period.

Only Michigan, Delaware and Maryland showed decreases during the period, which ended June 30, 1957.

Solon Seeking Special Meets For Congress

DULUTH, Minn., Nov. 7 (AP)—Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey called today for a special session of congress to deal with the "urgent tasks" necessary to meet Russia's missile-satellite challenge.

The Minnesota Democrat, a member of the senate foreign relations committee, said a special session is demanded by the urgency of the international situation and the great decisions which face the President and the nation during the coming weeks.

"I do not feel we can afford to mark time between now and the first week of January," he said, "when we have had to virtually denigrate to us how many millions and perhaps years the Soviets have had out ahead of us in certain areas of research, technology and production."

Humphrey, in a speech prepared for the Duluth branch of the University of Minnesota, was the latest Democrat to join in mounting demands for a special sitting of congress.

He wished "warmest congratulations and friendly greetings to Soviet President Nikhonor Khrushchev."

Food Superstition Discounted By Secretary of Technologists

CHICAGO, Nov. 7 (AP)—Thunder won't really cause milk to sour, and the mere presence of a red-haired woman near a cheese vat won't hurt the cheese.

These and other food superstitions were dispelled by Col. Charles B. Lawrence, executive secretary of the Institute of Food Technologists.

"There's absolutely no rhyme or reason to some of these superstitions," Lawrence said, "but people still hold to them."

The thunder-milk idea apparently is related to the fact that warm, humid weather does increase the lactic bacteria in the milk, he said, and this in turn will cause milk to sour if it is left in the open.

"But it's the lactic bacteria, not the thunder," Lawrence said.

The cheese superstition also is prevalent in some sections of the South and along the Atlantic seaboard, he said. According to the belief, if a red-haired woman lends the cheese vat, the curd will be "like loose sand and the cheese will be unfit to eat."

Along the coast of the Carolinas, Georgia, Florida and Texas, Lawrence said, many people believe that eating grape and ice cream at the same meal is "about like taking strychnine."

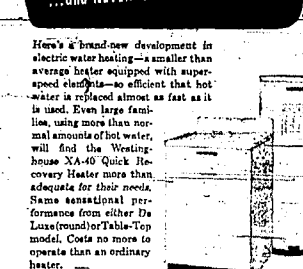

"Ike" to Cover Broad Agenda At Conference

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—President Eisenhower apparently intends to attend a conference with congressional leaders next month to cover a broader range of topics than he has at such past sessions.

Eisenhower scheduled the meetings in advance of his trip to a "summit" conference of North Atlantic Treaty nations in Paris next month. The NATO session will tackle ways of achieving greater scientific and military unity to meet the onslaught of Russian scientific and military advances.

The White House yesterday released the names of senators and representatives invited to attend a bipartisan session Dec. 3 and a strictly Republican huddle the following day.

In past years the President's bipartisan leadership meetings have been confined to matters involving foreign policy and national security.

But included this year are the chairman of the senate finance committee, the joint committee on atomic energy and the appropriations committee of both houses.

Acting White House press secretary Anne Whitton said no agenda has been drawn up yet. She said she thought the inclusion of additional committee chairmen implied that the Dec. 3 conference would be broader in scope than originally expected.

Phone Cable Set To Link 2 Nations

PARIS, Nov. 7 (AP)—A trans-Atlantic telephone cable will be laid between France and Canada in 1959 and put into service by the end of that year, the French government announced today.

An agreement signed last July included West Germany as a signatory. The cable is designed to improve telephone service—currently by radio—between the two European countries and North America.

'Ike' Is Hoping For European Visit for 1958

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—President and Mrs. Eisenhower hope to visit Europe and other European capitals next year.

Source close to the White House said the first family is trying to make arrangements for the trip. Such a tour would be in line with the President's desire to draw the United States and European nations closer together to meet the onrush of Russian science and military power.

Eisenhower will go to Paris next month to attend a "summit" conference of North Atlantic Treaty nations to study ways of achieving greater western unity.

The British have been particularly anxious to have the President come to their country. Queen Elizabeth and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan visited the United States last month and met with the President.

In meeting with them, Eisenhower stressed the need for greater Anglo-American cooperation to meet Russia's challenge in the new space-age era.

Discussions that arrangements were being made to have the President's year tour come after it was brought to the President's attention that the trip to London following the Paris NATO meeting.

The British touched off a transatlantic exchange yesterday with the President's announcement that the President had been forced to defer a proposed December visit because of Mrs. Eisenhower's health.

At the White House press secretary Anne Whitton, asked if there was any basis for the London state visit, said the President's current plan to continue his December visit to Europe had to do with his heavy official schedule and not the condition of Mrs. Eisenhower's health.

Asked whether Mrs. Eisenhower was ill, Whitton replied: "No. The first lady, who underwent an operation Aug. 6, has been more active in recent days than in a long time."

Mr. Eisenhower, unaware of the transatlantic exchange, said yesterday morning she was "feeling fine" when she appeared at a breakfast. But she added she still "hasn't too much walking" yet. Her remarks suggested that she tires mentally easily and is under doctor's orders to avoid strenuous exertion.

VIENNA, Nov. 7 (AP)—Communist Czech President Antonin Zapotocky is "almost completely recovered" from the heart attack he had last Monday, Prague Radio reported today.

The board of directors said the 59-year-old president's recovery is proceeding without complications. The radio reported him seriously ill Monday and that he had been taken to the state hospital for treatment.

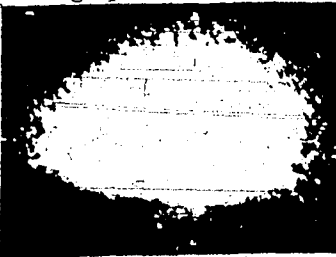

Mystery Note Hints at Death For Diplomats

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 7 (AP)—Rep. Glenard P. Lipscomb, R., Calif., said today that a mysterious letter slipped into his pocket while he was visiting in Stuttgart last October strongly hinted that incoming British diplomats Donald Maclean and Guy Burgess had been liquidated in Russia.

Maclean and Burgess fled from Britain while under security guard on May 25, 1951, and dramatically appeared last year on Fox 10 Moscow when newsmen were summoned to a press conference to hear them deny that they were ex-communists.

Lipscomb said the letter which now had been translated and handed to the "proper authorities" was placed in his overcoat pocket in the possession of a Stuttgart hotel while he was having lunch there last Oct. 8. He said he did not find the note until after he had boarded a plane in Moscow for Stockholm later that same night.

The congressman said the letter's author claimed to hate communism and wanted to "promote its destruction," and had had the means of offering to get certain "materials" to American intelligence.

"Accidents are possible, such as those of the British diplomat Burgess. . . I do not remember the name of the second," read one part of the letter, according to the writer declaring that for the time being he did not wish to make any address in the letter.

Lipscomb said it would be difficult to establish whether the letter was "genuine or a clumsy bluff" by a Russian agent.

"In any event, it is an interesting comment," he said. "It appears to have been written by two different persons, judging from the handwriting and the references to Maclean and to Burgess and Maclean may be very significant."

A part of the letter, revealed by Lipscomb stated: ". . . it is necessary to expose communism before it can gain public opinion as in Lipscomb society reducing people to slavery in all sectors of life. . . the acceptance of my proposal is very important to me since it will give me a consciousness of participation in the struggle of all mankind with the sworn enemy of mankind—communism."

The author set up elaborate arrangements through which he could be contacted, Lipscomb said.

U. S. Security Group Holds Rush Session

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—President Eisenhower held a second expanded national security council session today. He called in the greatest attendance of outside experts ever brought into one of these top policy-making meetings.

Mrs. Anne Whitson, acting White House press secretary, said there was no direct relationship between this meeting and Eisenhower's address tonight on science and security.

The action is on a speed-up schedule with this first one moved up six days ahead of the original schedule.

While the specific purpose of the security council session was not disclosed, Mrs. Whitson told reporters that "Yes, I would say it is connected with all developments of the last week or 10 days." That would take in the period of the launching of Sputnik II by Soviet Russia.

too big for the usual session in the cabinet room and was shifted to the broadcasting room in the basement of the White House proper.

The NSC has five members by law—the President, the vice president, the secretary of state and defense and the director of the office of defense mobilization. Occasionally, other top officials also are brought in.

Of this last group Newman and Shantley make the best showing statistically. Newman is the nation's total offense leader with 1,091 yards in 100 plays and 10 touchdowns in 14 games. He is eighth in total offense with 622 yards in 110 plays.

Malzone Is American Loop's Top Sophomore

NEW YORK, Nov. 7 (AP)—Frank Malzone of the Boston Red Sox, a last-minute eligible candidate for 1937 American league rookie-of-the-year honors, was an overwhelming selection Tuesday as the best baseman carried the league's sophomore award by a landslide in the annual Associated Press poll of members of the Baseball Writers Association of America. Malzone, 21, was named on 166 of the 182 ballots cast.

Shortstop Luis Aparicio of the Chicago White Sox, rookie-of-the-year in 1936, was second with 14 votes. Outfielders Tito Francona of Baltimore and Rocky Colavito of Cleveland each received one vote.

For most of the 1937 Malzone had been touted as being eligible for rookie honors. He had started the 1936 campaign with Boston, but after hitting .163 in 27 games the Red Sox sent him to San Francisco of the Pacific Coast league in early June.

Since Malzone had been in bat 102 times officially, there was a controversy over whether he had qualified as a rookie in 1937.

The baseball rules committee, composed of members of the Baseball Writers Association, declared Malzone ineligible in the major league. The committee met later during the World Series and voted to ban a player from the major league who had played in his first full season if he had more than 15 at bats in his first 100 official appearances.

Thus Malzone found himself ineligible as a rookie and classified as a sophomore. As it turned out, the 21-year-old native of Cleveland of New York clearly outdistanced his rivals as the league's most impressive second-year player.

The right-handed swinger who began in the Boston chain in 1936, was sent to San Francisco to come when he went to the Giants for further seasoning. He hit .260 with 10 homers and 10 runs in 102 games, his first chance with the Red Sox in spring training in 1937.

This time Malzone stuck with the Red Sox and filled the glaring third base gap in the Boston infield. Finding the short left field wall at Fenway park an inviting target, he hit for both average and distance.

After hitting above .300 for awhile, Malzone finished with a .299 batting average. The Cincinnati, N. Y., resident wound up in a three-way tie for third in runs batted in with 10. He was second in hits with 185 and was third in doubles with 31.

The 1936 season was the most he has ever had in a season. Stengel was so enchanted at Malzone's performance by mid-season that the Yankee manager picked him to play in the All-Star game.

In capturing the sophomore accolade, Malzone succeeded pitcher Herb Rehrer of Cleveland, the 1936 choice. Cincinnati's Frank Robinson was named the National league's outstanding sophomore last week.

Russian People Do Without Comforts Of Life to Spark Scientific Advances

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (U.P.)—Forty years ago today communists seized power in Russia. What's happened in that time; what life ahead? Communism developed and expanded enormously. There's no reason to believe it will stop.

In 40 years the Russians have made astonishing progress in industry and science. The progress has been concentrated most notably on weapons, the atomic and H-bombs, jet planes, missiles and earth satellites.

That progress would have provided the Russian people with far higher living standards—those standards are below the West but far better than 40 years ago—it had been devoted to peacetime goods.

In short: A couple of generations of Russians have been used—while forced to do without the modern conveniences and luxuries of the

of self-appointed leaders—perhaps 10 million out of more than 200 million people—will rule it by force.

Red party control is a little more relaxed than in Stalin's day. In time perhaps it too will undergo a change and become more democratic, permitting wider participation in government by the people for one of two reasons: either through evolutionary change or the demands and pressures of the people as they become increasingly more educated and questioning.

No government remains fixed and frozen forever. History believes that thought.

On one thing the red bosses of 1917 were wrong: They thought that

world revolution was just around the corner. Disappointed in that, but aggressively crusading, they have set out to bring about what didn't happen by itself.

In 40 years—by force and never by persuasion or open and free elections—communism has grabbed all of eastern Europe, all of China, half of Viet Nam, and North Korea. Its influence is spreading in Asia and the Middle East.

The peoples of the European satellites have shown vast discontent with their Russian masters. That does not mean communism will not persist without the use of Russian armies.

There are such weapons as infiltration, espionage from within, persuasion and example. And the industrial and scientific progress of Russia under communism in 40 years is bound to be impressive.

At least it will impress people who still living in feudal societies want to keep in a hurry into the 20th century. For many of them, who never knew democracy communism may seem a faster way of getting places than a democratic society operating under capitalism.

As the years pass, and Russians live better, they will probably move more to the right, toward capitalism. And the western powers, to offset the gains of communism, may be forced to move toward socialism.

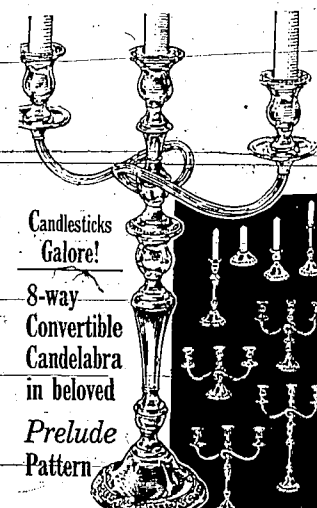

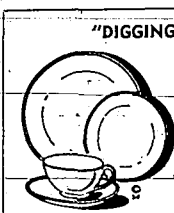

Tax Collection Hike Reported By U.S. Agency

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Federal tax collections totaled \$40,772,000 for the year ended June 30, 1957, or seven per cent more than the preceding year's yield, the internal revenue service reported Wednesday. The bulk came, as usual, from income taxes.

Of the collections for the past fiscal year, \$45,613,000,000 was in individual income and employment taxes, and \$11,331,000,000 in corporate income and profit taxes, compared with \$42,613,000,000 and \$11,200,000,000, respectively, for the preceding year.

Alcohol and tobacco taxes increased from \$1,711,000,000 for the 1956 fiscal year to \$1,718,000,000 for the 1957 fiscal year.

All states and territories showed increases except Michigan, Delaware, Maryland, District of Columbia, and Alaska.

Collections as reported by states for the 1957 fiscal year together with the comparative total for the preceding year included:

Wyoming—\$25,585,000 and \$25,276,000.

Idaho—\$132,200,000 and \$120,134,000.

Montana—\$136,374,000 and \$125,901,000.

Utah—\$192,653,000 and \$178,107,000.

Washington—\$259,346,000 and \$247,614,000.
