11 Perish as Storm Whips Eastern Area

Clearing weather today eased the grip of a weekend storm that whipped parts of the Great Lakes region with one to three inches of snow and caused at least 11 deaths. Heavy snow squalls and icy winds etc. a blanket of snow along the shores of the Great Lakes yesterday and brought an additional two-to-five-inch snow to parts of eastern New York. Previously, it was a three-to-five-inch accumulation.

A record cold air blast pushed as far south as Georgia and Alabama. Hailstorms plagued a record low of 17 at Indianapolis early yesterday for that date and another record was set at Louisville, Ky., with a minimum of 21.

A high pressure area in the Ohio valley brought clearing weather to much of the East, and a storm center over Washington brought southerly winds and warming temperatures to the northern section.

Minimum temperatures ranged from 10 to 20 degrees, with winds up to 40 miles per hour, and early morning low of 48, about 25 degrees higher than at the same time yesterday.

Occasional temperatures ranged from the low 30s in southern Florida to 10 degrees at Fraser, Colo.

Shower and most of the Pacific Northwest during the night and spread into parts of northern California and western Montana. The rain dumped nearly one inch of water at Berkeley, Calif., and most precipitation amounts were light.

Light rain also occurred in southern New Mexico, Texas and portions of southern Oklahoma. Amounts included one-half inch at Junction, Tex., and 3/16 inch at Corpus Christi.

Weathermen recalled that this was the 10th anniversary of the Armistice day storm of 1947 which killed 150 persons and caused damage in the millions of dollars. The nine of the storm victims died in ship sinkings on the Great Lakes and 40 persons perished in Minnesota, most of them duck hunters caught unprepared by the sudden blizzard.

Forecasters predicted showers and cooler for the Pacific Northwest today, with showers or snow flurries extending across the northern and central United States. A cold front for the Southwest and fair and warmer weather is expected in the Great Lakes region.

Occasional rain is likely in the southern plains and lower Mississippi valley and fair but cooler weather is expected along the Atlantic coast.

River Flood Plan Is Aired At Gem Meet

BONNERS FERRY, Nov. 11 (UP)—The North Idaho Chamber of Commerce, meeting in this flood-stricken town today, discussed early construction of proposed hydroelectric and flood control projects.

Members reaffirmed their apirit resolution asking the federal power commission to grant the proposed west power company a license to build Mountain Sheep and Pleasant dam on the Kootenai to flood control.

Speedy construction of Bruce Eddy dam on the Clearwater and Libby dam on the Kootenai to flood control was also urged.

Former Idaho governor Len Johnston, who urged the international joint commission, told the "night" session that the Kootenai had caused 15 million dollars worth of damage in the Bonanza area since 1948.

Flood control and power from the proposed Libby dam is currently needed and would benefit both the United States and Canada, he said.

Lee Leroy, 65, director of the North Idaho Chamber of Commerce for 1956, said the chamber's executive vice president and Del W. McPherson, Moscow, remained secretary.

The spring meeting will be held in Coeur d'Alene.

Kramer M. Robinson, Spokane, president of the Washington Water power company, told delegates that Pacific Northwest power pool lacks reserves. The pool has resources of only 10,750,000 kilowatts to meet a demand of 10,300,000 kilowatts for this winter, he said.

Other resolutions:

1. Asked elimination of the 3 percent government excise tax on freight and 10 percent tax on passenger travel.
2. Asked increased tariffs and import quotas to aid the domestic lead-in industry.
3. Urged that the report of the Idaho interim tax study committee of 1956 which it termed a "reasonable compromise" be accepted.
4. Asked congressional action to prohibit a three-cent wage building program to aid the lumber industry.
5. Urged a committee study of the desirability of placing North Idaho on mountain standard time to unify the time zone in the state with the Pacific standard time line coming at the Washington border.

Westerners requested to tell how reclamation helped U. S.

The ambassadors who leave here today will tell the story of the West and the nation, delegates to the National Reclamation Association's annual convention were urged before they scattered Saturday to their homes.

The 30th annual convention which drew more than 1,000 persons ended Friday with attention of Houston as the 1956 convention city. Denver said it was the 1956 meeting.

L. E. Coles, Pittsfield, Ore., was acting president during the convention. He was elected to the position.

"No previous association meeting has resulted in presentation of such an array of factual information as we have had at this meeting," he said.

This wealth of information as the value of reclamation to the West and to the nation should be carried home with us.

Italian Region Hit by Floods
ROMA, Italy, Nov. 11 (UP)—The worst flood in six months threatened the Italian peninsula today. Thousands fled with their goods and cattle before the rushing waters of the big river.

Smaller floods were reported from half a dozen other points in Italy.

In a dramatic, near Rome, lightning touched off a major fire in an oil refinery. The fire brigade worked night and day to put out the blaze, causing an estimated \$25,000 damage.

The Po burst its banks at six different points, sending thousands of tons of water boiling into the lands of Poine, scene of Italy's worst outdoor flood in 1953 which killed 273, left 223,000 homeless and caused 200 million dollars damage.

OK for Boost In Telephone Rates Sought
BOISE, Nov. 11 (UP)—Talk is cheap. An old adage says so.

But telephone companies operating in Idaho are attempting to convince the Idaho public utilities commission that the cost of providing facilities for talking is increasing steadily.

Pursuing before the commission are telephone rate increase requests from 10 of three major companies operating in the state. The bills already has been granted increased rates.

Hearings begin here Tuesday on a request of the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company to boost its rates enough to provide an additional \$447,430 in annual revenue.

At Corcoran, Ala., beginning Nov. 25, the commission will begin a hearing on a similar request from the General Telephone company. It asks rate boosts to get an additional \$112,244 in revenue.

Already authorized and effective Nov. 18 is a rate increase for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company which would give the company \$112,900 additional revenue from its Idaho operations.

Mountain States serves the bulk of southern Idaho; Pacific operates in the Lewiston area and General Telephone serves most of the remainder of northern Idaho.

The small telephone companies also are seeking rate increases. Already authorized is a boost for the Camanche Telephone company to give it \$4,110 in additional revenue per year. The action followed a hearing by the company that it had a net operating loss of \$10,12 in 1956.

Pending are rate increase applications from the Aberdeen Telephone company, which operates in southeastern Idaho, and the Lemhi Telephone company, which serves the Salmon area.

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Flu Outbreak Causes Death Of 700 In U. S.

Flu-spreaded, influenza across the nation have topped the 700 mark with three states accounting for nearly half of the tally.

An "alarming" flu epidemic in Georgia has been blamed for the death of 22 children and 17 adults. Have urged all Fulton (Atlanta) county, Ga., residents to get Asian flu inoculation.

The death toll in Pennsylvania from Asian flu, other types of influenza and flu complications reached 100 yesterday, and New York reported 48 at least 13 flu-blamed deaths.

The United Press counted at least 710 flu-connected deaths since the first outbreak of Asian flu in the country last summer.

All of Georgia's fatalities were reported in Atlanta where a month-long epidemic has raged. Officials of Georgia also were hit hard by the flu, but no reports of deaths, it was available outside of Atlanta.

An Atlanta health official said most of the flu victims were in the age group beginning at about 35 years old.

Charles Turner, a health department official, said that although the Atlanta situation was "alarming," he believed the epidemic may have reached its peak and soon would begin declining.

Alps Claim 385
ROME, Nov. 11 (UP)—The Alps dealt death to 385 climbers this year, the most tragic mountaineering accident in the world.

An Associated Press survey showed 111 died in Switzerland, 109 in Austria, and the rest in Italy, Germany and France. The worst previous year was 1953, when 269 persons perished.

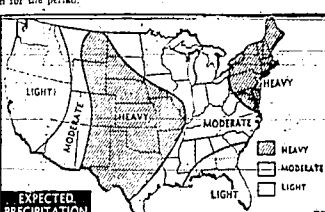

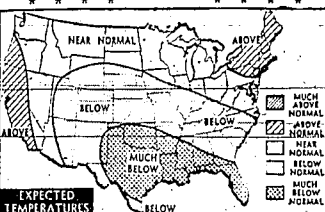
