

Burley Boy Is Killed in Auto Crash

PAUL, Nov. 14.—The number of traffic fatalities in Minidoka county was increased to nine Wednesday at about 6:25 p.m. when a 14-year-old Burley youth was killed when the car he was driving overturned two miles west and two and a half miles south of Paul on a gravel county road. Sheriff Theodore Johnson, meeting Foreign Minister Christian Pineau told the national assembly's foreign affairs committee that France "regretted" the Anglo-American move and considered it a "breach of Atlantic solidarity."

Bodies of 9 Strato-cruiser Victims Located in Ocean

A few minutes later he sent word that nine bodies were sighted, one of them strapped in an airplane seat.

McMURDO, Antarctica, Nov. 14—They also serve who only stand and wait.

These words of Milton apply in the modern age of air and space to the men who stand by the radio and radar sets at this operation headquarters.

It happened recently in a storm that sent wind and snow blowing across the air field here and dropped visibility to one-sixteenth of one mile.

Inside the shack that held the air operations center the OI clock on the wall read 1:45 a.m. Its ticking was drowned out by the buzz of a radio set and the voice of navy lieutenant Robert M. Epperly, Ensign, U.S. Navy.

Shortly after the preceding air operations officer had been called by air force 118, a four-engine bomber, to return to the base.

At 1 a.m., when the bomber should have been back, a redman turned to navy lieutenant Robert M. Epperly, Ensign, U.S. Navy, and asked him to prepare a rescue flight.

And then it came—the weak voice of air force captain Ralph D. Gorman, Glendale, Ill.

U. S. "Living At Volcano," Claims Cleric

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 14 (AP)—Evangelist Billy Graham warned last night that America is "living on the edge of a volcano" in "probably his most dangerous hour."

Graham who was honored at a memorial dinner and on the "This Four Live" television show, declared during his stay here that "America had best get on God's side and get it right quick."

The handsome evangelist arrived in Los Angeles by plane yesterday to confer with officials of a Hollywood religious film firm. He was walking with a cane as a result of an injury received when he was killed by a bad-tempered ram on his North Carolina farm four weeks ago.

Graham said he was taken by surprise by the TV show, which featured the "just the kind of religious relations and friends. Several movie personalities, including Roy Rogers, Dale Evans, Jimmy Stewart and Carol Channing, attended the show.

Following his arrival here, Graham admitted that Americans must not be soft and "morally decadent."

"World conditions are making people think more than ever and Christ is the answer to the world's problems and to individual problems," he declared. "This is an era of fire and danger, a terrible danger of annihilation, and we can't sit about with business as usual or 'Gee' as usual."

Graham came here from San Francisco where he had been mapping plans for a six-week revival at the Cow Palace there, beginning next April 27. Before that, he will visit Minneapolis and the Caribbean area.

Library Development Project Director Consults Trustees, Librarian in T. F.

Morten Kroll, director of the library development project of Pacific Northwest Library Association, was in Twin Falls Wednesday for a series of interviews with members of the Twin Falls library board of trustees and the city librarian, Arthur L. De Volder.

The association director is gathering information for a regional study of libraries confronting problems and the methods for dealing with them used by various districts. The region includes Idaho, Oregon, Washington, Montana and British Columbia.

"The project is a two-year inquiry," Kroll said, "into the problems they face. Our aim," he continued, "is to eventually formulate a program to improve facilities and services of association libraries."

He pointed out that libraries being studied included those at universities and colleges. A grant of \$10,000 was given the association for the study by the Ford Foundation in 1950. Kroll and the inquiry will be completed by June, 1952.

The director said help is being given the association by members of schools and colleges all over the Northwest. Dr. Boyd Martin at the University of Idaho, for example, is doing a study of library research facilities.

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Service Says Ailments Hit U. S. Heavily

CLEVELAND, Nov. 14 (AP)—At least one fourth of the nation's people have had to spend a day or more in bed since mid-summer because of severe colds, sore throat, Asian flu or similar upper respiratory ailments, a report by a U. S. public health service official showed today.

There were 38 million as affected from mid-July to October.

Dr. William Stewart, assistant to the surgeon general of USPHS summarized the latest available data on the Asian flu situation before the 85th annual meeting of the American Public Health Association.

As to Asia flu alone, he said: "The anticipated epidemics are now occurring in various parts of the country, particularly in the middle Atlantic and east north-central states."

Mortality Increase

"Slight to moderate increase in mortality that is above normal seasonal rates chiefly among older persons, have occurred in several places where epidemics are in progress."

He said that "future spread of the epidemic can be anticipated in essentially all parts of the country not now affected," and added:

"A high national incidence can be expected to continue for a period of six to eight weeks. The public health service—first—that vaccination against influenza is promoted vigorously."

Stewart said some idea of the prevalence of Asian flu could be derived from reports obtained in connection with the national health service—first—that vaccination against influenza is promoted vigorously.

The resulting estimates indicated he said, that during the period from July 15 to October 3 there were an estimated 38 million people with acute respiratory distress severe enough to cause them to go to bed.

Stewart said that during the week ended Oct. 12, an estimated 83 million persons throughout the country had colds, sore throats, influenza or similar diseases severe enough to put them to bed.

The average number of persons in bed each day that week as a result of these illnesses was about 3 million. A great number of these cases undoubtedly were Asian flu.

The questions were raised by Dr. H. B. Grayson, an authority on the disease since he wrote in Perryville, Mo., where silo-filling is a major occupation.

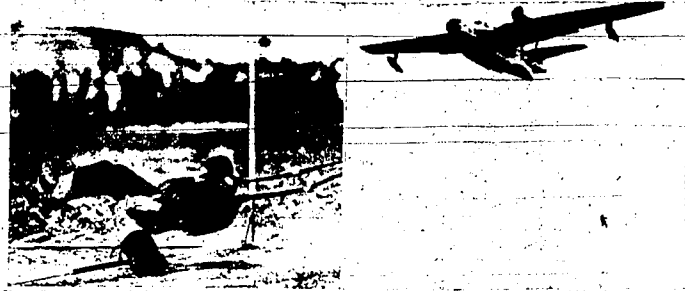

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Rescue Test Rushes Ex-Airman Swiftly Into Wild Blue Yonder



Harry Conway, 23, an air force veteran and now an engineering assistant at All American Engineering company at Wilmington, Del., has often moved into the wild blue yonder but this method of getting out is a bit sudden. Atom Power Plant Lights L. A. Region

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 14 (AP)—An atomic power plant which is already lighting up parts of Los Angeles will be formally dedicated today with a ceremony at the Santa Susana atomic energy commission chairman, Adm. Lewis L. Strauss, as the principal speaker.

The experimental generating plant, operated by Southern California Edison, is located in the Santa Susana mountains, some 30 miles northwest of downtown Los Angeles.

The AEC announced in mid-July that parts of Los Angeles were using electricity generated by the nuclear reactor. It was described at the time as the first non-fossil fuel reactor to produce electricity for a non-governmental power firm.

Federal funds were used in the building of the Santa Susana project, which now has a generating capacity of 7,000 kilowatts.

The General Electric company and Pacific Gas and Electric company joined forces earlier this year to produce 5,000 kilowatts of electricity from atomic energy at Pleasanton, Calif. The Pleasanton operation was credited with the first commercial use of atomic power in the U. S. since the government did not participate in its development.

U.S. General Sets New Jet Plane Record

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—Lt. Curtis LeMay and a record-setting jet plane set a new record today for the fastest jet plane to fly from Buenos Aires to Washington in 11 hours, 8 minutes and 48 seconds.

The time for the 5,200 mile flight was the first non-stop jet flight between the Argentine and United States capital.

LeMay and his new jet, the Boeing KC135 land transport, took off from Buenos Aires at 10:00 a.m. and landed at Washington National airport at 11:18:48 a.m.

The jet flew at an average speed of 465 miles an hour. At Washington National airport, LeMay received the distinguished flying cross from Gen. Thomas D. White, air force chief of staff.

The members of the crew also were decorated.

The same tanker-transport crew left Washington at 10:00 a.m. and flew to the east coast of Brazil and then to Buenos Aires, to demonstrate the jet's range and speed.

In doing so they set a distance record for non-stop jet flight of 6,335 miles, flown in 13 hours, 20 minutes, 51 seconds.

Washington's jet was not a distance mark but the establishment of a speed record which would not be broken for some time.

Gen. White described it as "just one indication of the growing ability of the U.S. Air Force."

Both Thursday's records were set by the National Aeronautics Association's Executive Secretary, J. Edgar Hoover.

Businessman Lists Kidnap, Theft of Auto

DICKINSON, N. D., Nov. 13 (AP)—A Minneapolis businessman said today he believed two men who kidnaped him at gunpoint and dumped him near here were bent on robbery and car theft.

James O. Romieux, 35, insurance manager of Carvill Enterprises in Minneapolis, said the abduction was planned by two men who had been in the car with him at a Minneapolis theater and got into his car.

They drove an erratic course westward from three states at speeds of 100 to 150 miles an hour, he said, and freed him yesterday afternoon when the car ran out of gas.

Romieux described the gunmen as about 25 and 40 years old. He said they were armed with pistols and a sawed-off shotgun.

At one point yesterday, Romieux said, the auto-popped a tire and stopped at a service station in Bowdoin, D. D., where he was held for a night when he was carried to a Minneapolis theater and got into his car.

The abduction of Romieux, a bachelor, was not discovered until he walked into police headquarters at Dickinson today and related his harrowing experience.

Subsequent to the abduction, he said, the possibility that one of the kidnappers might have been wanted for a long time in the state of Illinois. However, a description of the kidnapper sent to police here did not match either of the two men.

Truman Sees Tax Hike for Missile Costs

NEW YORK, Nov. 14 (AP)—President Harry S. Truman said today that Americans will have to pay more for the missiles that will be used to protect the nation in the future.

"It goes without saying that the missiles will be more expensive than the ones we have now," Truman said on his morning walk. "You know very well there'll have to be a tax hike to meet the situation. The way to balance the budget is to collect the necessary taxes."

Truman said he was walking for traffic lights to turn green before crossing, and as usual, he pictured reporters on the edge of daywalking, calling New York "the great lawbreaking town in the country."

Then, at the corner of Park avenue and Eighty-fourth street, Truman nearly didn't practice what he preached. He had just stepped into the street when the light turned from red to green. Before Truman could step back, a car came within a few inches of him. He said he didn't see it because he was too busy answering questions.

Truman told trailing newsmen that he had not heard President Eisenhower's speech last night. After being told that the President did mention a tax hike, he said that Americans would have to make sacrifices to keep up with Russia, Truman said.

"The bills are going to have to be paid, and there's only one place where the money can come from—taxes. We have a situation to meet, and we're going to meet it."

Drive to Save Manpower Is Begun in U.S.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—The government launched an intensive new campaign today to avoid critical shortages of manpower in the defense industry.

One high official said U.S. "survival" may be at stake in the program to train young people to do the jobs that most need to be done.

Warnings that the nation is losing the abilities of its youth came yesterday from two top labor department officials. They echoed the views of teachers and training experts who met here for two days to discuss manpower problems.

William C. Case, deputy undersecretary of labor, told a church group that proper job placement and training are "longer term" than military or humanitarian aid, but that they are most needed.

O'Connell said the labor department will try to put into action suggestions that it supply job information directly to local and state educators. It may use television to reach parents and comic strips to inform the youngsters.

Both officials stressed the need for developing skills in every field and maintaining them.

What Will First Spaceman Find on Moon?



With all the talk going around about man reaching the moon, the question is: What will be found when he gets there? Scientists, who have studied the moon over a distance of 240,000 miles for centuries, describe it as a rugged, dusty, lifeless globe. It has none of the earth's life-giving qualities, not even air. In man's earliest observations, light and dark areas were detected. Dark areas were believed to be water. These areas were given the name "maria," or seas. Later investigation revealed them to be dry plains. None of the maria are of tremendous size. Light areas on the moon are mountain ranges. Among the most impressive sights, easily discernible through even low-powered telescopes, are the craters. Scientists are not in agreement as to what caused them. Some believe they are the result of impact of meteors; others believe they were formed by volcanic activity in the centuries before the moon cooled. The moon is subject to extreme temperatures. The center of the light side, it reaches 214 degrees, about the boiling point of water. Away from the sun, it drops to 250 degrees below zero.

Idaho's Guard Reports Slashi In Enlistments

BOISE, Nov. 14 (AP)—Dramatic enrollment of enlistment of non-prior servicemen into the Idaho army national guard has been ordered as the result of budgetary limitations, Maj. Gen. John E. Walsh, Idaho adjutant general, announced yesterday.

Emphasis in the army guard recruitment program, he said, will be placed on the enlistment of men with previous service.

Idaho's quota of non-prior servicemen for the period between Jan. 1 and July 1, next year, will be 175, Walsh said. He added that enlistment of such men will be permitted only with the approval of the office of the state adjutant general.

Walsh said the national guard bureau in Washington, D.C., recently relaxed, however, its restriction on recruitment of high school seniors who had no previous service. Such seniors now may be signed up to meet the quota of entry into the six-month training program of up to one year from the date of enlistment without regard to the date of graduation from high school.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 14 (AP)—The Procrastinators Club of America, dedicated to doing-it-later, has finally got around to crowning its 1956 queen.

Strong said 14 cases and three deaths have been reported this year. Eight of the cases, he said, occurred in the last three weeks. "Population-wise, 17 cases would be of epidemic proportions," Strong said.

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Sahara Areas Cause French New Troubles

By United Press

The vast Sahara region of north-west Africa is developing into a new hotbed of trouble for France.

Algerian rebels have "retained" their operations into the area and put a further strain on the French forces which have been fighting them for more than three years.

In the same time Morocco, which obtained its independence in 1955, has set up an "office for Saharan affairs" to emphasize its claim to a part of the territory.

In what seems certain to become, in time, an angry dispute is an area that contains immense resources in oil and other mineral products which France is starting to exploit in a big way.

Algeria is 500,000 square miles in area. Of this total, about 725,000 miles lie in the Saharan region, the so-called southern region.

In its attempt to end the Algerian revolt, France is willing to give that country a great measure of self-rule. But the offer extends only to northern Algeria, which contains only about 10,000 square miles.

If serious negotiations with the Algerian rebels ever become possible, France is prepared to offer Algeria a part of the riches of the southern territories. But it is evident that it will insist on keeping firm control over the area.

As for Morocco, that country has put in a claim to a big part of Mauritania, in French West Africa adjoining Algeria on the southwest.

France's establishment of an office for Saharan affairs is a rebuff to France's action last summer in setting up a new "ministry for the Sahara" which is to have control of the exploitation of oil and other resources.

Backs U.S.

MANILA, Nov. 14 (AP)—Dionisio Macapagal, 47, a senatorial favorite of the poor, said today he would keep strong and closer ties with the United States when he takes office as vice president.

Macapagal is a member of the opposition Liberal party but his statement endorsed the pro-American platform on which President Carlos P. Garcia of the Nationalist party won apparent reelection as president. It was the first time the top government posts have been split between two parties.

LONDON, Nov. 14 (AP)—Morocco Radio said today President Eisenhower called for a stepped-up question-argument program in his Oklahoma City speech.

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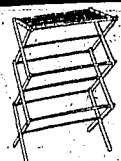

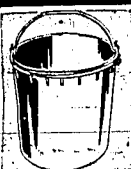

"I'd sure like to live in San Francisco, but I don't want to make an issue of it," said Mays. "I've never been through this kind of thing before and I'm not even mad about it now."

Mays now owns a home in Washington Heights in upper Manhattan. He said if he cannot buy here, he will keep the New York house and come out here only for the baseball season.

Mrs. Mays, who has a daughter by a previous marriage, appeared more resentful.

"Down in Alabama, where we come from, you know your place," she said. "But up here it's all a lot of rumpus. They grin in your face and then decide you."

Mayer Quince Christopher, who was kept informed of the negotiations, said it is not San Francisco's practice to prejudice anyone living where he wants to, regardless of his race.

"What's happened is not in accordance with San Francisco's traditions," he said.

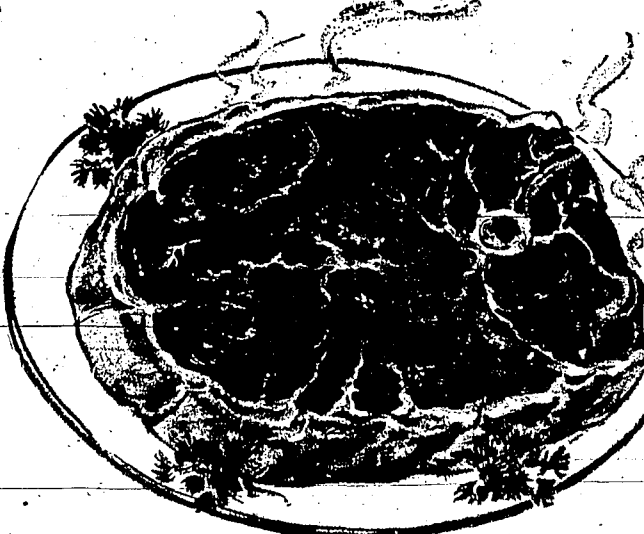

Many Citizens Of U. S. Want Trip to Space

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—The United States may not have any satellites aloft yet but it has plenty of volunteers ready to climb aboard them.

The Pentagon and naval research laboratories—hundreds of satellite Project Vanguard—said today they have received dozens of letters and phone calls for would-be space explorers.

Even Premier Nikita Khrushchev said in Moscow he has received a letter from two American girls who want to be space pioneers, even if they have to ride a red moon.

"We are young, healthy and beautiful with other good characteristics," Khrushchev said the girls wrote.

A Vanguard spokesman said a man calling himself "a crazy Irishman" telephoned every other day to offer his services as a space traveler.

"He says he wants to get up in a satellite so he can shoot down the Russian Sputnik," the spokesman said.

"I keep telling him the satellite is only 20 inches wide and he keeps insisting he is very small and he'll go on a diet."

A 13-year-old Georgia boy—apparently somewhat more hefty—wrote to the Pentagon he is ready to hop aboard a satellite if it is made larger.

"I'm very serious about going up and making studies of the heavens and earth," he said. "I will be excited to hear from you soon."

A South Carolina airman wrote simply to Secretary of Defense Neil H. McElroy: "I'd like to be the first man to embark on so great an adventure in outer space."

End of Tight Money Eyed For Builders

NEW YORK, Nov. 14 (AP)—Home office builders are watching closely today for the first sign of the tight money mortgage market.

Some feel sure it will come next year, making 1958 the time to build. Others are just as sure that long-term financing will be as tight and expensive two or three years from now as it is today.

Those who think tight money is due to ease soon cite a fall in supply of home mortgages this year because home building is off, and also count on an expected drop next year in demand for funds for business expansion. They argue these two things will make investment funds plentiful.

The doubling of home mortgages today simply because money is so tight and borrowing so expensive that fewer people can afford to build houses. They say that any drop in demand for new financing by business will be more than offset by rising demand for funds by state, local and federal governments.

They add that big lenders—insurance companies, large banks and investment firms—don't expect to have more money to lend next year than this.

A drop in interest rates on long-term borrowing such as mortgages for home and office building is called unlikely for some time, although short-term interest rates may ease as business lets up on its demand for funds. Builders report interest charges will tend to rise, especially for commercial buildings.

At the Dallas meeting last week of the Mortgage Bankers association of America there was much optimism to talk of a pickup in home building next year. But George W. Warrick, head of his national mortgage investment and real estate firm with headquarters here, says that beneath the surface there was much pessimism as to the amount of money that will be available to finance a revival in the home building trend.

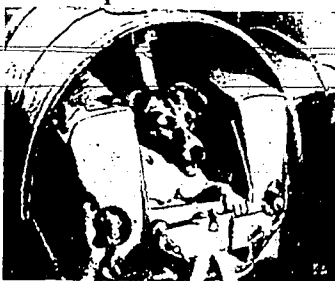

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Adlai Cautious In Aid to Ike's Foreign Policy

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—Adlai Stevenson today was cautious about helping the Eisenhower administration on foreign policy, as a man walking barefoot through a field of broken bottles.

Stevenson, a little like Hamlet sometimes in trying to make up his mind to do or not to do, issued a very carefully phrased statement on the help he'd give.

He stated his position only after the White House erroneously said he had turned down a suggestion that he would help.

But since Stevenson is a handy man with the English language, his phrasing is hardly accidental. Translated into very simple English, it sounds like: "I don't want to allow my neck out too far."

At the same time President Eisenhower, who wanted Stevenson's help, played just as cautious about asking him. In fact, he didn't ask him. He had Secretary of State Dulles do it.

This is an old story with the Eisenhower administration. The same kind of thing happened with former President Truman, whose relations with Eisenhower have been friendly since 1952.

Early this year Greece and Turkey, planning to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the help Truman started giving them in 1947, wanted him to visit both countries in March. Truman told the Eisenhower administration.

Eisenhower asked it over with Dulles. But it was Dulles, not Eisenhower, who sent the invitation to Truman. Truman rejected it, saying he had other engagements. Then the state department and both Eisenhower and Dulles rejected Truman's decision.

When Eisenhower goes to Paris next month to try to get American allies together, he'll be in a ticklish spot. He'll need as much American backing as he can get, from Democrats as well as Republicans.

Dulles asked Stevenson for help in working out a policy for Paris. Stevenson, although he lost two presidential campaigns, still is a familiar head of the Democratic party. But he can't speak for all Democrats, let alone all of the most important Democrats between elections. The Democrats in Congress, if they don't like the policy proposed at Paris, they'll be free to criticize.

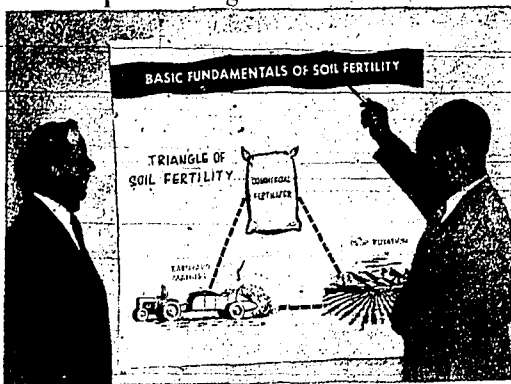
Washington helps make that policy, and the Democrats don't like it, he's in danger of being called a traitor by his own party. Inside his own party, Tuesday he made a statement, which said:

"I could not undertake to formulate the President's policies" but "I would gladly review and discuss our government's proposals before they were put in final shape."

This is hair-splitting. Since he'll be giving his views, he'll be helping to formulate Eisenhower's policies if Eisenhower buys what he says. He said further he'll back up publicly and politically, any policy he agrees with.

By that statement he left the door open to criticism any policy he doesn't agree with, although he didn't say so.

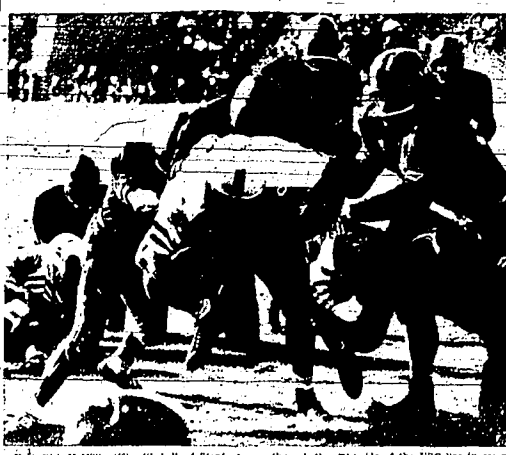

Two Juniors, Sophomore Become Individual Grid Offense Leaders

Two juniors and a sophomore took charge of a pair of football games in the East last Saturday in a way that left the NCAA statistics all shook up. As a result only one of the major college individual offense leaders retained the position he held a week ago.

Tom Greene, Holy Cross junior quarterback, engineered a 20-19 upset victory over Syracuse and pitched his way into first place in the tightest total offense competition in football history.

Lee Grosscup, Utah junior from San Monica, Calif., put on a spectacular passing show against Army and ended his week as a sophomore, matched it with flashy running and between the two they staged the greatest two-man, one-game show in five years.

But Grosscup's completion record suffered while he was gaining 215 yards on passes and Bob Newman of Washington State gained the individual passing lead. Newman had been total offense leader a week ago but dropped to third in the losing effort Tuesday by the NCAA Service bureau.

Only Colorado's Bob Stranaky retained his place as rushing leader and Anderson moved into a threatening position in that race.

Greene, who hails from Pikeville, Ky., passed for 270 yards and ran for minus three yards. Syracuse, he scored two touchdowns and kicked two vital extra points.

Greene's total yardage now is 1,150 yards, in which 1,074 has been gained by passing. He now has a 50.9 margin over the runner-up Stranaky, the biggest total offense margin any player has held this season, but only 182 yards ahead of Rice's King Hill in 10th place.

Trail the first time since the NCAA statistics set up shop 21 years ago that the top 10 have been blanketed within 200 yards this late in the season.

As a pair, Grosscup and Anderson netted 534 yards in their first three periods but Boston went ahead to score 35-2. In that year Tulsa's Don Morris and Detroit's Ted Marchibroda ran up a total of 726 yards in a 65-27 scoring game.

Greene's 270 yards per passing set a season record, but he lost 10 on the ground. Anderson ran for 215 yards, another season mark, and completed two passes for 14 yards.

Newman completed only six passes against UCLA last Saturday but they gave him a total of 73 and first place in the NCAA listing. Grosscup, whose 14 completions in 26 attempts against Army didn't match his previous season average of completing 72 percent of his passes, moved into 11th place.

Carl Berry of Montana is 5th in the passing race with 63 completions for 197 yards. He has scored six touchdowns.

The race for the passing lead, like that in total offense, is the closest on record for this stage of the season. Only 12 completions separate first and 11th place. Never before has the No. 10 man been within 20 completions of the leader so late in the season.

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Cuts of Pork Are Solutions For Shopper

Housewives searching the supermarket for a bargain this week-end are likely to find that pork is the solution to their problem.

Pork loin and pork butt are the cuts most frequently featured, with the former priced at 27 cents a pound for the loin end in the New York metropolitan area.

Pork, incidentally, is the second most popular of the red meats in the United States, according to department of agriculture figures. In 1950 pork comprised 14 per cent of the red meat output, compared with beef's 51 per cent. The total came to nearly 10 1/2 billion pounds.

Prices are declining seasonally now, which figures in pork's frequent selection as a special at this time. Beef, too, will be a No. 1 item in a good many stores.

Pork is more expensive this week in some areas, although both are featured elsewhere. Eggs, too, are higher, by 2 to 4 cents a pound. Vegetables on the outstanding list but this week are chile, escarole, cabbage, potatoes, and onions. Radishes in cellophane bags also are a prime bargain if you like an appetizer.

Cauliflower, though higher, is still rated a good buy by produce men. Broccoli is on the high side of a good buy, but other bargains can be found among fish, potatoes, eggplant, snap beans, topped carrots, capital celery, brussels sprouts and sweet potatoes. Spinach, too, is a good buy where it is available from nearby fields.

Tomatoes are higher this week, putting them in the moderate class. Lettuce, reportedly shows a wide range in quality and condition, but prices are a bit lower and the excellent shopper should be able to find a good head at a good price.

In the fruit department, it's still apples of just about every variety—macintosh, cortland, delicious, fuji and jonathan. Apples and grapes are showing variable condition, due to the season.

For the same reason, citrus fruit from Florida is growing more plentiful every week. Oranges, grapefruit and tangerines are coming to market in ever-increasing numbers. Peas are a good to moderate buy.

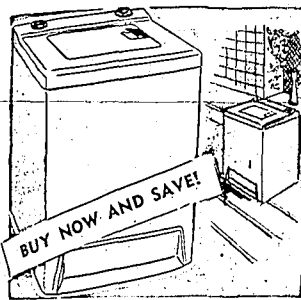

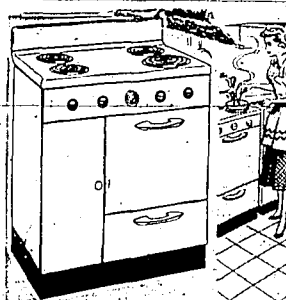

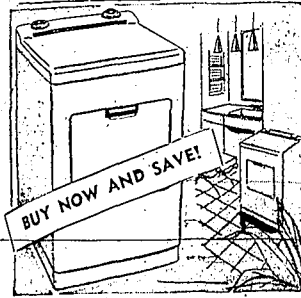

RALPH N. C. Nov. 14 (AP)—A number of the senate agriculture committee says Agriculture Secretary Ezra Benson will resign shortly after he returns from his world tour.

Sen. W. Kerr Scott, D. N. C. said that Benson had been convinced that he is a "definite detriment" to the Eisenhower administration and will quit in the "very near future."

"Gracious Heaven," Scott said, "this departure will be graceful. I am certain the President will agree to keep him in Washington, probably as a special assistant and adviser on world agricultural problems or some such thing."

"Instead of actually firing him, the President will probably promote him to a constructive position where he doesn't have to come into contact with the farm croakies," Scott said.

In the weekly "Washington Report," Scott said Benson became convinced he was a detriment to the administration "after he made his tour to various countries about his farm policies."

Unfavorable Reaction
The reaction was very unfavorable, both from farmers and from the general public," Scott said. He added that Benson also found a lack of congressional support, even from members of his own party, for his proposal for more flexibility in the price support program.

Scott said there were reports in Washington that high level Republicans have convinced President Eisenhower that it will be impossible for the OOP to sell Benson's policies in the 1958 congressional elections.

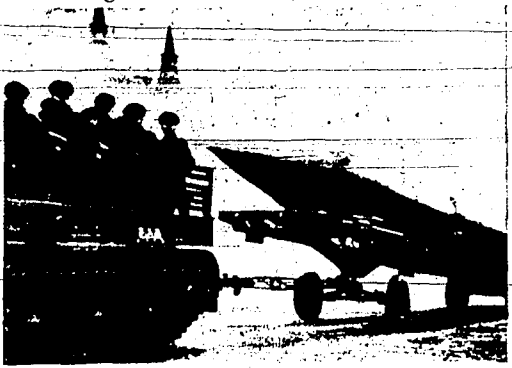

State Attorney General Rules On Meat Laws

BOISE, Nov. 14 (UP)—It's the consumption of meat, rather than the sale of it, that makes the difference in application of Idaho meat inspection laws, Attorney General Charles H. Smith said today.

Under that theory, meat inspection laws are designed to protect slaughterhouse owners to process meat for Idaho farmers without inspection by state inspectors.

Smith also told Minidoka county prosecuting attorney Charles H. Crayton that a slaughterhouse operator or farmer who attempted to carry uninspected meat over Idaho highways would be in violation of state law.

"The state department of agriculture is responsible for regulating slaughterhouses or preparation of meat products for human consumption," said Smith.

Smith said a farmer or animal owner may slaughter an animal for consumption by his immediate family, but the work must be done on his own premises.

An inspection is required before the meat is distributed for anyone else's consumption, Smith wrote in reply to a question raised by Crayton.

Khrushchev Is Ahead in Post-Stalin Longevity on Red Leadership Chart

The case of former Soviet Defense Minister Georgi Zhukov may have centered about the last important obstacle in the way of communist party boss Nikita Khrushchev's march to one-man rule.

Khrushchev has been moving closer to that position ever since the death of Josef Stalin, the old dictator, in March, 1953. One by one potential rivals have been ousted, demoted, exiled, and even executed. Five of the most powerful posts in the Soviet government once were those of communist party secretary, premier, secret police chief, foreign minister and defense minister.

Stalin was party boss and premier at the time of his death. He also controlled the secret police through Lavrenti Beria. Andrei Vishinsky and Nikolai Bulganin were foreign and defense ministers respectively.

When the confusion brought about by the passing of the dictator cleared, only Bulganin and Beria remained.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (UP)—The justice department is studying a compromise proposal by General Motors corporation to refund the government \$2,700,000 in excess profits and alleged overcharges on P-84-F jet fighter planes.

The offer was disclosed in New Orleans by Rep. F. Edward Hebert, D. La., and confirmed by the general accounting office (GAO) which acts as a fiscal watchdog for Congress.

Hebert, chairman of a house armed services subcommittee which investigated the plane contract, said a GAO audit showed that GAO made \$1,450,000 in excess profits on a contract for 599 P-84-F fighters built at its Kansas City plant.

He said the big auto firm had insisted up to now that "it was not obligated morally, legally, contractually or as a matter of principle to return any of the disputed profits to the government."

The GAO said the settlement proposal was made by John F. Gordon, a General Motors vice president, in May, Gen. William T. Thurman, air force deputy procurement director at air materiel command headquarters at Dayton, O.

The alleged overcharges occurred while General Motors was negotiating contracts with the air force for 200 planes turned out in the period between 1952 and 1953.

Europe's Smaller Nations Are Asking NATO Policy Revision

By United Press
The smaller countries of Western Europe are demanding a radical revision of NATO policy. They feel that the United States is concentrating too much on the possibility of a Soviet attack.

There seems no doubt that this report will play an important part in the big meeting of the heads of government of NATO countries, including President Eisenhower, which is to meet in Paris Dec. 16. Briefly, the complaint of the smaller states is that the United States, especially, is too aptly-minded.

"The structure of the NATO ground forces... is undergoing a steady disintegration," the report said.
"The Soviet military threat is still primarily the menace of ground forces applied by airforce. That is a nightmare for those people who are not separated from the Red armies by an ocean or at least by the channel—Britain's English channel." The report demands that NATO maintain a minimum of 30 divisions, equipped with tactical atomic weapons, and covered by adequate air forces.

The smaller countries have good reason for their fears. Of the 15 NATO countries, Norway, Denmark, The Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg, France, Italy and Greece were overrun by the German armies in World War II.
