# U.S. Scientist Discounts Red Claim Of New, Decisive Missiles for War

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—A Soviet scientist claims today that the Soviet Union has developed a new, decisive missile for war. The scientist, who is a member of the Soviet Academy of Sciences, said that the missile is capable of destroying enemy targets at distances of up to 10,000 miles.

Another scientist, Marshal S. S. Korolev, said that the missile is capable of destroying enemy targets at distances of up to 10,000 miles.

Dr. Fred Singer, a University of Maryland astrophysicist, said today that the launching of two Russian Sputniks demonstrated positively only one of four requirements for an effective intercontinental ballistic missile.

The four requirements, he said, are propulsion, accuracy, guidance and a means for protecting the missile against destruction by atmospheric friction when it heads back toward earth from space.

"If we just look at the Sputniks," Dr. Singer said, "we can certainly see that they have the propulsion. They claim all four, but Sputnik shows us only one."

A spokesman for the Martin Company said in Baltimore the creation of a new division was not indicative of any dissatisfaction among company officials with progress so far in its satellite-missile work.

A formal company announcement said the new organization will concentrate on the development of a new type of missile, the American missile test center, Martin activities there include test work on the air force Matador tactical missile and matters connected with the air force's Titan ICBM. So far, there have been no known successful tests of an American ICBM.

## Despite Talk; U. S. Lost Big Propaganda Tilt, Says Writer

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (U-P)—You're getting self-conscious. We've been busting our buttons—talking and performing—to show how strong we are ever since Russia fired the Sputniks.

But we didn't have the right muscles at the right time. The Russians won a propaganda victory.

"Allies and neutrals were left with visions of Russian missiles and hydrogen warheads dropping in their 'backyards'."

Something had to be done to reassure friends, warn foes. A whole batch of statements and "portentous" announcements followed, none as spectacular as Sputnik.

Last Wednesday Gen. Curtis LeMay, vice chief of staff of the Air Force, explained a jet tanker non-stop from Massachusetts to Argentina without refueling, a record of over 8,000 miles. After a rest, he flew back to Washington, also non-stop.

Last Sunday three jet bombers flew 8,000 miles from California to the Philippines, non-stop but with refueling.

Over the week-end six B-52 bombers flew non-stop from Florida to Argentina and—without landing but with refueling—flew back to Seattle, New York.

Meanwhile, the defense department announced the navy was being equipped with atomic depth bombs, said it had shot off various kinds of missiles, and told of breaking an altitude record with a rocket.

All this illustrated President Eisenhower's talk to the nation two weeks ago, a talk in which he said he would give the "rough" with the "smooth." There was more of the smooth than the rough.

# Ike Asked for Costly Shelter Project in U.S.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9 (AP)—The federal civil defense administration has recommended to President Eisenhower a \$4 billion dollar program for construction of underground shelters which could also be used for schools, hospitals, barracks and housing used in with national disaster.

The shelters would be for two types of protection: Against radiation fallout and against blast in areas target areas. The emphasis would be protection against fallout.

This represents a major shift in federal civil defense thinking. Heretofore the emphasis was on evacuation from target areas. The new plan was approved in the annual fall conference of the National Association of State and Territorial Defense Directors which winds up today.

Officials said the new approach to civil defense was evolved because of the successful satellite launchings. But some state defense directors indicated they thought the federal plan was too costly and that the primary civil defense need.

The shelter program is only part of the new concept. Other aspects of the new thinking include: use of government in emergency; just educational program to teach people how to save themselves from attack.

Federal planners were reluctant to put about the proposed new shelter program before a detailed plan is presented to congress.

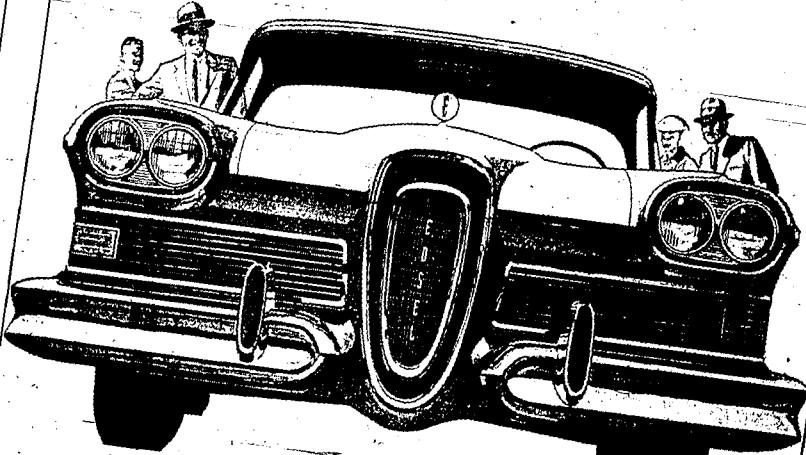

# Arguments on Dam Proposal Slated Nov. 26

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—Formal arguments next week may be the last step on a long road toward a federal power commission decision on a controversial proposed dam project in the Snake river valley between Idaho and Oregon.

The PFC has scheduled arguments Nov. 26 for and against an examiner's recommendation that Pacific Northwest Power company be given a license to build dams at Pleasant valley and Mountain Shire.

High Dam said More Productive

Argument against the examiner's initial decision will be by lawyers for the PFC legal and engineering staff, the state of Oregon, and public power groups. The PFC staff and public power groups contend a high federal dam at New River would produce more power and other benefits than proposed private power company project.

Oregon is asking the PFC to withhold action until Jan. 31, 1952, when the state's water resources board is to complete a study of dam building possibilities along the Snake River.

**PNP Support**

The recommendation that a license be issued will, of course, be supported by PNP, which was formed by Montana Power, Pacific Power and Light, Portland General Electric, and Washington Water Power.

Argument also may touch on:

(1) A request by six Democratic members to Congress that the PFC wait for investigations by the army engineers and reclamation bureau, and (2) the proposed construction of a high Pleasant valley dam which would flood PNP's Pleasant valley area as well as Idaho Power company's Pleasant valley dam site.

**Ask Further Study**

The Democrats asked further study of all alternative project possibilities.

Secretary of the Interior Fred Beeson has expressed with the PFC consider a high Pleasant valley dam. He has advised the PFC that a preliminary investigation of such a project has been made.

Congress refused to put up the money for further study during the year which began July 1, so the investigation may not be completed until late in 1952.

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## All Is Calm on Racial Front in Once-Turbulent Southern City

CLINTON, Tenn., Nov. 19 (AP)—What's the atmosphere here today in the great struggle over desegregating the schools?

Most important, how did the people and the students react to the news of violence around another high school—the one in Little Rock?

Booster or later, everybody you talk with in Clinton today uses the word "quiet." There have been a few flurries. But overall, they say, "quiet."

Six Negro children, four boys and two girls, are attending classes in the high school today.

They enrolled Sept. 2. That was the day when Gov. Orval Faubus ordered national guardsmen to keep Negroes out of Central high school in Little Rock.

The Clinton six go to school without escort. No police action has been necessary to protect them in and out of its halls.

The two boys have not attempted to sign up for football or any competitive sports. But all six children are "in physical education" classes with white students.

Most of them go home for lunch. One or two, however, eat in the school cafeteria.

None has attended any of the school's social functions.

"They're not forbidden," says W. D. Human, the high school principal. "They just didn't come. I suppose it's a matter of choice with them. Just like the choices of people in other social matters."

This latter is an important point. In the South, to a far greater extent than in the North, the school is an active center of social activity for both children and their parents. Segregationists usually argue that desegregation will mean that Negroes will attend these functions in the schools, "damaging their value."

Human came to Clinton last August after the "Clinton trial" and after the previous principal resigned. He is 52, soft spoken, with an air of quiet firmness. The Negroes came to school.

"There were some small incidents," Human says. "But the situation was so much better than I anticipated that—well, you wouldn't even call them incidents if they had involved the school."

# Soviet Leader Asserts Reds' 'Superiority'

MOSCOW, Nov. 12 (AP)—Nikita Khrushchev today claimed that the Soviet Union has an absolute superiority over the United States in the field of atomic energy.

In the event of another war, he said it would be fought on the American continent, but "we too would suffer immensely."

In an exclusive two and one-half hour interview with the United Press, the Soviet party chief expounded freely on world problems as he saw them and made three major points.

—Prospects for preserving world peace "aren't bad" but the possibility cannot be excluded that World War III might be started by some lunatic.

—There probably won't be any summit meeting with the West in the near future, "because" it is not in the "only way out" of the East-West impasse.

—There could be possible for Russia and the United States alone to settle major problems in bi-lateral negotiations. "If we're to agree, however, international tensions other countries won't be offended."

—Said the Soviet Union alone possesses an intercontinental ballistic missile.

Said the first rocket launched by the Soviet Union "hit the bullseye" and Russia could now use rockets to "disrupt" the West in Europe, Asia and Africa.

—If the American doubts Soviet claims in rocketry, "let's have a peaceful rocket contest just like a rifle shooting match and they'll see for themselves."

—Said that a third world war would not necessarily mean the end of mankind but that it would mean the death of capitalism and the triumph of communism.

The emergence of another Stalin and the development of a new cult personality in the Soviet Union is now impossible, "because" Khrushchev said.

Defense Chief Marshal Georgi Zhukov was removed by the president and the central committee, not by the general. He was "very rude and disrespectful" but "no Stalin or even half a Stalin."

Khrushchev, in the first interview he has ever given to a Western newspaper correspondent, claimed that the Soviet Union now enjoys "absolute rocket superiority."

He said that if attacked, the Russians could wipe out all bases on the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and deliver a mortal blow on continental United States.

However, he said, "the prospects for peace aren't bad" due to a recent change in the balance of power in favor of the communist and neutral countries and the rising clamor for peace among the European people as well as the American people who do not want war.

But he said the possibility of war could not be excluded. He said it might be started by some "lunatic" who should be put into a straitjacket.

In such a case, he said, it would be the "final agony imposed by capitalism on humanity" and would mark the end of capitalism and universal triumph of communism.

"But we too would suffer immensely," he said.

## German Minister Sets Trip to U. S.

BONN, Germany, Nov. 12 (AP)—West German Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano will fly to Washington for talks on NATO policy with John Foster Dulles Friday, it was announced today.

Von Brentano's visit will follow closely the U. S. secretary of state's conference with French Foreign Minister Christian Pineau.

The foreign office said Von Brentano requested the meeting and Dulles suggested the date.

He will fly to the United States from Rome where he is with German President Theodor Heuss on a state visit.
