AGANA, Guam, Nov. 21 (AP)—The U.S. Navy today announced a search for a Japanese fishing vessel missing for three days with 11 persons aboard after being hit by a typhoon.

The Taichuan, Maru No. 2, was caught in fierce winds to typhoon "Lola" Monday and radioed she was in danger 35 miles southwest of Guam.

The U.S. air force located "Lola" at night 500 miles east south-southwest of Tokyo Sunday.

The vessel, "Mame," was now 600 miles west of Tokyo.

Pointing generally from the east, the U.S. Navy said it was possible the vessel was headed for the Philippines.

Thomas H. Walker, commander here, said the vessel was not to exhibit there with the museum's collection of Japanese fishing boats. "It is one of the few boats of this type, in the world," he said.

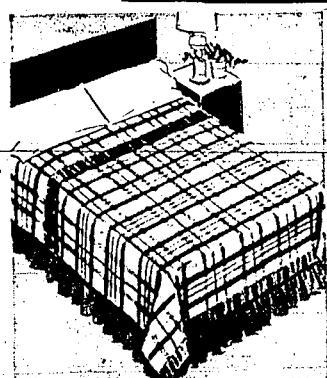

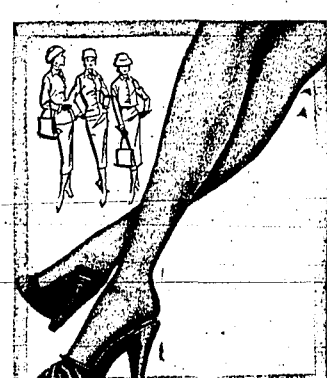

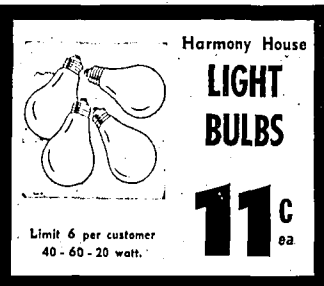

## Surplus Wool Disposal Bids Get Rejection

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21—A demand that the commodity credit corporation dispose of the rest of the wool in government stockpile was rebuffed by USDA officials this week.

The action came at a meeting here of some 100 members of the National Wool Marketing corporation, a group, with a total membership of \$1500 sheep producers, asked that the original support program for wool be limited to 150 million pounds of wool a year, with the balance of the stockpile to be sold in a lump sum.

USDA officials will quit dumping tag wool on the market, the government wool price would go up from 12 1/2 to 13 1/2.

However, Charles Miller, acting administrator of the CCC told the group, "definitely no. This means USDA will continue to maintain its support price 62 cents a pound, and it now has to pay."

If CCC released the remaining wool in stockpile, the price, already in a slump, would break further, and, apparently, USDA is unwilling to pick up the difference.

## Farm, Veteran Fund Slashes Are Predicted

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (AP)—The nation's budget chief has pointed the economy knife at farm subsidies, veterans benefits and housing to obtain more defense money, according to a budget director, the first administration official to name specific non-defense programs which President Eisenhower said will have to be cut back to finance the expanded space age military contest with Russia.

Brundage gave the three as examples of federal "benefit" programs which would have to be reduced. He said all the programs account for 17 billion dollars, or 22 percent, of the current budget.

Brundage discussed control of federal spending in a speech last night to the Washington chapter of the National Association of Accountants. Control over spending could be strengthened, he said, if Congress would authorize the President to veto selected items in appropriations bills. Under present practice the President must sign or veto an entire money bill.

Brundage reiterated his endorsement of a proposal to make spending authority lapse on funds that are unspent at the end of a fiscal year. This is part of a recommendation by the Hoover commission under which Congress moved to vote money only for goods and services that would be received in the fiscal year.

This so-called "accrued expenditure" system, Brundage said, would give the law makers more control over the scope of agency programs and of the budget "in terms of surplus or deficit."

Governments departments are now permitted to carry over appropriations and spend them after the fiscal year for which Congress voted them.

## Montana Reports Nine Flu Deaths

HELENA, Mont., Nov. 21 (AP)—The Montana board of health disclosed yesterday that nine persons had died of influenza in the past two months. Flu was listed as the contributing cause of three other deaths.

But Dr. O. D. Carlyle Thompson, executive director of the health board, said, "We can't say that Asian flu was present in any of the cases."

Eight of the victims died during October and the other in September, Thompson said. Of the nine, seven were past the age of 60.

## Spain Brings Forces Near Trouble Spot

MADRID, Spain, Nov. 21 (AP)—Spain has moved troop reinforcements to strategic points within easy striking range of the North African enclave of Sidi Ifni, it was reported today.

Spain and Morocco have been negotiating through diplomatic channels for months to reach a settlement on the 37-mile long by 15-mile wide strip of territory in independent Morocco.

Sidi Ifni was ceded to Spain in 1860. The Moroccan government now wants it returned. Spain is reluctant to make a quick handover.

Reports coming out of Sidi Ifni said impatient Moroccan nationalists had been stirring up trouble and that there had been several clashes with the small Spanish garrison which maintains order in the enclave.

"The Spanish foreign office refused to comment on the reports of difficulties in Sidi Ifni. A spokesman said 'we have nothing to say.'"

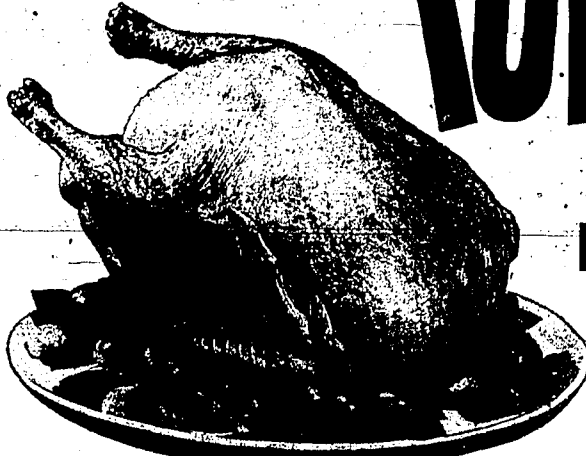

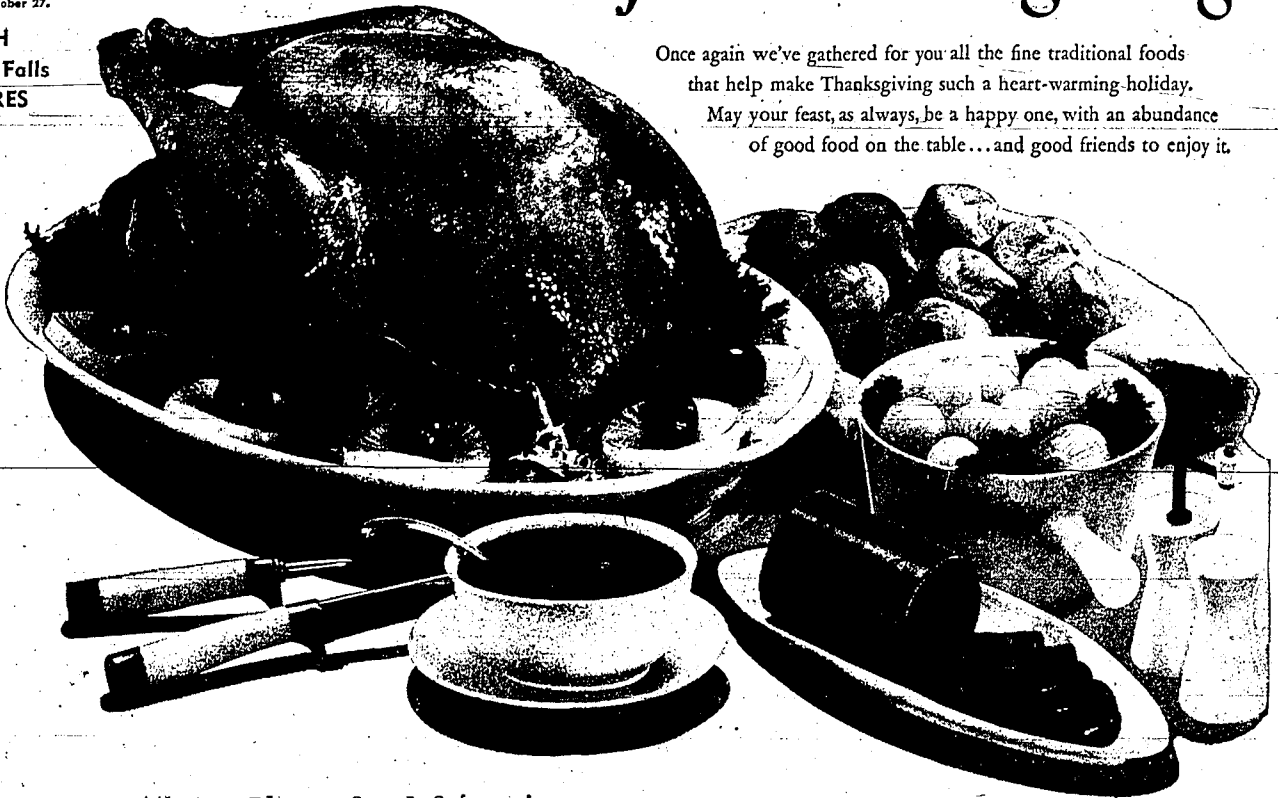

Helium Hikes Scheduled on Defense Plan

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (U-P)—The government is planning a major expansion of its helium production capacity to meet expanding needs in the missiles and other defense programs, it was learned yesterday.

High-level planning also was required under way to develop a comprehensive, long-range program to insure future extraction of as much helium from natural gas as possible for use in defense.

These developments were reported by senior department officials who also said that recently printed copies of the Russian dog-eared book, "The Helium Problem," contained a chapter on the Soviet Union's plan to produce helium in some quantity.

The bureau of mines operates this government's four helium plants at Amarillo, Texas; Shiprock, N. M.; and Oils, Kansas. These produce virtually all the helium available to the free world.

The missiles program is a major user of helium. The inert, non-explosive gas is also used in atomic energy work, in titanium and zirconium production, in electronics and in testing of refrigeration and air conditioning systems.

The interior department reported it plans to ask congress next year for about 14 million dollars for a new helium production plant.

This contemplated plant which would make possible production of about 240 million more cubic feet of helium annually.

Current production is at a rate of about 363 million cubic feet a year, with plants operating at top capacity.

Demand is expected to total 363 million cubic feet in the year ending next June 30, and to increase in the following year.

The proposed new plant would be sited at some point where it could extract some of the estimated three billion cubic feet of helium that is annually being wasted in gas sold from fields in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas for use as fuel.

For security purposes, the new plant would not be located in close proximity to the existing plants.

## U. S. to Open Alaska Tract In Mine Plan

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Secretary of Interior Fred A. Seaton announced yesterday the first steps toward opening 20 million acres of public lands in northern Alaska to mineral leasing and mining claims.

Another nine million acres in southwest Alaska, he said, have been set aside temporarily for future re-establishment of the national largest wildlife refuge.

The secretary made the announcements at a news conference following a series of meetings with Gov. Mike Sullivan of Alaska. The governor, a Republican, is a vocal opponent of the territory to either proposal.

Seaton said the proposed withdrawal for mineral and mining claims will not affect the 23-million-acre national preserve reserve No. 4.

A 1943 public land order withdrew more than 40 million acres in northern Alaska, including the navy oil reserve, from all forms of entry under the public land laws, including mineral leasing and mining entry. The lands to be opened under the new order would be outside the navy reserve.

The secretary said a notice of intention to modify the law was signed today after the "hot" issue, "concern" that it does not appear the more the interior department's ecological survey, he added, advised that a two-mile "buffer" zone—twice the width required—will be maintained around the reserve.

# Algerian Rebel Army Is Well-Trained, Hard-Fighting Force, Newsman Finds

(Editor's note: For six weeks, a reporter from the Times-News, Twin Falls, Idaho, has been in the Algerian rebel army. He has seen the rebels in action and has seen a first hand how the army is organized and how it fights.)

WITH THE REBEL ARMY IN ALGERIA, Nov. 21—France is not fighting a phantom army here.

The Algerian "rebel" army is a well-trained, tightly-organized, well-equipped and dedicated force. I spent five weeks with the army. I can report this army is determined to turn North Africa into another Indo-China if France does not meet its demands for total independence.

I lived with Algerian soldiers in several of their ever-moving bases, ate and slept with them in their training camps and rode with them on long, bone-bruising camel patrols.

Unlike musical comedy shirks, these men were no flowing, flamboyant, in fact, curious the against regulations. Their uniforms are American-type olive drab, their headgear is the type of the wide-brimmed "Anzac" hat worn by Australian and New Zealand troops in World War II.

They are clean shaven except for flowing mustaches, a sign of virility. A few have permission to wear beards, but the slacker who hasn't and doesn't shave is punished. He must kneel for two hours, hands behind his back, nose pressed hard against a wall.

These soldiers, who form the national Algerian liberation front

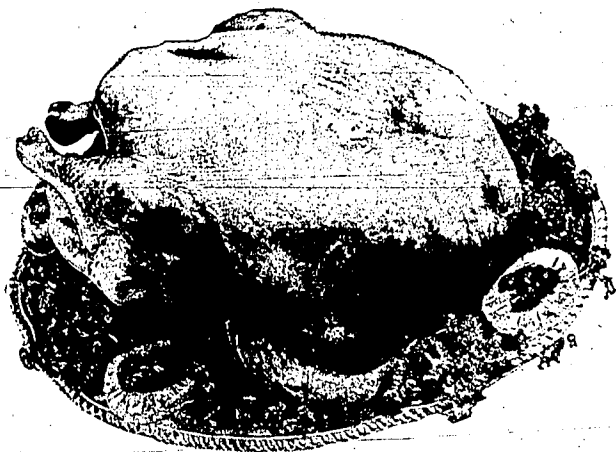
