

President Showing Improvement After Light Type Stroke

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—President Eisenhower eased back into the duties of his office today, less than 18 hours after he had a slight stroke. The President conferred for 15 minutes with the cabinet, and then met with the chief presidential aides, Sherman Adams, and the White House said they talked about "everything under the sun." Earlier Eisenhower spent a half hour with White House staff secretary Andrew J. Goodpastor, signing a dozen documents and initiating another.

Eisenhower's doctors announced that the President had 10 hours of almost continuous sleep during the night and showed no adverse effects, although he is eating a normal breakfast.

Auburn, headed by its board of coaches, put Auburn in third rank of the week. It was only part of the story that Christy scored all his team's points in a 20-6 victory over South Carolina, including a winning field goal on the final play. The first was the 100-point spurge from Christy, 19, set a new record for a single game. He made one out of three touchdowns, all on short punts. He made one out of three seconds to go in the first half, the second on a 10-yard run. He gained 70 yards by rushing and returned a punt 50 yards.

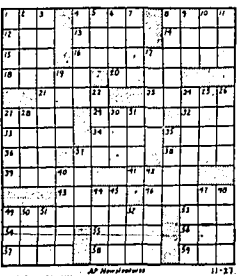

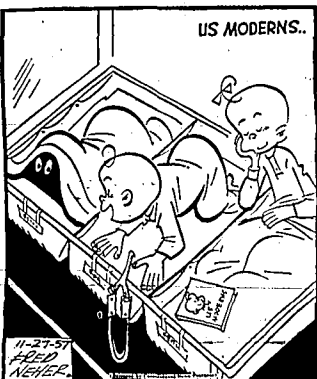

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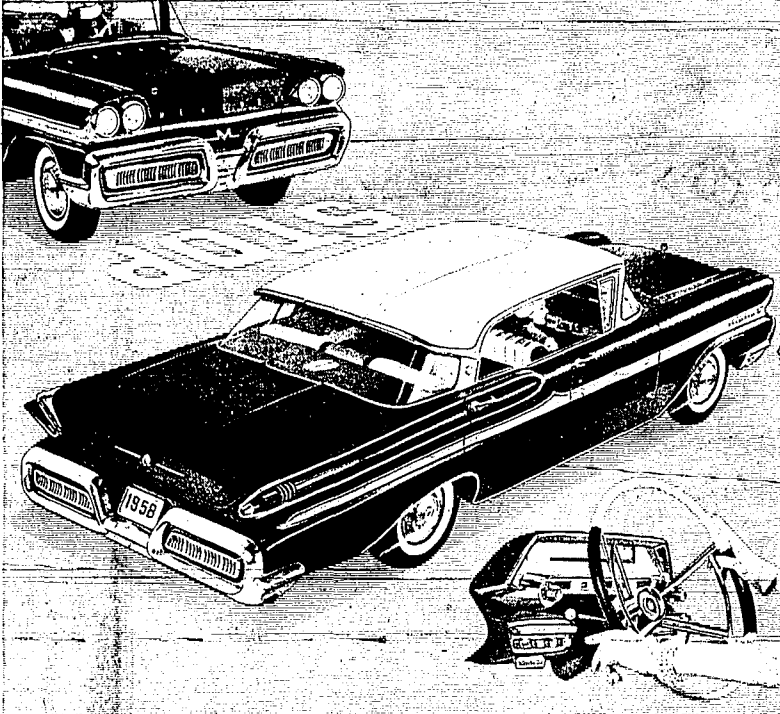
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
