Senators Jarred By Report Reds Could Raze N.Y. On Thor, Jupiter Missiles

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (UPI)—Senate investigators have heard that Russia could wipe out much or all of a seaboard city like New York with a missile fired from a submarine 500 miles at sea, it was reported today. According to one informant, this was one of the pieces of secret central intelligence agency testimony which jarred members of the senate preparedness subcommittee investigating U. S. missile and satellite development. The subcommittee completed three days of hearings shortly before midnight last night and recessed until Dec. 13.

Staff members will evaluate this week's testimony in the interim and interview prospective future witnesses.

One source said the subcommittee now believes it has a "good overall picture" of the country's position in the scientific-military race with Russia. The next round of hearings will be designed to get down to details of what the individual services are doing and procedures for weapons production.

The committee will ultimately embody its findings and recommendations in a formal report.

Much of the CIA testimony Tuesday and yesterday dealt with Soviet development of an intermediate range ballistic missile (IRBM) with which Russia could hit western Europe or, from submarines, America's cities on or near the coast.

One member who heard the CIA testimony said it was a "relatively short time."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (UPI)—Production of intermediate range ballistic missiles (IRBM) which eventually will ring Russia can begin to pick up steam almost immediately, authorities said today. Defense Secretary Neil H. McElroy pulled the stops yesterday when he informed congress he had told both the army and the air force to put their 1,500-mile range missiles into production. The missiles are the air force Thor and army Jupiter. In ordering the more McElroy revealed his own concern to select only one of the two weapons which are designed for identical purposes. Some defense department experts were quick to view the McElroy move as a possible answer to critics who contend inter-service rivalry has been damaging.

Within the short span of just two years, under heavy army, air force and industrial competition, the "United States now has two IRBMs judged sufficient to be ordered into production."

Many authorities doubt the IRBM program could have been that far advanced without the stimulus of competition.

On the heels of McElroy's disclosure to the senate preparedness subcommittee the air force announced its Thor is "already in production" and had been "for some time." The Thor was understood to be coming from a Douglas Aircraft company assembly line at a rate of two a month. The rate probably can be increased by five times to 10 a month very quickly and reach two of three dozen a month in a year's time.

The army said it expects to put its Jupiter into production in a Chrysler corporation plant in a relatively short time.

Nixon Substituting For Ike at Summit Conclave of NATO

PARIS, Nov. 28 (UPI)—The NATO allies agreed unanimously today to press on with next month's summit conference. Vice President Richard M. Nixon will stand in for President Eisenhower at the Dec. 16-18 session called to marshal the western resources against Soviet scientific gains, unless doctors tell the President he can go. It would be the first time the 44-year-old Nixon has taken part in the highest councils of the western alliance.

The decision to proceed with the summit talks despite the President's illness was announced here after a two-hour conference of the NATO permanent council of ambassadors headed by Secretary General Paul-Henri Spaak.

The NATO permanent council expressed serious concern that Eisenhower might not attend the conference but unanimously welcomed Nixon to the unprecedented gathering of the 16 chiefs of state. The council published this communiqué:

"The council, having learned with regret that President Eisenhower might be prevented from attending the meeting of the North Atlantic Council in December, decided that the meeting should take place at the level originally planned."

It learned with satisfaction that Vice President Nixon would be attending the Dec. 16 delegation.

The council expressed its best wishes for President Eisenhower's speedy recovery."

The delegates already had agreed that the Dec. 16 meeting was too important to be postponed or to be cancelled.

House to Revive Shelter Program

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (UPI)—A house government operations subcommittee today revived plans for a million-dollar atomic shelter program. The plans were buried in the congressional economy drive last spring.

The subcommittee, headed by Rep. C. W. Hollifield, D., Calif., disclosed it will try to revive the program in the light of Russia's spectacular successes in the missile and satellite field. It scheduled hearings for early next year.

The subcommittee advised top military, atomic and civil defense officials to be ready to testify in late January or early February on the feasibility of creating a new cabinet-level department of civil defense and make shelter construction one of its major tasks.

The National Safety Council, although it gave no estimate of how many projects would lose their lives over the holiday week-end, pointed out that a non-holiday day-out of the four-day week-end, for example, would result in a loss of 100,000 lives.

Normally, the council's safety experts said, about 40 million motor vehicles would be on the roads on Thursday. They predicted the figure might be as high as 60 million on Thanksgiving, as truckers, were taking a day of rest with their families.



Winnie to Be 83 Years Old On Saturday

LONDON, Nov. 28 (AP)—Sir Winston Churchill celebrates his 83rd birthday anniversary Saturday—a birthday he has spent working against the tide of time.

The last survivor of the great allied leaders of World War II, Churchill is hurrying to complete his monumental "History of the English Speaking Peoples," begun in 1920.

The third volume was published this year. A fourth and—as far as is known—final volume is scheduled for publication in 1958.

But time is the great uncertain factor.

Friends say Churchill's towering mental powers and mastery of the English language remain as vigorous as ever.

But physically he has declined noticeably in recent months.

His once robust figure is sunken and bent, his step is that of a very old man and he walks painfully with the aid of a stick or supported on Lady Churchill's arm.

At the urging of his wife and others he is doing everything to sustain the remnants of his strength.

Much of this year Churchill has spent on the French Riviera to escape the raw dampness of England which has plagued him with chills and bronchial trouble. He spent two months at Roquebrune last January and another three weeks there in May. In September he spent several more weeks at the Cap d'Ant home of his old friend Lord Beaverbrook. He expects to leave for the French Riviera again soon.

During his visits there he divides his time between painting and working on the "History of the English Speaking Peoples."

His visits to London are rare. When in England he generally stays at Chartwell, his beautiful country home about 20 miles southeast of London.

Friends said the old man will spend his birthday anniversary quietly at Chartwell with members of his family.

Those victories reflected 50-odd athletes' esteem for an embattled coach who they could easily have quit four weeks ago.

Shortly after Mather's Oct. 31 resignation, there was widespread speculation on how the team would fare. Some observers predicted certain defeat in the remaining games. However, the Kansas team won four contests, three of them against excellent opposition. Two victories came with less than a minute to play. Combined, they gave Kansas its eighth Big Eight conference finish in a decade, second only to Oklahoma. They also won a national title in the minds of those who had been most opposed to Mather.





Director Still Is Sought by Health Board

WALLACE, Nov. 28 (UP)—The state board of health is merely trying to administer the state health department until the "properly qualified man" can be found for state health director, Dr. Paul Ellis of Wallace announced.

Ellis is chairman of the five-member board which met Tuesday and requested an attorney general's opinion on whether it really could carry out a administrative duties.

The position of state health director is the last key post to be filled under an act of the 1937 legislature which organized the board and the department's top leadership.

Due to failure to appoint a state health director drew from Leslie McCarthy, Lewiston, president of the Idaho Public Health Association, the statement that the post needed to be filled to correct what he termed a "lack of decision and responsibility" in the department.

McCarthy said the health program needed "one-man planning." Ellis told newsmen yesterday that board members and department personnel are agreed on the matter of an administrator.

He said the board has not found "the person it wants for the job of administrator," whose qualifications probably would place him in a top salary bracket.

State Rep. H. Orent Gardner, R., Paretto, who earlier endorsed the board's attempt to find out if it could act as administrator, refused his position when contacted at his home in Pruitland.

Gardner pointed out that the law had given the board strong administrative powers.

"It is an administrative board, not a policy board," Gardner said. "Then to hire an administrator to work under an administrative board seems to me to be groundless for a possible repetition of trouble."

Ellis had said the legislature had not appropriated money specifically to pay a new health director's salary.

Gardner commented "Certainly I'm in agreement that I wouldn't want to rob such programs as the crippled children's services just to get an administrator. As a lay person, watching from the sidelines, I can understand why this board is approaching the situation cautiously."

The next meeting will be at the home of Mrs. Austin Walker, Declo.

To Give Thanks—An Ancient Human Urge

The Bible contains many references to the Hebrew harvest festival, called the Feast of the Tabernacles. Each year, for seven days, the Israelites celebrated their harvest. They lived in booths or tents made of olive or palm branches in memory of the years spent wandering in search of the Promised Land.



Demeter was the Greek goddess of the fruitful soil and of agriculture. In September a festival was held, and if one of the Greeks' many wars was in progress, a general truce was called. Celebrants marched in procession wearing garlands and carrying sheaves of grain.




Demeter was known as Ceres to the Romans. (Hence our word "cereal.") Their festival, called the Cerialia, featured games, music, and dancing, sports and a feast at which sacrifices were offered to the goddess.



In eastern Europe in the Middle Ages, the reaper who cut the last sheaf of grain was hailed on the Corn Mother. Dressed in a costume made of sheaves of grain, he was carried through the village in a wheelbarrow attended by laughing, merry crowds. Even today in some parts of Europe, a half-pagan belief in the Corn Mother, or Earth Mother, persists among peasants.



In England the last load of grain brought home has always had special significance. Harvesters sang and made merry on the way from the field with the beribboned and flower-decked cart. After the last load was safely stored in the barn, Harvest Home supper was held. Undoubtedly the Pilgrims carried memories of former Harvest Home celebrations with them to the New World, although they would have frowned grimly at the intimation of any connection between such a "pagan" festival and their Thanksgiving Day after the first harvest in 1621.



Their next Thanksgiving, held two years later, on July 30, 1623, is considered by many to be the first real Thanksgiving since it was the first day that was formally set aside by the governor as a day of prayer. It was not a harvest festival, but a time of public thankfulness for the end of a long drought and the arrival of the Anne bearing friends who were left behind when the Mayflower sailed.

Doctor Avers White Plague Is Dangerous

PORTLAND, Ill., Nov. 28 (AP)—A doctor who has spent much of his professional life fighting tuberculosis says the once-dreaded "white plague" still is a major medical problem.

Dr. E. A. Plazcek, executive director of the suburban Cook county (Ill.) tuberculosis sanatorium, said there has been a popular misconception for many years that TB is "under control."

Plazcek and his staff know better. They are waging an unrelenting fight against the "forgotten" disease. "There still is no sure preventive for tuberculosis," he said. "And there is no known cure."

Plazcek said many people are lulled by the fact that the tuberculosis death rate has declined from nearly 300 deaths per 100,000 population in 1900 to about 10 per 100,000 in 1950.

But he said there has been no appreciable decline in the number of new cases reported yearly since 1930. Last year, he said, there were 161,718 cases and 13,810 deaths reported, and the figures for 1957 are expected to be about the same.

"Since we still have no cure for tuberculosis this means we have an ever-increasing number of victims who will need care all their lives," he said.

The growth of cities has added another headache to the problems of health officials attempting to stamp out TB.

Tuberculosis is roughly three times as prevalent in urban areas as in rural areas, Plazcek said.

The Long Beach is scheduled for completion in 1961. "This big ship will be armed with the most modern surface to surface and surface to air guided missiles," he said.
