# Holiday Highway Deaths Pass 200 Throughout

Highway deaths across the nation edged across the 200 mark today while the fatality count rolled in from Thanksgiving holiday traffic. Four separate accidents took 10 lives, six died in an Arkansas collision, five in another crash at 4 p.m. EST, a United Press count showed that since 6 p.m. Wednesday there were 208 traffic deaths. Three persons died in plane crashes and 20 in other mishaps for a total of 231. Leading among the states in traffic deaths was California with 19. Others with high totals included Ohio, 16; Illinois, 15; New York, 13; Texas, 11; Missouri, 10; Pennsylvania, 9; and Michigan, 8 each.

Although the National Safety Council declined to give an estimate of 100 was on 13 roads, the highway deaths for the week-end, officials pointed out that a normal four-day period in November would claim 500 lives.

As late fatalities continued to pour in, the Wednesday night and Thursday death toll surpassed the 200 mark made by United Press last year when 190 persons died in traffic during the holiday season.

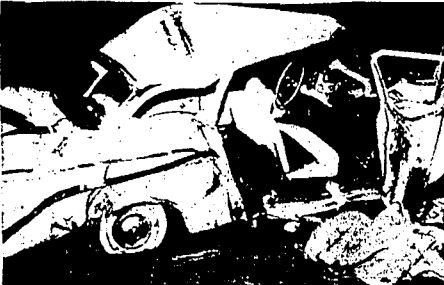
The 1934 holiday deaths for the week-end were 208, a number was almost double the normal highway count of a non-holiday week.

The worst holiday tragedy happened near Corning, Ark., when a truck carrying 15 passengers crashed into a tree, killing another eight. Two of the 15 killed were children.

A shocked father in Livingston, Mo., was told that a smashup killed two of his children, and it was believed the father was in the car.

Deaths were reported in collisions near Cairo, Ill.; Darlington, S.C.; and in a head-on crash near St. Louis, Mo. In a crash of holiday fires, the worst of which killed three young brothers and a sister, and a mother and her mother at Hayti, Mo., when a can of oil exploded at their home.

# Russian Is "Ringed" By U.S. Airpower, Avers Air General



WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (UP)—Gen. Thomas D. White said today that American airpower has the Soviet Union "ringed in from every direction" and the Russian leaders know it. The air force chief of staff also disclosed that the strategic air command (SAC) this week was assigned its first intercontinental missile, presumably comprising Snarks which have a range of more than 5,000 miles. In a speech to the National Press club, the four-star general told other weapons, but asserted:

"The expert in Russia who are responsible for their great progress must certainly know, however, that they have not yet succeeded in canceling the effectiveness of our own airplanes."

White said the air force took steps this week in line with the new "policy of urgency" prevailing at the Pentagon.

# Gaillard Says "No" to Offer of Mediation

Gaillard said his announcement in explaining his views to the National Assembly prior to two votes of confidence on his handling of the Algerian situation, was a political statement.

Last week King Mohammed V of Morocco and President Vincent Auriol of France had offered to mediate the Algerian rebellion on the basis of a declaration of the sovereignty of the Algerian people.

Gaillard said, in commenting on the offer, that the Algerian people of France are not open to change. "Then he urged the assembly to reject the offer of mediation, to refuse to be east divided on the reasons for the policy of three years of pacification."

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# Migrant Aid Is Proposed In Gem State

BOISE, Nov. 22 (AP)—Legislation was proposed Wednesday to provide migrant facilities for migratory workers who stream into Idaho by the thousands to help in the annual farm harvest.

A committee appointed by Gov. Robert E. Smylie at the request of President Eisenhower, who named a similar national committee, proposed legislation along two lines:

1. Requiring "reasonably safe, adequate equipment when used for the transportation of interstate agricultural workers."
2. Authorizing and directing the state department of public health to adopt and enforce "reasonable sanitary standards for the housing of migrants who are in the state."

But in a third field, education, the committee, headed by Labor Commissioner L. Robinson, has ordered additional study is needed before recommendations can be made.

"The problem of educating children of migratory workers is far-reaching," the committee said. "Because of the many complications, this committee believes a far-reaching study must be made before definite recommendations can be made."

With that in mind, the committee recommends "that the governor of this state appoint a committee for the express purpose of making a study of the problem."

The committee's report said an important part of the agricultural labor force in Idaho is made up of migratory workers. It stated that employment fluctuates from a low of 50,000 in the winter to 100,000 during the harvest season. Employment of hired labor ranges from a low of 8,000 to a peak of 40,000.

Seasonal activity requires even a larger range, from a low of 700 to a high of 20,000. The peak of the migratory season comes during the potato harvest in October with some 250,000 workers employed at that time.

"The out-of-state workers come by truck, private auto, trailer and buses," the committee reported. "Latin American crews come from Texas in crew leaders' trucks or in automobiles."

"The pattern in recent years has been for many of the workers to come to Idaho by truck and to return to Texas in automobiles which they have purchased here."

"The employment security agency has made special adaptations of the unemployment process to meet the needs of the migrant worker and the farmer."

"The past three years the 'migrant worker plan' has been used. This system has gained in effectiveness each year. Improved scheduling of work for migrants has been possible through completion of a work schedule for the complete season insofar as possible early in the season. In some cases complete work commitments can be provided in a year before they leave their home state."

In addition to Robinson, members of the committee were William J. Adams of the employment security agency, W. W. Benson of the state department of public health and Alvin B. Jones, state superintendent of public instruction.

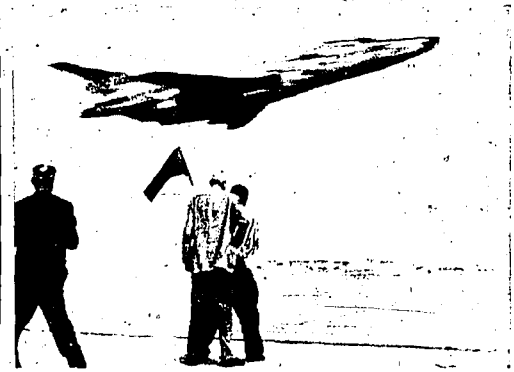

The idea is among many being considered by the administration for the scheduled North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) meeting in Paris Dec. 15-18.

Another idea being studied is an exchange of ambassadors among the NATO, SEATO, OAS and Baghdad pacts. This also would provide improved communication among these pacts, although formally merging the groups into such a large organization is not expected to be a real United Nations.

# Wall Street Hopes Congress To Inject "Zip" Into Business

NEW YORK, Nov. 22 (AP)—Wall Street is "looking" for "congress" to inject new zip into business and the market early in 1958.

But the market men admit there still are many things the market must contend with. These include:

1. Some further tax selling that might leave a jolting blow to the reinvestment of the year-end dividend and dividend payments.

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# Tunisia Arms Pledge Given; England Told

LONDON, Nov. 29 (AP)—Prime Minister Macmillan declared yesterday to send no more arms to Tunisia without consulting the British. He did not rule out the possibility of sending more arms to the former French protectorate.

In his first review of the talks this week with Premier Felix Gualba of Tunisia in Paris on the U. S. British arms shipments that angered France. Macmillan told the house of commons.

"We confirmed that no further arms would be sent from the United Kingdom to Tunisia without continued consultation with the French government."

"But I did not, because I did not think it right, give any absolute guarantee on our part."

"We agreed to work out together arrangements designed to avoid the recurrence of the difficulties such as those which have recently occurred."

France protested the shipments of small arms before they were made two weeks ago. The French feared the shipments would reach rebels fighting French rule in neighboring Algeria.

States and Britain said they were assured the arms would not reach the Algerians. They said they had kept Tunisia from turning to the Soviet bloc for arms.

# Cuban Rebels Put Torch to Sugar Fields

HAVANA, Nov. 29 (AP)—Rebel leader Fidel Castro's torch offensive against the Cuban sugar crop flared up today, according to reports from Havana.

The British were embroiled in a dispute with the Paris dispatch reporting that two months ago France was asked by Yemen for weapons to fight the rebels in the Aden protectorate.

The Yemen kingdom, which has had some arms from Russia, has an old quarrel with Britain over ownership of the Aden protectorate. Fighting has often flared along the dispute border.

# Figures May Give Time of Rocket's Fall

A scientist at the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory in Cambridge, Mass., today planned a series of computations which may enable him to predict the death of Sputnik 2's rocket to the hour.

Dr. Charles A. Whitney said last night that present calculations indicate the rocket will enter the earth's atmosphere probably on Sunday.

He refused to specify a time but added that a more exact study will possibly aid him in predicting the death-plunge to the hour.

The head of the observatory, Dr. Fred Whipple, said he believed the rocket's end will come "between 6 degrees south and 6 degrees north" probably in the northern hemisphere.

The satellite itself was expected to remain in its orbit another month while Sputnik II, containing the body of Laika, the Russian dog, may survive several months.
