

West Europe Is Worried Over Ailment of Germany's Leader

Western Europe is recovering from a period of acute anxiety caused by the illness of West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

While President Eisenhower's slight ailment made him the center of interest in the United States, western Germany and Western Europe generally were pretty nearly as worried over Adenauer's attack of influenza.

Eisenhower's illness caused a lot of discussion in both the United States and Europe whether it might not be a good idea for him to retire in favor of Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

There were no such suggestions in the case of Adenauer. Though he is crowding 82 years of age, Adenauer is regarded as much as any one person can be as West Europe's indispensable man.

The likelihood that the President would be unable to attend the summit meeting of the heads of government of the 15 North Atlantic Treaty Organization nations to be held in Paris Dec. 16 was regarded in Europe as unfortunate.

But the possibility that Adenauer might not be able to attend was regarded by many people in Europe as even more serious.

Adenauer went to bed last week with what was first thought to be a cold. It developed into influenza.

Europeans at once recalled that he had two previous illnesses in the last year, and that he had an attack of pneumonia two years ago.

It was recalled also that he stands tired and shoulders over all other West European leaders.

Above all, it was recalled that Adenauer has no political heir.

Vice President Nixon was at hand in Washington to replace Eisenhower in the NATO meeting—or, if necessary—in the White House.

Adenauer has been building up Nixon as the American heir presumptive for several years.

Adenauer has stubbornly refused to build up a political heir, despite persistent urging. It is true that on Oct. 31 Adenauer named Economics Minister Ludwig Erhard to be his vice chancellor. But he did it only because the West German constitution requires him to name a deputy leader. He went out of his way to make it known that he did not regard Erhard as really being in the No. 2 spot, either in government leadership or in the leadership of the Christian Democratic party.

"One does not name an heir," Adenauer said to an interviewer who asked him a few weeks ago whether he was not ready to name a possible successor.

In the eight years since Adenauer has been chancellor, West Germany has become the most prosperous and potentially the most powerful European nation outside of Russia. And Adenauer is indisputably West Europe's strongest man.

It now looks as if he will be able to attend the NATO meeting. If he does his voice will carry nearly as much authority as the leader of the United States delegation, who ever he may be.

Controversy Over Benson To Continue

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—A declaration by Secretary of Agriculture Benson that he intends to stay on the job and fight for his farm views has ignited speculation regarding his tenure.

But it is not expected to put an end to political controversy over the secretary and his policies.

Benson told a crowded news conference yesterday that whether some people believe him to be a political asset or liability to the Republican, he intends to stay and fight for what he considers to be right and in the best interests of farmers and the nation.

This statement was designed, Benson said, to clear the atmosphere of recent widespread speculation that he would leave the cabinet because of opposition from some farm leaders in the party.

Benson could hardly have been as positive as he was in stating his intentions to continue at his job had he not while House lawmakers that his position was strong there.

But whether or not Republican critics of the secretary abandon their efforts to get him out, Democrats are certain to blast away at him in the coming months.

Increased vigor as the coming election brings near the congressional elections, Democratic farm leaders say Benson is the "campaign lark" they have in their efforts to increase their farm-belt strength in the new congress to be elected next November.

The Benson statement appeared to put an end to speculation that the administration might jettison some of its farm policies and programs in an effort to please some of the critics.

Basic Factors Listed in U.S. Nuclear Plans

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—This is an ABC on the American dream about sharing atomic secrets with allies.

Congress passed the atomic energy act which since then has been the President's hands in sharing atomic weapons information.

In all fields except the atomic he is free to decide what information should or should not be shared.

But this country no longer has a monopoly on atomic information, and, perhaps, much more than that, it is no longer a secret either from the Russians or from some American allies, especially the British.

Because of the U. S. atomic energy act the British had to start from scratch in making their weapons. Like the Russians, they eventually made them.

Because they were shut out from American information, they had to duplicate what was already known or done here.

Thus years of brains, energy and money were lost. If the two countries had been sharing, the West now might be far ahead of the East.

The allies surprise the Soviets in combined brains and resources in making atomic progress is beginning to force this realization on us.

If the West hesitates to share, or any shared, the Russians in atomic weapons it will be a matter of brains and energy it can master.

It can do so only by sharing facts more than this country has revealed to its friends yet.

For this reason the Eisenhower administration is coming to grips with the atomic energy act's re-strictions and gives the President more freedom in deciding what to share and the allies to know.

This is an example of the need to put into the atomic energy act for the President to do what he is doing in sharing information with allies:

1. He can turn over classified information on the present use of atomic energy, provided the allies agree to keep it classified.
2. He cannot divulge to the allies any information about the design of the making of atomic weapons, such as size, weight and effect, but not if it is believed such information might reveal anything about design or manufacture.
3. He cannot turn over atomic weapons to the allies. For instance hydrogen bombs would have to be kept at American bases, they must be under American custody.
4. He can turn over to the allies atomic materials which could be used for military purposes but only if they agree to put them to non-military use.

Russian Scientist Describes Research By Reds on Outer Space, Micro-World

MOSCOW, Dec. 4.—The year 1957 has been marked by two major events in the history of Soviet science: the launching of the first satellite, Sputnik I, and the discovery of the micro-world.

The second concern a completely different set of problems and is also of tremendous importance. It refers to the commissioning of the 10 billion electron volt proton-synchrotron or accelerator at Dubna on the outskirts of Moscow. Last April the accelerator, the only one of its kind in the world, produced proton particles with a record energy of 10 billion electron volts.

These are in effect artificial cosmic rays.

These particles provide access to the secrets of the atom's nucleus. To obtain them, it was necessary to use a tremendous "young" charged electric magnet weighing 3,000 tons. The most intricate equipment had to be designed to detect the accelerating particles which travel hundreds of thousands of kilometers along the circular path between the magnetic poles.

The giant new accelerator at Dubna has two similar installations for accelerating in the U. S. In size and energy of its particles, it is a great advance in the history of science and the launching of the two accelerators open new paths for scientific research.

They lead to two diametrically opposed "poles," to two entirely different fields of knowledge as far as physics is concerned.

Complex machines such as the accelerator are being built to study the phenomena in a field that may be called the "micro-world" — the world of the atom's nucleus and the particles governed by special laws which science has barely mastered, even in their fundamental forms.

On the other hand, the "space" age of the Sputniks equipped with various instruments, was the beginning of a new era in the study of the cosmos, in the study of the phenomena taking place in the inconceivably vast distances of outer space.

However distant these two poles may seem, they are really important parts of a single whole.

Cosmic rays are a stream of nuclear particles, accelerated to tremendous speeds, which constantly penetrate the borders of the earth's atmosphere. These are mainly protons whose average speed in this area equals 10 billion electron volts.

These particles have long been used in the proton synchrotron we have now built. However, the penetrating cosmic rays contain energies at least a hundred million times greater than the particles generated by the largest proton synchrotron, although with very little intensity.

This stream of particles, whose source are located somewhere in the innermost depths of cosmic space, contain not only nuclei of hydrogen atoms (protons) but also atomic nuclei of a number of other light energy particles.

Physicists have long been using such natural high energy particles in their attempts to observe the phenomena of the micro-world. The giant accelerators now make possible detailed study of these phenomena, because they give a tremendous source of artificial cosmic rays.

Cosmic rays may be described as the most advanced patrols of the processes taking place in the distant parts of cosmic space. Before reaching the earth's atmosphere, they must travel millions of years.

A thorough study of primary cosmic rays can bring science extremely valuable information on the origins of these rays, especially from observation of the fluctuation and variation of the streams' intensity.

U. S. Watches Trips of Red Infant Moons

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Dec. 4 (AP)—Russia's satellites are running a celestial gauntlet formed by "moon watchers" in farm yards and vacant lots on top of observatories, schools and museums.

At the headquarters here, Moonwatch Director Leon Campbell, Jr., said the 3,500 volunteers are doing a "wonderful job."

The teams, which vary in size from 15 to 100 persons, are called "autonomous." Campbell said, with each group planning its own operating procedure. They are kept informed about possible visible passages of the satellites by the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory, he said.

The observatory supplies information about the time and where the object to be sighted will appear in the sky and the moonwatchers plan their "watch" accordingly.

After receiving this information, their observers of the Moonwatch stations are arranged in lines so that the satellites have to run a gauntlet of their telescopes. The moonwatchers usually sit at tables with each one manning a two-inch objective telescope.

If they sight the satellite, the leader phones the exact time and place and any more remarks in a direct line to Moonwatch headquarters here in the Smithsonian building.

Campbell said it costs about \$2,000 to set up a station, but that the entire cost is paid by the individual station. Each moonwatcher supplies his own telescope at a cost of about \$60.

This system of amateur observers is the brainchild of Dr. Fred C. Whipple, Smithsonian director. Dr. Whipple had the problem of how to get observations on the satellites when we didn't have the money to pay people to do it, Campbell explained.

Moonwatch officials now expect 15 to 20 more stations in this country and about 50 more overseas in the present time there are 110 in the U. S. and 75 in other countries, Campbell said.

The Moonwatch ranks are made up of housewives, students, scientists, businessmen, secretaries and others, he said.

Seven of the U. S. teams are led by medical doctors and Dr. Worth T. Cox, boasts a "family team" made up of two teen-agers and their parents. That team is directed by Dr. Charles Noble, curator of a children's museum, New York who is "over 60" is one of two women leaders in the network.

Campbell says one of the most unusual teams is at Portland, Ore., where between 50 and 60 high school students man the station directed by four adults.

One of the largest stations is at Alamogordo, N. M., with about 100 observers. At Columbus, O., there are 70 in one team.

U. S. Science Is Hampered By Language

CHICAGO, Dec. 4 (AP)—A massive language barrier confronts American scientists trying to keep abreast of Russian scientific and technological developments.

It's a one-way barrier. Soviet scientists "pull" new technical knowledge in keeping up to date on United States progress in physics, chemistry, applied mathematics, medicine and other fields.

The basic reason for this one-sided handicap in the age of space rockets is a simple one, linguists and scientists said today. Russians by the horde are learning to read and speak English. But only a handful of American students are acquiring a working knowledge of the Russian language.

Only five public high schools and six private prep schools in the United States offer courses in Russian, according to Dr. Kenneth Milneberger, director of the foreign language program of the Modern Language Association of America. About 100 students take the courses.

Of a quarter-million American college students studying foreign languages, Milneberger said, less than 8,000 are learning Russian. "In contrast, the U. S. office of education reported recently that 40 per cent of Soviet high school youths and 45 per cent of Russia's college students are studying English."

Milneberger said 26 of the 110 U. S. graduate schools that have language requirements for doctor of philosophy degrees specify French and German. In most of the others, Russian can be substituted—if it's available.

Scientists and linguists generally agreed today that Russian has far

War Is "Remote" Man Convinces At Tuttle Home

DEVER, Dec. 4 (AP)—Terminating war at this time "remote," Adm. Arthur A. Burke, chief of naval operations, said yesterday the United States could defeat Russia with or without an intercontinental ballistic missile.

Safety, Security Played Part In Selection of Missiles Base

Background on Cape Canaveral—the site chosen by the United States for the launching of its first satellite in a long, narrow windward island on the Florida east central coast—Cape Canaveral is cut off from the mainland by the bay and Indian rivers. It was chosen as a missile test firing site for safety and security reasons.

It is also considered a geographically sound location because missile tracking stations are dotted along a string of the Bahamas islands to the southeast and as far distant as Puerto Rico and Acoron Island.

On a 15-mile stretch of the cape, a series of launching pads have been built. The pads are operated from "black" houses nearby, built to withstand shock and the intense heat generated when the missile fuel is ignited.

The block houses are controlled by a "larged" nerve center that sits back from the ocean. It is located almost in the center of the group of launching pads.

The pads themselves are huge concrete basins, honeycombed with water-cooling pipes, embedded deep in the sandy earth.

Conversely, a lonely place, where very few of the scientists who develop missiles ever visit. The cape is used only for test firing. The missiles are designed and built in plants all over the country and shipped by railroad to Canaveral.

The defense department has put Cape Canaveral off limits to all outsiders, including newsmen and photographers, who stand their

Cape Canaveral, activated in 1949, and the tracking stations are all auxiliary bases to Patrick air force base, Cocoa, Fla., 18 miles to the south, where administration for the test firing is handled.

The tracking stations are on Grand Bahama, Eleuthera, San Salvador, Mayaguana, Grand Turk, St. Lucia and Acoron Island, and in the Dominican republic and Puerto Rico.

U.S. Moonlet Described as 'Intricate' Jewelry Compared to Soviet Sputniks

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (U.S. News)—The U. S. satellite and its launcher to the Soviet Sputniks and their rockets is like comparing a wristwatch to Big Ben.

Big Ben does its job all right, better than some wristwatches, but it lacks elegance.

Elegance is just the word for the Vanguard launcher and its delicate payload—the present 6-inch test sphere and the 20-inch scientific satellite to come next year. They are as finely designed and pleasing to the eye as an intricate piece of jewelry.

But they are no match in power and size to either Sputnik 1 or 11. The first U. S. test satellite weighs 3½ pounds. Sputnik 1, launched Oct. 4, weighs 184 pounds. The first instrumented U. S. moon will weigh 21½ pounds, compared to the 1,120 pounds of Sputnik 11, launched Nov.

The 72-foot U. S. launcher is tapered like a giant's carotid artery and weighs 22,000 pounds. It generates a total thrust from its three rockets of less than 40,000 pounds. The thrust of Sputnik 11's launcher has been estimated by U. S. scientists at around 124,000 pounds.

The U. S. launching vehicle was designed like Sputnik 11's so that the third-stage rocket also would become an artificial moon orbiting at 18,000 miles an hour.

Both the Soviet Sputnik program and the U. S. Project Vanguard were conceived as contributions to the international geophysical year (IGY), 1957-1958, which concludes Dec. 31, 1958. It is a cooperative worldwide undertaking to clear up old mysteries and get new information about the earth and its niche in space.

The Russians have not said how much money they are putting into their satellite program, but Project Vanguard—exclusive of a recently initiated supplementary satellite program by the army—has cost about \$11,000,000.

The U. S. designers, lacking powerful military rockets for their satellites, deliberately aimed at "mini-satellites."

The Russians, having power to spare because they employed rockets of intercontinental ballistic missile thrust, made no great effort to cut down on weight.

The batteries alone in Sputnik 1 weighed 40 to 100 pounds, according to different estimates, whereas the entire U. S. test sphere—with two sets of batteries—weighs only 3½ pounds.

Corn is supported at 75 per cent and dairy products at 70.

Farm law permits a range of 50 to 80 per cent for all the feed grains except corn, in which case the minimum is 75 per cent.

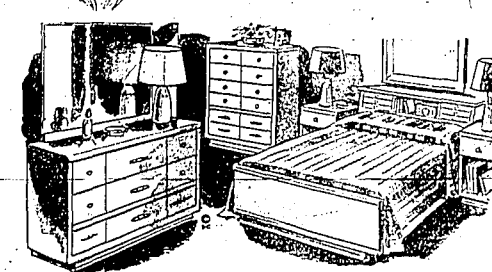

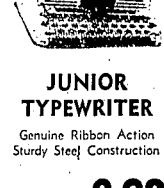

Utah 'Warned' Schools' May Be Approved

EPOKANE, Dec. 4 (U)—The accreditation committee of the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools recommended yesterday that all Utah high schools be removed from the "warned" list on which they had been placed for failure to meet certain standards, an official said.

The East, West and South schools in Salt Lake City, the Olympia and Granite schools in the Granite district and the Davis school in the Davis district were recommended for full accreditation, the report said. The Blending high school at San Juan also was removed from the warned list, but the district had not authorized release of its new status, the official said.

School Recommended
One new Utah high school was recommended for accreditation. The name was not announced, but it was known that a representative of the Hurricane high school in the Washington district had attended the meeting to press for approval.

A report to the secondary commission Tuesday showed that 25 of 62 accredited high schools examined by the association had shown "some deficiency in preparation of new teachers." Of these, 10 schools had teachers who were over-aged.

'Warned' Rating
The association fully accredits schools which meet certain standards. Those with minor deficiencies are placed on an advised list. More serious deficiencies bring a "warned" rating and failure to improve standards then can mean loss of accreditation.

Lernus Winget, Utah's director of secondary education and head of the state delegation to the convention, said the improvement in the rating of the seven schools was due largely to energetic local action.

We are of course thrilled by the committee's recommendations," he said. "But the real prize must go to the efforts of the people in the local districts—the officials, teachers, residents and even press representatives who worked for the required improvement."

Editors Urge Ike To Quit Top Job

NEW YORK, Dec. 4 (U)—Nine of 20 leading news editors polled by Newsweek magazine after President Eisenhower's recent stroke either said he should resign or should delegate at least temporary authority to Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

The magazine said five editors called for quick action by congress to pass legislation to cover the problem of presidential disability and said only the President can decide what is the best course of action. The most outspoken demand for the President's resignation came from V. M. Newton, Jr. of the Tampa Morning Tribune.

"This country is being taken for a ride by high-level press agency," Newton wrote. "It's a perfect outrage at a time of crisis, with all the problems we face right now, to let these press agents mislead us about who is running the government."

Registration Due.
Idaho Fliers Told

BOISE, Dec. 4 (U)—State Aeronautics Director Chet Moulton today reminded Idaho pilots and aircraft owners that they are required to register this month for 1958.

Moulton explained that the annual pilot registration fee of \$1 is authorized exclusively to financing authorized search and rescue for lost aircraft and airmen by the Idaho search-and-rescue unit.

Aircraft registration fees are computed on a 2½ cents per pound certificate "useful load" of the aircraft with fee in lieu of all personal property taxes, Moulton explained.

U. S. Satellite Operates on 'Silent Voice'

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (U)—America's first test satellite has a "silent voice."

The two radio transmitters will beam carrier waves back to earth. The waves will be soundless, like the beam of a standard radio station when it is not broadcasting.

A naval research laboratory spokesman said minitrack listeners on the ground will be able to pick up information from the sphere's transmitters only by bouncing sound from an oscillator against the incoming beams.

Here's the way he said it will work:

The solar battery powered transmitter on the skin of the satellite will broadcast on 108.030 megacycles. The mercury battery powered transmitter inside will broadcast on 109 megacycles.

The oscillator will be injected from the earth along a 108.010 megacycle beam sandwiched in between. Variations in the sphere's translation will be recorded in the beat of the oscillator. The variations will then be translated into temperature readings and other data.

Atom Project Speedup Said 'Unnecessary'

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (U)—Electricity's utilities do not think the nation's power program needs speeding up when considered from a domestic standpoint, one of the country's leading utilities indicated yesterday.

Philip Sporn, president of the giant American Gas and Electric company, said this was the consensus among utility executives who conferred yesterday with the atomic energy commission.

He said the United States need not carry on a nuclear building program as far reaching as that of Great Britain, where conventional sources of power are in scarce supply.

When asked whether this country should step up its program from the viewpoint of international trade, Sporn commented, "That's another question."

The AEC has been criticized by some congress members for lagging behind Britain in developing re-

actors for export to non-atomic nations.

Sporn heads Nuclear Power group, a combination of utilities building a power reactor in Grundy county, Ill., south of Chicago. That project is being financed solely by private capital.

Sporn and other executives were close-mouthed about the day-long session with the AEC.

The commission previously had announced it would not disclose what occurred at the closed meeting although classified material was not under discussion.

However, the utility executives reportedly recommended no definite program for the AEC is to present to congress next year.

They were said to be in a dilemma, caught between rising costs of reactor construction and operation and a desire to keep the program on an almost exclusively private enterprise basis.

The meeting was the first of a series of three called by the AEC to look into its nuclear power program.

NEW YORK, Dec. 4 (AP)—North Carolina's "Tar Heels," who went unbeaten in 32 games last season, were picked by the United Press board of coaches today as the 1957-58 national college basketball champions.

Kansas, beaten by the Tar Heels by one point in a triple-overtime NCAA tournament final, ranked second, with Bradley, last year's national insulation champion, third.

Twenty of the 35 famous coaches who comprise the rating list cast first-place ballots for each team. McGuire's "defending" champions were the only team to be named on all 35. Kansas and Bradley each missed two.

On scheduling, the conference upheld the general principle of the round robin. The three California schools demanded more freedom of scheduling. Under the round robin, all members except Idaho must play each other annually.

In addition to USC, UC, UCLA and Idaho, the conference members are Stanford, Oregon, Oregon State, Washington and Washington State. Thus under the round robin, at least seven conference games are required annually.

A team can petition to cancel a schedule commitment. Tuesday the conference voted to allow such a team playing six games in 1958 to remain eligible for the conference title and the five bowl. This would be required to five conference games in 1959 and 1960.

Ohio State leads the "second" round, followed by Seattle, UCLA, Idaho and Oklahoma State (formerly Oklahoma A & M). In a tie for 12th place were Rice and Utah. St. Louis was 16th and there was a three-way tie for 18th place. Kansas, Missouri, and Illinois.
