

11 People Die as Blast Hits Town in Georgia; Tots Reported Missing

VILLA RICA, Ga., Dec. 5 (UP)—A shattering blast ripped through the business district of this town today, killing at least 11 people, Assistant Police Chief Reese Styles said. At least 100 others were injured, and at least two children were known to be missing. Estimates of the blast ranged as high as \$50-million, the highest in the history of the Atlanta police department which steered rescue vehicles through the state capital 40 miles east of here.

Slow Sell Is Aim of Store In Shoe Sale

CHICAGO, Dec. 5 (AP)—A shoe store chain has hired an atmosphere decorator to create an atmosphere that will slow its sales.

In this era of sales psychology, the store chain is something of a twist.

But the Joseph Shoe salons hired decorator Marion Heurt to create interiors to induce the "slow sell."

"It sounds odd to me, too," Mrs. Heurt said. "But I soon got the point."

"The company believes women buy shoes too hastily. Nowadays they pick up hats at a hat bar and expect to buy shoes the same way."

This seemed like a twist, too. The decorator usually shows a pile of shoes and a hatted shoe salesman at the mercy of an undecided female.

But it's not that way at all, Mrs. Heurt said. Instead, midway rushes into a store and takes her open-toed pumps, the same size she's wearing, to a different style shoe entirely.

Her old shoes feel terrible after a morning's shopping, and the first new pair she tries probably feels like a bunch of nails.

"Next day she'll walk with the shoes and a string of complaints," Mrs. Heurt said. "She's probably hurt her friends and such hurt her feet. And the store's reputation suffers."

So the store chain of Joseph's salons hired Mrs. Heurt to come up with a decor that would invite the customer to buy shoes.

For example, there's a restaurant in town which redecorated its walls to red as people wouldn't linger over lunch unless other hungry customers were waiting.

Mrs. Heurt took the opposite tack. She decorated the shoe company's windows with white and gold, muted with turquoise and something called avocado.

"It looks something like an Italian palace," she said. "Real realistic."

And the cash register jingles along in a nice, refined, leisurely but steady fashion.

Wind Bothers Woman 'Fire' Plunger at 66

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 5 (AP)—The woman of 66—and only—woman flame-thrower says it's not the fire that bothers her. It's the wind.

Grandma Ella Carver, 66, earned her bread and butter by climbing a 50-foot ladder, setting fire to her hair, and diving into a five-foot water tank that is topped by flaming gasoline.

These towering dives are not much of a problem, said Miss Carver. "I've been at it now 57 years. The only thing that worries me is if I've got to battle the wind. I've broken my ribs from hitting the water at the wrong angle."

Her white, short-cropped hair bordering a square-jawed face, Miss Carver has the muscles of a coal miner and the coordination of an acrobat, all combined into a five-foot four-inch 114-pound package.

Stretching out her legs and speckled skin, Miss Carver explained that this wild, 10-pound sledgehammer to pound stakes into asphalt pavement for her rigging isn't more strenuous for her than knee-

boards for the average woman.

Being wedded to show business for more than a half-century has kept Miss Carver in vigorous health. "I never have an ache or pain. Never take medicines and can go all day long without a meal because I believe in letting the stomach rest," she said.

Only her face, framed by clear, plastic-framed glasses, are balky. Just this fall she stopped "daytime diving" because of the glare on the water.

Ironically, the worst accident she ever had occurred when she had both feet on the ground. Three years ago, while putting up her tower at West Hollywood, Fla., a cable she held was blown by the wind into a 1620-volt wire. Her hands and feet were severely burned, but Miss Carver was back practicing only three weeks later. She hobbled on crutches to the tower.

Allied Legacy Totals 67,753 German Tots

BONN, Germany, Dec. 5 (AP)—Scattered throughout western Germany are 67,753 illegitimate children, a legacy of 10 years of allied occupation.

The children were born between 1945 and 1955 when allied troops occupied Germany in a decade of confused emotions that ranged from "non-interference" to a brotherhood-in-arms.

It was a decade in which Germany rose like a phoenix from the ashes of defeat to become a western Europe's most dynamic economic power.

The children were the sons who lost out. According to German statistics, 36,234 (or 53.4 per cent) had American fathers, 10,188 (15.2 per cent) French fathers, and 8,327 (12.6 per cent) were born in the British occupation zone.

Few of them will ever know their fathers. In only 67 per cent of the cases has parentage been acknowledged, and only 2,119 marriages have followed as a result.

For the remainder, the unmarried mothers have been left to support their children by themselves, and only a minority can obtain state aid on the grounds of extreme poverty or illness.

In present-day Germany, lost in its middle-class, Volkswagen-economy dream, they are the refuse of the post-war years.

Few Germans want to be reminded of them in case they should bring back memories of the days when clarity was currency and a soldier's relationship was something to be desired.

Like other remnants of the past, they have been pushed into the limbo of forgotten things, swept aside in a rush of riches to the head.

According to statistics, which Germans keep in abundance even when they like to forget, 10 per cent of the children are supported entirely by their mothers who could not under occupation laws make any claim on the fathers for support even if they could track down the fathers.

Such immunity ended on May 8, 1955, when the treaties which gave West Germany its sovereignty also gave unmarried mothers the right to sue for maintenance in German courts.

It was, however, non-retroactive legislation which left the 1945-55 mothers completely out.

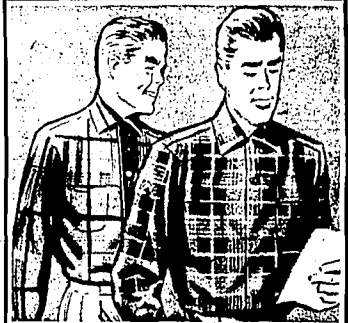

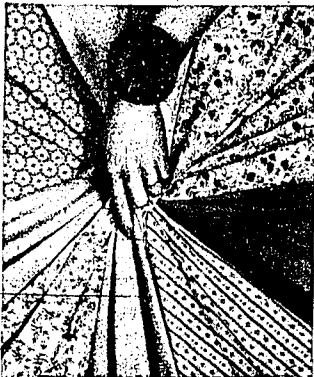

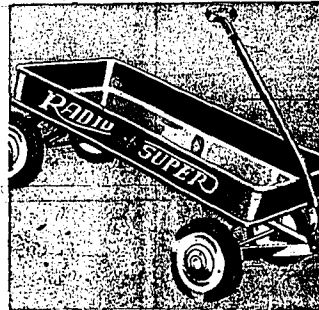

Missing Child Feared Dead; Search Ended

BYCAMORE, Ill. Dec. 5 (AP)—A search for a 7-year-old boy who disappeared Tuesday ended in vain today, police here said. The boy, who was last seen in the early afternoon of Tuesday, was believed kidnapped and perhaps killed by a sex fiend.

About 1,000 cold and weary searchers, many of whom had not slept in 30 hours, were sent home last night and early today when the search was called off. The search was called off by the sheriff's office for instructions.

"The area within a seven-to-eight-mile radius of the city has been tramped over two or three times," a police spokesman said, "and there are no signs in keeping the men out in 20-degree temperatures another night."

"We like to think we'll find him alive," he added. But he said each passing hour lessened the likelihood of that.

Sheriff Al Dier, directing the search with a staff of seven FBI agents and state and city police, said he was convinced the curly-haired girl had met with foul play.

"We're looking for a boy now," he said. "We've been looking for a girl for a week now."

Maria disappeared Tuesday night shortly after a young man offered to drive her a play set to her home. She was seen near her home in this small farming community west of Chicago.

The FBI called the search off Tuesday evening, after 24 hours under terms of the Lindbergh kidnapping law. There were reports a man named D. Auerbach, special agent in charge of the Chicago office, would arrive here today to take personal charge of the investigation.

Explosion at Oil Refinery Triggers Fire

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 5 (AP)—Firemen battled a raging million-dollar blaze at an oil refinery early today and yesterday, leaving behind smoldering, blackened ruins.

The fire broke out at the refinery, which is owned by the American Oil and Refining company, located about 10 miles east of here on a marshy bank of the Mississippi river. There were no injuries but three firefighters collapsed from the intense heat.

Firemen from neighboring city fire departments joined early and coast guard personnel to battle the blaze into early morning hours.

One fire engine was left at the scene.

Chalmers, L. Fire Chief Henry Book, in charge of the fire department, said his department will start an investigation into the cause of the fire today.

Firemen used about 18,000 gallons of water to battle the blaze into early morning hours. The huge refinery has a long pier connected and the entire 4-million-dollar installation was threatened.

Flames were being thrown and hauled in from as far away as Memphis, Tenn., and Houston, Tex., and firemen said they were using it about as fast as new supplies could be rushed to the scene.

Fair Chance Of Balancing Budget Seen

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—Republican congressional leaders took an optimistic view today of the administration's chances of balancing "the next federal budget" despite planned increases in missile spending.

Their reports indicated President Johnson's aides are using a "moving glass" in an effort to find savings to offset the prospective budget increases. But no great picture has yet emerged of what economic administration will propose when it sends congress next month the budget for the fiscal year beginning next July 1.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said plans are not called out yet and administration officials "want to do a lot more talking and studying of the things we believe are necessary and things that can be reduced or cut out."

He said the amounts for several programs, chiefly in the defense field, still must be determined.

The balanced budget goal was emphasized by the White House and the GOP congressional leaders who attended yesterday's conference with President Eisenhower on his domestic legislative program for next year. The congressional group was part of the largest bipartisan delegation which met with the President Tuesday to discuss defense and foreign policy.

Some of the GOP leaders were more dubious than others about prospects for saving enough to offset prospective rises in missile and space-age spending. But Hagerty, who sat in on the meeting, said the President made it plain he is shooting for a balanced budget and believes it can be achieved if there is a will to do so.

It was disclosed after the Tuesday session the administration wants to spend about two billion dollars more on fiscal 1969, starting next July 1, than in the current fiscal year.

Missile development and a number of other defense programs to answer the Soviet space age challenge, Hagerty said, are "not going to be made to find enough savings in other defense areas to offset about one billion dollars of this."

Both the White House and congressional leaders said yesterday's meeting was a preliminary exchange of views, to be followed by others with Republican leaders before the administration legislative program goes to congress next month.

Much of the discussion dealt directly and indirectly with the budget. Hagerty said "there was a feeling" the administration will not have to ask an increase in the present \$75 billion dollar debt ceiling when congress reconvenes.

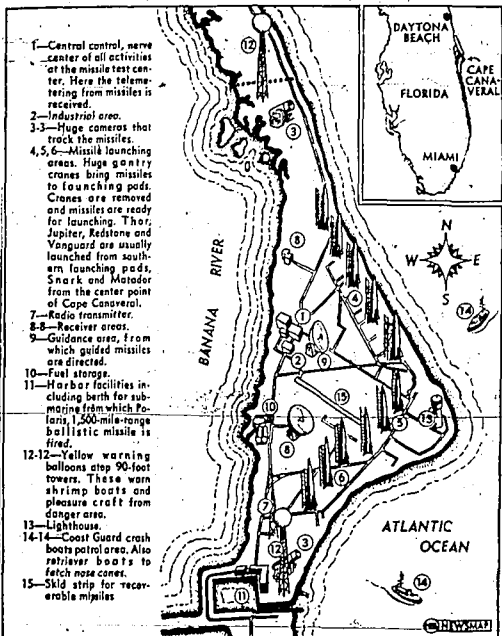
He and Senate GOP leader William F. Knowland, R-Calif., agreed a tax reduction next year is "highly unlikely." Knowland added he is also "very hopeful" there will be no tax increases.

Pay Rises

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—Pay of factory employees rose in October more than the customary seasonal amount to a total of 23 for the 1,000 workers, the Labor Dept. reported yesterday.

At the same time, it said, the October hiring rate dropped from 1.1 percent from the September level, dipping from 33 per 1,000 workers to 28.

POINT OF THE MOUNTAIN, Utah, Dec. 5 (AP)—An AWOL prisoner turned up last night inside the Utah state prison where officers had said he was all alone. He'd been looking for him none-the-less. He hadn't been in his cell since Monday night.

The prisoner, 24-year-old Frank J. Owens, Fort Smith, Ark., did not say where he had been during the 50 hours of somewhat restricted freedom. Officials hoped he'd be more communicative on Thursday, after a night in isolation.

Guards found Owens in a photo lab on the second floor of the prison administration building, a room they'd searched twice before during the day. They surmised he had entered a trap door in the ceiling that leads to an attic—also previously searched. A vent from the attic leads to the roof. It is not been searched.

Forest Funds Distributions Anger Solons

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—Distribution of national forest highway funds yesterday aroused the ire of members of congress from several western states. Montana's congressional delegation accused the departments of agriculture and commerce of "picking the pockets" of Montana taxpayers to the tune of about 1 1/2 million dollars in 10 years.

The charge came in a joint statement released by the office of Representative Metcalf, and lauded by Metcalf, Senators Murray and Mansfield, and Representative Anderson, all Democrats. Members of the Oregon and Washington delegations also protested, saying congress would be asked to intervene in the matter.

The statement said the departments did the pocket picking last month when they changed the formula by which funds are apportioned to states containing national forests.

Under the new formula, Metcalf said, Montana will get \$142,974 less annually than it would have gotten under the old formula. He said congress should reverse "this administrative disruption of a fair and just long-standing formula" and direct "the agencies" to "use the old formula."

"Our forests were valued as if they were being offered for sale," Metcalf said. "The price was reduced because in many areas we do not have access roads on which to drive the timber to market. So, we get less money for roads because we need roads."

In a statement released by Sen. Neuberger, the Oregon Democrat said the Senate public works committee would look into the formula change. Neuberger is a member of the committee.

Workers' Mambo OK'd by Germans

BERLIN, Dec. 5 (AP)—The East German communists today announced the acceptance of a "socialist" version of boogie woogie.

The Soviet zone newspaper National Zeitung reported that the communist regime has lifted its ban on any dance livelier than a waltz or foxtrot. East Germans now may dance such western imports as the mambo, cha-cha, calypso and boogie woogie, it danced "rhythmically and aesthetically" with "capitalist" features discarded.

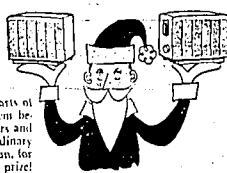

Anti-Inflation Plan Is Given OK in France

PARIS, Dec. 8 (AP)—Premier Felix Gaillard won a vote of confidence today on a bill giving him emergency powers to halt inflation. But a policy split with the powerful Socialist party still threatened the life of his cabinet.

Unofficial reports gave the government 222 national assembly votes to 183 against. There were 42 abstentions.

Gaillard won his vote of confidence—the third since he was voted into office a month ago—after a quick double-swing by the socialist members of his cabinet.

Informed sources said the socialists submitted their resignations to Gaillard last night and threatened to wreck his chances of winning today's confidence vote, but reconsidered this morning at Gaillard's request.

This turned the scales in Gaillard's favor. If he had lost the government would have toppled and Gaillard might have been tendered for the NATO summit conference which starts Dec. 16.

Although the socialists supported him in the assembly vote, they still could pull out of the cabinet and precipitate a government crisis that way.

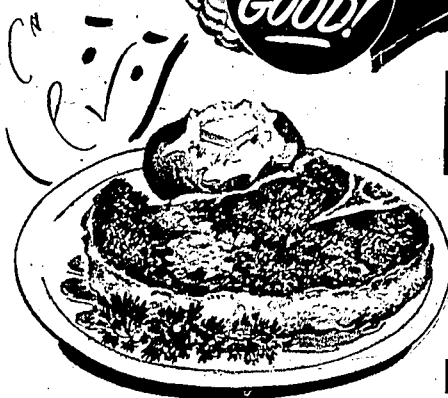

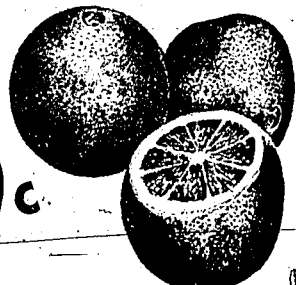

**People From All Faiths Join
World Bible Reading Project**

NEW YORK (AP)—An African-tribe, the Amazon-tribe, a Japanese, a Hindu, have never seen a Bible. An American Indian started reading identical passages from the Bible to the natives and ask for simple words and phrases. At first, the missionary made point to objects, employ gestures, mimicry—anything in order to obtain the names for commonplace objects such as tree, cow, hut, canoe, now and then.

This will mark the 14th year that Americans too, will take part in the program which is endorsed by President Eisenhower and a lay committee of prominent men and women, including former President Hoover and Truman.

Of special significance this year is the fact that more persons than ever will be able to join the reading program, since a milestone was recently reached in Bible translation work and the Scriptures are to be had in many new hitherto unpublished tongues.

The Bible—or some portion of it—has been translated into more than 1,100 languages and dialects of the world, thanks to devoted missionary translators and the language experts of the American Bible Society and similar societies abroad.

To bring the Bible to peoples living in remote areas to make it possible for them to read the Scriptures in their mother tongue, is often an incredibly difficult task.

Junior Achievement Project Is Strong Movement in U.S.

NEW YORK (NEA)—The winter's moving in again, a lot of boys and girls are back in "classrooms." They are the members of Junior Achievement, Inc., which is well known to students of many high schools for its opportunity to earn money as they learn about business.

Started some years ago by Horace A. Moses, a Massachusetts businessman, it now has more than 40,000 members, all high school boys and girls.

Moses was born on a farm, but when he became wealthy he returned to that young people are often denied work because they lack experience. He began Junior Achievement to help students get some practical business knowledge while still in school.

Through it, youngsters actually operate small businesses of their own and more than 2,000 corporations are now in effect during the school year. Companies are formed, numbering from 15 to 75 boys and girls. Each company is led by three advisers from local business firms and members meet one night a week.

"Every enterprise must have a name," says Vivien Paine, a group member, Kansas City, Mo., "and the first step is to decide upon a product that will make money. Then the group decides how much working capital their firm will need to begin production."

To get the money for financing, the young people sell capital stock at 50 cents a share. Parents, friends, relatives, neighbors, even teachers are prospective purchasers, but no one can own more than five shares. Every member of a company must own at least one share, however, and the average capitalization is about \$100.

In October of each year, members elect a president and other officers. Books must be kept when a bank account has been opened with which to purchase raw materials. The company applies for a J.A. charter, pays for it at an average of only three dol-

lars a month and buys the small tools it needs. Shop machinery is leased from the Junior Achievement organization by deposit of capital in proportion to the value of the machinery used.

In Chicago, Ralph Kowalski explains what his company does with its product. "We sell it on the open competitive market. The boys and girls decide on the wages to be paid to themselves, and then they determine the amount of commissions on sales." All groups follow this procedure.

The average gross sales of a J.A. company is about \$300.

At the end of the school year, every company is liquidated. Inventory is sold and all debts are paid. If the company has been profitable—and most of them are—stockholders get back their original investment, as well as a dividend.

In choosing a product to manufacture, careful attention must be given to the pros and cons of its availability. An item that sells for less than \$2 is usually the easiest to dispose of, although this rule does not apply to everything.

If it can be made better, that's in the group favor—and means more money in their pockets. The sums earned are not large, of course, but they can keep the partners in spending money without having to ask for that at home.

The first team is represented by all seniors, four juniors and a sophomore. Kaprielian, a 215-pound linebacker, is the only sophomore on the squad.

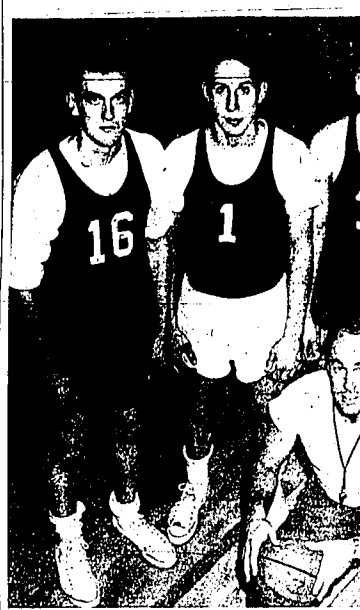

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 5 (AP)—The Pacific Coast conference Wednesday eased penalties for 1957-58 season to allow them to play one-half of next season. They include All-American end Dick Wallen of UCLA.

The conference also voted to cut round robin scheduling requirements starting in 1958. Both moves were seen as concessions to the three schools, plus California, which drew severe penalties in 1956 for illegal aid to athletes.

A move by UCLA to regain full eligibility was defeated by a 5-4 vote. Against it were Stanford; Oregon State; Washington State and Idaho.

Then the following was passed:

"The student athletes at UCLA and Washington who were on the freshman football squad in the fall of 1955 and who are under penalty of loss of one season of full eligibility because of their acceptance of illegal financial aid shall have their penalty reduced to one-half of a football season and be permitted to play in any five consecutive games during their third season of varsity participation."

California, UCLA and Southern California were down to defeat in their bids to reverse conference opinion and to represent the conference in the 1955-56 season. But Wednesday Stanford proposed the easing of the round robin after 1958, Oregon, Oregon State and Idaho objected to it in the 6-2 vote. This motion reads:

"The conference grants the privilege to institutions to schedule football games after 1958 according to their own free choice. Any institution which makes a football schedule after 1958 which provides for less than five games with conference members shall not be eligible for the conference championship or to represent the conference in the Rose Bowl but may remain a member."

This appeared to meet, at least partially, the demands for free scheduling made by the University of California board of regents and the USC board of trustees.

Members can petition through this conference meeting, which ends Thursday, to drop round robin games between now and 1961.

The deal marked the return of Miñoso to the majors after a 10-month stay in the American League training camp. It was Lane who kept the junior circuit in a dither with his countless trades that lifted the White Sox out of the second division before he left Chicago for St. Louis in 1956. The 41-year-old man of limited energy took over as Cleveland's boss only last month.

"This is just the beginning," Lane said. "We hope to complete one or two more trades during the week. We have a deal on fire with the Washington club and we still haven't given up hope of getting the second baseman we are after."

Cleveland's proposed deal with Washington involves a second baseman and utility infielder from Cleveland.

LONDON—Last night I went to a party in a smuggler's den. It wasn't a cave. There were no caskets on the walls, none of the men wore golden hoops in their ears, and there was no talk of hawking or hawked-out hocks or secret linings.

But everyone present was a smuggler, including myself. It was an ordinary party in a well-endowed house with an ordinary mixture of European and American travelers.

At one time or another, every one of us had taken something or other across a national border without declaring it. This doesn't set us apart as a vicious lot, because there isn't a tourist in the world who hasn't done the same thing.

"Gentle smuggling"—to give it a name—comes naturally to everyone; more cigarettes than are legal, an extra bottle of perfume, inconspicuous gifts for friends that never see the light on a customs declaration.

We're fooling no one, of course. The customs men know about this lawless deceit and let us pass unmolested to go our way gloating that we have put something over on them.

The most proficient "gentle smugglers" the MEA men said, "are assistant directors, prop men, publicity agents, electricians—well, anyone who is on his way. And the items they bring in range from honest little labels for prop men. They come to us for advice and we tell them all the same thing—claim it as personal property and take your chances. Of course, we try to help them at the custom house."

The MEA men told of the assistant director who was given the job of carrying a wicked looking revolver in Marrakesh for "The Man Who Knew Too Much" just at a time when she troubles in Morocco were beginning. Told him to keep it concealed at all times, he blithely brandished it about and somehow got it in.
