STOCKTON, Calif., Dec. 6.—A 31-year-old woman, a former nurse, who has been in a coma since she was injured in an automobile accident on Dec. 4, 1951, today marks her sixth year in the hospital.

Doctors hold little hope that she will ever regain full consciousness. They say she is not "attuned" to the world around her. Such response as she shows is that of a child who smiles when happy and frowns when disappointed, they said.

# Well at Bank Is Completed, Ready to Use

Drilling of a well to be used with new air conditioning in the remodeled Bank and Trust company building was completed Thursday.

The well is 440 feet deep, produces 125 gallons of 60-degree water per minute, is located beneath the building, is located beneath the building.

The well was drilled by the bank. Costing will be installed Saturday and Monday.

Bank officials expect remodeling of the building to be complete within 60 days. Heating equipment has been installed already.

The newly drilled well will supply water for the intricate air conditioning system which also is designed to reduce colds and respiratory diseases of employees. As air is drawn through the system it is subjected to specially designed ultra violet lights which destroy virus and bacteria. After passing under the lights the air is pumped throughout the building.

The well drilling job took three weeks, two spent in the actual drilling and a week of testing. Remodeling of the bank building has been under way for more than a year.

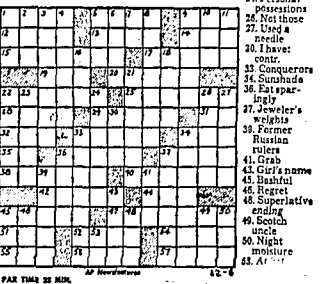

## U.S. Satellite, Russian Atomic Vessel Make Top World News

By United Press

The week's good and bad news in the international balance sheet: The United States, spurred by Soviet Russia's successes, started to get into real competition in the earth satellite field this week.

At the Cape Canaveral missile-testing center off the Florida coast, scientists were ready to launch the navy-developed Vanguard space rocket with a 6.4-inch earth satellite in its nose.

This country's satellite is tiny compared to Russia's two satellites. But it will be followed early next year by a missile four times as large. Russia gave the United States another advance to match when it announced the launching of the world's first nuclear-powered surface ship, the 16,000-ton icebreaker Lenin.

Three days before, the keel of the first American nuclear-powered surface ship had been laid at Quincy, Mass.—the cruiser Long Beach. But the Long Beach will not be launched until 1961—unless, as well may happen, its construction is speeded.

French Premier Felix Giscard won a vote of confidence in parliament on a bill that would give him emergency powers to meet a serious financial situation. The vote was 223 to 127.

The bill would authorize the government to raise 250 million dollars in new taxes. Giscard proposes also to raise government-controlled prices and to refuse pay raises to civil servants.

But the tax bill is still to face a final vote and the threat of a defeat which would force his resignation still hung over Giscard's head.

Socialist members of the coalition cabinet bitterly oppose the price increases and the refusal of the pay daughter, Mrs. Robert Lacey, and her son, Steven, who will spend the holiday season here.
