

'Work Together,' 'Ike' Urges Allies On Eve of Parley

PARIS, Dec. 14 (AP)—President Eisenhower arrived Saturday with a call to NATO nations to work together to free their freedom from the threat of Soviet aggression. Looking light and hearty after his mild stroke, Eisenhower spoke words of encouragement and confidence at the airport, then drove through Paris to shouts of "vive lui" from many among massed thousands. Eisenhower was among the last of the 11 chiefs of government to arrive for the opening Monday of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization's summit conference.

Prime Minister Macmillan of Britain arrived earlier, but got a cool reception from a crowd still resentful of the U.S.-British terms shipment to Tunisia and Iraq—the United States and Britain sent troops to those areas—after they went to base NATO. **A**

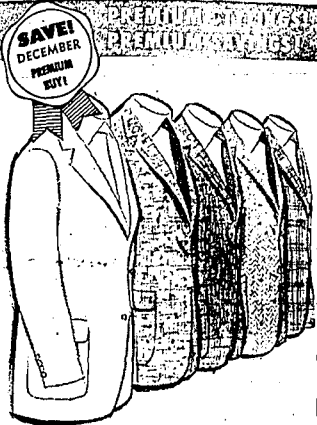

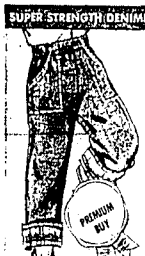

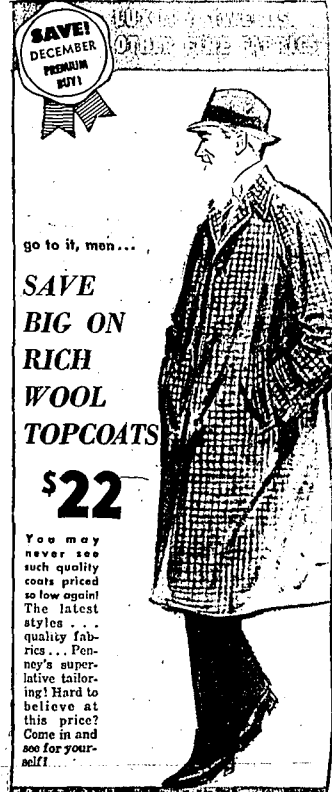

Hostility, Furtive Friendliness Noted For "Little Rock Nine" by Classmates

LITTLE ROCK, Dec. 14 (AP)—Now that the first flames of student protest have died down, the day-to-day lives of the integrated Little Rock nine have settled into a pattern of routine.

It is classes under guard each school day for the nine Negro students, but the atmosphere, previously all-white Central high touched off violence, federal intervention and a long period of recovery.

Their relations with more than 1,500 white classmates after three days of school range from open animosity to tentative friendliness. There is no socializing.

They are under guard, social pressure and, most of all, the loneliness of being, in a crowd yet not of it.

They are not given any indication of withdrawing.

"Twenty-seven white students have been transferred and expelled since the Negroes started classes under the eyes of federal troops," one source said.

One school source estimated there are fewer than 50 students actually in the school today. But there might be more were it not for the presence of the now federalized National Guardsmen in the school corridors.

Apparently, there was more social contact between Negro and white students before the federal troops—who have since been withdrawn—moved in.

"The Negro students are anxious to find out if we are like," said Monte Jean Brown, one of the Negro students.

"They are torn between their parents and their own minds."

"A few are afraid to go out with them in the cafeteria," a white boy says. "But hardly anybody does."

"I said I didn't care any way or the other before they got into the school. I was just not sure if enough of the other."

During a walkout of about 65 white students in the height of the trouble, one white boy turned angry and asked:

"You got any friends in there, 'No, I'm chicken."

The first boy turned to a Negro boy.

"You ain't got 'em."

"No, I'm chicken," said the first boy.

All three talked, but the Negro boy didn't give in.

There were a number of "incompetes" on the Negro students' report cards.

up the work they have missed. Lots of students came in late, but they didn't take much time in answering questions in class."

The youngsters and their parents are reluctant to talk for publicity. The National Association for Advancement of Colored people is pushing a protective curtain around them.

Most of the Negro youngsters say they want to attend Central. It is closer to their homes than the new Mann, Little Rock or Negro high school. Many of them live within a few blocks of Central and some miles from Horace Mann.

What will happen when the last school day is held? The students, Thomas, one of the Negro young men, sums it up for all of them:

"I just want to go to school. I just want and see what happens."

All of the nine Negroes are average or intelligent. They are the survivors of 10 Negroes who applied to enroll in Central. One has 10 of 130. All had good scholarship records in their Negro schools.

Gore Follows Lewis, Clark Road on Trip

LEWISTON, Dec. 14 — Sen. Albert Gore, D., Tenn., left here Saturday to follow by air the route of the proposed Lewis and Clark trail, which Idahoans collected his way for a hearing Friday.

A similar hearing was scheduled Saturday at Missoula, Mont., to discuss the route over the Bitterroot mountains between Missoula and Lewiston.

Gore, who is chairman of the senate public roads subcommittee, promised he would work for early completion of the route. After hearing from 25 witnesses, including Gov. Robert E. Smylie and Senator Frank Church and Rep. George P. Flaherty, both Democrats, Gore said:

"I find myself unable to comprehend why this national project has been successfully avoided all these years by highway and railroad development."

Thirteen miles of the Lewis and Clark route has received no development. Officials estimate it could be completed at a cost of \$825,000. Other parts of the route have been graded or surfaced.

In regard to early completion of the remaining stretch, Gore said "I can give you no forecast of it, but I am pleased to give you the assurance I will be working side by side with your representatives in congress to bring about the early completion of this highway."

Smylie and the members of the Idaho congressional delegation were among 25 witnesses who urged that congress provide funds to complete the highway along the historic route taken by explorers Lewis and Clark on their way to the Pacific Northwest.

Smylie asked that the entire amount needed to finish the road be appropriated at the next session of congress so work could be done by the summer of 1959. He said the route could produce some 5 million dollars in tourist revenue annually and be a prime industrial and defense link.

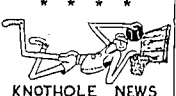

The teams will play six-minute quarters, using an intermediate basketball, Granger said. The intermediate basketball is a little smaller than a regulation basketball.

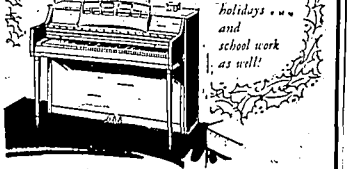
Four officials will be hired this week to officiate at the ball games, the officials to come from the ranks of the high school varsity and junior varsity teams.

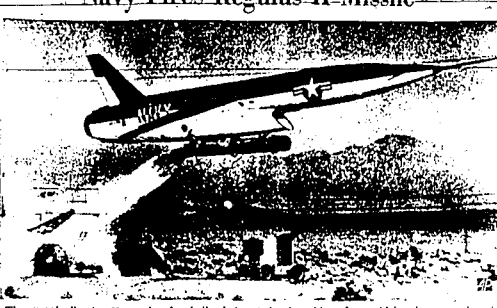

AEC Reactor Started Again

IDAHO FALLS, Dec. 14 — A nuclear reactor that produced the world's first power from atomic energy has been re-started at the national reactor testing station, the atomic energy commission announced Saturday.

The AEC said the reactor is now undergoing preliminary tests and will be used to investigate the effect of varying factors on the stability of fast reactors. Fast reactors are suitable for breeding a second generation which produces more fuel than it consumes.

The reactor, called the experimental-breeder reactor 1, has been reloaded with a new core to replace one in which the fuel rods melted on Nov. 29, 1955. The new core is the result of two years of research and is expected to be more stable, the AEC said.

The reactor was first placed in operation in 1951. It produced the world's first electricity from atomic power on Dec. 20, 1951, according to the AEC.

Power from the reactor was used to operate the reactor and its pumps and to provide electricity for the entire building and its equipment.

SHIP SINKS
TOKYO, Dec. 14 — A South Korean merchant ship sank in Tsushima strait between Japan and South Korea Friday and 14 crew members are missing, the Japanese coast guard said Saturday.

Grab of Dutch Firms Is Said Nearly Ended

JAKARTA, Indonesia, Dec. 14 (U.P.)—The Indonesian news agency Antara said Saturday that Dutch business firms reported almost all Dutch business in Indonesia now under state control.

The report followed the seizure of an army base against further seizures of Dutch property in the Netherlands. The seizure of the base came down a bit after a flurry of rumors which he denied—that President Sukarno had been deposed.

Trade ministry circles said there is no cause for worry that the seizure of Dutch property would be followed by a seizure of Dutch business to protect Dutch possession of West New Guinea.

The sources said precautionary steps had been taken to obtain from other countries essential goods and services. They said the Netherlands government had been asked to supply the Netherlands.

At the same time a committee of the Indonesian parliament said it did not want to go to war over West New Guinea. Communists certainly want the island to declare war on the Netherlands, the committee chairman said, "because this would get more and material support from Soviet Russia."

General Says Space Travel Near for U.S.

DENVER, Colo., Dec. 14 (U.P.)—Thomas D. White, air force chief of staff, said today that the United States is working on a space program that will carry man on "routine" flights to nearby planets "in a very few years."

He said a manned spacecraft, the X-15, is "now in the works" that will blast man farther and faster into space than he has ever been before.

White said, "because this is the air force program to fly at hypersonic speeds, climb to the edge of the atmosphere, circle many times before re-entry into the earth's atmosphere."

Soviet Warns NATO Allies On War Plan

MOSCOW, Dec. 14 (U.P.)—The Soviet army newspaper Red Star said Saturday NATO nations are hatching aggressive plans that could turn Europe into a "atomic graveyard."

The warning was part of an increasingly shrill campaign in the Soviet press as delegates arrived in Paris for the NATO summit conference opening Monday.

The newspaper Soviet Aviation said Friday that Soviet armed forces are on a constant alert for instant retaliation against NATO bases.

Red Star said the NATO plans were drawn up by the United States and called for "large scale military operations with the use of weapons of mass destruction."

None of the dozens of articles in the Soviet press suggest that NATO plans for military preparedness are to be defensive in nature.

School, Highways Agency OK Pact

Upper Snake River Aiding Stored Water

By The Associated Press
Reservoirs along the upper reaches of the Snake river system have contributed largely to an increase of half a million acre-feet of stored water for irrigation purposes, a survey showed Saturday.

The reservoirs already hold more than half their capacity with winter rains and spring rains still coming. Storage in southwestern Idaho reservoirs was running below last year, however.

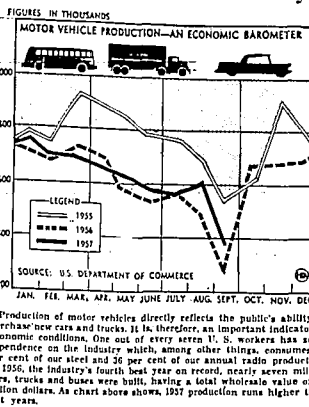
Principal reservoirs along the Snake river and its tributaries now hold 3,625,588 acre-feet of water, the survey showed. That compares with 2,172,159 stored at this time last year and with capacity of 6,813,600.

Jackson Lake, with 601,400 acre-feet compared with 192,000 last year, showed the largest increase. The new Palisades reservoir also has passed the half-way mark toward a capacity of 1,402,000. It held 705,000 acre-feet of water compared with only 317,000 a year ago.

River officials explained that storage figures on the Snake river system were below last year because last year's figures reflected a larger carryover of water.

Anderson Ranch dam held 230,236 acre-feet of water compared with 17,000 a year ago; Arco, 124,000 compared with 168,500; Lucky, 53,348 and 108,025; and Lake Lowell, 95,278 and 98,428.

NATO Allies Split, Confused Over Questions for Meetings

PARIS, Dec. 14 (AP)—The North Atlantic allies are widely split over one of the major issues facing them on Saturday. On another, they seem to be afflicted by deep worry and confusion.

The result is likely to be heavy pressure on the United States to revise its policy toward the alliance and to go easy in its drive for establishment of nuclear missiles based in Europe.

The two fundamental problems before the NATO summit conference opening Monday can be summed up in the following questions:

1. How much does the alliance actually ally? Should the 16 member nations, with their sometimes conflicting interests, agree on policies all over the world? Should the United States back France in North Africa? Should the European nations back the United States in the Far East?

2. From the European point of view, is it a good thing to bring in American missiles with nuclear warheads? Would this increase or diminish Europe's security against Soviet attack? Would it make atomic war in Europe more or less likely?

These questions will be debated during the next four days in an atmosphere of urgency such as NATO has not experienced since its beginning eight years ago. The reason for this is a widespread impression among allied leaders that the alliance is losing its force and momentum, and that it is a time when Russia has forged ahead of the United States in the developing nuclear weapons warfare.

In its race to develop nuclear-carrying missiles, the United States has concentrated on 1,500-mile range rockets. Such weapons can only reach Soviet targets if they

Sources Deny Plan for New Arco Reactor

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (UPI)—High official sources here deny reports that the national reactor testing station at Arco, Idaho, might be chosen as the site of a \$10,000,000 aircraft, nuclear fuel and material test reactor.

Such a reactor, to study problems of engines in atomic-powered aircraft and missiles, is now under construction by the national advisory committee for aeronautics near Sandusky, O., to provide data for NACA's laboratories at Cleveland.

The partly constructed reactor was begun in September, 1956, and now represents a 2 million dollar investment. It recently became the center of dispute when the newly created advisory committee on reactor safeguards, a group of private citizens authorized by Congress, reported that the Sandusky project was unsafe. They claimed it was located too near a dense population center, especially for some of the tests scheduled.

At the same time, AEC's staff published a conflicting report testifying to the project's safety.

A public hearing by AEC, required by law, will be held Jan. 16 to determine whether or not NACA should continue its construction of the reactor.

However, NACA officials do not contemplate moving to another site, but believe at most some of the operating conditions as Sandusky will need modifying.

Even if they were required to move to another area, NACA indicated the Arco station would be an unlikely choice. It pointed out that Arco is an AEC facility and NACA has its own testing stations located in Virginia and California. One of these is in the unpopulated Mojave desert.

Further, it indicated that the data which would be supplied by the Sandusky reactor is to be used by the Cleveland laboratory and that Arco is too far away.

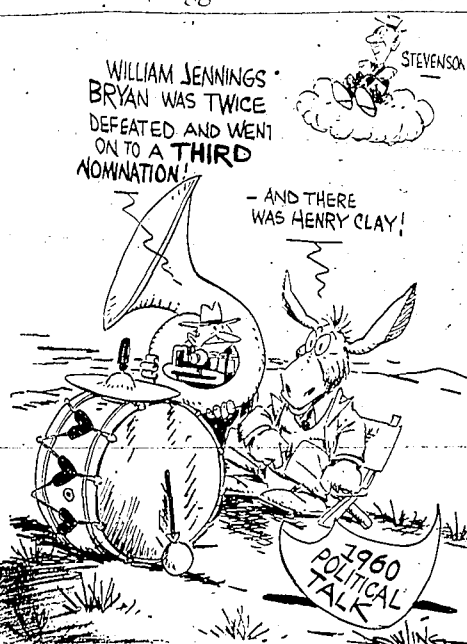

T. F. Construction Figure up As Northwest Average Drops

The dollar volume of construction permits issued in November was up 42 per cent in Twin Falls from November, 1936, as compared to an average drop of 14 per cent for the major Pacific Northwest cities, according to a report issued by the Equitable Savings and Loan association.

Dwelling construction was up 49 per cent in Twin Falls while the rest of the Pacific Northwest cities dropped an average of 20 per cent during November compared to November, 1936.

November dollar volume of construction permits was up only 20 per cent over October of this year and dwelling construction was down by 26 per cent from October.

Compared to the remainder of the cities in the state, Twin Falls was exceeded in construction permits only by Lewiston which had a 320 per cent increase from November of last year.

Alameda and Coeur d'Alene were the only other cities in the state with increased dollar volume of construction permits. They increased 23 and 19 per cent, respectively.

Other cities in the state dropped from 13 per cent to 68 per cent with Butte dropping 39 per cent.

Dwelling permits in other cities in Idaho were up by 39 per cent in Idaho Falls, and 58 per cent in Nampa, but down 44 per cent in Burley, 84 per cent in Boise and 22 per cent in Caldwell.

Total Idaho dollar volume construction was down 25 per cent in Washington was the only state in the Pacific Northwest which showed an increase, 12 per cent.

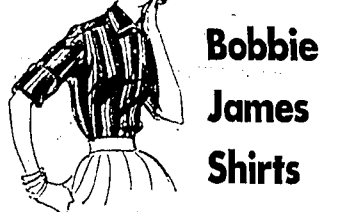

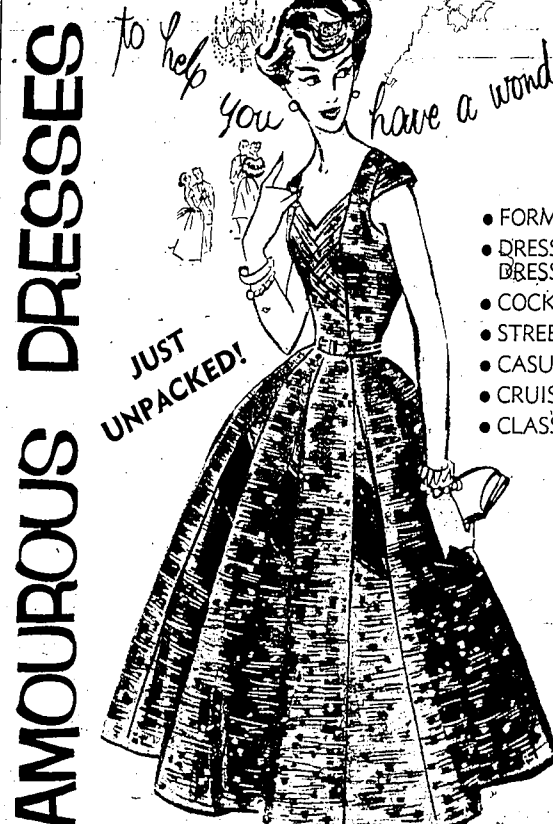

Watkins Raps U. S. Agency's Grazing Slash

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 14 (AP)—Senator Watkins, R-Utah, today said that the U. S. Grazing Service is "slashing" the public lands at a rate that is "unjustified and unwarranted."

"In my opinion," Watkins said, "the current situation which has generated adverse feelings on the part of all groups interested in national forests, is the result of a moratorium on contemplated grazing cuts, until a complete review of the carrying capacity on each national forest can be made."

Watkins said he will ask the secretary of agriculture to declare a moratorium and start a study with out delay.

"While I firmly believe in multiple use of the public lands," Watkins said, "any public management program must contribute as fully as possible toward the stability of livestock production."

"The effective use of our western private cropland, as you know, is well dependent upon the contribution these public lands make as watersheds and forage producers," Watkins said, "and public officials responsible for the formulation and application of management policies on these public lands need to understand the significance of these lands to the agricultural economy."

Watkins spoke at the second day of the cattlemen's convention at the Hotel Utah. A public lands forum preceded his address.

The senator said he had understood adjustments on grazing allotments were to be made "according to the need and the facts and not on a flat over-all basis."

Therefore, Watkins said, "I was surprised and disturbed to learn that an over-all 20 per cent adjustment on both sheep and cattle ranges on the national forest (Cachet) is now contemplated by the forest service."

The proposed cuts have created a furor in Utah. In one instance, cattlemen demanded the resignation or reassignment of a district forester.

Watkins said agriculture is basically sound and the outlook for 1936 is good; asked support for the Mahoney-Watkins private bill to prevent unfair practices in interstate commerce by persons engaged in processing and distributing meat and meat products, and warned of what he called the dangers of the national wilderness preserve bill.

He said the bill "would build fences around millions of acres of public land which would be classified as 'wilderness preserve.'" Watkins said the measure represented a wholesale reversal of the multiple-use principle.

Maine to Get Base for U. S. Missiles

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—The air force will build a new base in Maine for the nation's first scheduled operational inter-continental missile capable of striking deep in Russia.

The air force said the 12 million dollar facility would be built at the Presque Isle air force base to handle its 3,000-mile B-36 guided missile.

The service said it would begin acquiring additional land to start constructing at Presque Isle next month.

Snark units assigned to the base will be under the strategic air command's eighth air force. The announcement said a Snark unit normally would number 740 men.

The Snark, which is armed with nuclear warheads, is a pilotless bomber which travels through the atmosphere at speeds slower than that of sound.

About 50 of the "birds" have been test flown from the Cape Canaveral, Fla., missile test center and the last two were reported to have gone the full 3,000-mile length of the flying range. They landed in the south Atlantic only a few miles from the target center.

The move to obtain new outfits for the safety patrol youngsters began in a PTA meeting at the school some time ago. It was felt that the old uniforms were not conspicuous enough. "I can't recognize my own children on patrol, they look so little different from the other children," one mother said. Many parents were dismayed at the lack of consistency that the old uniforms had. "The uniforms were usually alike," one parent said, "but underneath one belt could be a red sweater, underneath another an orange sweater, maybe a polka dot sweater, underneath a third."

Jack S. Newell, who is safety chairman of the school PTA executive board, was directed to find out the cost to supply the school with 20 safety patrol uniforms. "The cost was so far out of line for us that we couldn't think of it," Newell says. "They wanted \$12.50 a uniform. That would have meant an expense of \$250."

Newell asked his wife to determine what it would cost to buy material for caps and have school mothers do the work themselves. "We knew the school mothers would pitch in and help," Newell says. "When they realized the project just couldn't go over without them."

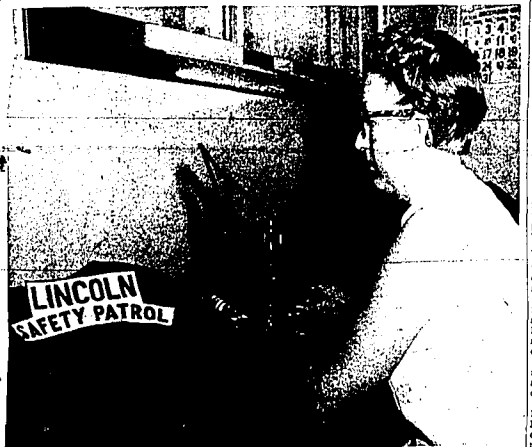
Newell says it was decided that with the help of the mothers the caps could be made for about \$5 apiece. Newell notes about 20 school mothers gathered five or six different times at Newell's home to cut, sew and blind seams for the caps. Newell estimated that it took from six to seven hours to produce one cap.

He adds the local Sears, Roebuck and company store arranged the school a 10 per cent discount on cape material.

From a local surplus sales dealer Newell obtained 20 surplus army helmets at cost. "The fellow didn't even make a penny on those helmets," Newell says.

The two boys were sprayed with white paint free of charge by Hanchey's body shop. "They supplied

New Snow Falling as Sun Valley Prepares to Begin Winter Season

SUN VALLEY, Dec. 14.—Nearly 10 inches of snow fell on Sun Valley's ski slopes today, the latest in a series of snowfalls that have made the resort a winter wonderland.

The resort has been favored with snow since last summer. Bookings for the winter season are just about sold except for the last week of January.

Ski instructors are arriving, a new double chair lift has been completed at the top of Mount Baldy and the last touches are being added to lodges and other facilities in preparation for the opening.

The first "official" snow report is scheduled for Wednesday. But "unofficially" Sun Valley had only about two inches of snow on the valley floor and around a foot on Mount Baldy Friday. But snow started falling in earnest Saturday morning.

Starting Saturday, 60 instructors and 30 ski patrol members were packing the snow which ranged up to 12 inches before new snow fell.

Features of new facilities added to this famed resort is a new double chair lift for top of Mount Baldy to eliminate any waiting in line for the third section from the Round House to the top of the mountain where most of the skiing is concentrated. The new lift can handle 1,100 skiers an hour.

Stel Engel, head of the Sun Valley ski school, will be in charge of a ski clinic and refresher course starting Monday for the ski school and any other ski instructors of the Northwest who care to attend.

A feature of the refresher course will be the appearance of two prominent Austrian instructors, Edmund Wurmstetter, top racing instructor from Kitzbuehl who has joined Engel's staff for the winter season, and Rudi Teichmayer, former head instructor at Zurs. The two Austrians are expected to bring the latest techniques of European skiing.

A special welcome awaits a former instructor, Les Outen, who will return for the winter season. The popular skier, a native of Idaho who has been in Sun Valley's rare "diamond suit" is now working in television in Los Angeles, but will return for the winter season.

The Sun Valley ski school, Engel has announced, will be staffed this

season by 60 instructors, the largest will include three women teachers. Sun Valley will be the destination of a ski train in January that will break all records for distance traveled. The school, as last year, Froehlich and Bill Hatterfield.

Christmas Shoppers Are Spending at Near Record Rate, Merchants Report

Magie Valley families are spending at a near record rate for Christmas, according to many Twin Falls merchants queried here last week. Shopping has been brisk and even exceeds many expectations in some lines of merchandise.

Some merchants, though, are slightly disappointed in the buying, they have here in the past years.

Much of the Christmas shopping has been during the past week, although some merchants report Christmas buying since Nov. 1.

Mainly, Christmas shopping began in earnest Friday following Thanksgiving.

Twin Falls stores have been crowded almost every afternoon during the past week with the bulk of the shoppers hitting the shops and stores during a period from 11 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

The daytime shopping has been done by women of the family with the

man of the family doing much of his shopping in the early evening hours.

Families were reported to have as much money to spend on Christmas gifts this year as they have had in past years but are buying more wisely and shopping around more.

The bulk of merchandise queried report the main Christmas rush will be during the coming week. Buying increased noticeably during the past week, many of the merchants credit to the visit of Santa Claus last Saturday, which alerted families to shopping needs.

Santa's visit also spurred the biggest day for city stores of the season thus far.

A trend to more expensive gifts was reported by some merchants, the trend going mostly to electrical appliances. Many new Christmas items are in stock in Twin Falls stores, these items mostly toys and jewelry and appliances for Mom and Dad.

New car sales were reported good by auto dealers who were selling cars

with a radical change in design for 1958, but other dealers reported sales not much over average, even stating that new car sales are dropping during the Christmas season.

Credit buying ranged from 40 to 50 per cent in some stores with the average about 50 per cent.

Almost all stores have added extra help to handle the Christmas rush.

The Twin Falls postoffice reports Christmas mailing good and expressed appreciation to citizens who were mailing early. Postmaster W. W. Francis said the postoffice has now handling between 20,000 and 21,000 pieces of mail a day, but expects that figure to go up to around 25,000 to 30,000 by Tuesday when the incoming Christmas mail will be in.

The present amount of mail is about 8,000 pieces more a day than the postoffice handled last year at the same time.

Beginning Monday the postoffice will get on extra help to handle the larger load, hoping to keep ahead and get mail in and out on time.

Former Blacksmith Carves Western Riders

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

AN 67-year-old GOODING man, Zal Cheever, has made a hobby of carving horses and outfitting them with authentic western riding equipment. The horses vary in size from 14 inches to about seven inches tall, and are carved in three sections which are glued together. Saddles, bridles, quirts and lariats are all exact copies of western gear and are made from leather scraps. Each horse carries a tiny cowboy or cowgirl, also hand carved, and dressed in western regalia. One small feminine rider boasts a well-coiffed rope wig, thin-plate earrings and rhinestone stud-chaps. Cheever's only tools are a jack-knife, chisel and a file.

Until his recent retirement Cheever has led a busy and active life. At the age of 8 he began herding sheep near his home in central Nebraska, and at 12 was employed as a blacksmith's helper in his father's shop. Later he began to repair wagons and buggies and in his spare time carved toys to give to children in his neighborhood.

Cheever has been an Idaho resident since 1934, when he came here with his family from Nebraska in a covered wagon. He settled on GAM-AB VALLEY, opening the first blacksmith shop there and acquiring a farm by trading three horses, a wagon and harness for 100 acres of deeded land on OROVAL CREEK.

Since his days as a blacksmith are over, Cheever feels that his hobby is the next best thing to actually working with horses and his growing collection is evidence of his affection for one of the world's most useful and likeable animals.

The death of Mrs. Lillian Brooks on December 8 at St. Benedict's hospital, JEROME, marked the end of a long story of tragedy, suffering and hardship.

Mrs. Brooks was the British wife of Russell Brooks who came happily to GOODING to make her home many miles and an ocean from her own kin. She bore two daughters and was stricken with multiple sclerosis within three years of her arrival here. She was admitted to St. Valentin's hospital, WENDLELL, April 19, 1950, completely helpless with the paralysis that accompanies the disease, and with vocal paralysis rapidly advancing.

The Brooks had exhausted all possibilities for treatment to correct or arrest the advance of the illness, but in this instance, nothing availed and complete incapacity came faster than usual.

During her long stay in the hospital many people learned of Mrs. Brooks and the people of Gooding, Wendlell and Jerome have done much to help lighten her load and bring what cheer they could to her. Almost every civic organization in the area has made it a project at one time or another to provide something she needed. Hundreds of individuals have visited her, written her, and sent cards on all special occasions.

All the doctors on the staff at St. Benedict's became her friends and stopped to chat with her. Personnel at the hospital would spend hours after duty hanging up cards she received for birthday or Christmas until her bed was surrounded by gay colors. Flowers came constantly throughout the long eight years. Gifts of body powder, cologne, lipstick, nail polish and toothpaste kept her constantly supplied with all her personal needs.

Now and then a beauty operator would drop by and pin up her hair in front and keep it trimmed behind so she'd be more comfortable. Small sums of money came anonymously so there would always be change for her if she wanted to buy something.

Mrs. Brooks' children were brought each week to visit. Her friends were rewarded for their interest and effort. Had it been a day or a year, she never forgot one and in spite of the handicap of being voiceless and practically immobile, she could signal an inquiry regarding her visitors' interests.

About four years ago, Mrs. Brooks became homesick. Sisters at St. Benedict's with the aid of a number of organizations, made arrangements for her to be flown to England, but she decided at the last moment that she felt safer here.

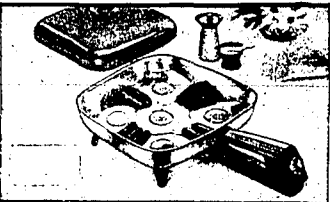

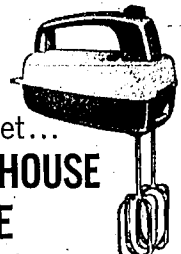

VIENNA, Dec. 14.—A Hungarian officer who pledged his life for Cardinal Mindszenty after he was shot by a firing squad, was killed today.

The officer, Major Palinkas-Pallavicini, was shot by a firing squad of the Hungarian government forces. He was shot in the chest and died shortly after.

Major Palinkas-Pallavicini had been a member of the Hungarian resistance movement. He had been captured by the government forces and was being held in a prison.

He had been offered a pardon if he would pledge his life for Cardinal Mindszenty. He had agreed to this and was being taken to the firing squad.

The cardinal's death was a major blow to the Hungarian resistance movement. It was a sign that the government forces were winning the war.

Hickory Sticks From Missouri Provide New Hobby; Man Uses Them for Canes

The hickory stick, one-time traditional symbol of authority, is being prepared locally for more utilitarian purposes.

I. T. Creed has adopted, temporarily, a new hobby. He is making hickory canes which he hopes to distribute to local stockmen, auctioneers and friends he believes are in need of a little physical support.

During a visit in November to his boyhood Missouri farm home, Creed cut more than 200 second growth hickory limbs. He loaded the limbs into the rear of his stationwagon and brought them 1,000 miles to his Twin Falls farm home southwest of Twin Falls.

Creed's knowledge of the toughness and durability of hickory when properly cured and converted into canes comes from owning a hickory cane made over 35 years ago by his father. The one made by his father is polished to a glossy, brown-cinnamon color and is tipped with the brass from a shotgun cartridge.

The method employed by Creed to obtain the proper crook to the canes, coupled with knowledge obtained in Missouri years ago about the properties of hickory, results in a plain but, practical support.

"These canes are not designed for the cane or candy," Creed says. "They are for stockmen to poke and prod cattle into pens, for auctioneers to smack on the table and wear about and to help some of my old friends who need help in getting around."

"The first step in making a cane is to get the proper size of hickory limb. One that is anywhere from one-half to one and one-half inches in diameter, the size depends on who is going to use it and for what purpose," Creed explains.

Once the size has been determined

Mulch Urged As Guard for Trees, Shrub

A mulch will prevent alternate freezing and thawing of trees and shrubs during the winter months, according to Tony Horn, horticulturist of the University of Idaho extension service.

"Material that will permit penetration of moisture is best," he says. "Sometimes leaves, mulch, or straw, or shingles, or the rain or melted snow runs off, the horticulturist adds.

"Horn says trees and shrubs that go into the winter with 'wet feet' usually have a better chance of surviving cold, drying winds cause branches and twigs of a dry tree to crack. Horn also points out that all over pruning makes some trees more susceptible to winter injury.

After the severe winter of 1949-50, for example, peach orchards pruned before the freeze were damaged less than those left unpruned, Horn says.

The horticulturist says winter damage can be prevented by placing a board about six inches wide on the southwest side of the tree several inches from the trunk so as to provide shade at the critical time. Bursack is most common in January or February. The sun activates the cells, and then when the sun goes down the cold ruptures them, eventually causing the bark to drop.

Apples and cherries are particularly susceptible, Horn says, and shade trees such as lindens, Norway maples, horse chestnut, redbud and European larch are also vulnerable because they have smooth bark.

Trees planted in the fall should be staked so they will not whip in the wind, the extension authority says. He also advises that such trees should not be pruned until spring.

Horn says hybrid tea roses and polyanthas may be protected by mounding soil six inches high around the base of the plant. In addition, straw, hay or straw mulch should be placed over the ground.

If heavy snow falls, Horn advises to sweep it from junipers, arbutus and similar plants. It also is wise to tie such bushes with binder twine to prevent limb breakage.

Europe's Red-Controlled Unions May Harm West in Case of Russian Clash

LONDON, Dec. 14 (AP)—Millions of communists are in control of key labor unions in western Europe. They could damage, perhaps wreck, the defense against Russia in time of war.

On a signal from Moscow, it is likely too that red-led strikes and sabotage could hamper new American plans to step up the atomic potential of the NATO countries.

These conclusions are drawn from a United Press survey of communist strength in labor unions among the closest allies of west Europe.

The survey shows that in France and Italy the main effort is aimed at quickly getting seats for communists on work councils in major industrial plants.

Only in Scandinavia, The Netherlands, Austria and Switzerland—and, of course, Spain and Portugal—where communism is not tolerated as their influence negligible.

In France and Italy they maintain control through gigantic trade union federations which are completely under red domination.

In West Germany, where the Communist Party was outlawed last year, their main effort is aimed at quickly getting seats for communists on work councils in major industrial plants.

Only in Scandinavia, The Netherlands, Austria and Switzerland—and, of course, Spain and Portugal—where communism is not tolerated as their influence negligible.

French communist Maurice Thorez and Italian Palmiro Togliatti declared in 1949 that the people and workers would welcome the Soviet army "in pursuit of the aggressors."

In Britain former Communist party Secretary General Harry Pollitt declared an "imperialist aggressive war against the USSR" would lead to strikes to "prevent the war from being carried through."

None of those statements has ever been changed.

Travelers, The train leaving Los Angeles Jan. 11, will arrive Jan. 12 carrying a load of skiers and their hickory skis, 1,110 miles.

The train is an endeavor to move skiers out of the over-booked week in February and March by giving them a taste of the powder snow skiing that is always at its best in January. As an inducement to skiers to book in January, the all-expense tour on the special train is being offered for as low as \$149.95. This includes passage in coaches with reclining seats, seven days and six nights at Sun Valley, with three meals a day, unlimited use of the lifts and outdoor warm water swimming pools, and six days in the ski school at the time when the classes are small.

From the top of Baldy is a crossroads of highways for those with immediate or expert skills. With no direction but downward, the expert has his choice of such runs as the Black Garden, Exhibition, Olympic or Holiday to put him on his metal. Six great timberline bowls provide a taste of the deep, feather-light powder snow of the Sawtooth mountains and the experience of running half a mile or more with skis tips never in alight.

Intermediate skiers find their thrill down Collier, Canyon Warm Springs or Ridge runs. "Ego Alley" the latter is called by Sun Valley skiers, for on this one the average skier can showcase his talent to the chaffed riders who swing above on the upward trip.

Novices in skiing have their own slopes and two chairlifts on Treeline Dollar mountain. This is the famous blue-sky classroom where Sigl Enal and his staff of 50 instructors put beginners and intermediates through their paces.

The ski school experts work on a progressive style of mountaineering education that aims at their pupils graduating to the thrills of class-work on Baldy.

Sun Valley visitors don't all the time, and not all Sun Valley guests are skiers.

Some arrive for a week or two of "complete rest" in the picturesque mile-high mountain community but

Unless You've Discarded That Record Big Game Head, Measurements Needed

You took "the biggest head you ever saw" during hunting season this year. Where is it now?

If you are like most Idaho hunters you (1) got tired of lugging the cumbersome thing and left it in the woods, (2) nailed it up on the barn wall where "height" and "distance" dwarf its true size, (3) hung it on the rafters in the garage and forgot it or (4) gave up and "nailed it out" to the dump. Too bad. Maybe it really was a record trophy.

Idaho could go with a few more listings in the Boone and Crockett records. At present, this state is inadequately represented, giving a rather poor impression of the quality of our big game. Yet at least half a dozen racks of antlers that appear to be of record caliber have been measured informally by department personnel during the past month.

Two Idaho men are authorized to make official preliminary measurements of trophies for the Boone and Crockett club. They are Jack O'Connor of Lewiston and Lea Deane of Boise. Anyone who has a good set of deer, elk or moose antlers, or analogous big game trophies, should have the measurements and description to one of these men. A photograph helps, too.

The Boone and Crockett club scoring method is rather complicated, and official measurement may not be made until at least two months after the kill. Trophies taken during previous seasons may be entered, however, and racks picked up in the woods may be accepted for a preliminary rating. If good enough,

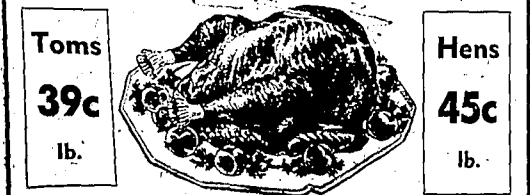

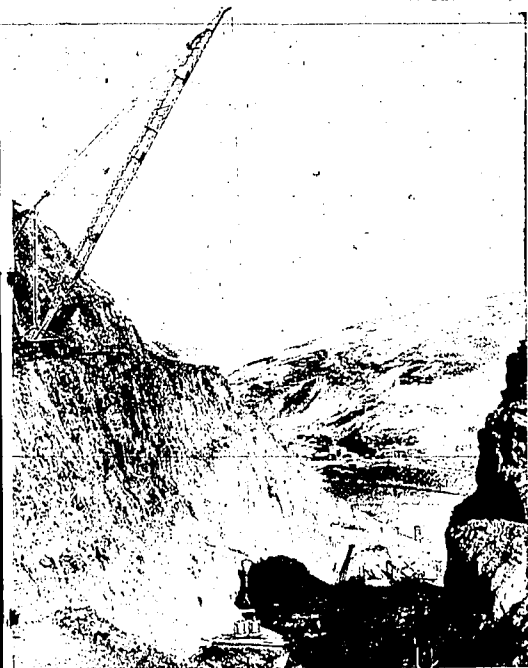

Giant Derrick Hastens Dam Work

Giant Derrick Pours Concrete Around Clock in Last Major Part of Dam Job

BROWNLEE, Idaho-Oregon, Dec. 14—A giant "stiffleg" derrick was pouring concrete around the clock today on the spillway of Brownlee dam—the final major phase of construction work to get under way on Idaho Power company's big new hydroelectric project in remote Hells canyon of Snake river.

The three-legged derrick was carefully picking two buckets of concrete at a time from delivery trucks and dumping them into pouring position on the spillway with a 207-foot-long boom capable of reaching to the top of a 17-story building. Firmly anchored to a rocky ledge high above the rising structure, the derrick was working under brilliant floodlights at night.

Start of the 168-foot-high spillway sent the huge project into the concrete and marked another big step toward on-schedule completion next year of Brownlee—the world's second-highest rock-fill dam. Some 1,800 buildings are rolling on Brownlee with many phases of its construction being pressed forward around the clock to meet the region's urgent power needs.

The first of the mammoth dam's four 60,000-kilowatt generating units is slated to spin into action by October, 1958, and all of its units will be development will yield 10 million

"on the line" by December, 1958, dollars annually in federal, state and local taxes.

Brownlee's builders, using one of the biggest arrays of modern construction equipment ever assembled on a single job, have pushed the over-all Brownlee project to the 72 per cent mark of completion, according to Glenn Johnson, resident manager for Morrison Knudsen Inc., the world-famed construction firm that is building both Brownlee and Oxbow for Idaho Power.

Johnson said the downstream rock-fill section of Brownlee's embankment will be "topped out" by Sunday and that the entire embankment—395 feet high and 1,200 feet long—is expected to be finished next spring. By that time, Brownlee's builders will be assembling the first of the project's generators to go on the line.

Brownlee's spillway is rising in a vast U-shaped cut, drilled and blasted from solid rock on the Oregon side of the project. Standing as high as a 14-story building and 172 feet wide at its crest, the structure will be equipped with two rows of steel gates for regulating the power-level of the new dam's reservoir and for downstream flood control and public navigation.

Every Day Unlucky for Soviet Zone Shoppers in West Berlin

BERLIN, Dec. 14—Friday the 13th may be unlucky for you. But what about any day can be unlucky for an East German who goes shopping in the western sector of this divided city.

Take the case of Frau Schroeder, who lives in the communist-run zone of Germany. For a long time she worked diligently to accumulate enough western currency to buy a winter coat in a West Berlin shop.

Then she came to West Berlin to make the purchase. The first thing she did was to remove the shop's tell-tale western label. Then she put on the new coat and left her old one behind.

On her return to her Soviet zone home, Frau Schroeder had to go through communist police at the Orlitzstrasse border railway station. The police accused her of shopping in West Berlin. She denied it.

The police thereupon produced the coat's original label and even the bill of sale which she had tossed away.

She will go into the lowering spillway—enough to build more than 66 miles of two-lane highway, for added strength, a closer knit web of nearly 1,180,000 linear feet—or 253 miles—of reinforcing steel will be woven throughout the structure.

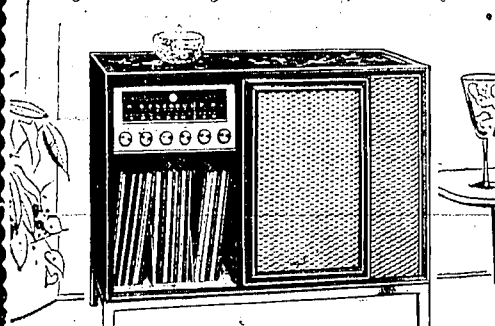
The spillway is designed to discharge 300,000 cubic feet of water per second when the reservoir is full. Water released from the reservoir by its seven automatically controlled gates will plunge 1,000 feet down the spillway's sloping concrete-lined chute and thence back into the river below the dam.

Two smaller crawler cranes will be used in addition to the giant stiffleg derrick to speed concrete placement on the spillway, according to Resident Manager Johnson.

"Our pouring operation is fast and smooth," Johnson said. "It makes us confident as ever that we will complete the entire project in three years, instead of the four and one-half or more years that it would ordinarily take to build a dam of this size."

High speed trucks, each carrying two buckets, deliver concrete to the spillway from a mixing plant located beside the river downstream from the dam. Water used in the concrete is heated to 180 degrees to protect it against damage by freezing temperatures during the winter.

EVAPORATED MILK is the important ingredient that does the magic smoothing. Here, today, are five prize-winning Christmas candy recipes that will turn out extra creamy and fine in texture because evaporated milk, and only evaporated milk makes 'em that way.

ORANGE CREAM BON BON'S 4 dozen pieces

2 cups sugar 1 tablespoon grated orange rind
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup evaporated milk $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped nut meats
 $\frac{2}{3}$ cup orange juice 6 ounces semi-sweet chocolate
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup (1 stick) butter

Combine sugar, evaporated milk, orange juice, and butter in a saucepan. Stir constantly until the mixture boils. Boil, stirring occasionally to a soft ball stage, 225°F. Remove from heat and add to lukewarm. Beat until thick enough to knead, then turn out onto a wooden board. This candy may get quite hard in the pan, but it will soften up when kneaded. Divide it in two equal parts, and into one half knead the grated orange rind and into the other the chopped nut meats. Wrap in waxed paper and refrigerate for several days to mellow. When ready to use, shape the candy into balls. Melt the chocolate over a water bath. Dip the balls into the chocolate until well coated, remove with a spoon, place on waxed paper until the chocolate hardens.

APRICOT CANDY ROLL 80 small pieces

2 cups sugar $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter
 1 cup evaporated milk $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt
 1 cup finely chopped dried apricots 2 teaspoons vanilla
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup finely chopped nuts

Combine sugar, evaporated milk, apricots, butter and salt in a saucepan. Stirring constantly, bring to a boil. Boil, stirring occasionally, to the soft ball stage, 234°F. Cool to lukewarm (120°F). Add vanilla and nuts and beat until soft enough to knead. Place on a bread board and knead well. Shape into four small rolls about an inch in diameter. Place in the refrigerator to chill for several hours. Cut into small rolls.

CHOCOLATE NUT CANDY ROLLS: Omit apricots and add 2 squares unsweetened chocolate to the evaporated milk and sugar mixture.

CHOCOLATE FUDGE 4 pounds (70-72 pieces)

2 8-oz square pans or 7 12x9x2 inch pan
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups sugar 2 8-oz. packages semi-sweet chocolate bits
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups evaporated milk 1 teaspoon vanilla
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter 1 pint jar marshmallow cream

In a 3 quart saucepan combine the sugar, evaporated milk, butter, salt and chocolate bits. Stir over a medium heat, until the sugar melts and the mixture comes to a rolling boil. Boil, stirring occasionally, to the soft ball stage (225°F.). Approximately 10 minutes. Remove from the heat and fold in the vanilla and marshmallow cream. Mix until the marshmallow cream is dissolved and pour into two buttered 8-inch square pans or buttered 13x9x2 inch pan. For variations, the fudge mixture may be flavored with half after mixing in the marshmallow cream and the following additions made. Each ball is then poured into an 8-inch square pan.

PEANUT BUTTER: To $\frac{1}{2}$ the recipe add $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of chunky style peanut butter.

MINT: To $\frac{1}{2}$ the recipe add 1 teaspoon peppermint extract.

MOCHA: To $\frac{1}{2}$ the recipe add 2 teaspoons instant coffee powder.

PEACH: To $\frac{1}{2}$ the recipe add 1 cup finely chopped peaches, (other nutmeats may also be used).

COCONUT: To $\frac{1}{2}$ the recipe add 1 cup chopped shredded coconut.

MAPLE PREALINES 10-12 large prealines

1 cup maple syrup 1 tablespoon butter
 2 cups confectioners sugar $\frac{1}{2}$ cups brown pecans
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup evaporated milk 1 teaspoon vanilla

Combine maple, confectioners sugar, and butter in a saucepan. Cook, stirring occasionally, to the soft ball stage (225°F.). Remove from heat and add nuts and vanilla. Immediately pour into small daisy. Drop by tablespoons into waxed paper.
