

'Tke' Warns Speed Needed in Missile Race With Russia

PARIS, Dec. 16 (AP)—President Eisenhower called on the Atlantic alliance today for heroic efforts to build its military strength in the missiles race with Russia "while the margin of power is still ours." He immediately ran into demands from some other NATO leaders to postpone a final decision on basing nuclear rockets in Europe. A disagreement over quick action of NATO missiles bases and atomic stockpiles appeared to be developing at the very

outset of the historic summit conference to rally the resources of the western coalition.

The conference opened with a brief public session at noon, at which Eisenhower spoke. It went

Mothers of 3 Jailed Yanks Await Travel

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (AP)—Three American mothers are awaiting a go-ahead from the Chinese Reds to visit Christmas with their sons imprisoned in communist China, it was disclosed today.

The state department, reversing previous policy, recently agreed to permit close relatives of American prisoners to visit them in China.

Mothers of two of the Americans have received U. S. passports for China, it was learned. A third is awaiting communist permission before asking to have her passport validated for travel to the red China.

The state department has received a word that relatives of the other three plan to visit them at this time.

Thus far the Peiping regime has failed to give the three women permission to enter. The Chinese Reds originally offered to let relatives of the imprisoned Americans visit their sons but the state department then banned all American travel to red China.

The three mothers are:

—Mrs. Mary V. Downey, New Britain, Conn., whose son John, a former civilian employee of the army, was sentenced to life imprisonment for alleged spying. His brother, William Downey, was sentenced to life imprisonment for alleged spying. The Chinese Reds originally offered to let relatives of the imprisoned Americans visit their sons but the state department then banned all American travel to red China.

—Mrs. Philip D. Pecton, Lynn, Mass., whose son Richard was sentenced to 20 years in jail also for alleged spying. Mrs. Pecton said she is waiting for a visa from red China, after applying for one about two weeks ago to the Chinese Red Cross. The American Red Cross originally made the application but it was turned down.

—Mrs. Hugh P. Redmond, York, Pa., whose son Hugh was arrested in Shanghai April 21, 1951, and sentenced to life imprisonment for alleged spying. Mrs. Redmond said she has applied for a red Chinese visa and will wait to see whether she gets it before applying for a U. S. passport.

New Iraq Leader Sets Cooperation

BAHJADA, Dec. 16 (AP)—Abdullah Mirjan formally took over as Iraq's new premier yesterday and declared his government will continue cooperation with the western Baghdad pact.

He also said he would follow an "Arab national policy." Mirjan formed a new government under King Faisal after Premier Ali Jawad Ayyid resigned early last week.

Avalanches Hit

GLION, Switzerland, Dec. 16 (AP)—Officials here said today the Alpine valleys of St. Gallen, Appenzel, Bern and Lucerne have been hit by a Russian attack and that it cannot be an "either-or" proposition.

The officials said the villages were hit by avalanches and that the avalanche would fly in more snow than weather permitted.

Infantry Is Needed for NATO Nations As Well as Modern Missile Weapons

PARIS, Dec. 16 (AP)—No matter how much the NATO armed forces need modern missile weapons, they also need old-fashioned infantrymen.

Today, eight years after the NATO alliance was formed, the alliance has only 18 divisions, including 12 Soviet and satellite divisions across the plains of central Europe.

Gen. Louis Norstad, supreme allied commander in Europe, says his staff is not enough to check any Soviet onslaught, not enough to get the West's retaliatory forces on the move. But he believes 28 or 30 divisions would be enough.

The 30-year-old American army general will make this clear in all discussions he has during the NATO summit conference here.

His recommendations on strategy will call for an increase of allied troops strength—despite the advent of the missile age.

Allied strategists believe 30 divisions would be able to contain a Russian onslaught for three crucial days. In these 72 hours, all the retaliatory power of the West, from nuclear bombs to missiles, could be tossed at the invaders and thus slow down the attack.

This emphasis on allied defense by sheer manpower will be important in the coming months.

Norstad insists that the allies must be able to reply to a Russian attack and that it cannot be an "either-or" proposition.

Mild Weather Causing Fog, Rains in U. S.

Waves of mild, moist air sweeping most of the country today, bringing rain in heavy fog and bringing rain to other parts.

The overnight fog blankets reached from eastern Kansas through the Ohio valley and into lower Michigan.

The fog, which is expected to last until mid-morning, is causing much delay in travel throughout the region.

A disturbance along the Pacific coast dumped rain over much of the western third of the nation during the night and brought some rain to the northern half of the Rockies.

Storm warnings were raised along the Washington and Oregon coasts yesterday as winds up to 50 miles per hour kicked up rough seas in the north Pacific.

Light showers left the eastern third of the nation during the night, occurring from northern New England to the lower Great Lakes and east to New England. The rain changed to light snow in northern New England.

Overcast conditions ranged from the 20s in the northern plains and New England to the 30s from the central plains to the mid-Atlantic states and the 40s and 50s from Texas through the south states.

Forecasters predicted mostly cloudy skies for most of the nation today except in the Ohio valley where skies will clear after the 11th.

The western precipitation is expected to spread into the plains today from western Texas and the northern Great Lakes.

Some cooling is seen for the Great Lakes region, but little chance of rain. Light snow will continue in northern New England and the northern Great Lakes.

Seaton Balks at Import Program

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—In testimony before a Senate subcommittee today, Secretary of Agriculture Charles Brannan balked at the idea of a new import program for domestic producers of feed and grain.

Brannan expressed the view in reply to a letter from Dornbrook, secretary of the American Farm Bureau, that the current voluntary program for limiting crude oil imports to 100,000 barrels a day was "not a very good idea."

After detailing the procedure under which the voluntary oil import program was set up, Brannan said he was unwilling to predict what determination would be made should the President exercise the provision of law relating to such arrangements.

Many Die During Mongolian Quake

TOKYO, Dec. 16.—Mongolian newspapers today reported that 1,200 persons in Uster Mongolia died in a quake Friday the 15th killed more than 1,200 persons in Uster Mongolia.

But later it asked the casualty figures be eliminated from the report since it was untrue. The number of casualties, it said, at least 200 persons were killed in the village of Alev Bay.

It was the second earthquake to hit Uster Mongolia this month. Deep tremors were reported to occur in the full-proportion of this disaster, it said.

Venezuela Claims Government Wins

CARACAS, Venezuela, Dec. 16.—The government claimed overwhelming victory today in a nationwide plebiscite on whether to keep President Marcos Perez Jimenez's regime in power for five more years.

The victory meant automatic reelection of a government spokesman and single list of candidates for a new house of representatives.

An estimated 3,000,000 Venezuelans voted in yesterday's election. They had only two choices: Yes or No. There was no state in opposition to Jimenez.

Slave Labor Used

VIENNA, Dec. 16.—Diplomatic sources reported today that Russia is draining thousands of slave laborers from its prisons to build a 33-mile canal between the Dnieper river and the Ukrainian iron mining center of Krivoy Rog.

The sources said reports from Russia revealed some 180,000 prisoners are being held in main work camps under supervision of the secret police. Reliable sources estimate more than 100,000 prisoners died building the Soviet White Sea canal during the Stalin era.

Germans Note Doubt at U. S. Missiles Offer

DONN, Germany, Dec. 16 (AP)—A "suspicious newspaper" is taking place in West Germany as a result of the U. S. offer to establish intermediate-range ballistic missile bases here.

Frankly, the Germans don't want them, but they fear they are going to get them all the same.

The offer to supply the United States' NATO allies with missiles and to stockpile nuclear warheads at continental points has brought home to the Germans—more than any other action in recent years—that their country would become a peacetime battlefield in any future war.

It is a terrifying thought to a people who still vividly remember the horror of World War II.

Despite the fact that more than 100 divisions are stationed on German soil, forming the front-line of NATO's defensive shield, the West Germans have been secretly hoping they would be spared nuclear attack.

Now they are beginning to realize it is vain hope. A Russian general has said that has swirled through their minds for 10 years like a local river.

Missile bases, which would bring Russia's major industrial targets under fire, inevitably would mean a great retaliation in the early stages of any future war.

The Germans now are thinking it is a disturbing thought.

Officially, the West German government is paying for time. Government spokesmen emphasize that the problem is not whether the missiles will not be available for nearly two years.

When the time comes we shall make up our minds," they say. They point to other problems which have a more urgent ring.

Continually, they express the view that if West Germany's NATO allies desire establishment of missile bases, then Germany naturally would acquiesce. But the statement is a double-edged sword.

Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano leads the diplomatic dance, an exercise in "brinkmanship."

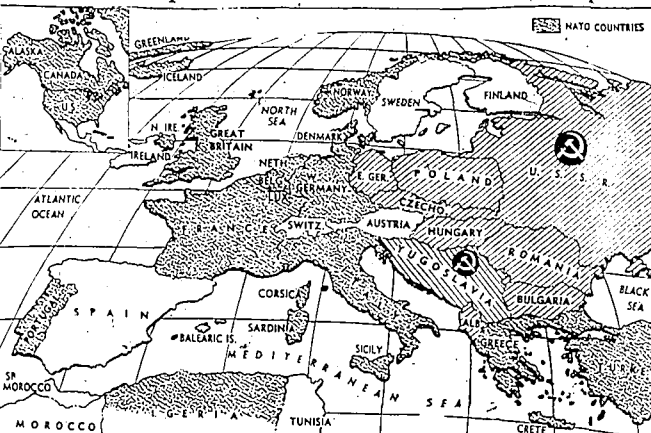
At a recent news conference he said the problem was primarily military in character, as the Americans "have yet to produce the missiles. First must decide whether the missiles should be based for the greater part of military effect."

Only when this has been decided will the problem move into the political field.

"This is a public way of saying: 'We are waiting for them. They want them and we will tell them whether we will accept them.'"

Another interesting reaction has come from the military side. They say they are not sure they should put their shoulders to such a heavy artillery in the front-line. Germany being the front-line, this they say, the missiles should be somewhere else.

Solon Ready To Introduce 'Wiretap' Bill

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (AP)—Rep. Kenneth B. Keating, R-N.Y., planned today to press for action next year on his bill to permit wiretapping by authorized FBI and state law officials.

The measure would permit "unauthorized" wiretapping by state law enforcement agencies.

Keating said he does not believe Congress needs to bar the states from authorizing wiretapping by their courts and law officers. But since the Supreme Court has so interpreted the federal communications act, he said it is necessary to eliminate once and for all any doubts left by the present language of the law.

The New York Republican said he will urge his colleagues to give priority consideration to his measure when Congress meets in January.

While he agrees wiretapping is a dirty business, Keating said law enforcement fighting public enemies should be allowed to tap wires "within reasonable and fair limits."

He said the criminals involved are not "far dirtier" than the wiretappers. He said his two-pronged bill would "hit dirt at unauthorized wiretapping" by making it illegal for anyone to intercept any communication by wire or radio except in certain specified instances. Present law is only use of wiretap data.

Keating's bill would permit wiretapping by authorized FBI agents and state officials acting under authority of state law. It would require that state officials make their own decisions as to whether wiretapping is necessary.
