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Nostalgia for Military Life Listed by Ike

LOUVIENNES, France, Dec. 17.—President Eisenhower admitted today he is "homesick" for the military.

Eisenhower spoke with nostalgia of his army days during a sentimental visit to his last, military command—supreme headquarters, Allied powers Europe (SHAPE).

It was Eisenhower's first visit to his old NATO headquarters since he left more than five years ago to run for the presidency.

Eisenhower looked at the hundreds of Allied troops mustered beneath the lines of the 15 NATO nations, fluttering in a slight breeze. The temperature was two below freezing, a wintry sun broke fitfully through the clouds.

"I have a special kind of sickness—that afflicts the aged and the young—homesickness," Eisenhower told the assembled officers and enlisted men.

He recalled his days at SHAPE and said that when he left his command it was the last day "I was ever privileged to wear my uniform."

"After 40 years of wearing a uniform," he added, "it would be strange if I felt quite as natural with my civilian hat as I did with my military cap."

Only a few officers and enlisted men remain who served with Eisenhower here, but to them Eisenhower is "the general" and always will be. Even the few officers and enlisted men seldom refer to him as anything else but "General" Eisenhower.

Former Resident Paid Last Honor

SPRINGDALE, Dec. 17.—Funeral services for Mrs. Martha Laella Peterson, 83, former Springdale resident, were held Saturday in American Fork, Utah. Mrs. Peterson died Thursday after a brief illness in a hospital in American Fork.

She was born Aug. 10, 1874, at Porterville, Morgan county, Utah, and was married to John E. Peterson in 1913. The family came to Oakley and later to Springdale where Mr. Peterson was bishop of the LDS church for a number of years.

Mr. Peterson preceded her in death in 1937. A son, Ernest Peterson, died in December, 1957, and a daughter, Mrs. Mildred Peterson, died in April, 1957.

Surviving are four sons, Grandin Peterson, Burley, Aron Peterson, American Fork; Darrell Peterson, Los Angeles; and Arlon Peterson, Kaysville, Utah; two daughters, Mrs. Clara Rolla, Provo, Utah, and Mrs. Hermina Shober, Murray, Utah; 20 grandchildren; 74 great-grandchildren and four great-great-grandchildren. She also is survived by 106 for the corresponding period last year.

Cold Shoulder Is Handed U.S. Solon on Trip

NEW DELHI, India, Dec. 17 (U.S. Press.)—Philip Blinn, U.S. congressman, was treated to a "cold shoulder" in his former country during his recent tour of India. The Indian-born congressman's attempt to show himself as proof of American democracy ran head-on into the Indian government's refusal to accept the launch of the first earth satellite. He also faced Indian skepticism over America's intentions in the East and her alleged dispute over Kashmir.

Sandhu, who was received in other nations as evidence of the quality of Americans, was greeted here by bold newspaper headlines and front page pictures.

But most editorial writers ignored his visit, falling even to comment on the return home of a native son who made good in a foreign land. His spectators were well attended. His critics, most foreign dignitaries to appear before him, failed to issue such an invitation to Sandhu.

Government and political circles in India were more of a "cold shoulder" to Sandhu than the "cold shoulder" he came to India to promote himself rather than Indo-American friendship.

Rule on Insurance Reversed in Court

BOISE, Dec. 17 (U.S. Press.)—The Idaho supreme court reversed a ruling of the state circuit court yesterday, saying such rulings "must be reasonable" rather than "arbitrary or capricious."

The court upheld legality of a proposed life insurance policy granting an extra month of so-called "grace period" for every year, after the first, on which premiums are paid.

O'Connell had disapproved this and two other supplements to a policy prepared by the Gen State Mutual Life Insurance association, Inc. Dist. Judge Merlin B. Young upheld his action.

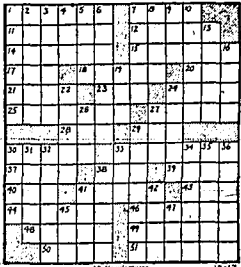

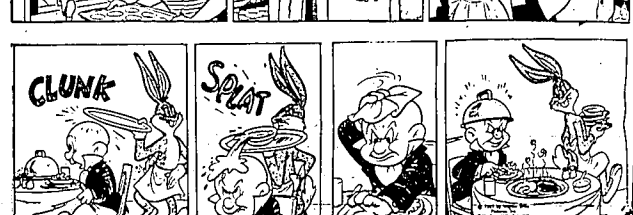

Spending Hike Paid Offset to Industry Drop

NEW YORK, Dec. 17 (AP)—State and local governments are fast narrowing the still wide gap today between their spending and that of the federal government.

The expected increase next year in this outpouring of money into the economy is counted upon to help offset the decline in industry.

More than \$3 billion dollars will be spent next year for goods and services by the 48 states and their many subdivisions. That will amount to some 8 percent of the nation's total output. The federal government is expected to spend about \$2 billion dollars as a further offset.

Altogether it's quite a cushion the taxpayers are putting under the economy, if that's any consolation to them.

Spending by the state and local governments has doubled since 1949 and is 4 1/2 times the federal government's.

The Northern Trust company, of Chicago notes in its December comment on business: "The popular demand for more or better public service, in all appearances, continues undiminished. The rapidly rising school-age population, the continued expansion in housing, the growth in number of cars on the highways, the gradual spread of substantial metropolitan neighborhoods—all point to a growing demand for more public services."

The governments are also shouldering a larger share of the social assistance programs. The Tax foundation, a research organization, says that in 1949 the federal government's contribution of \$1.4 billion dollars, Federal funds spent for such state operated programs as old age assistance, aid to dependent children, aid to the blind and to the permanently disabled, and include state-local general assistance.

These federal funds are now only two-thirds as great as they were in the depression, while state-local spending on these programs has risen from \$24 million dollars then to \$1.5 billion now.
