According to the report, the report says that to meet all kinds of military threats, there must be a steady state of emergency through 1970, reaching in the years 1960 and 1961 a peak outlay of about \$10 billion dollars a year in additional expenditures over and above the current \$8 billion defense budget for five billion a year, for several years, for a civilian shelter program, is recommended on a grand scale.

These key recommendations, the report says, were presented to President Eisenhower at an extraordinary internal security meeting Nov. 15, 1957, at the launching of the second Russian satellite. As to the time steps, also, the report said the committee recommended: "An increased foreign aid program, especially economic aid for the underdeveloped countries, to specific figure was recommended."

Virus Expert Backs Coffer In Salk Work

OAKLAND, Calif., Dec. 20 (AP)—A noted virus expert has backed the work of Dr. Jonas Salk in making the Salk vaccine.

This testimony came from Dr. William McMichael Hammon, who helped set up the government's standards for vaccine production.

He was a defense witness in a \$350,000 damage suit brought against Cutter by the parents of two children who contracted polio after being inoculated with Cutter-made Salk vaccine.

Hammon said he and other experts could not explain why polio developed in some children inoculated with the vaccine.

Arrive Monday

The family was put aboard a train in New York with tickets to Lexington. They arrived Monday.

But Patocskal, through an interpreter, said his authorized sponsor was to have been a George Marlow, Riney, N. Y.

Officials said the mistake apparently occurred when an agency sent a niece and her family to Mr. and Mrs. Gabriel Borsos, Lewiston, with whom the Patoczkais are staying. Apparently the wrong niece was sent.

Complete Arrangements

The Borsos completed arrangements with the Catholic Welfare council a few days ago to have a Hungarian refugee dentist and his wife, Dr. and Mrs. Brude J. Varga, come to Lewiston under their sponsorship.

Both Mrs. Varga and Mrs. Patocak are nieces of the Lewistown woman, Mrs. Boras.

The Barnes already had two other refugee families staying with them. The Red Cross and Catholic Daughters of America have agreed to provide a house, fuel and food for the Patocaks until the mixup can be straightened out.

Patocak, a former flour mill foreman, said he wants to return to New York where there would be more of his countrymen.

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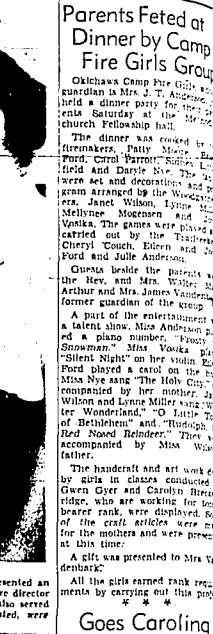

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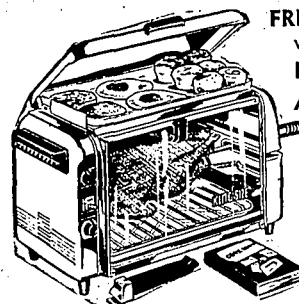
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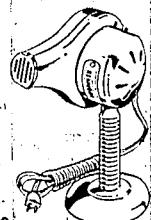
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
