Surgery OK'd For Tot After Ban of Father

STIMMOND, Ind. Dec. 27.—A little girl was in good condition today following an emergency appendectomy performed with her father's consent in his religious opposition to medical care.

The father, Arthur Phippen, 40, had refused for almost three days against pleas by authorities to permit a physician to operate on his daughter, 11, for acute appendicitis.

Instead, Phippen, his family and other members of the "Fuller" sect of Old "religious sect" prayed almost continuously to save the life of the blind, blue-eyed girl.

Phippen was persuaded to permit the operation last night when he learned that the girl was in a condition which would have been fatal without medical treatment.

Earlier yesterday, Phippen had allowed doctors to examine Judy at Reid Memorial hospital, but when warned Judy's appendix might burst within hours and she might not live without surgery, he refused.

Despite the prediction, Phippen insisted on taking the girl back home to continue praying for her recovery.

In a last-ditch effort, a delegation of Richmond physicians, including county health officer Dr. W. R. Taylor, went to the Phippens' four room home last night to plead with the father.

One of the men in the crowd advised the child was in extremely critical condition.

But Phippen told him in his belief until Sheriff Edward Corbett arrived with a summons. The summoned Phippen, a foundry worker to appear in court today for hearing on the girl's condition.

"Then the law wants to take her to the hospital?" Phippen asked the sheriff.

"Yes," Corbett replied.

"My church preaches that we must obey the law," the father said. "We have followed the law to the hospital and I am now here for the surgery."

The operation lasted more than one-half hour. A hospital spokesman said today the girl was "in good condition."

Phippen, 40, his wife, Viola, and their nine other children sat quietly in the hospital waiting room during the surgery.

After the girl was taken to the emergency floor, the law left.

The court's appeals concluded in the decision that if the Dallas school board fails to integrate, then it will be up to Judge Allred to order the Dallas public schools to integrate.

The appeals of the Negroes to get into Dallas schools were sent back and forth between Judge Allred and the Dallas circuit court.

It was on the basis of an appeal order—which today's decision said Allred succeeded in doing—that Dallas school board officials integrated at mid-term.

When Judge Allred ordered Dallas schools integrated, he made plain that he did so reluctantly.

Today's decision is a phrase that "if there are civil rights there are also civil wrongs," and contended that the NAACP's suit was based on principles of sociology rather than law in ordering public schools desegregated.

He was the "captain" of the national educational program, the Huk movement. His arrest left the Huk movement in a state of confusion.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 27 (AP)—Unheralded University of Tulsa broke open a close first-round contest to upset No. 2 seeded Idaho State 64-51 in the first round of the All College basketball tournament here Thursday night. The game was fought to the wire although the Golden Hurricane was finally able to breathe easy with 17 minutes remaining.

The teams played even the first 12 minutes when the count was knotted at 15-all, and Idaho State was unable to make its first seven chances at the free throw line.

Tulsa pulled away to a 27-21 edge at the half and built the margin to 11 points early in the second quarter. However, with Idaho State's Lloyd Harris, Gale Simmen and Alan Morris putting together some hot plays, Tulsa picked up only a field goal when 54-40 at the end of the first half. The Bengals moved to within three points 42-39 midway in the last half.

Leading Tulsa's scoring was Wayne, who hit 20, and Oleander, who made 17. LeRoy Barker, Idaho State, led his team with 11. In Friday afternoon, Tulsa will play Denver meet Western Kentucky and Tulane plays West Virginia.

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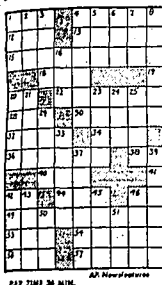

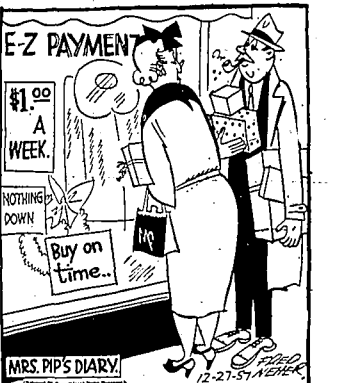

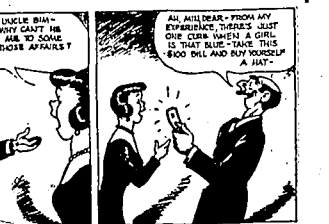
