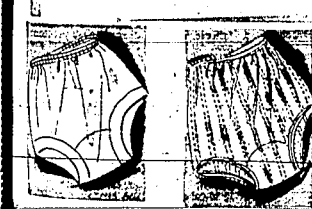

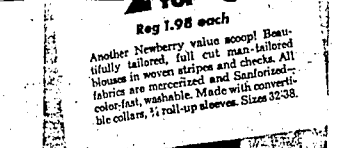

**PALO ALTO, Calif., Jan. 15**—(AP)—Utah's football coach, Jack Curtice, will be appointed Stanford coach on Thursday with a three-year contract at \$15,000 per year, a source close to the school said Tuesday. Curtice has been virtually the only man mentioned as possible successor to Chuck Taylor, who resigned at the end of the 1957 season to become assistant athletic director. At Salt Lake City, Curtice said he might decide on his future by Friday.

"If I do have an announcement it will probably be made out there," Curtice said. "You mean at Stanford?" he was asked.

"Yes," the coach replied. "Stronger indication came Tuesday when it was announced the school's athletic council will meet Wednesday at Stanford to discuss the appointment of a new coach."

The board of trustees, the group having the final say in the matter, will meet in San Francisco Tuesday night. Moving up the day of the athletic council meeting gives Curtice the opportunity of making a recommendation prior to the trustees session.

Athletic director Al Masters, who submits recommendations to the council, is ill but his report is ready for submission.

Under Stanford procedures, a recommendation made by the athletic council at intermediate and that goes to school president, Dr. J. E. Hughes. He, in turn, presents it to the trustees.

The source said an understanding was reached at the NCAA meeting in Philadelphia for Curtice to get a three-year contract and bring in either two or three assistant coaches.
