Two Cities Cited For Fire Safety

BOSTON, Jan. 23—Phoenix, Ariz., and Ottawa, Ont., were cited today for having conducted the most outstanding municipal fire prevention programs in North America last year.

Fire returns for the year July 1, 1957, to June 30, 1958, were due Jan. 31, to include all vehicles in the United States.

In any following month that additional trucks are put to use, the tax on the truck-tractors is determined according to the empty weight and the number of axles.

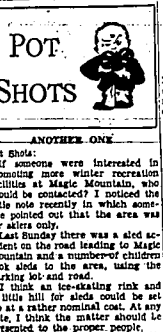

Doctor Notes Same Tensions For Solons and Businessmen

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23—The aptly attending physician said today he doubts lawmakers would be any looser if they all resigned from congress and became business executives. "The tensions would be about the same," observed 70-year-old Dr. George Calver who has been doctoring congressional ailments for 39 years. "Anyone who holds a responsible executive position—whether it's in a business firm, a government agency, or here in congress—is bound to be under pressure," he said. "Worries and responsibilities put a drain on any man." Calver spoke in an interview about mounting concern among members of congress over the recent high congressional mortality rate. In the capitol corridors and classrooms it was a major topic of conversation. The lawmakers confessed they were badly shaken by the sudden death yesterday of 48-year-old Lawrence H. Smith, R. Wis. Smith was sitting down to lunch at the House restaurant. A number of his colleagues said they did not realize Smith was the fourth member of congress to die in the last 11 days and the sixth since Nov. 10. Members took note of those ailments in eulogizing Smith on the House floor yesterday afternoon. Rep. Robert Hale, R. Me., said

(that in his 15 years here he couldn't remember a time "when death had so frequently visited the house." Rep. Charles B. Hoeven, R. Ia., said "the terrific strain on members is taking its toll." He advised his colleagues to "slow down before it's too late." But the tempo of congressional activity will be stepped up rather than slowed down in the months ahead. The legislative machinery, as usual, has been moving slowly in the two weeks since congress convened. Members anticipate a long and grueling session. "There is no doubt, Calver said, that this year they will be under greater strain and pressure" than last year. That is because this is an election year and in addition there is greater concern now than last year over the international situation, he said. In an election year, Calver said, members always do more worrying because they must go through election campaigns if they want to hold their jobs. All the house seats and one-third of the senate seats are up for election in November. Probably the most widely ignored prescription of the medical advice Calver hands lawmakers is: "Accept inevitables—don't worry." West Germany's Leader Makes Initial Bid for Parley With Russia on Peace

By United Press
CHANNING, Jan. 23.—Adenauer has made the first definite allied move toward opening secret talks with Russia in a peace treaty.

In a letter to Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin, the 63-year-old West German leader offered to turn the "German-Russian-German trade negotiations in Moscow into talks on East-West issues.

Adenauer, however, said he was prepared to agree to "any other promising point of departure" to try to eliminate Russian-German tensions.

But he added, that he was ready to take up the whole range of disarmament and security issues, with which all allied governments are concerned.

A few days ago, it looked as if the United States might make the move through Llewellyn B. Thompson, Jr., its ambassador in Moscow, who is attending the Moscow conference with President Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

It seems certain, however, that Adenauer made the offer in agreement with the United States and other members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

President Eisenhower, in his letter of Jan. 12 to Bulganin, said that secret diplomatic negotiations should precede any formal East-West talks by foreign ministers or heads of government.

However, the President's comment was made in general terms. Adenauer's proposal was specific. He urged Bulganin directly to agree to start the talks going.

London dispatches quote communists as saying that the Soviet government still insists on the "summit" meeting. Not only that, but the Kremlin is represented as wanting to hold a jambo conference which would include all heads of state and principal leaders.

It is obvious that the Russians hope that by such a conference they can bring sufficient pressure on the United States, Great Britain, France and Western Germany to agree to such a conference.

But if there are two men in the whole diplomatic world who are not to be swayed by such propaganda and such pressure, they are Adenauer and Winston Churchill.

The Soviet government certainly should precede any formal East-West talks by heads of government of countries all over the world.

But there are indications that the Kremlin may outsmart itself.

More Than \$215,660 Spent on District's Roads During 1937

More than \$215,660 was spent on roads and bridges in 1937 in the Twin Falls highway district, according to the annual report of J. D. Nelson, district engineer.

A total of \$140,701 was spent on road construction in 1937. The amount reported included \$62,335, bringing the total amount expended on roads during the year to \$203,036.

The total cost of bridge work in 1937 was \$12,817. New construction included \$4,266 with maintenance work totaling \$8,551. The amount reported included \$4,266 with maintenance work totaling \$8,551.

The annual report classified all road work under four topics, new construction of roads and bridges and road and bridge maintenance. Also included is an inventory as of Jan. 1, 1936.

The report notes there are 844 miles of road in the district. This includes 733 miles of bituminous surfaced roads, 481 miles of gravel surfaced roads other than the highway and 229 miles of earth roads.

Projects completed during the year on the state highway include a \$67,775 bituminous road, 1.5 miles after the W-9-59 district bridge across the lowline canal. This work was done by Nelson and Smith.

A total of \$2,126 has already been spent on plans for a new construction highway 30. The underpass will be the first on a secondary road in the highway district. The project was approved in a letter dated Aug. 15, 1935, sent to Nelson by C. W. Shorl, secondary road engineer, Idaho Highway Department.

Alfrena says, "The project for improvement of the road from Rogers to Salmon dam is still in the planning stages." He notes that the district has constructed fills at the canal bridges and placed culverts.

New construction included \$4,266 worth of grading in the district. The largest item was shouldering and draining the road from Rogers to Salmon dam at a cost of \$2,379. Gravel 235 miles of earth roads during 1936. The gravel amounted to 2,925 cubic yards.

Shouldering and draining prior to placing a bituminous oil mat cost \$4,233 and required 26,240 yards of gravel. This work also required the loading and hauling of 16,699 cubic yards of dirt.

A two-inch bituminous road mat 20 feet wide was placed on 15 miles at a cost of \$10,134. This work required 10,874 cubic yards of gravel. The report notes that the average cost per mile of this project, including sprinkling, grading, gravel loading, mixing, laying and rolling was \$674.

A total of new road construction, including 1,000 feet of earth road, the city installed a plant mile bituminous surface on Harrison street and Bourne boulevard, portions of which are in the district. These two streets were seal-coated at a cost of \$1,000.

Major construction for the year consisted of placing 1,536 feet of pipe in 24 culverts. The pipe ranged in size from 12 to 36 inches. The total cost was \$8,266.

The costliest item under road maintenance was \$19,273 for sealing 13 miles at an average cost of \$1,112 a mile. Road grading for maintenance—total \$2,256. Grading was carried on the Ghoshone falls road, foothill road, Basin road, Cline creek road, Jarbridge road and the Roseworth roads, in addition to approximately 40 miles of un-named roads.

Repair of piled roads cost \$5,585, including labor, equipment rental and material.

The placing of road signs and culvert markers and the cutting of weeds at intersections cost \$131.

A total of \$6,247 was spent on bridge maintenance during the year, including \$32 to re-floor a concrete bridge east of Twin Falls, \$600 to re-floor a canal bridge southeast of Twin Falls.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Two key Democrats on the Senate agriculture committee said today there will be no chance of winning passage of a farm price support minimums.

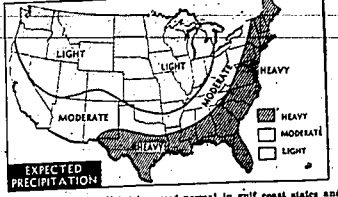

Ellender said he doubted whether more than two or three senators on the 15-member group would vote for the minimum 60 per cent level.

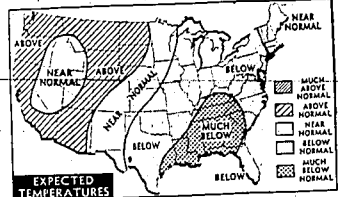
Throughout his testimony, Benson contended the bill is a slight improvement in farm income.

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Church, Military Men, Students Are Factors Leading to Venezuela Revolt

(Editor's note: Venezuela has observed the 50th anniversary of the revolution which split the net 50-50 between the military and the people. The following explanation is by the Latin American editor of United Fruit.)

The general strike and the violence in Venezuela appear to be the spontaneous yet concerted reaction of the laboring class, the Roman Catholic church, students and intellectuals to some segments of the military to a long denial of democracy.

It is a paradoxical uprising in some ways, for the magnificent oil resources, second only in production to American fields, bring the nation around \$1,500,000 a day in royalties which have gone into building roads and buildings and spurred down to a good part of the population.
