Wild Travels In Cable Car Safely Ended

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 30 (AP)—A cable car plummeted out of control down the steep Hyde street hill Tuesday night, but the passengers managed to stop it at the Aquatic park turntable before any of the 12 passengers were hurt.

The cable car reached a speed of 40 miles an hour during its wild, five-block descent. The Hyde street hill is one of the steepest in San Francisco.

Among the 12 passengers were two guests of the state department, Purnima Shastri of Delhi, India, and Vira Poomvillars of Bangkok, Thailand. It was Poomvillars' first day in the United States.

The cable car went out of control just as it began its descent past Lombard street. Gripman James C. Hutchings shouldered to the passengers to be ready to jump.

Two blocks later, the cable car hit a tailhook, breaking a front window. "The brakes wouldn't hold," Hutchings said. "We may have gone off the rails. But we were going nearly 40."

A cable car normally travels at nine miles an hour. At the bottom of the hill, the cable car careened into a right angle turn so fast that it appeared in danger of overturning. However, the turn served to slow the cable car up to the point at which Hutchings could stop it. He turned the car around at the terminal and took it back to the carsmen without incident.

Uproar Over Potato Soup Is Providing Capital Relief From World Conditions

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30 (Special)—A new controversy has broken out over a capital hill. It provides a bracket of choice of pure from the normal altitudes about world conditions. Center of the kitchen: Potato soup.

The trouble all started when Republican Rep. Carroll Kearns, who comes from the northwestern part of Pennsylvania, quietly introduced a resolution requiring that potato soup appear on all menus. His reason: "We stock a lot of potatoes in my district—about 100 million bushels a year. Now, I like to eat potato soup every day. Now, I like to eat potato soup every day. In a phone conversation with a reporter for Roll Call, newspaper of capital hill, she indignantly challenged the house chef to a cooking duel, vowing she'd fetch up a batch the way it should be done. "The match is to come off this week, amidst more fanfare."

In the meantime, a woman out of Ohio has gotten a sniff of the aroma coming from the house kitchen and has charged that Mrs. Monck's recipe actually is one her own grandmother brought over from Germany 100 years ago.

To further compound the difficulty in this area, the Baltimore Sun wrote a piece one size on Mrs. Monck's recipe. However, through a typographical error, the recipe called for seven quarts of scalded milk, instead of one. Amateur cooks in the Baltimore area are still washing a resolution requiring that potato soup appear on all menus. 4 Men Perish In Falls From High Scaffold

PORT ARTHUR, Tex., Jan. 30 (AP)—Four men were killed and seven injured when one end of a construction scaffold snapped Tuesday, hurling the men and equipment 120 feet to the ground.

The men were employees of the M. W. Kellogg Construction company. They were building a cracking unit tower for the Texas company refinery.

The workers fell from a height equal to about an 11-story building when bolts holding the 20-foot-long scaffold sheared off without any warning yesterday.

Report Shows State Reaping Liquor Profit

BOISE, Jan. 30.—Profits of nearly \$14,000,000 have been made from the sale of liquor in Idaho during the past four years, according to figures released by the Idaho liquor dispensary.

A report by Fred Charlton, dispensary superintendent, shows that for the years 1948, '49, '50 and '51, profits from the sale of liquor were never less than \$5 million dollars a year and totaled \$14,000,000.

During the same period, he said, 1948-1951, sales in 1951 and 1952 climbed slowly above \$11 million dollars total, but sales in 1953 and 1954 were above \$12 million dollars.

Inventory totals listed by the report show a decrease from a \$1,420,528.50 total in 1954 to a \$1,750,152.63 total in 1957. Inventory totals for the four years were \$1,420,528.50.

From January, 1954, to Dec. 31, 1957, allocations of earnings paid to all towns, counties, junior colleges and the general fund totaled \$12,792,720.18 according to Charlton. Of this, \$120,000 was earned in the latter part of 1954 and a total of 1 million dollars were paid out at this time was earned in 1957, the report shows.

Charlton says, "It should be noted that the inventories in this report show approximately 50 per cent decrease, which means the difference was paid to counties, cities, junior colleges and the general fund in the state of Idaho."

She protested she did not want to lose the children when told they had been turned over to county authorities.

Rotarians Are Asked to Join In Discussion

Twin Falls Rotarians were urged Wednesday to join local foreign policy discussion group and listen to a talk and saw a film on transmission of pictures and sound by micro-wave.

Dr. Gordon Oldham said an understanding of the United States foreign policy is one of the obligations of citizenship. He urged Rotarians to form groups of from 8 to 14 people to continue a program started in Idaho two years ago.

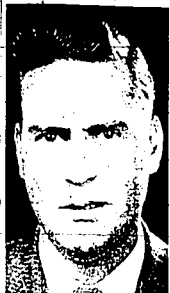
Besides the four covered wagons there were 14 horses and mules, a cut a dog and a pickup truck used to haul supplies.

Mortgage Burning Ceremony Climaxes Years of Struggle

SHOSHONE, Jan. 30.—With the burning of the mortgage at the Shoshone Assembly of God church recently, a dream of many years was realized.

Beginning with the purchase of three city lots in Shoshone in 1949, the Rev. Mr. Shackle began what they called "the gospel work which is known as the Shoshone Assembly of God church."

The Rev. Mr. Shackle became the pastor, making his home in the residence on the lots purchased. Overall cost of the lot and house was \$4,000 with \$2,000 given as down payment. The purchase was made from Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Butterfield of Shoshone.

The Rev. Mr. Shackle was pastoring a thriving church in Jerome at the time of the start at Shoshone and has been noted for his call to pioneer in church service since that time. He and Mrs. Shackle had previous experience in establishing churches in Colorado and their call to Shoshone was as "home mission workers under jurisdiction of the district."
