### 100,000 Held In Red China

HONG KONG, Feb. 7 (AP)—Lo Jui-chung, minister of public security in Communist China, has carried out another widespread purge of "rightists" in which more than 100,000 persons were arrested, it was disclosed today.

An official Communist magazine reaching Hong Kong from Peking showed the Chinese communist "butcher" had questioned more than two million persons in the latest security check and discovered rightist tendencies among more than 8,000 Communist party members.

It quoted Lo as saying "this campaign proved that all of our various fronts and nearly all of our work departments had been penetrated by counter-revolutionaries or wicked elements."

"Not a few of them had stolen into our inner bastion and some indeed had worked their way into our inner circles and snared important party and administrative posts," Lo said.

Lo sometimes known as "China's hangman," said at least 269 of these persons were found to have held important party or government jobs above the county level and more than 200 worked in the Peking government itself.

Five Indicted

CAIRO, Feb. 7 (AP)—Five persons were indicted today by the Egyptian government today on charges of plotting to assassinate President Gamal Abdel Nasser and restore the monarchy to Egypt.

The accused included Ahmed Attouza, former interior minister under ex-King Farouk, another Egyptian, two Lebanese and a Turk. All are living abroad. They were alleged to have infiltrated the armed forces and formed groups to carry out the plot. Maximum penalty for conviction is life in hard labor.

### Grange Chief Raps Farmers In Complaints

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—Herschel D. Newsum, thinker-farmer of the National Grange, thinks farmers should do less shouting about their troubles.

Butler, he says, more efforts should be spent on eliminating "bad truths and distortions" about food and farm prices and farm-aid programs from public thinking.

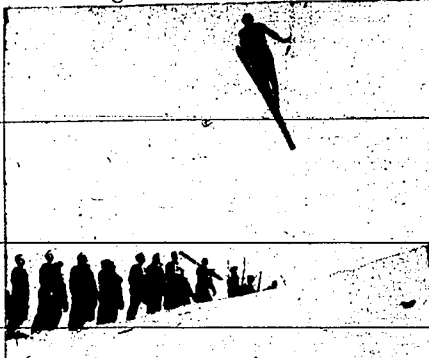
