New Torpedo Reported for Ships of U. S.

PASADENA, Calif., Feb. 10 (AP)—A new type of revolutionary new anti-submarine weapon built as America's answer to Russia's formidable submarine fleet.

It is the rocket-actuated torpedo known as the "Widgeon," which is a small, bullet-shaped missile and torpedo capable of killing an enemy ship at a distance of more than 100 yards. It is driven by a diesel engine, and is controlled by a radio transmitter.

Although the exact range of the new "Widgeon" is not known, sources said it is considerably more accurate than the torpedoes used by the U. S. Navy. It is expected to be ready for use by the end of the year.

Senator Church indicated that the study would be conducted by the Interior Secretary, Fred A. "If the investigation should disclose that the dam is a high, multipurpose dam," Church said, "the Pleasant Valley site would be preferred."

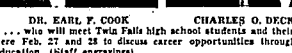

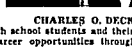

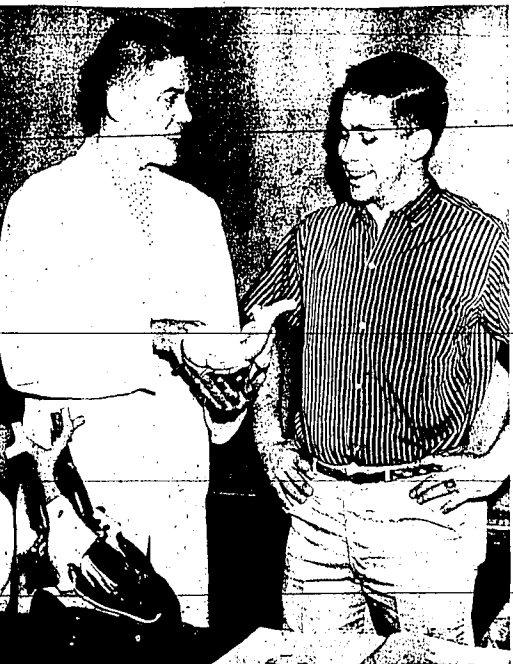

Auto Finance Firms Eyeing '58 Prospects

DETROIT, Feb. 10.—Predictions of a nearly \$3 billion increase in 1958 have aroused the men in the auto finance business.

They think there are 11 to 12 million prospective buyers for 1958 cars and a lot of them should be picked off the tree.

The auto finance people say employment, consumer income and personal savings just aren't in such bad shape that more than half of these potential buyers should opt out to rattle around in cars 4 to 6 years old.

They are even more convinced now that the Eisenhower administration has loosened the strings on the money used by making it easier to borrow money at lower interest rates.

The big auto finance companies already have cranked up their rates charged dealers for floor planing or stocking new cars. Early this month the floor planing interest dropped from 5 to 4 1/2 per cent to 4 1/2 to 5 per cent.

The finance companies haven't lowered their interest rates to customers yet. With even new cars sold even per cent, interest on this is expected within the next few months.

Who are these 11 to 12 million prospects for new cars? Five million are people who bought cars in the record sales year of 1955 and have paid off their finance contracts. About two million more 1955 buyers will finish paying for their cars this year.

Another two million are those who paid cash in 1955-56 and will have other two million 1956 buyers have paid off enough on their cars to have a down payment or better on a 1958 model.

Arthur O. Dietz, head of universal CTR corporation, one of the major auto financing firms, points out that "a 1-million-dollar investment in the new customer program will be a real money-maker."

"Since people have enough money and credit, we are dealing with what people have in their minds, not what they have in their pocketbooks or bank accounts," Dietz told the auto dealers recently.

"Gatling Gun" Arm Reported In U.S. Plane

PORT WORTH, Tex., Feb. 10 (Special) — The B-58, the air force's newest supersonic version of the Gatling gun, was officially fired 1,000 rounds today.

The B-58, which has indicated, flies early at about 1,500 miles an hour. It can fly faster, but probably would melt from air friction if allowed to. The gun is mounted in the tail of the plane in a special compartment.

August C. Ezenwein, vice president of the Gatling gun, makes the plane at Fort Worth, said engineers are working on a problem in trying to find a gun that would shoot 7,000 rounds a minute.

They turned to the multi-barreled gun which R. J. Gatling developed in 1861 and which was first used in the Civil War.

"Gatling got pretty close with his gun," Ezenwein said. "We just improved the feeding mechanism and substituted a motor for the hand crank."

When one barrel of the Gatling gun on the B-58 is firing, another is discharging a live casing, another is being fed from the magazine.

The barrel rotates so fast that it takes "several" degrees of rotation for a shell to clear the length of the barrel.

The Army's small arms research and development section borrowed the Gatling gun and mounted it on a few years ago and got it to fire 5,000 shots a minute by substituting an electric motor for the hand crank.

General Electric developed the gun to the point it can fire 7,000 rounds a minute.

After getting the gun, engineers conducted tests in a super-sonic tunnel, a bubble-type turret caused drag, and a bubble-type turret caused work, but if it turned away from the center it would act as a rudder and with the function and work.

Finally an engineer remembered how an old-fashioned driving crank connected in the Gatling gun.

Engineers at the Emerson Electric Manufacturing company designed a control turret of sectional springs-operated plates to mount the gun in.
