FCC Official Under Fire In Probe Asks for Okay To Clear Self in 'Payoff'

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP)—Richard A. Mack told congressional investigators today he is confident that once they get the facts they will conclude that accusations against him "are without foundation." He asked an early opportunity to testify. Mack described charges that he had taken money and used his vote as a federal communications commissioner in connection with the Miami, Fla., transmitter "tampered with" charges, accusations in a letter to Chairman Harris, D. Ark., of a house committee investigating the FCC, Mack said that he had no recollection of the justice department that he would cooperate in every way possible with an FBI investigation.

Four Drunk Driving Cases Head 'Parade'

Four cases of drunken driving headed the parade of traffic violations in Magic Valley courts Friday. The fourth and possibly worst wave of cold weather to be experienced in the Magic Valley covered northern Florida today and fresh snows plagued the west, the Centers Lakes and the Northwest. However, the first break in the marathon cold wave across the Magic Valley occurred today as temperatures rose to 40 degrees in parts of the Mississippi valley.

Fish Protection Plan Is Reported for Dam

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP)—The power commission yesterday prescribed fish protection facilities for the Snake and Oxbow hydroelectric dams in the Hells canyon region of the Snake river, the dams are being built in the Idaho-Oregon stretch of the river by Idaho Power company, which submitted general plans for the fish facilities. The commission also stated that the functional design of a foreign net barrier with fish skimming and trapping devices at Brownlee for downstream migrants and upstream facilities at Oxbow. There would also be a suitable means for fish passage at the dam.

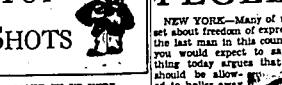

Von Braun Is Man of Hour For Germans

FRANKFURT, Germany, Feb. 14 (AP)—The German people are celebrating the man of 1958. It was the name of their living space which they are celebrating.

Facing at the sky for a glimpse of the stars and the planets, West Germans whispering radio voice, West Germans recall that both are the man of the year—V-2 which sliced the edge of space before falling to England.

Only hours after the American satellite was in orbit, beehive was telling the story of outer space, and Explorer meeting in outer space, and then inquiring:

"Sprechen Sie Deutsch?"

Speechless pride is about the only consolation for scientists who would love to be back in doubt they would have to be back in space-plate, moon-exploration business. It is the sense of scientific achievement at which this nation has always excelled.

There are thousands of enthusiastic and not a few of government funds for rocket research.

So far, the emphasis is on the space-plate, moon-exploration and the part played by hundreds of German technicians divided up between the two at war's end.

Research forces collected about 150 of Penemunde's top rocket scientists as Germany collapsed in the spring of 1945. Russians rounded up about 100 technicians and assistants. Most of those who went to the United States have remained there and 103 have become citizens, eventually allowed to return.

The last returned home only this week. The absence of scientists and a 10-year ban imposed by occupation authorities on any type of rocket research has left the country which started the race to space before the rest of the world.

There are numerous rocket societies but they have little money and no equipment. They are in competition that public policy will change and funds will be available.

Law Requiring Brakes on Trailers to Be Under Attack in Next Legislature

A state law requiring brakes on all trailers and semi-trailers of 3,000 gross weight or more will be under attack during the 1959 session of the Idaho state legislature.

The law, contained in section 49-232 of the Idaho code, has been "on the books" since 1923 when it was enacted. It was amended during the 1955 session of the legislature.

Opposition to the law has been expressed in the past weeks by members of southern Idaho Granges and Farm Bureaus. Attention was drawn to the law by a news release from the fourth district office of the state highway patrol.

Although the law has been in effect since 1923 it has been enforced only in recent weeks.

Enforcement of the law has brought a wave of protest from farmers who claim the law is unfair and creates undue hardships on the farmer operating on a small scale.

Harold Soper, manager of Soper's Trailer and Trailer Rental, said he would like to see the law repealed. "As far as this law applies to the average small farm trailer it should be brushed from the books," he said.

Floyd Lincoln, chairman of Twin Falls County Farm Bureau, said, "The Farm Bureau in this county will institute and support a move to have the law amended during the next session of the state legislature."

Lincoln appreciates the intent of the law, which is one of safety. "I believe the gross weight should be reduced from 3,000 to 5,000 pounds so the average farmer can do his work where a trailer is needed without going to a large trailer dealer," he said.

Lincoln pointed out that the use of safety chains in addition to the usual trailer hitch provides a great amount of safety factor. "While some drivers are afraid of a safety chain, if they will use two crossed chains on their trailer they will find there is no danger of away in event the hitch comes loose."

Pilot Praised In Landing of Airline Plane

PALEM SPRINGS, Calif., Feb. 14 (AP)—Pilot H. B. Schumaker was praised today for a "brilliant" fine job in landing a two-engine Western Air Lines plane which exploded shortly after the 21 persons aboard escaped in a rock-strewn desert wash.

The veteran pilot battled 40 to 50-mile-an-hour crosswinds to set the silver-painted Convair down in a dry wash yesterday afternoon five miles north of here.

The plane landed seconds after takeoff from the Palm Springs airport on a flight to San Diego, Calif. Witnesses said the craft began to shudder "a few hundred feet" in the air.

Five of the 18 passengers aboard the plane were injured but all escaped with their lives. They fled from the doomed plane less than a minute after it had landed bumpy 100 yards along the lighter-strewn wash and stopped.

Shortly after, Edward O. Brown, Granger, 24, Venter, 30, V. had guided everyone out of the plane and Schumaker, Newport Beach, Calif., and his co-pilot, James Level, Los Angeles, escaped. The Convair caught fire and exploded.

This pilot did one part of a first job of putting the ship down in the "rugged area," Chief of Police August Kretzman said. He was one of the first to reach the scene in the Granger area, one mile south of U. S. Highway 90.

The injured were hospitalized at a Desert hospital.

Better care for potatoes will be the theme at the ninth annual Northwest Perishable Loss Prevention meeting scheduled to begin at 8:30 a.m. next Thursday at the Legion hall here. The object of this course is to bring information to growers, shippers and dealers in order that losses connected with potato handling may be reduced. Duane Letourneau, county agent for potatoes from many parts of the country will take part in the annual course. The program is sponsored by the University of Idaho, Oregon State College, Washington State College and the American Highway Development association. The course begins at Idaho Falls Thursday. On Wednesday the participants will tour potato storage and processing plants in the Idaho Falls area. Speakers include Ora Smith of Cornell university, director of research for the National Potato Chip Institute, who will discuss the storage of potatoes for processing. Skell E. Riton, a representative of the railroads from Pennsylvania, will discuss pallet handling of potatoes. Will M. Simmons, an agriculture marketing service economist from Washington, D. C., will talk about packaging for the retail trade. Other speakers include Walter Sparks, horticulturist at the Aberdeen, Wash.—seaweed; Edmond Richard Ohms, Boise, potato specialist of the extension service; Carl Hensel of the water research laboratory, Albany, Calif.; Duane Letourneau, agricultural chemist, Moscow, and V. T. Jensen, district

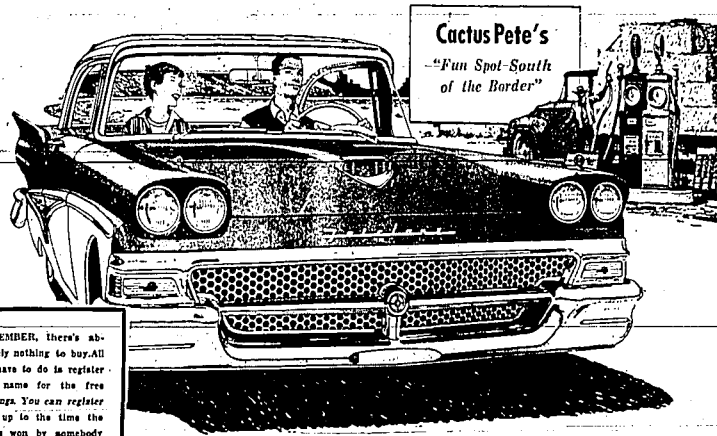

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 14 (AP)—"Agriculture must not be sacrificed on the political auction block," Secretary of Agriculture Benson indicated Wednesday night his agency and the administration are not about to bow under the hail of criticism falling on his farm program.

He held a Lincoln day dinner of some 1,000 Utah Republicans.

"Agriculture is neither Republican nor Democratic—it is American," Benson, a native of Salt Lake and an official of the LDS church, defended the administration in partisan terms. He then issued what he termed "anti-fiction" statements in defense of his own department and its program.

Cites "Basic Conventions"—"Adherence to principle, even in the face of severe criticism, is a basic convention of this administration," he declared.

"While some international problems remain unsolved, we must always remember the vast difference between a shooting war and shooting satellites."

In his "anti-fiction" report, Benson said it is untrue that his department has ever proposed the abolition of price supports. He added that what is wrong with agriculture today is that attempts have been made to supply price support and acreage control by rigid formula, and "farms and ranches of America cannot be run from a desk in Washington, D. C."

"Not True," Benson Says—The secretary said it is not true that higher farm incomes have been due to rigid price supports; or that high support can hold up farm income; or that the support program helps small farmers since more than half the nation's farms market only 9 per cent of the agriculture production.

He said he believes in good farm prices, good wages and just profits, but there is no "question that farm prices today are out of line with profits and wages."

"It is not for me to say what labor or industry should do, but as a spokesman for agriculture, I will say that I am deeply disturbed by any action which adds one penny to the production costs of farmers at this time," Benson said.

Order Signed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP)—An order has been signed by the Almatamated Sugar company, Ogden, Utah, prohibiting it from discriminating among its customers in the price of sugar.

The signing was announced yesterday by the federal trade commission as an outgrowth of a complaint it had filed in April, 1937, it charged. Almatamated had cut prices to its Utah customers from 15 to 50 cents per hundredweight.

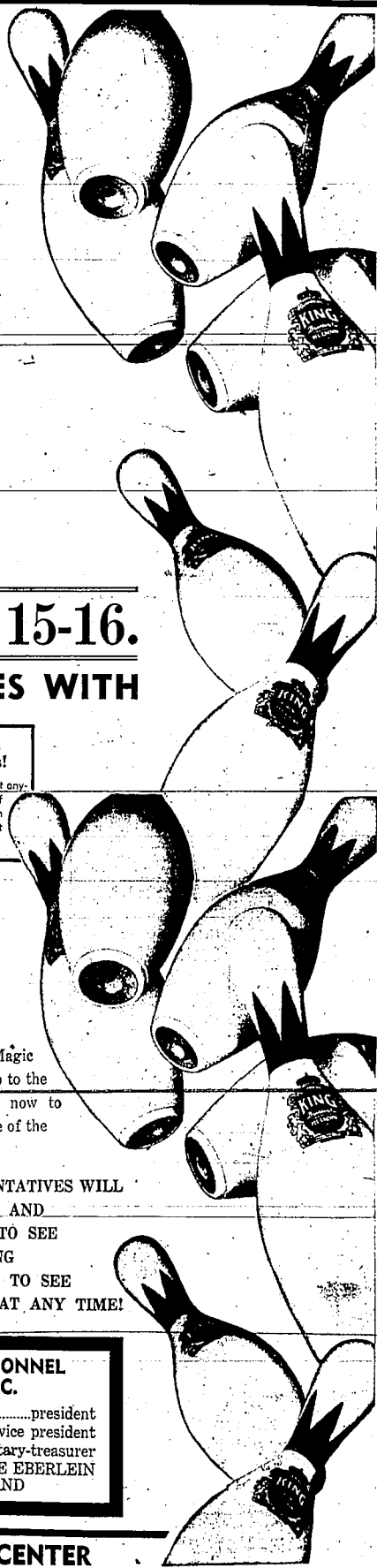
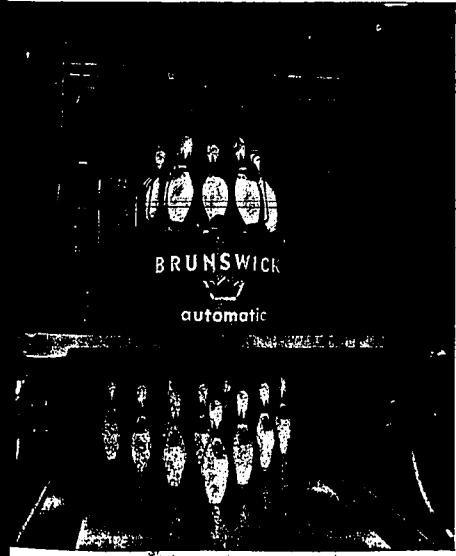

Move to Balk Recession Set By Democrats

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP)—Senate Democrats are drafting a 10-point anti-recession program which party leaders plan to give a speedy start through congress.

The program is being put together by individual committees under the guidance of the Democratic policy committee headed by Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas. It will represent the party's answer to demands that congress act before the business slump gets worse.

Johnson is understood to have told his colleagues that while he is opposed to a "gloom and doom" attitude, he thinks immediate steps must be taken to combat unemployment, which now has reached 4 1/2 millions.

He has asked the committee to come up speedily with legislative proposals to enter a wide field of government activity to bolster the economy.

As Johnson views the program, it would shape up like this:

1. A comprehensive housing bill aimed at getting this limping industry's score bill on its feet.
2. Legislation to permit federal reserve banks to make loans to small business which certify they can't get credit in ordinary channels.
3. Passage of a postoffice construction bill.
4. Authorizations to put on extra shifts of workers on public works projects for which congress has provided the money.
5. Construction of military housing in areas with short spots of unemployment.
6. Action to start and speed up with extra shifts work on reclamation projects which have been authorized by congress.
7. Repeal of the pay-as-you-go provision so the interstate highway program can be speeded up.
8. Authorization for additional hospitals to be built under the Hill-Burton act.
9. Action to authorize the planning of new projects aimed at providing more business for basic industries.
10. A works progress administration program to be thrown into the breach if other efforts fail to stem the recession.

President Eisenhower expressed confidence that the economic downturn has about run its course and that March should see a steady upward trend.

Some senators made it clear they are not as optimistic as the President.

Senator Mansfield, D. Mont., said in an interview he hopes Eisenhower is correct in his forecast "but I have grave doubts that he is."

Republican officials in Lincoln say speeches around the nation, expressed confidence the economy is near its recession trough.

In Brooklyn, Secretary of Commerce Weeks said the Democrats support a "gloom and doom" program to "sell America short."

He accused the Republicans of "slugging back" and try to "pull every reckless charge."

Aims Are Listed In Farm Bureau

HAZLETON, Feb. 14—Farm Bureau principles were outlined as "a high net income, a sound dollar, world peace, a fair share of the consumer's dollar and freedom from fear" by Nile Taylor, Twin Falls, field representative.

Taylor spoke before 80 members Monday night at the Frontier Grange Hall. Clark McClain was acting chairman and introduced Taylor who said the bureau also believes in 90 per cent of parity for basic crops based on modern farming. He urged everyone to continue to write senators.

Gordon Walker, Pocatello, state director, talked on fertilizer, point-to-point and other issues discussed last year and that over 48,000 returned to members as dividends.

Ralph Kohls, Edward Smith and W. H. Blesener were named nominating committee. Election is slated for March 10.

The meeting adjourned for refreshments served by Phillip Cochran and Ralph Kohls.

Firm Giving Scholarships For Teacher

Twin Falls high school seniors planning to prepare for the teaching profession are eligible to apply for \$500 scholarships from Consolidated Freightways, Inc., the company announces through M. C. Carr, Twin Falls manager.

"The Chinese government and people fully support these timely, important proposals and are ready to make active efforts for their realization."

A Peiping broadcast said Chou was accompanied by Marshal Chen Yi, who—replied—Kim's plan to administer a few days ago and other top communist officials.

State's Output Of Milk Goes To New Highs

BOISE, Feb. 14 (AP)—A new record for January milk production has been established for Idaho, the U. S. agriculture department reported today.

It said that Idaho's cows produced 113 million pounds of milk during January. This was three million pounds greater than in January, 1952, and 21 million pounds higher than the 10-year January average for the base period 1947-52. The department did not milk production as one of the bright spots in a general favorable agricultural production picture for January.

"This year's January production per cow is at a record-breaking level, which reflects not only generous feeding of grains and roughage," the department said, "but also improved management practices generally."

The report said the mild weather in January was favorable for the wintering of livestock with hay and feed grain supplies in abundant quantities. It added that the condition of fall grains was good. However, it said, a relatively light snow cover makes the crop more vulnerable to winter kill.

"Lambing from both farm and range flocks is now well under way with death losses apparently small," the report continued. "Some early lambing has started and has been favored by mild winter weather."

January egg production was given as 27 million eggs, unchanged from last year but two million higher than the average 1947-1952 January output.

He was the most beloved American humorist of this century... the homespun philosopher whose warmth and wit had made him a permanent place in America's heart. He was a star of the radio, a screen, and a newspaper columnist, who had read by millions. His name—Will Rogers.

Yardley Is Pro's High Scorer and Top Man in Missile Research Race

DETROIT, Feb. 14 (AP)—George (the Bird) Yardley spends half the year scoring points for the Detroit Pistons and the other half helping the nation in the missiles race. The 29-year-old former Stanford great is currently the top scorer in the National Basketball association and has a good chance to become the first player in the history of the association to score 2,000 points in a single season. When he quits making field goals and free throws for the Pistons this spring, he'll head for Anaheim, Calif., to resume research work on the Titan and Atlas missiles for the Robert Shaw-Fulton company.

Yardley admits the combination of basketball player, aeronautical engineer is an uncommon one, but he likes both and is grateful for the opportunity to play for the Pistons and work on the missiles program.

"The ultimate goal of any college graduate is to get into the type of work he likes," the balding Yardley said. "I know my future lies in engineering and my boss has been very good to me by letting me play basketball six months a year."

George, who stands six feet, five inches, plans to retire from basketball after one more year. That's his last season for the Pistons.

"This is Yardley's fifth year in the association and it has been his best by far. He averages better than 27 points a game and, barring injury, should give the Pistons their first NBA scoring champion in history."

The highest previous average posted by Yardley was 21.5 points a game during the 1936-37 season. Yardley is modest about his scoring success. In a recent game, George poured in 53 points—the highest total by any player in the association this season.

"I feel guilty about all those points," he said. "Those other four guys out there did most of the work."

But Yardley's modesty isn't borne out by the records. He ranks second on the team in rebounding, a key defensive ability. Yardley, who is with the pro basketball season entering the stretch drive, Yardley is going to get back to his work on missiles.

But he'd like to lead the Pistons to the NBA playoff first. Yardley's daughter of Michigan State will coach the East. Assistant West coaches will be Len Casanova, Oregon, and Bill Meek, Southern Methodist.
