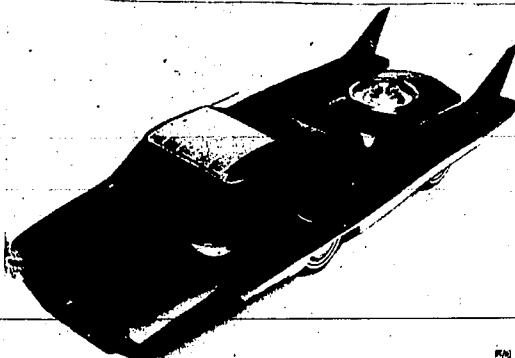
Charles Hendricks, chairman of the agricultural committee, reported on the annual federal tour.

### Ike Message, Senate Report Pinpoint Major Issues of U. S. Farm Policies

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Two documents laid before the present session of congress have done much to pinpoint the major issues of the farm program controversy over government farm policies.

One was a special message on agriculture sent to congress a month ago. The other was a report of the subcommittee on agricultural policy of the senate-house economic committee, issued public last week.

Both agreed on one point: that agricultural income is not a technological upsurge in production and so will not be adjusted to its output to its market.

But the issue is drawn on the point of who is to do the adjusting, agriculture or government.

All the talk of merger allotments, marketing quotas, commodity payments, food stamp plans, surpluses, export subsidies and soil bank and retirement programs is nothing more than a side issue from the question of who is to take the lead and responsibility for adjusting agriculture.

The Eisenhower administration says in effect, it is about time for government to step aside and allow farmers themselves to do this job.

### Ouster Result Of '2 Words,' Student Avers

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Feb. 18.—"For just two words, they kicked me out," said the 16-year-old Negro girl as she sat looking at a framed Americanization award presented to her by a veteran organization.

Minnie Jean Brown had just been expelled from Central high school, which she and eight other Negro students integrated last fall under federal paratrooper protection last fall.

Minnie was expelled yesterday by the Central high school board for "relating" to harassment of other students. Her relation—the two words to which she referred—was calling two white students "white trash" and bringing on two more racial incidents.

The Negro girl had been involved in five racial incidents since she first entered the school last fall.

"It just got to the point where I couldn't stand it anymore," she said. "Once you imagine having the school allow while students to do or say anything they want to, then you can't be able to raise your voice to them."

What are some of these things the white students have done, she was asked.

"For about a week there," she said "certain students would walk until I came into the classroom, then yell like it was a pep rally. There comes that whole thing about Brown," then everybody at a signal would hiss.

"And any of the other Negro students will tell you they've been called some mighty low things."

"The Negro girl said she thought it would have been better if the school board had allowed 25 or 30 of us, at least," to integrate the school, rather than just nine.

"We wouldn't have felt so self-conscious and it would have worked out better," she said. "As it is, there is only one class in the whole school that has more than one Negro student in it."

What will she do now that she has been permanently expelled from school?

"Mr. Blossom suggested I take correspondence courses then reapply next fall," she said. "You hear a lot of folks say they don't think the Negroes will be back at Central next fall, but I think they're wrong. If they are, I'll try to be with them."

### Gloom Shown For Business During Month

NEW YORK, Feb. 18 (AP)—New state of unpleasant statistics and a falling trend in many business barometers is adding gloom to the general February dreariness.

Businessmen take what comfort they can from the knowledge that February often is the low month—with better days usually lying ahead.

Barometers that businessmen watch are falling for some time—and are now far below the normal of shipments of tools ordered months ago.

**Paper Output Watched**  
Output of paper and paper board was watched because they sell how much factories are shipping and how much they expect to ship.

The American Paper and Pulp Association reports production off from a year ago and the industry profits averaging about 18 per cent lower than in 1956.

Its members gathered here for their annual convention say demand hasn't picked up yet. But improvement by fall—as expected in the Whiting survey—let them go strong again.

New factory orders in general are on the skinnier side and purchasing agents are ordering only a short distance ahead. They haven't sloughed a turn in the weather yet.

Check inventories.  
Inventories in general are always watched as a barometer of future business. Statistics pointing backward—show that they were all high enough last month for many, if not most, business firms to fire off them.

When business reverses itself and starts ordering to rebuild inventories, it will be one of the best indications that the lull is coming.

**Latest Figures on Industrial Output**  
Show in at its lowest point since February 1955—that month again. Cut back most were the schedules in factories making durable goods.

There, too, were the greatest number of layoffs.

Stores form one of the better barometers. Some retailers think orders should pick up in March, but whether more than just the usual gain from dreary February they don't venture to guess.

**Retail Trade Shows Buying**  
Consumer buying habits show up in the statistics of retail trade. But they also reveal themselves in the trend of installment buying. Latest reports show the rate of repayment of installment loans growing apace, while the rate of new installment buying has slowed almost to a walk.

This particularly disturbs the auto industry which has come to be looked upon as a prime barometer in itself. Auto making now dominates much business thinking. When Detroit has a good year everyone feels better. When car sales slump, most folk feel as dreary as the weather.

### Expert Warns Nation on New Red Advances

CHICAGO, Feb. 18 (AP)—Dr. Werner von Braun, chief of army rocket experts, warned last night that within a "few years" Russian scientists could put a satellite equipped to relay television reports on military movements.

As it made its circuit around the world, it could report on construction and on naval and air force operations, von Braun told the fourth National Military-Industrial Conference.

The director of the army ballistics missile agency which launched the U. S. satellite Explorer said at a news conference earlier that the United States could strike a decisive target in Russia with a nuclear missile very soon.

And vice-versa, he cautioned, making it clear Russia was in very much "the same position" as the United States.

Such action, however, would do neither country any good in the event of war, von Braun said.

"What really is needed," he said, "is a reliable quantity production and training. This means U.S."

President Eisenhower's "open skies" proposal for international disarmament has been rendered a source of "academic" problems, since a fact-reporting world-encircling satellite is imminent, he said.

von Braun reminded his listeners there was no use pretending German brains were responsible for Russia's beating the United States in putting a satellite aloft. Russian scientists did it on their own, he said, and their achievements are considerable.

### U. S. Leasing Hands States Record Fund

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 (AP)—Secretary of Interior Fred A. Seaton announced today 22 states and Alaska received a record of \$10,256,488.86 as their share of \$11,577,887.32 in bonuses, royalties and rentals from mineral leases on federal lands within their boundaries during the last half of 1957.

The distribution brought to \$27,216,676.68 the total payments made to the states and Alaska from royalties received during calendar year 1957.

Leases leased under administration of the Bureau of Land Management include public lands, acquired lands and certain privately owned lands containing mineral rights, leased to the federal government. The minerals leased are oil, gas, potash, sodium, sulphur, coal and phosphates.

Wyoming received the largest individual check—\$5,027,775. This was followed by New Mexico, which got \$2,715,519.46; Colorado, \$2,072,000.84; and California, \$1,748,173.14. Alaska got \$1,342,903.76.

### List Gas Plan

The Delta Tank Manufacturing Company, Inc., said its device demonstrated its ability to "squeeze out" raw gasoline in tests conducted recently in Texas.

### Idaho Spud Stock Falls Under 1957

BOISE, Feb. 18 (AP)—The estimated total grower and dealer stocks of all potatoes in Idaho Feb. 1 is 500,000 hundredweight below that of a year ago, the U. S. department of agriculture reported today.

The department said it was estimated that total potato stocks at the first of this month was 15,500,000 hundredweight, which compares with 16 million at the same time a year ago.

However, the USDA said, the amount was above the 1956-57 average of 12,000,000 hundredweight.

The department said the total potato estimate embodied all potatoes to be sold for table use, processing, feed and seed as well as quantities to be used on farms where grown for feed, seed and household use. It also includes potatoes that will be lost through shrinkage, decay and dumping after Feb. 1, the USDA added.

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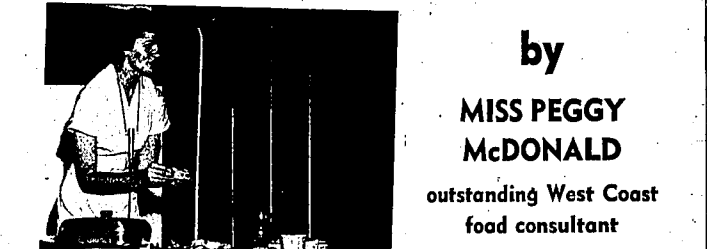
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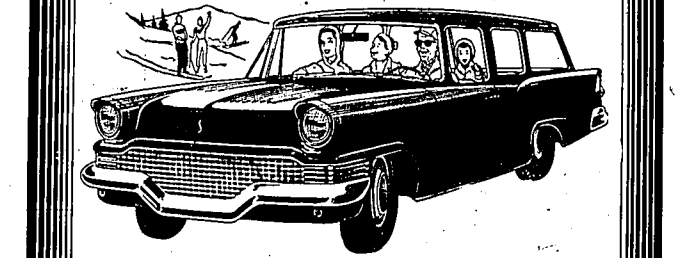

NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—Pollitzer publisher of the "Morning Freiheit" of the Greenville, Miss., Delta Democrat-Times, warned yesterday that a mass exodus of people from the South poses a serious threat to the social and economic structure of the region.

"The few job, drug farms, and low-paying industries have prompted more than a million people to leave the South from 1935 to 1936," Carter wrote in the current issue of "Look" magazine.

Carter called "unrealistic" statements by southern spokesmen that industrialization is compensating for a decline in farming and agricultural employment in the southern states.

"These assumptions and the optimism they engender are an unrealistic idea as the old southern dream of a dollar-a-pound cotton," Carter said.

Arkansas has been hardest hit by emigration, Carter said. Just state, he said, has lost more than 350,000 people; Mississippi, 210,000; Alabama, 285,000 and Kentucky, 231,000. He added that 60 per cent of those leaving are white.

"More alarming than their number is the caliber of white emigrants," Carter said. "They are largely in the productive age group from 18 to 35 years of age, and, on the whole, better educated than the average of those who stay at home."
