Voters Approve Additional 2-Mill Tax Levy to Set up T.F. School Building Fund

Property owners in Twin Falls voted Tuesday by a 71.25 per cent majority in favor of two mill plant facilities levy for Twin Falls class A school district No. 411. A two-thirds majority was necessary for the levy to pass. A total of 1,450 voters went to the polls at Lincoln and Washington schools and cast 1,019 votes for the tax increase to 411 cents against the issue. Voting was considered lighter than a regular bond election but a "good turnout" for this type of election.

Ernest H. Hagland explaining the two-mill levy will raise about \$100,000 annually to set up a moderate school building fund. He said four classrooms must be added to the high school and to the elementary schools by 1962, but more classrooms by 1960. He estimated the cost of the program at \$1,500,000. The estimates are based on the number of pre-school children presently in Twin Falls and the number of children attending school.

The results of the election will be made known at a public hearing to be held at 7 p.m. at the city hall. The levy will take effect Sept. 1, 1958.

Senator Sees U. S. Science Interest Need

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—U. S. Sen. Henry Dworakoff said today a revival of interest in science is needed by everyone in this country to offset the interest being practiced in the Soviet Union.

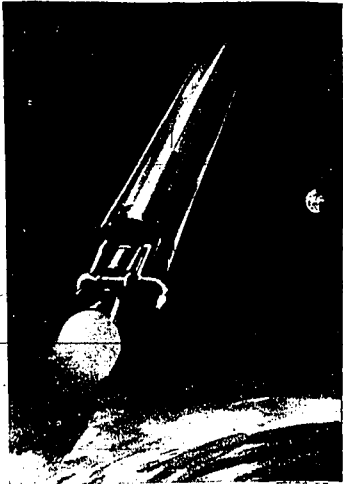
Dworakoff said he has been informed that an education program to explain the need for an interest in science might provide the spark to get American parents and students interested in the pursuit of scientific knowledge.

He said the statement came from Dr. Alan T. Waterman, director of the national science foundation, before the subcommittee on research development of the joint committee on atomic energy.

The senator said he had asked Dr. Waterman "if our voluntary system of support of science by the public and the government's compulsory system might excel us in all phases of science development."

Dr. Waterman replied that he believed the American system of voluntary science study is superior to the force system used by the Soviets.

Bank Promotes Use of Coins As International Peace Plan

By DOC QUINN
NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—Will the individual citizen grab at the chance to do something tangible about promoting the cause of peace?

A remarkable show of public desire to take place in New York City as part of President Eisenhower's "people-to-people" program, a local bank decided on a grand-run drive to get people to carry a U. S. silver "peace dollar" as a symbol of national peace dedication.

It ordered 25,000 of the silver dollars bearing the word "peace" from the treasury department through the Philadelphia mint. This special dollar can be had for 41 cents and the idea is for travelers abroad and Americans at home to carry it as a pocket-piece and conversation-maker in the cause of peace.

The Chase Manhattan bank made them available at its main office and 99 branches the last three days of last week. By Friday, the bank had to order 50,000 more. The drive began with presentation of the coins to Blanche Theobald, opera singer, and Byron Jants, pianist, who will help represent the U. S. at the Brussels world's fair.

The dollar was minted only from 1921 to 1938 and from 1938 to 1943. There is a girl's head, a symbol of liberty, on the front. On the reverse side is an eagle on a mountain on which appears the world peace. It is the only coin issued by any country in this century as intended.

Aside from the presentation to the two artists, the bank has told its customers about the dollar only in pamphlets in the various branches. The idea of a coin as a symbol of

international peace, friendship, and understanding came from Vernon Brown, curator of the Chase Manhattan money museum of 75,000 pieces in Rockefeller Center.

President Eisenhower launched the people-to-people program in September, 1956, calling on private citizens to work out methods of promoting peace. Many committees of citizens have been formed under the general chairmanship of Charles E. (Electric) Christie Wilson, the ball-toss executive who boxed war production and defense mobilization in World War II and the Korean war. Brown heads the numismatic (money study) committee of the program. He says he doesn't know whether other banks across the country intend to follow suit. He did not expect the peace-dollar program to catch on as fast as it has.

Wilson said the quick sale of the coins "shows that a search for a road to peace is in everybody's mind—this is a hard substance step—a visible evidence of a need. If it's just influence thinking, that's our major job in the world today—to keep peace uppermost in people's minds."

He said the people-to-people directors were considering appealing the group by a membership drive of some sort.

New Western Towns Slated In Dam Plans

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—By the time the major units of the upper Colorado river development project are well under way, the government will have built three new western towns.

The towns will cost approximately 300 million dollars and will house employees of the reclamation bureau at Glen canyon dam on the Colorado river in Arizona, Flamingo Gorge dam on the Green river in Utah, and Navajo dam on the San Juan river in New Mexico.

One town, at Glen Canyon, already has been named—Page, Ariz., and construction is well under way. The others will follow along as the construction progresses on the Flamingo Gorge and Navajo dams.

Planned cities of the projects were disclosed by the reclamation bureau in testimony made public yesterday before the house appropriations committee.

Estimated cost of the Glen canyon town is \$20,000,000. Major construction items include: permanent housing 7,750,000; temporary housing 4,250,000; an office and store building 4,250,000; water supply system 1,250,000; administration building 725,000; and warehouse 455,000.

At the Flamingo Gorge construction town, which is estimated to cost \$7,750,000 the plans call for: Permanent housing 2,500,000; temporary housing 2,500,000; streets and utility systems 1,500,000; miscellaneous equipment 250,000; and laboratory, garage and other buildings 1,000,000.

The bureau says it has no plans for permanent housing at the Navajo dam but does expect to erect \$455,000 for temporary housing, streets and utility systems. The total estimated cost of this town is \$455,000.

Raid on Trapped Deer End When Two Cougars Are Killed by Federal Hunters

Cougar raids on federal fish and wildlife service deer traps in the rugged country along the Idaho-Nevada state line north of Jarbidge ended Saturday when two cougars were killed.

The old scattered female cougar with worn teeth and a large young one were trapped and taken by two trappers owned by John Luak, American Falls, government trapper and hunter. Both were killed by Luak within a few hundred yards of a freshly killed buck.

Two Nevada wildlife service men have been trapping and tagging deer along the south side of Dave creek, located east of Murphy's Hot Springs and north of Jarbidge.

On Feb. 15, they found a partly eaten doe in one of their traps. A hole was torn in the mesh netting about 200 yards from the three-foot trap and one of the front traps of the deer had been eaten.

The men removed the dead doe from the trap and began to look for tracks of the predator which made tracks along the south side of Dave creek. Again they jumped a fresh trail.

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Brannan Cites Need for Fair Pay for Crops

PENDLETON, Ore., Feb. 19.—Former Secretary of Agriculture Charles Brannan today said the federal government has an obligation to provide reasonably diligent farmers with fair prices.

Such services, he said, could be provided at a reasonable cost. In an interview prior to a farm development conference, Brannan said the present administration's farm program is too expensive and does not provide enough service.

Brannan said the administration should either administer the law as congress intended or get out. "If they don't get out, the people ought to throw them out," he said.

Brannan was secretary under President Harry Truman from 1948-1952.

When he made the keynote address at the one-day conference, Brannan said that farmers should be protected by the kind of laws which now aid industry.

Brannan said that farmers working hours and other conditions have been enacted for protection in industry.

"But no such protection is afforded the farmers," he added.

The conference was one in a series sponsored by the National Farmers Union to obtain ideas on legislative programs to aid farmers.

Another of the conference's main speakers, Dr. A. L. Strand, told its members that farmers should be protected by the kind of laws which now aid industry.
