# 33 Boys Consider Themselves Lucky to Tour and Miss Three Months of School

Thirty-three boys, ranging in age from 9 to 15, consider themselves the luckiest group of youngsters in the United States. They belong to the Tucson Arizona Boys chorus, which was presented in concert Wednesday night at Piler High School by the Magic Valley Community Concert Association.

The boys not only consider themselves lucky because they can travel throughout the United States and Europe each year, but also because they are absent from their schoolrooms about three months while on tour.

The "ambassadors in chief" called the singing group has been traveling since Jan. 19 in the Pacific Northwest area with their repertoire of classics, carols, folk songs, Mexican novelties and westerns. Their present tour is scheduled to end on March 31 after the chorus has toured the Midwest and South-west.

The beginning of the chorus group goes back to 1939 when Eduardo Caso, present director-of-the-chorus and founder of the organization, Caso, an Englishman and a busy man, said Wednesday night he had gone to the Arizona city for his health. He said he realized he had to make money, and since music was his speciality, he decided upon the boys' chorus.

The boys are real trouper and handle practically every phase of the tour themselves. They travel by bus and do their own loading and unloading. They make necessary contacts, set up the stage, handle their own lighting and sound equipment. They also are their own best publicity agents.

Although they, too, were busy Wednesday night, there was one youngster who considered himself too busy to stop and talk about his group.

Oldest of the 33 boys on the tour is Tom Kille, 15, a ninth grader at Tucson. Youngest of the group is Harry Jones, 9, a fourth grader.

Young Kille said the boys do not have difficulty with their school work. Each boy receives private tutoring when he returns home. Non-berish of the tour is based on their grades and their voices. Kille said the boys must have a "B" average before being permitted to take the tour.

Young Kille said, "It is not especially hard to make up our grades in school." He further stated the tour itself is educational. In 1956 the group toured Europe and plan another such tour for 1959.

Besides Caso, three other adults accompany the youngsters. They are Mrs. Elsie Morgan, Mrs. Orace Sandi and Alfred del Moral, who accompany the chorus on the piano.

Caso started the chorus largely with backing of individual parents. He was able to hold the group together during the first few years. A radio station agreed to sponsor the group and, with their broadcast, interest gained momentum and local support increased.

Caso says money derived from the concerts and local projects at home is used for the organization. He says it is an incorporated, non-profit, non-sectarian organization.

Membership in the organization grows from its prestige in Tucson. From a group of eight, the chorus has grown into an aggregation of more than 100 boys. Those taking the tour are known as the senior group. There are about 50 in the intermediate and 50 in the junior groups.

All members of the chorus are Tucson boys. They are selected at auditions held three times a year. Since the chorus is not affiliated with any school, church or other organization, most of the boys are students of Tucson public schools.

Besides the intensive musical training the boys receive, they are also taught the full routine of ranch life during the summer. A riding program formed with chorus members has won prizes in Arizona for its riding skill.

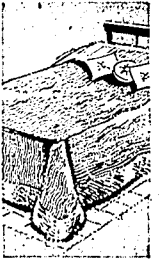

### New Booklets Are Available On Fertilizers

A handy booklet just published by the University of Idaho extension service, "Fertilizers for Idaho Farmers," says County Agent C. W. Dalich.

The booklet contains a lot of fundamental information about fertilizers, how they are made, their most efficient uses. Farmers can pick up a copy at the agent's office.

In addition to a description of the ingredients in commercial fertilizer that supply nitrogen (N), phosphorus (P), and potassium (K), the booklet tells how the compounds are made and the effect they have on soils. Data points out:

"The authors are Charles Painter, soil scientist, and C. O. Baker, soil technologist of the experiment station. The bulletin is the third in a series. The others are 'Nitrogen for Idaho Farmers' and 'What Farmers Should Know about Phosphorus'."

The bulletin tells how to read labels on fertilizer bags, how to figure the cost of nutrients, the combination of ingredients, and how to determine what a certain field requires. Data is given.

"The authors say a soil test is the best way to find out the needs of the soil. Facilities of the University of Idaho colleges of agriculture are available for soil testing to all Idaho farmers."

### Tributes Paid Solon in 47th Year in Office

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Yesterday was a day of tributes for Carl Hayden, 47 years of age, for his 47th year in congress and 37th year in the senate.

There has not been a day since Hayden became a state in 1912 that he has not been either a representative or a senator.

All of which causes rejoicing in a senate acutely conscious of each milestone. But it also has ironic touches.

For the senate is proud of the quality, may even envy the quantity, of its history. It delights in the names of its members, whose frequent pronouncements keep its name in the headlines, who fill the floor to television and radio studios.

Yet here is Hayden, who rarely talks and who, when he does, has a tendency to mumble, who actually sweats even in an interview, whose name never once has been mentioned for a household word in this country, and who has outlasted them all.

But Hayden, now 80, is no mere time server.

Anyone who talks with other senators soon realizes that few see as Hayden. Hayden, anyone who watches the senate in action, stands that few are as influential.

The admittance is bipartisan.

For the Democrats, Vice President Alben Barkley once said: "No more effective legislator ever served in either house."

Barkley, like Hayden, served in both.

For the Republicans, there's Sen. James Eastland of South Dakota: "Some years ago a man said to me that he thought Carl Hayden knew more about the government of the United States than did any other individual. I have never been disposed to take exception to the compliment."

How did Hayden get that way? Well, he says that when he first came to congress he was run off with the headlines but "if you want to gain the respect of your colleagues, be a work horse."

Rarely has any advice been so carefully followed.

### History of Written Word Is Feature of Rare Book Week

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Feb. 20.—A sweeping view of the history of the written word, from clay tablets of the Babylonians to modern day high speed press work—is on display at the University of Idaho library.

Honoring Rare Book Week, the exhibit will be on view for two weeks.

Contributors to the exhibit are Dr. Howard B. Slough, professor and chairman of zoology; Ronald Glenn, general librarian, and the archives of the university library.

Smallest piece is a Babylonian clay tablet about 4000 years old. It is a receipt for a goat killed at a market and delivered on the 20th of the month.

A copy of a Latin Bible dated five years after Columbus discovered America is part of the exhibit.

Among Dr. Slough's collection are embossed leather covers, richly decorated with religious scenes. Wood cuts, copper engravings and hand colored pages of art work for the frontpieces of books, highlight the skill or early day printers.

Rarest books among the collection are oddly enough, from the Pacific Northwest. They include leather books printed on the Jenni Mission Press in the Nez Perce language to instruct the Indians in English.

### Emotional Stress as Cause of Ailment Is Doubted by Doctor

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—The psychosomatic or mind-body explanation of hardening of the arteries is attacked by a well-known heart expert on the grounds that its proponents can prove nothing but "would have us believe that work causes heart disease."

"That isn't so, asserted Dr. Howard B. Sprague, editorializing in a technical journal of the American Heart Association, and the psychosomatic point of view presents danger. It is an easy way out because it almost precludes scientific research."

The allegation is, he said, that this is "an unusually anxious age in world history." But "no one can prove that our age is more troubled than many before it. No one can measure emotional stress, since it has no meaning except in relation to him who is stressed."

Furthermore, it creates the belief that emotional stress is a bad thing. Therefore, not only are pain, anxiety, fear, anger and frustration undesirable, but so also are pride, joy, success, striving, etc.

The psychosomaticists have suggested that emotional stress can increase the volume of fatty substances in the blood, and these

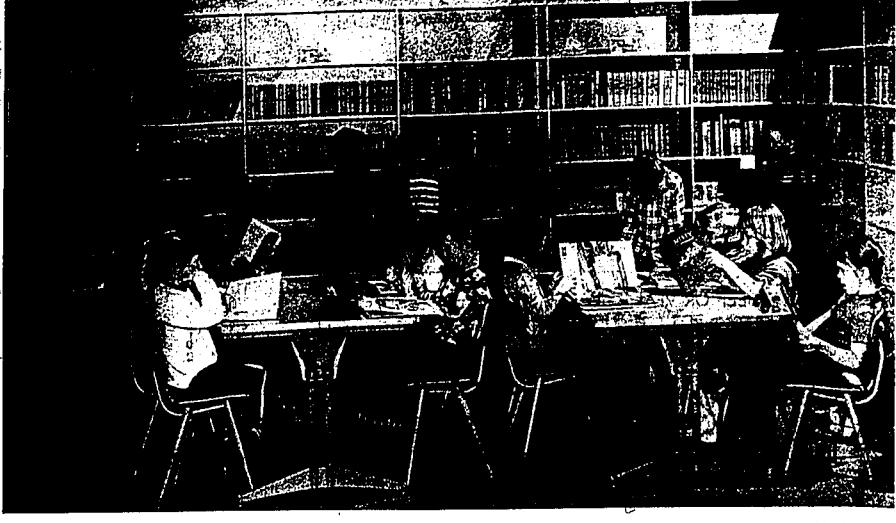



### Chinese Army Bids to Better Civil Relation

HONG KONG, Feb. 20 (AP)—Red China's army is making another bid to improve relations with the civilian population.

The first step was to order army units to grow their own pork and vegetables.

The latest is an order under which virtually all private houses requisitioned from civilians will be returned. This decision came at the all-army barracks council work conference in Peiping.

The conference, according to the communist New China news agency, decided that excepting the marine defense units, frontier defense units, anti-aircraft units, railway corps and the national defense engineering corps which really need private houses and could continue to rent and use them, all PLA (People's Liberation Army) units should be removed from March 1, 1938, and returning private houses they have already rented.

The requisitioning of private homes, along with the food problem, has angered farmers and city dwellers in the coastal areas and the coastal areas, especially in Kwangtung province in the south.

Public opinion in the north is also facing nationalistic Formosa, where the reds found it necessary to take over private homes to house troops.

Apparently Fukien, which is regarded by the Chinese as a top-notch province, has been almost completely affected by the new order.

But in inland regions, the change will be for the better. It will build barracks for itself to live in, as well as produce much of its own food.

It is all part of Peiping's campaign for the army "to get to know the people."

ANCVA pointed out the extensiveness of the requisitioning in reporting the Peiping conference held in January. It said that "last year alone, various units returned a total of 74,000 houses" to the original owners.

Judging from the fact that a new, widespread order has gone out to turn back housing, it can be figured that the number of dwellings still held by the army is far greater than the number already returned.

### Deadly New Fighter Plane Is Added for U. S. Air Arsenal

HAMILTON AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., Feb. 20 (AP)—The air force today accepted a fighter-interceptor plane that will fly twice the speed of sound and will push America's defense perimeter far out over its oceans.

The plane, called the F-104 Starfighter, is an "upper atmosphere" fighter and was billed by Lockheed as the "fastest, lightest and highest-flying interceptor ever built."

Exact range of the new plane was not disclosed, but spokesmen said it would sweep the air for "hundreds of miles" on the defense perimeter.

The plane was put into operation for the western air defense command today by Lieut. Gen. J. H. Atkinson.

Air forces and Lockheed officials said the plane will fly more than twice the speed of sound and "climb as fast as it will fly."

Lockheed called the aircraft a "missile with a man in it."

The Starfighter is a stubby weapon packing "more firepower" than the air force said.

Performance specifications of the new jet were still under security wraps but the air force released three statistics about it:

- It contains the most powerful jet engine, thrust-per-pound, yet developed.
- It will use the fastest-firing aerial machinegun ever built, a 20 millimeter, gas-lung-type cannon capable of firing 6,000 rounds a minute.
- It carries Sidewinder missiles guided by an infra-red tracking device capable of destroying a target ball.

The pilot never sees.

—It will contain the first down-ward ejection system for a production type jet fighter. This removes the hazard of an ejected pilot colliding with the aircraft when he device capable of destroying a target ball.

### Papers Banned

TUNIS, Tunisia, Feb. 20 (AP)—Tunisian authorities have clamped a nationwide ban on the sale of four conservative Paris newspapers.

The government order issued yesterday applied to France Soir, Paris Presse, Aurore, and Parleian Libere. Also banned was the weekly publication, Jour de France. All of the organs new to a consistently anti-Tunisian government line. The government Tunis Journals, Action and Al Amal, have been banned in France for some time.

### Tax Refunds May Be Slow

If you are expecting a federal income tax refund don't plan on receiving it until sometime between April 1 and June 30, advises Charles G. Olsen, Twin Falls internal revenue agent.

Olsen explains returns are now shipped to a central location for electric machine-processing and a refund check writing along with millions of others from other states.

Meanwhile, it is impossible to answer all inquiries about individual refunds until after June 30, Olsen says. After that date the returns will have been shipped back to district offices and separately indexed.

Olsen says some tax refunds will come in sooner than others because of early filings but the returns must be checked in different ways, depending on what's in them.

Other claims for refunds cannot be paid until later in the year. As an example, Olsen explains, some persons claim deductions which must be investigated before refunds, and faulty and incomplete returns cause extra correction work.

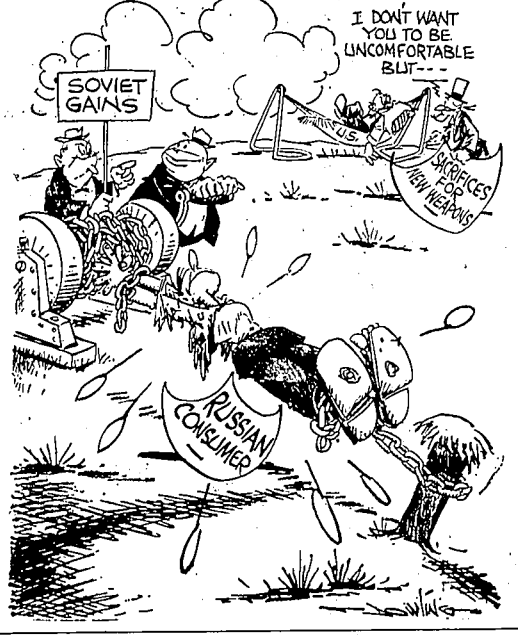

**May "Attack" Scheduled for Defense Tests**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—The government announced yesterday that the mock attack on the United States scheduled for the defense mobilization alert 1953 has been scheduled for May 6-7.

The exercise is the fifth annual and is the largest of its kind. It is designed to test the nation's ability to mobilize its resources in the event of a sudden attack.

The exercise will be held in three stages, with the first stage being the most critical. It will involve the mobilization of the nation's industrial and agricultural resources, as well as the transportation and communication systems.

The exercise will be conducted under the direction of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, with the participation of the various military services and the civilian agencies.

The exercise will be a major test of the nation's ability to sustain itself in the event of a sudden attack. It will also provide an opportunity for the various agencies to coordinate their efforts and to identify any weaknesses in the nation's defense capabilities.

**Britons Hit Rough Going in Antarctic**

LONDON, Feb. 20 (AP)—British scientist Dr. Vivian Fuchs radioed yesterday that his expedition was "extremely bad weather" in his drive to get his trans-Antarctic expedition to the coast.

Fuchs said he, Sir Edmund Hillary and other members of the expedition were forced to feel out a trail and mark it with flags before driving on. He said the group had covered only about 10 miles since refueling at "depot 480" Monday night. Depot 480 was a supply point 480 miles from the expedition's goal at Scott base.

"This is slow work but it is better than waiting for the weather to clear," Fuchs radioed.

**Ike's Note Shows Basic Weakness for Reds—Ignorance of World Conditions**

President Eisenhower has pinpointed a fundamental weakness of Russian leaders in his latest letter to Soviet Premier Nikolai S. Bulganin.

That is, their complete ignorance of the real conditions in countries like the United States.

There was a decided change of tone in Eisenhower's letter, latest in a series of exchanges which Bulganin started last Dec. 10 on holding a "summit" conference on world issues.

Eisenhower retorted sharply to charges made by such men as Bulganin and communist party leader Nikita S. Khrushchev that "the United States is a nation ruled by aggressive, war-minded imperialists."

He expressed amazement that such allegations were made by Soviet leaders "who have never even been near this country."

If there are Americans who, as the "Russians" charge, are conducting a "preventive" war and calling for

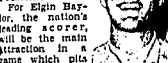

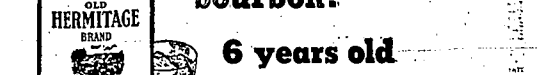

### Danger Signs Seen for Pay In Dam Tract

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—Representative Thompson, R. Wyo., sees three danger signs in the hour-long approval of a 2 1/2 million dollar payment to the Crow Indians for land needed for the proposed Yellowstone dam in Montana.

Thompson sought unsuccessfully yesterday to raise the payment to 1 1/2 million dollars.

Noting that the Indian-owned land has been appraised at less than \$50,000, he said in a statement there are dangers that (1) the price of the land may be inflated by construction of the dam itself, (2) with the proposed payment, the dam may not return power sufficient to pay for its construction cost within 50 years, and (3) other congressmen with Indian constituents "will want to see that they are treated just as well."

The senate already has approved a 3 million dollar payment to the Indians for the land. The bill now will go to a conference committee to resolve the two figures.

Thompson said he strongly supports construction of the big dam, but he added:

"If this project is continued to be handled with additional costs and payments like the 2 1/2 millions we are going to get to the point where the Crow Indians will break the camel's back."

"We want to see it built, of course, but unless it is built, the people of the area do not benefit, nor do the Indians get a single dime."

"We have a project here which is on the borderline as far as pay-out in 30 years is concerned. If we are going to establish a precedent in paying 30 times the value of the Indian land, I am sure that those of us representing Indian constituents will want to see that they are treated just as well."

### Cold Weather Boosts Prices In Vegetables

By The Associated Press  
Distribution problems, combined with harsh weather in the east and freezing temperatures in Florida, combined this week to boost prices on these winter vegetables available.

Many supermarket executives tried to solve the distribution problem by featuring turkeys, which are plentiful. Stocks of gobblers on Dec. 1, the most recent count, stood at nearly 22 million pounds. That's 14 per cent above a year earlier and 40 per cent more than average for that time.

Steaks, which are supposed to give you more energy in cold weather, will be the No. 1 attraction in many stores while others will be offering round and rib roasts at bargain prices.

**Fish Stocks Angle**  
Others, taking notice of bent, have specials on codfish, halibut and swordfish steaks, scallops, flounder and various fillets. Stocks of frozen fish products are 3 per cent over a year ago, but still considered ample to meet current demand. The fresh catch is expected to pick up seasonally next month.

Vegetable prices, already pushed up by the poor growing weather, went up another notch because of slower distribution. Collards, spinach, broccoli, lettuce and carrots are about the best bargains, although produce men rate them no better than a good buy.

Eastern storage potatoes and both old and new cabbages are sharply higher, making them only a good to fairly good buy. Idaho potatoes and onions are in the same category, although their rise was moderate. Cauliflower also is somewhat more expensive. Celery, on the other hand, became a little cheaper.

**Beets Are Good Buys**  
Cucumbers, beets and Mexican peas are fair buys, while eggplant, peppers, beans and squash are moderate to expensive.

Fresh fruit showed the same overall picture. Florida-orange, which usually is selling out of the bins at bargain prices in February, is

only a fairly good buy this week. So are Washington state apples.

Peas, lima and the few remaining cucumber grapes are moderately priced, while lemons and California's navel oranges are more expensive this week. Avocados are a good buy if you happen to care for them.

Cuba, Mexico, Chile and Argentina are shipping summer favorites such as melons and plums, but they're at luxury prices.

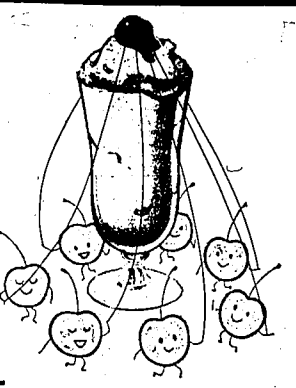

### Need of Lean, Tender Meats Told Packers

**SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 20 (AP)—**The president of the National Restaurant association said today that patrons are getting very conscious of calories—and want "tender, lean meat, without fat."

Harry Hillaris, Portland, Ore., told the Western States Meat Packers association that perhaps both industries should take a new look at meat grading, to base it on something besides the quantity of fat.

He admitted that some fat is essential in meat for tenderness and flavor, but suggested that cattle breeders turn out a type of animal whose meat would be tender without it.

Hillarlis said supermarkets have educated American housewives to using pre-cut, pre-zested and pre-packaged meat, and restaurant operators and packers would have to learn to provide patrons with uniform pre-portioned cuts.

The packers convention also was urged to join with renderers in an expanded research program to find new uses for lard.

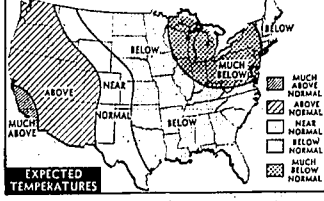
Walter A. Herrgott, of Hergott and Wilson, San Francisco, warned that the industry may lose the toilet soap market within the next five years to detergent-based soaps. The soap industry now takes about 30 per cent of the American lard production.

The group also previewed futuristic methods of food processing. Six-month old meat cuts, preserved by radiation instead of refrigeration, were on display.

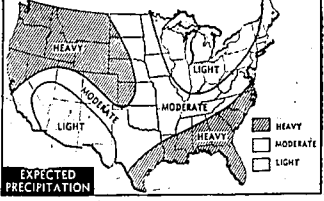
The army will start construction on a large radiation processing plant at Lathrop, Calif., in May. The plant will produce 500 tons of radiation-processed food a day for the military.

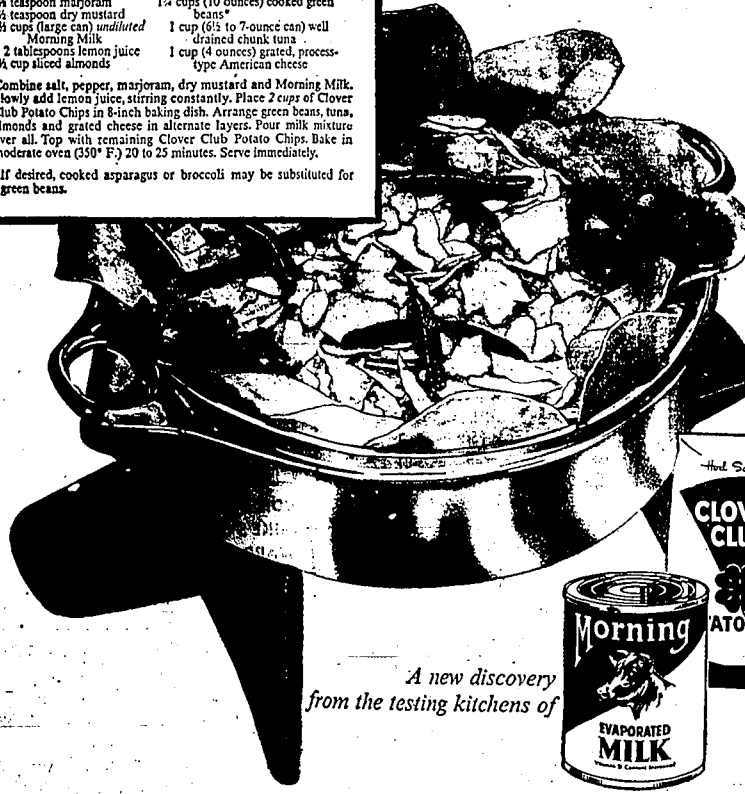

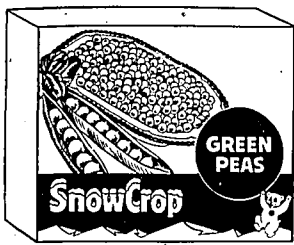

## Choice Idaho Potatoes Baked for Two Generals During Camp at Desert Base

Choice Idaho potatoes were served to two army generals during a recent national training encampment in the desert at Camp Irwin, Calif., thanks to Maj. Thomas B. Hovenden, Twin Falls, and the Chamber of Commerce.

Hovenden was in training at the California camp with other members of the third battalion, 116th armored cavalry regiment, Idaho national guard. As battalion executive officer, he was charged with inspecting the kitchen facilities used for a tutorial personnel.

"The potatoes they were using were little better than culls in food cases," Hovenden says. "They were all in bags marked 'No. 1,' but they were far from top quality." He adds, "Hovenden knew Maj. Gen. Robert Howze, acting sixth army commander, and Brig. Gen. Walter Jensen, camp commander, were scheduled to eat with the battalion's headquarters and howler companies.

He called Mitchell Hunt, secretary-manager of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, and asked Hunt if it would be possible to get some Idaho potatoes to Camp Irwin," Hovenden says.

Hovenden says Hunt contacted E. B. Harper company and purchased 250 pounds of potatoes, including three 40-pound boxes and a 100-pound sack. The potatoes were shipped to California by the processing company.

"The day the generals came to lunch we served the potatoes and fried chickens," Hovenden says. "Members of both the companies were served the potatoes, but we baked the potatoes for the general in tin foil and served them still wrapped," Hovenden adds.

Hovenden says the generals were enthusiastic about the potatoes. "Army regulations prohibited us from giving the general gift boxes of the spuds," Hovenden says, "so we gave the gift boxes to their wives."

A gift box also was presented to the wife of Lieut. Col. Frank Pitter, head of operations and training at the camp.

"We know the potatoes were appreciated because one of the women broke her 40 pounds into smaller sacks and was giving them as gifts," Hovenden says.

"General Howze took his potatoes back with him to the Presidio in San Francisco," Hovenden says.

Hovenden says the wives who received potatoes expressed the wish that similar top-grade potatoes could be purchased in California.

The meetings will be held every Sunday, Tuesday, and Friday nights for an indefinite period. The public is invited.

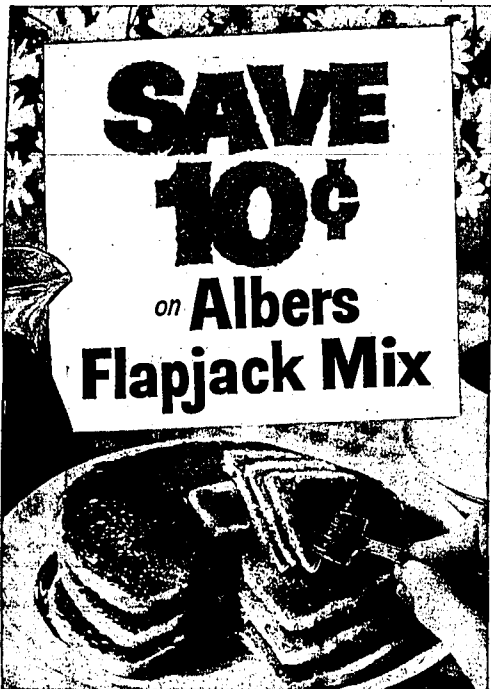

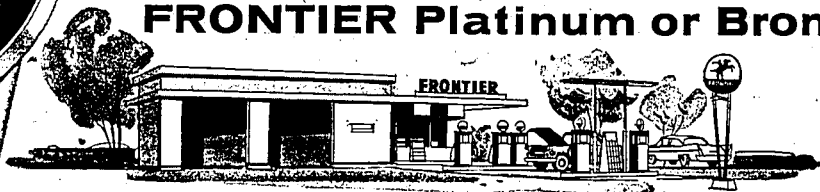

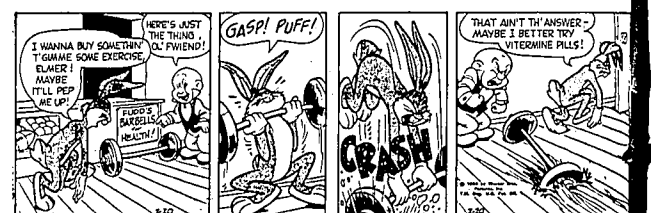

### Case in Utah Court to Test Lease Rights

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 20 (AP)—A suit was filed in U. S. district court yesterday which government attorneys say will force settlement of a 40-year-old argument over oil and mineral leasing on public lands in Utah.

Asst. U. S. Atty. C. Nelson Day filed the suit against the state of Utah and four lessees. Involved in the suit is a 60-acre tract of land on the Navaho Indian reservation in the Apache oil pool of San Juan county, an southeast Utah.

Day said the suit will affect indirectly more than a million acres of scattered school sections on which the mineral rights are clouded.

The lands have at one time or another been exchanged because they were located on Indian reservations or on government withdrawn lands.

The trouble started when Utah passed a law in 1919 requiring it to retain mineral rights of exchanged lands. State land attorneys claim the state can exchange only surface rights.

Utah subsequently has leased mineral leases on the vast lands involved. Uncle Sam has proceeded to do the same. As a result oil firms have found themselves drilling on land already leased out by others.

On the tract in question, the state leased mineral rights to a Salt Lake City accountant who subleased them to three other parties. The Navaho tribal council, with approval of the interior department, leased the same section to Honolulu Oil corporation. Oil has now been discovered on the tract.

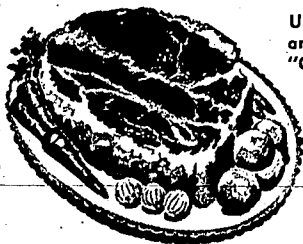
