China's Reds Urging Grain Crop's Boost

TOKYO, Feb. 21 (AP)—Communist China has embarked on a frenzied drive to increase its grain output to feed its teeming millions, according to a new report reaching Tokyo.

The communist New China news agency reported that 320 counties—one-sixth of the nation's total—have pledged to attain grain output targets almost 10 years ahead of schedule.

It said that "pledges" to reach 1967 output goals during this year came "in the course of nationwide discussion of agricultural production plans."

Communist China in 1957 produced about 183 million tons of food grains for its more than 600 million population. For 1958, that target announced by chairman of the national planning commission Pi I-pu during the just completed national people's congress session was 195 million tons, an increase of 11 million tons in one year.

But apparently even this is not enough.

Though the communists seem to have done away with actual famines, the need for more rice and staple food to stay ahead of the ever-increasing number of mouths to feed is a major one.

And the communists themselves have reported growing unrest among the hard-worked peasants.

To solve the food problem, the communists today are sending millions of students and office workers into the field indefinitely to help on the farms.

He said changes in the law in recent years have extended and improved the federal old-age and survivors insurance system and have added protection against loss of earnings because of disability. Today this program of contributions social insurance provides basic protection for nearly all American families, he said.

However, he said, social security should be considered only the "ground floor" of savings. No one should depend on it for a livelihood after retirement, he added.

Washington—The President's Naxon has leaped so far out in front of the 1936 Republican presidential nomination race that politicians now generally regard it as "no contest." It is also believed, that the Naxon is so far ahead of the opposition that there are no other stars and available candidates.

General recent developments have strengthened the confidence of the Naxon's supporters and legislative discussions of the Naxon's program by the two spinners and the Explorer. With characteristic energy, he has dug deep into the question of international control.

In a forthcoming trip to western Europe, the Naxon will disseminate the knowledge of foreign affairs and personalities which he has acquired during his mission to Africa and South America.

NIXON MAY BE GOP'S BANNER CANDIDATE IN FALL—Not his general health condition. No member of the administration has been in such demand for appearing before influential and representative groups—editors, bankers, industrialists, and the like—as the Naxon.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Feb. 21 (AP) — The Little Rock School Board today sought court permission to suspend integration at Central high school because "defiance" by a "small group" was hampering efforts of both teachers and students.

In a petition filed yesterday in federal district court, the board asked the court to issue the second part of its decree issued last year calling for gradual integration of the high school. It asked the court to define the term "deliberate speed" as applied to school integration.

Since nine Negro students were enrolled at Central high last fall under protection of federal marshall troops and federalized national guardsmen a series of racial incidents occurred, culminating in the explosion last week of one of the nine, Minnie Jean Brown.

The board and school Supt. Virgil W. Blossom scheduled a hearing on the suspension last Monday of two white boys students accused of following up Minnie Jean's death by displaying a banner that read "one down—eight to go."

The suspended students were Sammie Dean Parker, 16, and Harold Cooper, 17.

Over more than a dozen hours heated oral police searching through the school again sought to determine if the boys had got a phone call warning there was a bomb in the building.

Police Chief Gene Smith said no bomb was found.

Cost Increase Plagues U. S. Food Groups

NEW YORK, Feb. 21 (AP)—Costly food today plagues the family budget within bounds. The cost of growing, producing, distributing and marketing food worries the industry. It is seeking new means of holding cost within bounds.

Most has been done. The National Association of Food Chains says increased warehouse efficiency has cut costs 16 per cent in 10 years, and store operating efficiency has cut receiving and storage costs 50 per cent. At a recent national meeting, food chain executives swapped experience in cutting prices here and there of distribution costs.

Not Reduced

Food industry leaders insist that despite higher food prices, the rising costs—largely of labor in transportation and labor—limit the net return on the dollar of food sales last year.

Like many other industries, food processors and merchandisers alike have tried cutting overhead by such devices as mergers and computer buying. Some of the other things they're trying:

Baking is going in for more automation—such as conveyor belts that take pans in and out of ovens, in and out of coolers, carry the loaves to slicing and wrapping machines and finally to the shipping platform.

Seek Savings

Meat packers are consolidating operations and looking for cheaper distribution. They seek savings through new antibiotic and chemical preservatives and through preserving meat and through chemicals that tenderize has choice cuts.

The Produce Packaging Association says that now supermarket shelf 60 per cent of fresh fruits and vegetables are packaged for distribution. They seek savings through new antibiotic and chemical preservatives and through preserving meat and through chemicals that tenderize has choice cuts.

The Folding Paper Box association forges a new packaging of meat and produce at point of production, aimed at insuring quality, reducing spoilage and saving cost of packaging operations at the store.

The cost of packaging itself is also being tackled.

Packaging costs average 20 per cent of sales of grocery manufacturers, according to Donald Deskey, industrial designer for the processors look to the designers for a double-barreled attack on the profit squeeze problem. To cut packaging costs they are calling for more efficient materials, processes and techniques—securing the competitive battle between the makers of boxes, jars, squeeze bottles and tubes.

Industry leaders planning cost-cutting drives include Porter M. Jett, president of the National Association of the Kroger food store chain, who says closing of smaller outmoded stores and opening of larger outlets with adequate parking facilities will let the grocers get the most out of the dollar.

W. Burger, president of the Atlantic and Pacific chain, who says stores must cut costs because the housewife is leading a sharper eye on the 25 per cent of the family budget which usually goes for food.

Delegate Farm Agency Predicts Aid On Soil Plans



WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—An agriculture department official predicted today congress will provide enough soil bank funds to cover applications of all farmers who wish to participate in the acreage reserve program this year.

The official made the prediction after the house appropriations committee recommended yesterday an additional \$15 million dollars for the soil bank acreage reserve. Last year congress voted to limit acreage reserve payments in 1958 to 500 million dollars.

The department did not ask for the additional money. Officials had said they would parcel out the original 500 million dollars through state agricultural and stabilization committees. But farmers argued applications more readily than the department thought they would and the original funds were committed about two weeks before the sign-up period ended.

The house committee then recommended the additional \$15 million dollars. Department officials said they believed the senate appropriations committee will act accordingly and set the amount to cover all applications.

Through Feb. 7 applications had been received to retire 152,211 acres from the production of corn, cotton, wheat, rice and tobacco. If all are approved and government payments will total \$62,712,274.

The sign-up period for corn, cotton and spring wheat ends today and for tobacco and rice signups will close March 7.

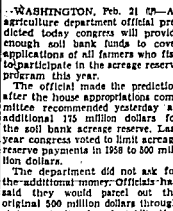
