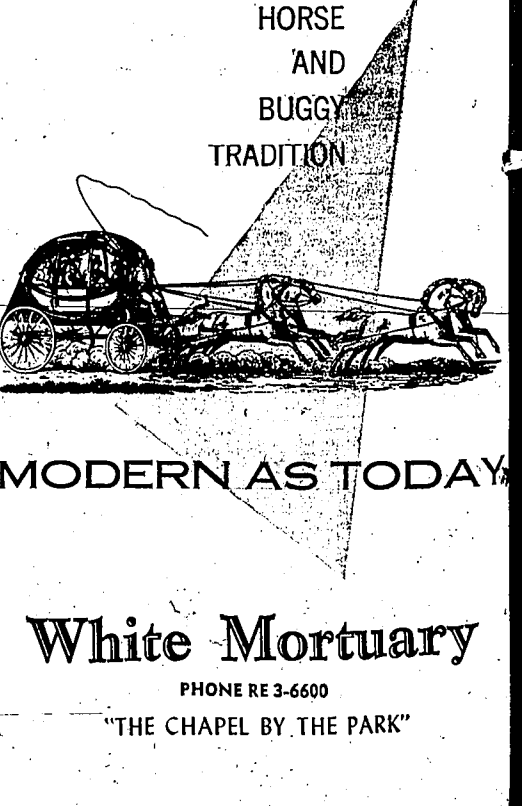

Wildlife Plan OK Is Urged In Dam Setup

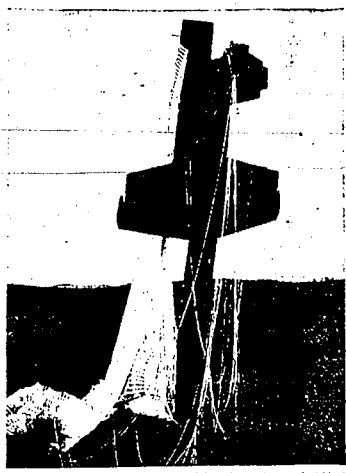
WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—U. S. Sen. Henry Dourshak today called for a favorable committee report on a bill which would give wildlife agencies a chance to present their case before dams would be built in the Northwest.

In a letter to Chairman Warren O. Magnuson, D. Wash., of the senate committee on marine and fisheries, Dourshak pointed out that the bill provides safeguards so that wildlife will be given consideration and plans for taking care of fish runs would be subject to approval by wildlife agencies.

However, Dourshak added, the bill does not give wildlife agencies "veto power over dam projects." "This plan," he said, "sets up on a regional basis the plan I have suggested for Bruce Eddy," that funds be provided to take care of fisheries being damaged, either by artificial planting or through construction of passage devices.

Senator Dourshak also said he had received word from Idaho Fish and Game Director Ross Leonard saying the department does not favor imposing in any wildlife agency the veto power over dam construction.

Dulles Faces Tough Schedule As 70th Anniversary Nearing

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles celebrates his 70th birthday anniversary tomorrow amid signs he will remain the nation's No. 1 diplomat for a long time.

The occasion finds him facing a schedule that could test the mettle of a much younger man. A possible summit conference with the Russians, appearances before the Senate, and a new round of global travels and world problems in general lie ahead.

But close associates of the secretary and President Eisenhower say Dulles will continue in the cabinet as long as Mr. Eisenhower is in office. Only a few believe he may step out before his 71st anniversary, but none believes he will leave before next fall.

Insiders say the Eisenhower-Dulles relationship has become closer as a result of the three arduous illnesses experienced by the President. The subjects made him rely more and more on Dulles for foreign policy advice. And recently the President spoke out publicly with a quite warm endorsement of the secretary.

All hands agree that for a man his age, Dulles has remarkable vigor. He works a long 8:30 a.m.-6:30 p.m. day before slipping into black or white tie dress to attend frequent social affairs.

Much of the time he is flying to some far off trouble spot as a sort of winner diplomatic fireman. He has traveled 44,935 miles, 374,637 of them overseas, during his five-year tenure in office.

"According to his doctors," his health appears to be good. There is no recurrence of the cancer which prompted an emergency intestinal operation in November, 1956.

Dulles is a frequent White House caller and usually stays a long time. He also has a direct telephone line to the President that is used frequently. His orders from the chief executive are to "call or see me any time."

Dulles' grip on foreign policy matters has been tightened by departure of Harold G. Stassen, the President's permanent adviser. Dulles welcomed the development. He believes disarmament probably is the outstanding East-West problem and

Aandahl Says Cuts Eyed for Basin Project

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—The federal government is planning to cut construction on the Columbia basin reclamation project short of its original \$100,000,000.

The alternative appears to be higher repayment by project beneficiaries.

The problem was outlined in a letter received by various members of the Washington congressional delegation from Fred G. Aandahl, assistant secretary of interior.

Aandahl describes cost increase.

After describing the increasing cost of the project, Aandahl says that the government is now negotiating contracts with water users and the rapid approach of project completion has authorized cutting.

"In view of the circumstances," Aandahl says, "it is not a desirable alternative but to limit project appropriation requests for new construction to funds for irrigation works which can be completed under the repayment cost limitation."

Woolf Limit Construction

This, Aandahl said, would limit project construction to a total of \$25,000,000.

Asked if he was saying the government would not go beyond the authorized cost limitation unless new repayment contracts are negotiated, Aandahl replied:

"I wouldn't want to quote that."

However, Representative Mammou, D. Wash., one of the recipients of the letter, said the "direct impression that Secretary Aandahl is saying that unless water users agree to pay for the higher construction costs, the administration will oppose continuation of the project after reclamation is completed."

Asks Explanation

Aandahl said the purpose of his letter is to suggest that there should be an explanation through negotiation of the possibility of amending the existing law.

He said he believed it premature to make any final decision as to the project's future until the negotiations are concluded.

The existing ceiling, set on the basis of \$100 million, estimates made last year, however, show the probable cost, assuming the project is completed, to be \$100 million.

Through last June 30, the government had spent \$23,828,828 in bringing the project to \$100 million.

Present repayment contracts with water users provide for repayment of \$47,000,000 to \$100 million on the basis of an average payment of \$5 for each irrigable acre. The cost above this amount is to be paid from Grand Coulee dam power revenues.

Storm Isolates Aged Women; Bodies Found

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—Victoria Hyde, 80, and her sister, Louisa Cooke, 80, lived together for 30 years.

For the last 12 years they lived alone with two pet cats in a house with comfortable Victorian furniture.

Mrs. Hyde's legs and left arm were paralyzed by a stroke several years ago and last year she had gone completely blind. But Miss Cooke, a retired saleswoman, had care of her and their needs were simple.

Cut off from outside

Last week 14 inches of snow fell on Washington and the elderly sisters were more than ever cut off from the outside.

Yesterday, the neighbors realized they hadn't seen the sisters since the heavy snow began. They called police.

"When they entered the house, police found the cats were running frantically around the house 'as if with rabbits'." The kitchen and other rooms of the large stone home were littered by the animals' desperate search for food.

The house was cold and there was no oil or kerosene tank of the furnace.

Dead of Heart Attack

They found the body of Miss Cooke in the bathroom, dead in two overcoats clasped together with a pin. The coroner said she died of a heart attack about a week ago.

The body of Mrs. Hyde was found in her bed, dead from heart failure, several days ago. She apparently had lain there helplessly after her sister died.

Her brother and closest relative, Mr. William Wallace Cooke, died here in 1940 at the age of 72.

The only living relative, Alice Cooke, lives in a cousin's home in Spokane, Wash., having been notified by police.

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Reporter Aims N. Y. Schools' Crime Waves

Lights of Times square to the east residential streets of Queens, I have put that question about race tensions.

The squarest answer I can reach is about this:
The mixing of the races is not the basic cause. But a huge percentage of the crimes and violence sprang from Negro and Puerto Rican elements because of their economic and social plight.

Let me give you one example which demonstrates that friction between races is not a basic element. Several years ago now on trial for their lives for the beating and knifing to death of another boy, a police couple. All seven are members of the same gang. Their races: Two Puerto Ricans, two Negroes, one white and one boy from the Dominican republic.

For another thing, there appears to be virtually no race problem in the classrooms. In those schools that are integrated and in those with more complexities—pupils work side by side regardless of race and seem to get along.

Outside the classrooms, on the streets, the racial attitudes bristled like the teeth of a porcupine. Oddly enough, here appears to be less real race friction than in some other parts of the city.

The reason is pretty obvious, however, when you get down on the streets with the youngsters. They are fighting a battle for survival—a place to sleep and far from least, someone to love and be respected.

A fellow who reaches that status on the streets of New York isn't worried much whether he is a Negro, Puerto Rican, Irish, Catholic, Jewish or P.I. Islander.

There are Negro gangs doing battle with white gangs and mixed gangs backing up Negro and white gangs. They talk to members and they'll tell you the reason a certain boy has beaten was because he "worked his neighborhood" look because of his color.

New York's current troubles were not begun yesterday, but in the hectic period following World War II. For the first time, huge crowds of southern Negroes and Puerto Ricans came to the move, caught up in the swirl of the big cities. The Puerto Ricans have been coming into New York at the rate of 1,000 a week.

Many of the wartime migrants stayed there. They wrote for their people and their families to come to the city. The city's non-white population has boomed by 41 per cent in the last ten years while white residents have headed for the suburbs, cutting their numbers in the city by 5 per cent.

Some newcomers were able to obtain good jobs, but many were not. The economic leader, they moved into what was available in the slums—and still does—crowding into a room or two of a cold water tenement with a father, mother and five or more children.

And the breeding of more children goes on relentlessly, often with night and hearing of others in the family. Such situations drive the children into the streets. They are seen in the city in ugly pictures of drunkenness, babies born out of wedlock.

"This produces what is known as New York's troublemaker one per cent. The city's five boroughs have almost a million public school pupils and, as in most of the other cities, the majority are just school-aged boys and girls. Then there are the trouble makers.

Ralph W. Whelan, executive director of the city's youth board, estimates that between 8,500 to 10,000 students are in the problem category. That is the one per cent who make the sensational headlines.

It's difficult to get at racial friction statistics here. There are state laws which discourage identification by race. This is safe to say, however, while the problem children come from all races, Negroes and Puerto Ricans predominate simply because there are more of them in the element of society that nourishes mischief.

One top police official corroborated this analysis:
"We keep no figures," he said, "but it's simple to figure it out. Most of those who commit the crimes are from the neighborhoods where most of the inhabitants are Negroes and Puerto Ricans."

Rescue Crew Needs Spoon To Save Man

CAMBRIDGE CITY, Ind., Feb. 24 (AP)—Workers digging carefully with spoons freed a 45-year-old man trapped for eight hours yesterday when a well caved in near his arm pit.

The situation was so delicate that state police resorted to highway traffic away from the area for fear vibrations would loose more gravel on the narrow shaft.

Wilbur (Peter) Harold was caught 16 feet below the surface when the side of the well caved in as he was digging for his brother-in-law in the basement of his home in nearby East Germanstown.

His helpers, Paul Stone and Park Sourbeer, alerted police and about 100 rescue workers rushed to the scene.

A barrel-like structure was placed over Harold to prevent him from being buried alive by falling gravel. The dirt was administered throughout the long ordeal.

Because of the narrow size of the hole, only one man at a time could dig, and the cramped workmen had to be relieved every half-hour.

The rescuers used a small spoon about four inches in diameter to painstakingly scoop away the gravel. The dirt was placed in a five-gallon can and hoisted to the top of the well. Concrete blocks which Harold had used to line the well collapsed in the cave-in and had to be removed.

His wife, Gladys, and two daughters, stood by at the top of the well anxiously watching the rescue. As workers cleaned most of the dirt, Harold freed his feet himself—and was hauled to the surface in a harness.

Rescuers said Harold remained in good spirits throughout the operation. He was hospitalized for a few days, but physicians said he apparently had no ill effects except for shock.

"He had a few bad moments," Mrs. Harold said after her husband was freed. "I held up pretty well until he had been down there for six hours. Then I couldn't stand it any more and broke down. He was very healthy and had a good sense of humor in good spirits all the way through."
