### Moves by Ike, Demos Hinted On Recession

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 (AP)—Both the Eisenhower administration and Democratic leaders in congress may move to take action on recovery measures including tax cut proposals if the economy doesn't pick up next month.

However, some Republican leaders profess to see signs that the economy may be about to make a comeback.

Secretary of Labor Mitchell said "I would think so" when he was asked Sunday if it was the consensus of the cabinet that a tax cut should be proposed to rise next month.

Sen. Decline in March

But Mitchell said he expects unemployment to decline in March after reaching a peak of perhaps 6.5 percent or 4,700,000 jobs this month. Unemployment in January was reported as nearly 7.1 million, or 5.8 per cent of the total civilian working force.

There already are signs the employment situation is improving, the labor secretary said in a television interview. But he said if the recession lingers he should get worse the administration will "do whatever is necessary" to reverse the trend.

Demos Plan Measures

Senator Mansfield of Montana, the assistant Democratic leader, said if things don't start looking better in March the Democrats in congress will "move immediately" to bring legislation into the breach with legislation now being drafted. Mansfield didn't specifically mention tax reduction, but it is known Democratic congressional leaders are considering such action.

Administration economic officials have predicted a business upturn by midyear.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Feb. 25—While Eastern states are knee-deep in snow, Idaho is up to its northern neck in sunshine, but that hasn't stopped a University of Idaho coed physical education ski class for one minute. They are practicing on straw, plied over the greening grass.

"Generally, there is ample snow to run the three courses in skiing offered during the second semester. This year, however, the first class was held in sunny, 60-degree weather without a snowflake in sight."

Asst. Professor Patricia Rowe of the women's physical education department, who is in charge of the classes, said, "The snow certainly isn't here, but it is slick enough to teaching skiing fundamentals."

The 33 skiers—in the classes—are doing kick turns, climbing steps, traverses and an occasional and untimely ride off the straw and into the grade on the slope behind the radio-TV building.

### Knowland Backs Nixon for Ballot

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 (AP)—Sen. William Knowland of California has set his sights on the 1960 or possibly 1968—Republican presidential nomination.

Knowland, the senate Republican leader who is running this year for governor of California, practically took himself out of the 1960 presidential contest with a conditional endorsement yesterday of Vice President Nixon.

"If I am elected governor of California, I expect to serve out my term," Knowland said in an interview. "I think Dick Nixon is likely to be the presidential nominee and I would support him."

Knowland made it clear, however, he is not foreclosing the possibility that he himself would become a candidate for the 1960 nomination if anything should happen to eliminate Nixon from the race.

### Slow Learner Is 'Forgotten' Pupil of U. S.

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 25 (U.S.)—Slow learners are the forgotten fifth of America's students and deserve a better break, a Minnesota educator said today.

All too often, said R. A. Tiesz, administrator, slow learners are overlooked and permitted to drift. They drop out of school after becoming convinced there is no hope of becoming graduates that they are being failed through no fault of their own.

And yet, Tiesz told the convention of the American Association of School Administrators, these are the people who will "do their share of the work of the world. They will cast their votes, they will participate in the activities of labor unions and farm organizations. They will make homes."

Tiesz said about 18 of every 100 school-age children are slow learners, with 12 of about 15 to 19. This does not include the two children in every 100 so mentally retarded that special education is required for them.

Many of the slow learners reveal unexpected aptitudes and talents when given the proper opportunities, Tiesz said.

"And this we must not forget," he added. "The slow learner can be a person who will 'do their share of the work of the world.' Americans cannot afford waste in education. Human resources are the country's greatest assets. The schools have been given the responsibility of educating all the children."

The slow learners must be identified as early as possible, Tiesz told the administrators, and special classes must be set up to give them the education they need.

These special classes call for special teachers, he said, teachers who have an unusual degree of understanding and a tremendous amount of patience, a real warmth for children—and above all they must want to teach children with the kinds of problems these children have."

# North Papers Rapped Over Race Trouble

CHICAGO, Feb. 25 (AP)—A southern editor has accused northern newspapers on the ground that they play up news about racial strife in the South while suppressing similar news events which occur in their own backyards.

Orover C. Hall, Jr., editor in chief of the Montgomery (Ala.) Advertiser, also accused northern politicians of abhorring segregation problems in their districts although they "moan" about Jim Crow in "Montgomery."

Hall and Harrison E. Salisbury of the New York Times spoke yesterday at the annual winter meeting of the Inland Daily Press association.

Salisbury, who has been investigating recent outbreaks of violence in Brooklyn schools, blamed teenage hoodlums, badly paid and "terribly poor social conditions" in which millions of persons exist.

The Pulitzer prize-winning reporter said solutions to the social problems in the United States must be found if this country is to stay ahead of Soviet Russia.

Hall was particularly critical of Chicago and Illinois in his attack on the "serious race problem of the South—the south side of Chicago—where more Americans are in immediate physical danger because of race strife than in all the southern states together," Hall said.

He said "if you want to talk about blood pollution, you can't credit practiced, evasion and defiance of the law on a grand scale—your state—no Jim Crow, no Montgomery, but Chicago, Detroit, Philadelphia, New York."



# University Gets \$58,000 to Help Summer Studies

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 (Special)—The University of Idaho has received \$58,000 for the summer study institute for high school science and mathematics teachers from the National Science Foundation. It was announced in Washington last week.

The money will be under the administration of W. H. Core, department of physical sciences, the foundation said.

Marjorie E. Hopkins, Idaho state college, received a three-year grant of \$4,800 for research in plant nutrition and associated plant diseases (see page 10).

The awards were part of 15 million dollars in funds distributed by the foundation during the second quarter of fiscal 1953. An independent federal agency, the foundation is directed by the national science board, under the director, Dr. Alan T. Waterman.

# League for Nursing Survey Indicates Future Nurse Shortages Facing Idaho

A statewide study conducted by the Idaho League for Nursing indicates Idaho faces a serious shortage of nurses in the years ahead.

The south central district health unit supervising nurse, Mrs. Sylvia Knight, league president, who discussed the contents of the report Monday, says "Idaho neither admits enough girls to nursing-school nor graduates enough 'trainee nurses'."

Mrs. Knight says Idaho's population is expected to increase by 18 per cent by 1970. "This will put our population near the million mark," she notes.

"Idaho's problem is that, even if we maintain our present nursing-training levels, we'll be going backward by 1970," she says.

A questionnaire was sent to the four schools in the state training nurses. Mrs. Knight says. These schools are St. Alphonsus hospital school, Boise Junior college; Falls college, Rexburg; and Idaho State college, Pocatello.

The schools were asked to furnish information about the number of nursing students admitted in the fall of 1957, how many of these were

from Idaho and how many were from out of state. Queries were sent at the same time to schools in Washington, Oregon, Montana and Utah requesting information on how many Idaho students were taking nurse training.

Mrs. Knight says 17,780 students were graduated from Idaho schools in the spring of 1957. "Of this total," she notes, "only 120 went into nursing training. Forty-five of them went out of state for their training. 84 were enrolled in the four schools. A total of 18 students came to Idaho from neighboring states to train," she says.

The schools also were asked to estimate how many more students they could have admitted. Mrs. Knight says, "Of the four schools, only one answered it couldn't have taken any more students. A total of 20 could have been accepted by the other three schools," she notes.

Mrs. Knight says the out-of-state schools answered they could have accepted 50 to 75 more Idaho students.

though there are three current investigations of juvenile delinquency, plus a congressional hearing scheduled to begin Thursday, no one is about to talk for fear of losing their jobs in the schools.

But let's go back to the white shopkeeper in Harlem near the corner of Park avenue and 125th street. Park avenue is no fancy thoroughfare there.

"I would be put out of business if my customers knew how I felt," he said, "but it's the God's truth. When it was a boy I could go anywhere in the city. We had fights, but it was with our fists. Now children carry knives and razors. I am out at night I walk in the middle of the street."

"In the old days we had immigration from Europe and the people were looking to better themselves. In this way they bettered the city. But today it is different."

"These people come here to get something for nothing. They take what the other person has. New York is becoming a jungle for the survival of the fittest. That is not something out of a movie. It is a fact."

Records of the police department show juvenile crime has increased 10 to 16 per cent during the past year in the age group under 16. It is up 10 per cent in the 16-20 age bracket. Although police kept no racial breakdown, they acknowledge the majority of crimes are committed by Negroes and Puerto Ricans.

"Many of my races attend the same schools without difficulty. They use identical playgrounds, swimming pools and gymnasiums. But doesn't mean some don't object."

On a snowy morning, I made my way to a church far out in the Queens area. I rounded up 11 teenagers from a Sunday school class and we talked about race relations.

"Negroes should have a chance for equal education and job opportunities," said a high school sophomore who goes to an integrated school.

"I am not a church member, but I don't believe race is the cause of the trouble we are in class at the other schools."

But these white teenagers also agreed there is a distinct line—an understanding, if you will—between the races out of school.

"They are good friends," Coleman said.

# Dizziness Blamed In 'Copter Crash

### Halogeton Project Reported by Solon

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—U. S. Senator Dwight Dornhak yesterday revealed that a \$100,000 program has been established for this year to control halogeton, a cattle and sheep-killing weed.

Dornhak said the atomic energy commission plans to spend \$20,000 on reservation lands under its control and that the bureau of land management aims to spend \$80,000. About 1,100 acres of AEO land will be treated as well as 8,000 acres of public land under the state's jurisdiction. In addition, the senator said, about 2,500 acres of infested land will be sprayed.

"Control work is sorely needed," said Dornhak. "Since a total of 12,000 acres of Idaho land is infested by the weed, I am now working on an accelerated long-range program."

## Bids Opened, Local School Board Has Lengthy Session Over Other Business

Bids on bus transportation and new lockers were opened by the Twin Falls school board Monday night at a special meeting called for that purpose, but other business resulted in a lengthy session.

Kirkman Bros. filed, submitted the only bid to operate two buses for Union school. The board accepted the bid of \$18.00 per day for each mile with a specification of 30 cents per mile for any additional mileage.

Kirkman Bros. presently operate the same bus service for \$17.45 per day for each bus. The new contract will run for a year.

Bids from four firms on the steel lockers were taken under advisement. Bids on 12 lockers were submitted by Caston's, Caldwell, \$1,025.57; Utah-Idaho School Supply,

(Salt Lake City, \$1,170.00 per locker; Northern School Supply, Portland, \$1,077.87; and Hill Equipment, Porterville, \$1,116.78, or \$450.00 less on different locks. Caston's also submitted a bid on 12 lockers for \$1,094.50, the difference in price involving a cartload shipment.

In other business, the board voted to pay \$400 toward the expense of enclosing a ditch behind the agricultural building. A request to take the high school band to Ely, Nev., for an event May 8, 9 and 10 was denied on the recommendation of high school principal V. L. Lefebvre, who noted it came too close to the close of school.

The board voted to offer 1958-59 contracts to all teachers except two notified by Caston's, Caldwell, \$1,025.57; Utah-Idaho School Supply,

end of the present school year, one whose certificate will expire and one who has been teaching only half time. Resignations were accepted from E. Shaw Robinson, Jr., high school speech and drama instructor, and Mrs. Ruth L. Kibler, high school Spanish instructor.

In other board action, trustees approved a recommendation to appoint a coordinator of English for the 8th, 10th, 11th and 12th grades. A number of recommendations submitted by the curriculum steering committee for the 1958-59 school year also were endorsed by the board.

The recommendations included a plan for additional equipment to be purchased for use in the elementary school science program. The committee also recommended expansion

of physical facilities and participation in science courses in junior high school.

Improvement in quality of science teaching was urged, not only from the standpoint of more facilities and equipment but also better classroom teaching by well qualified instructors.

Two years of science will be required for graduation beginning in 1959-60, reading will be required of all seventh graders and mathematics for all ninth graders.

The committee further recommended that four years of English should be required for graduation. Also, graduation requirements will include 18 units in 1959, 19 in 1960 and 20 in 1961. There will be no limit of credits in the elective field after the student has completed the basic requirements.

The committee also recommended new junior high school science books. Board members also voted to rein-

state a senior who had been expelled from high school for truancy. The boy and his mother were present.

The remainder of the meeting was devoted to presentation by Principal Lefebvre of a number of suggestions for changes in curriculum. Board members took no action pointing out the suggestion was under the jurisdiction of the State Board of Education, who is the director of curriculum.
