## Idaho Falls Man Selected As 'Outstanding Farmer' By Jaycees at Meet Here

John B. Gellings, 30, Idaho Falls, was named here Tuesday night as the state's outstanding young farmer of the year by the Idaho Junior Chamber of Commerce. The selection was announced at an awards banquet at the Turf club which was attended by approximately 60 persons, including finalists and officers of sponsoring Jaycee chapters. Second-place winner was Dean W. Parks, Blackfoot, and third-place honors were won by Dale Koester, Lava Hot Springs.

The Jaycee chapter stated Gellings was named the year's outstanding young farmer in 1934 when he was 20 years of age. In 1935, he contracted to buy the farm. He started with five acres. He now has 20 dairy cows. He grows hay, pasture, potatoes, wheat, barley and corn.

He has formed a cooperative movement with six neighbors to jointly own the group's irrigation during winter months. This represents a financial savings to the group.

The citation states Gellings "started with virtually no financial backing and has built an excellent farm with fine crops." He has made extensive soil and water tests to obtain the best possible utilization of his land and water, the citation stated. He is married and has five children.

## Prober Demands Custer For Mack on "Grossly Improper" FCC Dealing

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 (AP)—Rep. John R. Bennett, R., Mich., today called on President Eisenhower to fire—or Congress to impeach—FCC Commissioner Richard A. Mack. Bennett, a member of a house subcommittee investigating Mack's finances, said evidence so far has shown that Mack's dealings were "grossly improper." He told a reporter that Eisenhower should remove Mack from his post. Bennett said Mack should have the legal authority to remove Mack, the house should impeach Mack and Mack should be removed from office.

Bennett said that he would start proceedings to try to impeach Mack if the President does not remove him from office.

The President was asked about the Mack case at his news conference this morning. He pointed out that the justice department, through the FBI, is looking into the matter. He said that pending a report from the attorney general, he had no judgment to make at this time as to whether Mack should be ousted.

Bennett made his statement after the subcommittee heard new details of the financial web of Mack's financial dealings in Miami, his home town, with Thurman A. Whitehead, a local Cables attorney and lifelong friend.

The hearings have shown with some detail the matter dealt with by a member of the FCC, Bennett said.

Whitehead testified that before the award of channel 10, one of the National Airline's rival applicants, Col. A. Mack, had been a partner in a business which he continued to urge Mack to support the attempt to buy the station.

Whitehead also testified that he had withdrawn insurance business from Mack's company, in which Whitehead owns one-third of the stock. If the attorney did not "cease and desist" from dealing with Mack to be fair to National Airline.

## "Uke" Avers Upturn in Economy In Economy

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 (AP)—President Eisenhower said today it will take some time to stop the business recession, but he expressed the nation to abide in his confidence that there will be an upturn by mid-year. The President said the development of an upturn naturally would be a slow, gradual process. He remained confident that basic improvement in business and employment conditions would be evident by the middle of the year. In a news conference, Eisenhower made these other major points:

- He strongly defended Agriculture Secretary Ezra Benson and said he had no intention of asking Benson to resign.
- He denied a story published in Time magazine today that the cumulative effect of his illnesses since 1934 had forced him to make his workday by as much as 25 per cent.
- He declined to express an opinion on whether Richard A. Mack of the federal communications commission should resign.
- In discussing the sagging economy and possible methods of pulling it up, the President said a reduction in taxes was still a possible economic device, but he said he did not want to consider a tax cut until an event took place which would bring about an upturn.
- In the news conference discussion of the national economy, the President was asked about an apparent discrepancy or marked difference of opinion between his budget director, Percival Brundage, and Dr. Raymond J. Saulnier, chairman of the President's council of economic advisers.
- Saulnier has been represented as favoring a certain number of tax cuts in connection with an economic plan to be submitted to the President.
- Then the President was reminded that he had stated in his last news conference that he would favor a tax cut only as a last resort.
- He said today that he had not been particularly pleased with the impression that a tax cut would be employed only as a last resort.
- He said Saulnier and Brundage were not "entitled" to express their opinions but that when it came down to actual federal measures of economic policy, the President made the final decisions.

## Coroner Jury Boy May Lose Sight Following Explosion

John Brumback, 15, son of Mrs. Violet Brumback, Shoshone, was in "fairly good" condition Wednesday at Magie Valley Memorial hospital following an injury to his left eye during an explosion of dynamite in the town of Shoshone.

The youth, with two companions, Richard Sparks and Raymond Mitchell, both Shoshone, had removed the lead and powder from 27 caliber shells and filled the casings with powdered match heads. They then lit the casings with a hammer. The resulting explosion cut the boy's eyeball.

The accident happened at the home of Al Butterfield, grandfather of John Brumback, who was examining a Shoshone physician and then rushed by Deputy Sheriff Charles Pugh to the Twin Falls hospital.

His physician said Wednesday that it was too early to tell if the sight of his eye could be saved but chances were that it could not be saved.

STILL ROOM TO GROW... As population in the United States mounts toward the 100 million mark, it is creating great new problems.

We are a nation accustomed to receiving people from other shores, not to seeing them pack up and depart in search of better opportunities elsewhere.

How different it is in Europe, and has been for some centuries. The United States was originally populated by Europeans who fled their homelands, first to escape religious and other persecution.

Always, of course, countless millions have stayed behind, struggling to inch upward in the living scale. But many times a good part of most adventurous people have set out to America and other more distant havens of promise.

For all the improvement in Europe's post-war economy, the outward movement is occurring again in tight spots like Britain and Holland.

Last year some 220,000 persons left Britain, a country of 43 million. A 1937 poll shows that perhaps 10 million, a fifth of the total, would leave if they could.

In Britain as in Holland and other places the hardest time is taken by so many of those who are the young people whose skills and vitality are sorely needed to put new fire and spirit into nations tired of what seems an age-long struggle against crushing odds.

Here in America the increase in our difficulties has been the result of the steady enlargement of our living standards and our opportunities for rich human satisfaction.

The world would not have been surprised if the Tunisiacs, as the outraged party, had refused any move which suggested a bringing together of their representatives and the French. Their willingness to talk seems to reflect the fact that either nation could not forgive a deed as this cannot be permitted to weaken the resolve of truly free peoples to stand together.

Both sides, of course, have filed appeals and complaints before the United Nations. Whatever may be said there by either nation cannot free the French from the necessity of expressing to Tunisia the most profound regret over the bombing of innocent civilians.

### Cost of Living Rate Sets New High for U. S.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28 (AP)—The cost of living jumped six-tenths of one per cent in January to set a new record, the government reported yesterday.

The main factor in the general increase was recorded high prices for fruit and vegetables by freezing and rainy weather which ruined southern crops.

Higher Than 1957

The bureau of labor statistics said its consumer price index hit 122.9 per cent of 1947-49 prices. This was 2 1/2 per cent higher than a year ago. It was the 16th time in 17 months that the index climbed to a record peak. This was the largest monthly increase since a seven-tenths of one per cent rise in July, 1956.

The latest advance was disclosed as economists predicted five million Americans would be out of work this month.

**Great Prices Climb**

Ewart Clague, commissioner of labor statistics, said the price of all meats, from hamburger to ribs roasts, increased 4 per cent in January because of reduced livestock marketing.

Food prices generally were up 1 1/2 per cent, reflecting sharp rises in the price of fresh fruits and vegetables.

The rise in the index meant pay boosts for 1,350,000 workers. Wages were tied to the cost of living.

**Raises Pending**

Clague said about one million auto workers would get three cents an hour pay boosts while 350,000 others in the aircraft, farm equipment, and electrical machinery industries would get about two cents an hour more. The wage boosts will take effect March 1.

Clague said the next few months "don't promise much in the way of lower prices." He said the index has not yet felt the full effect of the crop-destroying freeze.

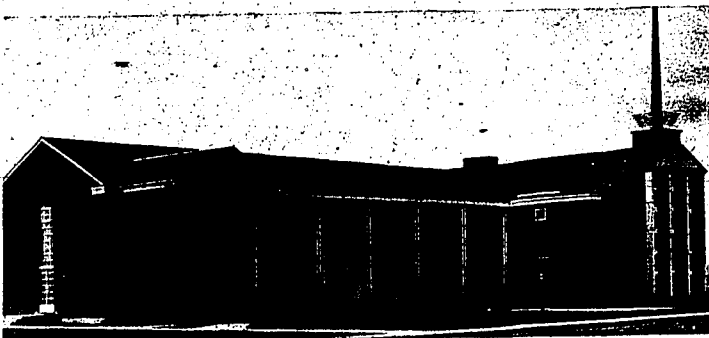

### East Germany Reds Divided In Party Split

**By United Press**

A serious split has developed in the leadership of the East German Communist party.

Three first-ranking men have been ousted from their posts in the last few weeks. Others are under attack.

It is reported persistently, despite denials, that Walter Ulbricht, the party leader, and Premier Otto Grotewohl are on opposite sides in which looks like a critical situation.

The split stems from disagreement on party policy—"Stalinist" Ulbricht, who favors a harsh dictatorship, against a number of "revisionist" leaders who favor a relaxation like that which has taken place in Poland.

But the quarrel also is reported to be due to the increasingly serious East German economic situation.

Ulbricht and his supporters are trying to speed up production at the expense of industrial workers, by increasing individual output quotas without raising wages.

Ulbricht's opponents favor concessions to industrial and farm workers. They fear that popular unrest might lead to a new uprising like that of June 17, 1953.

There is no evidence that such an uprising is likely. Nevertheless, East Germans obviously are unhappy.

They have only to contrast conditions in red-ruled East Germany with those in free West Germany, which is about the most prosperous country in Europe.

Ulbricht seems to be firmly in control of the party machinery. But disension is so serious that it is bound to weaken the communist regime unless it is ended.

### T.F. Residents Use 52 Per Cent More Electricity Than '52, Pay Low Rates

NEW YORK, Feb. 28 (Special)—Twin Falls residents are consuming electricity in their homes at a rate that is 52 per cent higher than it was in 1952, but the rate is lower than the national average.

Houses equipped only with electric lighting, refrigeration and a few basic appliances at that time have blossomed forth since then with all sorts of additional gadgetry.

The changes in the period, as to the amount of current used and the rates charged, are brought out in statistics made by the federal power commission in the Edison Electric Institute and others.

The cost of electricity in Twin Falls is 40 per cent higher than it charged elsewhere, is shown by the PFC in data covering more than 4,000 cities in the United States.

For 100 kilowatt hours, enough for lighting, refrigeration and small appliances, local people pay \$4.00 monthly, compared with an average of \$3.29 in the rest of the country.

For 250 kilowatt hours, which is about what most householders consume, the bill locally comes to \$9.54 a month. Nationally it is \$7.23.

The charges in other cities for this quantity vary widely. They range from a low of \$2.15 in Eugene, Ore., to a high of \$11.75, in Elms, Pa., states the PFC.

For 500 kilowatt hours a month local bills amount to \$3.80 as against \$10.29, on the average, throughout the country.

There is a direct connection, say the economists, between consumption of electricity and living standards. As one goes up, so does the other.

The consumption in the region that includes Twin Falls increased from 4,020 kilowatt hours a year in 1952 to 6,140 kilowatt hours per household in the past year, or 52 per cent.

With the expanding use of electricity and the lack of an unlimited supply of the facts that are necessary to generate it, the local range reaction is being played on nuclear energy as the fuel of the future. Scientists feel that at this time this generation, by conserving electricity generated by nuclear power.
