Blizzards Sweep Plains as Storms Of Rain Pelt East

A blizzard raked the western plains today while snow swept into the Midwest and heavy rains doused the Northeast. A foot of snow piled up at Dickinson, N. D., and Pierre, S. D., and 14 inches accumulated at Chadron, Neb. Drifts six to eight feet high formed in the Hays, Kans., area. Five highways were blocked in Kansas and one was blocked near Logan, Colo., for several hours early today. A school bus was last in the snow for a time near Natoma, Kans., but state police received a radio report that the young passenger found shelter.

The wind-blown snow hit the Dakotas, Nebraska and Kansas and extended into western Colorado, southeastern Wyoming and Oklahoma.

The snowstorm also rolled into the Midwest with a gust of snow up to four inches posted for parts of Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin and northern Indiana.

Driving rains and tidal flooding hit the Northeast. Some families left their homes along the Connecticut coast and a number of coastal roads were flooded.

Flash rains threatened some areas in the mid-Atlantic state and New England.

New York City was doused by 1.5 inches of rain in a 24-hour period—almost as much as the average rainfall there for the whole month of February.

Four inches of snow dropped on Alton in states of snow.

Snow was general over eastern Wyoming and drifting was reported at Cheyenne, Torrington, Wheatland.

150 Pints of Blood Is Local Quota for Bloodmobile at Legion Hall on Monday

Local Red Cross officials and transfusion workers hope to obtain 150 pints of blood Monday when the bloodmobile is stationed at the Twin Falls American Legion hall from 2 to 4 p.m. Tuesday.

The bloodmobile will have a quota of 125 pints of blood when it stops at the Legion hall from 2 to 4 p.m. Tuesday.

Blood is collected by the Red Cross to be used for emergency and routine use by the public.

A Twin Falls woman, Mrs. John Hansen, has been selected as the donor of the blood program. She has experienced complicated bleeding during an operation and needs 1 1/2 pints of blood.

Delay for Bond Vote To May Is Predicted

The bond election originally scheduled for sometime in April for the proposed sewage disposal plant probably will not be held until May, it was predicted today by the city engineer.

Lattimore said selection of a fiscal agent and an outside engineer would delay the election at least 30 days. The city manager explained that the law required that the city ordinance calling for the election had to include estimates of the plant costs and the methods to be used in financing it.

Lack of Student's Desire to Think Is One of Biggest Problems for Teacher

Many of those who do inquire are concerned with methods, with "how" not with "why." In part, this is because those students who do bother to think at all, think of professional competence as the equivalent of knowledge. They understand the necessity of techniques as the purpose of their learning, for it is the type of skill which most occupations require.

The unwillingness of students to wonder about the "why" of things is a serious problem. Pre-school children are notable for their curiosity and inquisitiveness. Their ability to ask questions is remarkable. As they grow older, however, this ability to wonder and to ask questions is pushed to the frontiers of their knowledge.

Bus Hurled Into River by Crash; 21 May Reach 21

PRESTONSBURG, Ky., Feb. 28 (AP)—A school bus carrying an estimated 38 children struck a wrecker, slideswung an automobile, and then plunged into the Levisa fork of the Big Sandy river here today.

Alex Derossett, was trapped in 30 feet of water. Sixteen others were known to have escaped through a rear door. Six were hospitalized. The National Safety council said it undoubtedly is one of the worst school bus crashes in its history.

March Business Climate Has Blustery Aspect, Sunny Also

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—The business climate in March seems sure to be as changeable as the weather. On this rainy side, President Eisenhower is counting on a seasonal lull in employment to perk up business confidence.

A covey of industrialists are predicting that in resurrected February will be seen to have marked the bottom of the slump in their lines. On the blustery side March will blow in some business optimism—mostly telling how bad things were in February.

Marchants will worry about bad weather and an early winter which may hold down apparel sales.

Taxpayers will find a mixture of sweet and sour too. There seems sure to be more talk in March of cutting taxes. But at the same time the Pentagon is set to ask for another hike in defense spending.

The treasury may record to pay the bills for awhile, but sooner or later the work will set the money in from tax collections.

March may see a testing of the widely held belief that home building is due to pick up.

Several top steelmen say that customer inquiries give them hope that orders will pick up modestly in March.

A leading maker of machine tools says that new orders are a bit

healthier now than last fall. He believes the low point in his industry has been passed.

If so, March could be a step or two away from the wait-and-see position which many business firms have taken up in recent months.

Given an assist from the weather, March could bring some relief from high food prices as Southern produce farms start producing well again.

Good weather might thaw out some of that price resistance which has held auto sales down in recent months.

Few look for any real upsurge of industry in March. But if it does nothing more than stop the downswing many will be happy.

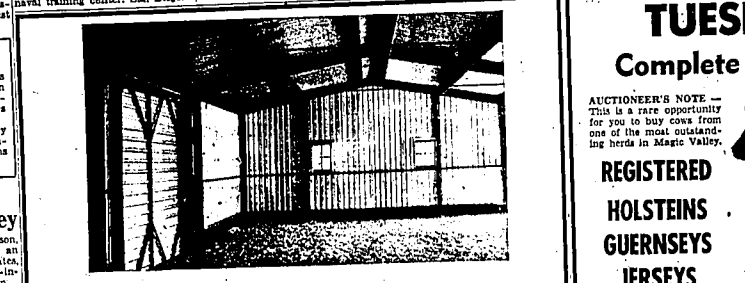

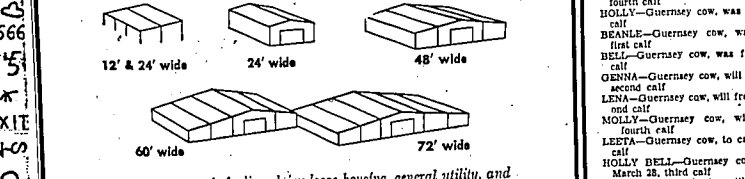

"Our daughter, a lovely girl in her freshman year in college has a crush on her science teacher, a man year absorbed in his work and with no interest in the child, the professional one of a teacher."

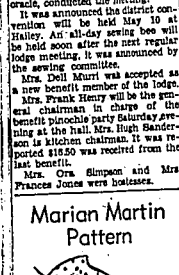

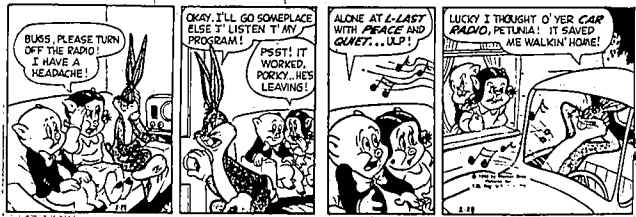
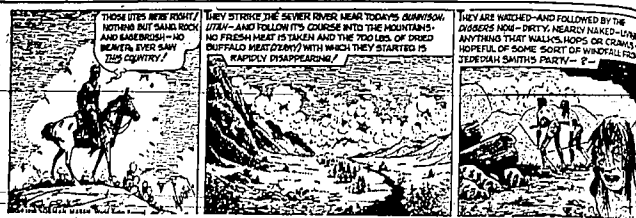
