Top Level Confab For East, Russia Suggested in S.

WASHINGTON, March 5 (AP)—President Eisenhower said today Russian leaders have sent word they are willing to come to Washington for a summit conference. He said he thinks there might be a good arrangement if such a conference was going to last for a while. It was to be just a short meeting, Eisenhower told a news conference, and he would be ready to go on any convenient date. But for a long session, he said, he should stay in the United States.

Eisenhower said, however, it would be absolutely futile and damaging to attempt to hold any summit meeting at all without very careful preparation and adequate evidence of achievement. The United States, he continued, never will close the door on East-West talks. He said if there is any possible avenue no matter how crooked and no matter how narrow that will take the two even one step toward the achievement of peace, he is willing to try it.

But he endorsed Secretary of State Dulles' warning yesterday against becoming involved in some sort of "box-as-Dulles-called-it." Dulles also used the word "fraud" in his speech. He said the United States would not want to become involved in Eisenhower's "fraud" but in using the word "fraud" but in any case he was sure Dulles didn't mean to close the door on talks.

Eisenhower added he had a long talk with Dulles before and after the news conference and his comments reflect the president's own views on a summit meeting.

In the course of the news conference, the president also said that he had other matters to discuss. Economic Secretary expressed the view that spending federal money to pay legislation freezing 1958 farm prices at 1957 levels is a little better than no action at all with needed adjustments in production.

Benson Attacks Critics of Farm Assistance Plan

WASHINGTON, March 5 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Benson struck back yesterday at critics of the post of farm assistance program. He told a news conference that there have been some "hoax and intrigue" statements made recently about expenditures for such programs, and added: "If the critics say we are spending too much to help farmers I disagree with them."

Asked—who are these critics, Benson said he understood some criticism had been made by columnist Drew Pearson. He added that he had not read Pearson's writings.

The secretary said it was true that more money is being spent now for farm assistance than in previous administration. Some of the increase, he said, reflect developments in programs for agricultural research, conservation, watershed and forestry developments.

The cabinet officer added that all money spent had been appropriated by congress "in its wisdom." Furthermore, he said, many benefits of the expenditures go beyond the farmers.

Some of the increased spending, Benson said, grew out of programs for crop production and marketing, credits and price supports which he declared, have not worked to the benefit of farmers in their efforts to adjust from wartime-to-peace conditions.

Consequently, he said, reference to expansion under these programs is a little better than no action at all with needed adjustments in production.

Jupiter-C Carries Explorer II Ahoft To Encircle Globe

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., March 5 (AP)—The army launched a Jupiter-C rocket today and it climbed toward space on legs of fire, carrying a second bullet-shaped Explorer satellite expected to go into orbit not far behind the first. It would be two hours after the 1:28 p.m. EST firing before it would be announced from Washington whether an orbit had been achieved. The first Explorer was fired Jan. 31 and had made 418 trips around the Earth by today.

After the 70-foot missile carrying the new Explorer disappeared into a bank of clouds that hung some 400 feet over the cape and was lost to view.

Minutes later, reports began to come in from widely scattered spots—"signals picked up."

The minitrack station at Antigua, in the West Indies, recorded the signals minutes after the firing. The Radio Corporation of America laboratories on Long Island heard them; so did the radio station at Ft. Monmouth, N. J.

To observers, the four-stage Jupiter-C seemed almost certain to bring America's second man-made "moon" in the heavens. This one is called Explorer II, or, scientifically, "1958 B-1."

The air force announced that the Jupiter-C was launched from the missile test center at 1:28 p.m. EST as part of this country's participation in the international geophysical year.

Banks Healthy During Slump; Sources Claim

NEW YORK, March 5 (AP)—Not a single bank in the nation has failed because of the current mild banking recession, banking sources said today.

Today's unique situation is in marked contrast with the quarter century ago when the nation's banking industry was in its biggest slump.

Back in 1933, after four years of deep depression, banks were in a weakened condition.

According to the federal deposit insurance corporation, in the 1930s an average of about 600 banks failed each year, and in the first four years of the 1930s bank failures averaged 600.

Depositors' losses in banks closed between 1921 and 1933 reached nearly \$3 billion, while bank stocks experienced even heavier losses.

Two days after Franklin D. Roosevelt inaugurated for the first time, he proclaimed a national bank holiday which ran from March 6 to March 15, 1933.

Congress resumed work on legislation that had been passed for the Hoover administration.

The result was the banking act of 1933, a bill which among other things provided for insurance of bank deposits—at first up to \$2,500, then \$5,000, and currently up to \$10,000.

Not only did the deposit insurance provide protection for average depositors, but also the banking laws generally were strengthened to provide stricter bank supervision.

Today the failure of banks runs and consequent failures is wiped out, say the experts. And that, they add, is a major reason why the present recession will be kept from spreading into a depression.

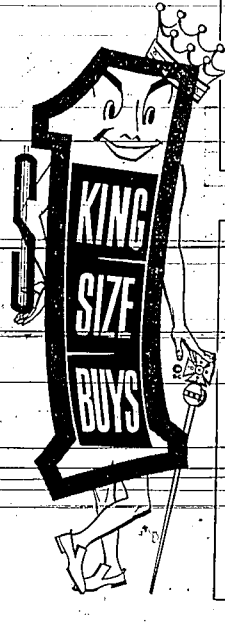

Africa Looms As New Goal In Red Moves

LONDON, March 5 (AP)—The world's most important fact of a new upsurge of unrest born of nationalism in Africa encouraged by the communists.

This was the ominous warning in diplomatic reports received here over the past few months. Within all agreed that Africa was the next target.

Propaganda Renewed

From Cairo there were reports this past week-end of a renewed propaganda drive for Afro-Asian unity.

The London Times reported this with the comment that it was the mark to believe Colonel Nasser is forging another of his nationalist words with which to smite the West and increase his own bargaining power.

Other reports over the past month have indicated a reorientation on the thesis that unrest in Africa at this critical stage would suit Nasser and increase his own bargaining power.

The Afro-Asian solidarity secretariat formed in Cairo last December has been carrying the new creed to Africa.

Agreement Made

At the Afro-Asian solidarity conference in Cairo last December it was agreed that by 1958 the 21 permanent secretaries from as many Afro-Asian nations should be working to work on fulfilling the resolutions of the conference.

So far none has arrived, although appointments have been announced by Japan, the Cameroons and India.

Indonesian Feels Revolt Near End

SINGAPORE, March 5 (AP)—Indonesian diplomat Nazir Pannontjak today predicted an early end to the central Sumatra revolt with both President Sukarno and the rebels making concessions.

Pannontjak, Indonesian ambassador to the Philippines, predicted that former Vice President Mohammad Hatta will return to the government "possibly by the end of this week."

With Hatta's return, he said, "the bottom will fall out of the revolt."

He hinted that return of the ex-vice president would result in the curbing of Sukarno's powers.

15 Dead in Riot

KARACHI, Pakistan, March 5 (AP)—Five to 10,000 persons rioted for more than four hours in a fight over water in this water-short city yesterday.

Witnesses estimated eight to 15 persons were killed, but these figures were not considered reliable because public relations officials said at least 20 were injured and 21 arrested, but admitted he did not have complete details.

"I do. I have to sweat."

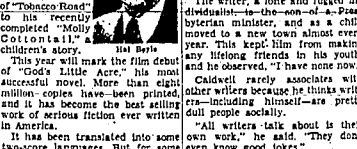

SAN FRANCISCO, March 5 (AP)—The 12-state western pine region lumber industry achieved a 16 per cent reduction in industrial injuries in 1957 as the result of an organized safety program. It was announced here today.

Nixon Travel To Russia Is Being Talked

WASHINGTON, March 5 (AP)—Vice President Nixon is seriously considering a visit to the Soviet Union in September, perhaps in exchange for a trip to the United States by Deputy Soviet Premier Anastas Mikoyan.

Substantive officials said Nixon might also visit Poland, Yugoslavia and six western European nations during a five-week tour as President Eisenhower's representative.

Nixon's stop in Moscow, they said, would depend on arranging a visit with a Soviet leader of about equal rank to this country.

Mikoyan's name has been mentioned frequently by diplomatic planners as an acceptable man but no formal invitation has been made.

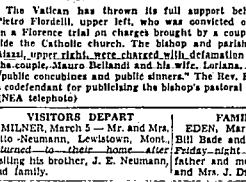
In deputy premier, as well as top economic-trade planner, Mikoyan's influence seems to be rising even though he is a holdover from Stalin's days.

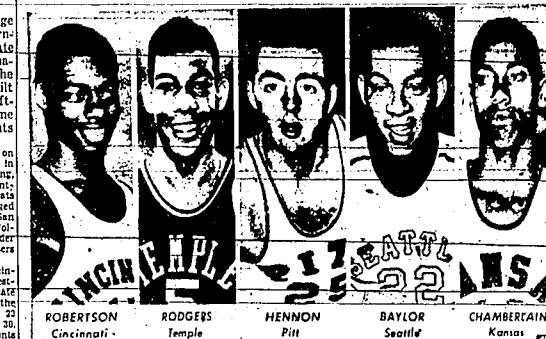
