Security Test of Mails Could Cost Man Five Years

NEW YORK, March 7 (AP)—An amateur criminologist faces a possible five years in prison and \$2,000 fine for "testing post office security" by pocketing a letter while working as a postal clerk.

The former temporary postoffice employee, John Miller, 34, pleaded guilty in federal court Wednesday to delaying and securing U. S. mail. Miller—graduate of a criminology course, said he took a letter containing coins from a batch of mail and intended to return it unopened later as a test to see how well guarded the mails were.
