Income Said Larger Than Mack's Wage

WASHINGTON, March 8 (U.P.)—Representative Harris, D. Ark., said today that Richard A. Mack may have had an income of up to \$750,000 in the two years when his official duty as a federal communications commissioner was out beyond half the amount.

The same-time Harris announced in the scheduling of Mrs. Mamie C. Mack's brother-in-law, Col. George Gordon Moore, for the trial of testimony March 10 before the house subcommittee investigating regulatory agencies.

Harris said Moore was not appearing under subpoena and had not been asked to bring any interest in the FCC's award of license in the Miami, a main interest channel 10 case, subject of the house inquiry so far.

Harris did not say whether he would bring any other evidence. Mack resigned last Monday after a committee hearing with Thurman A. Whitacre, a Miami lawyer who was a witness in the Mack case.

The committee members, Rep. J. O'Hara, R. Minn., had started on the hearing to go into commission records indicating Mack's income of "around \$750,000" in two years. During that time, Harris figured Mack's pay as an FCC commissioner was first \$150,000 and then raised to \$200,000 a year.

Harris said Mack received some \$1100 beyond what he received in his salary, Harris said. He said the grand jury look over committee records of Mack's accounts and bank statements had to drop the matter for the time being.

Whitacre testified Monday while Mack was separately stated for a Frank J. Kelley, one of the unsuccessful applicants award as having "engineered" Mack's successful application. Kelley testified scheduled for testimony Tuesday.

Concrete Is Laid In Dam Structure BROWNLEE, March 8 (U.P.)—Idaho Power company reported Saturday it has finished laying the last major concrete structure for the Brownlee dam hydroelectric project on the Snake river basin.

Concrete is being laid for the powerhouse intake structure, the company said. The intake will funnel water from Brownlee's reservoir into penstocks which lead through tunnels to the turbines in the powerhouse.

Water will flow to the intake through a rock wall 150 feet long and 160 feet deep. Idaho Power said the structure will be equipped with huge gates that can be dropped over the entrance to seal them for maintenance purposes.

Soviet Warns Southeastern Asian Group

MOSCOW, March 8 (U.P.)—The Soviet government called Saturday night for establishment of an atom-free zone and a system of collective security in Asia and the Far East. The call came in a 3,000-word communication of the Sovietist Asia Treaty Organization (SEATO) conference which convenes in Manila this week.

The official statement, released by the government news agency Tass, made no specific proposals. It warned nations of Asia and the Far East they would lay themselves open to nuclear retaliation—presumably from the Soviet Union—if they agreed to the establishment of nuclear or rocket bases on their territory.

Warnings on More

The Kremlin charged the NATO powers were aiming to link Western with SEATO and warned that such a move "would place SEATO's Asian members in even greater danger."

It said that such a collision could contaminate the surface water of an eight-mile long, three-mile wide, 50-foot deep harbor that radiation exposure, in the area would be as follows:

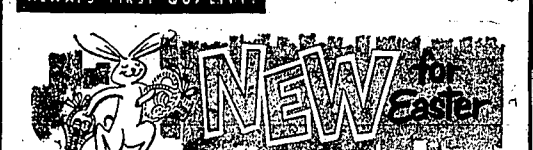

Western Regions Hit in Rain, Snow

Showers and snow flurries spread over much of the far west between the Pacific coast and the northern Rockies Saturday. Cool air flowing in from the ocean carried a threat of frost to California's interior valleys. A pattern of rain, snow and sleet formed between the plains region and the Mississippi valley. Most other sections of the nation had dry weather.

Dip Reported For Idaho on '58 Buildings

Total construction value in Idaho in 1937 was six per cent above the 1936 level, and the dwelling construction value last year showed a one per cent increase over 1936, according to figures compiled by the statistical department of the Equitable Savings and Loan association. The figures show that only Idaho showed an increase in building activity, compared to decreases of 14 per cent in Washington and 13 per cent in Oregon and British Columbia.

Total dwelling construction value in Twin Falls, however, dropped in low 1936 levels last year. The construction figures show a 35 per cent drop in construction from 1936 to 1937.

Idaho's total in 1937 amounted to \$28,480,142, compared to a 1936 figure of \$28,912,250. Burley showed a 223 per cent increase from 1936 last year, the association reports. Total construction value rose from \$44,720 in 1936 to \$1,770,070 last year. No other Idaho city reported so great a percentage increase.

Construction totals for 34 cities show \$10,338,303 worth of building, 12 per cent behind 1936's record of \$10,827,500.

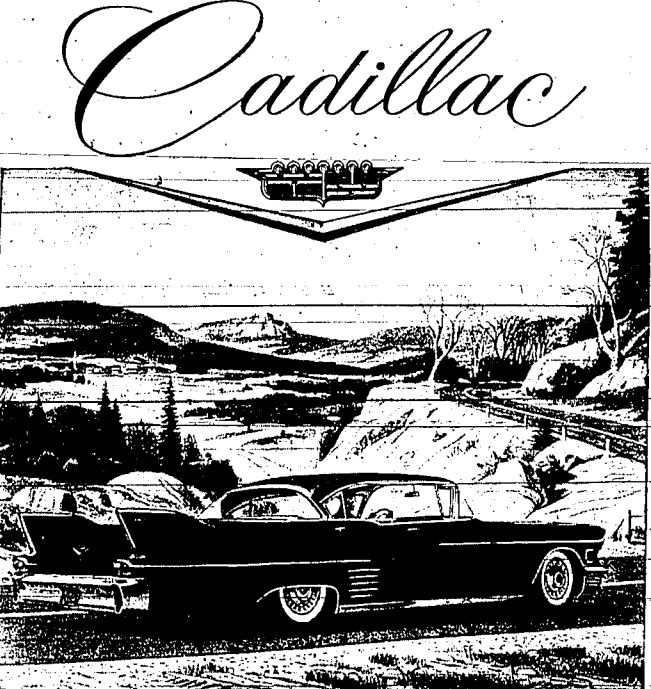

\$15,655 Case Is Filed Over Pay for Note

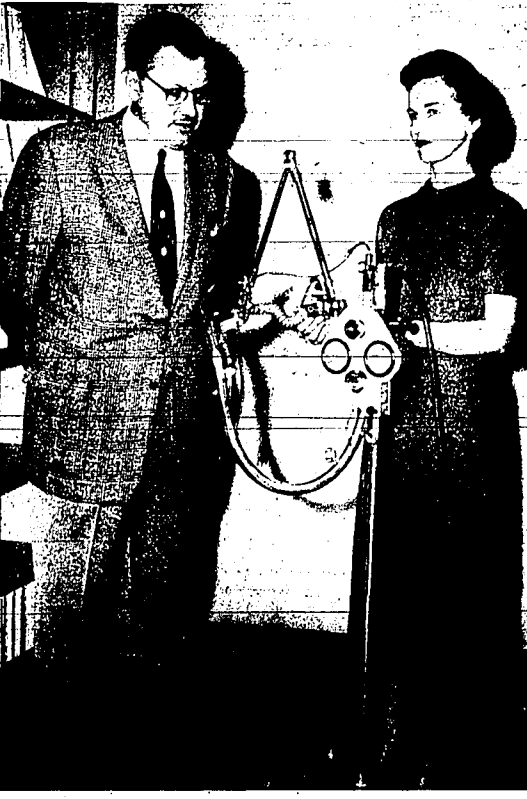

A pressure breathing therapy unit for use in the treatment of respiratory and cardiac disease was presented Friday in Magic Valley Memorial hospital by Mrs. Kenneth Self, Twin Falls.

The unit was purchased with money provided by friends of Mrs. and Mrs. Self who contributed to a memorial fund following his death in 1937. A unit similar to the one presented the hospital was used to treat Mr. Self when he was stricken with pneumonia.

The hospital did not own such a unit at the time and one had to be bought and brought to the hospital for its use.

Dr. W. M. Peterson, president of Magic Valley Memorial hospital medical staff, accepted the unit from Mrs. Self on behalf of the hospital. We are deeply grateful to Mrs. Self, her family and their many friends for providing such a fine and useful piece of equipment, it will be used for treating respiratory and cardiac emergencies," Dr. Peterson said.

Mrs. Irene Oliver, hospital administrator, expressed thanks to Mrs. Self for the gift.

Mrs. Self said the gift to the hospital was possible through the kindness of Mr. Self's many friends.

The intermittent positive pressure breathing therapy unit is an intricate and ingenious device whereby oxygen is blown forcefully into the patient's lungs only at the time he is breathing in. The patient then naturally expires his oxygen that has been blown into his lungs. A cycling device on this machine can be set at any desired rate of breathing in case the patient has stopped breathing. In effect, this does the same as the "iron lung" in that it breathes for the patient except that oxygen is blown in instead of being sucked in as it is in the respirator.

With certain accessory devices that are attached to the machine one can spray in along with the oxygen various antibiotics and other drugs

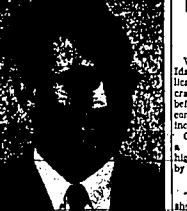
Melton claims the warrant from Texas was issued Dec. 20, 1957, and was created and placed in jail on Feb. 18. On Feb. 29 a second warrant was sent Gillette which was dated Feb. 27. Melton says it is not known if he is being held on the first or second warrant.

The petition states that on Feb. 16, Melton signed a waiver of extradition on the first warrant but has not signed any papers whatsoever with reference to the second warrant.

Melton has been held in the city jail since Feb. 18 by Gillette without bail—the petition claims—and Melton has no knowledge as to what disposition is being made of the charges against him. Further he states he has been committed to jail on a criminal charge which is without reasonable or probable cause.

Chief Gillette said Saturday that Texas officers are on their way to Twin Falls to take custody of the man. In Texas he is charged with larceny by bailer and is supposed to have taken money from the company for which he worked in Houston, Texas.

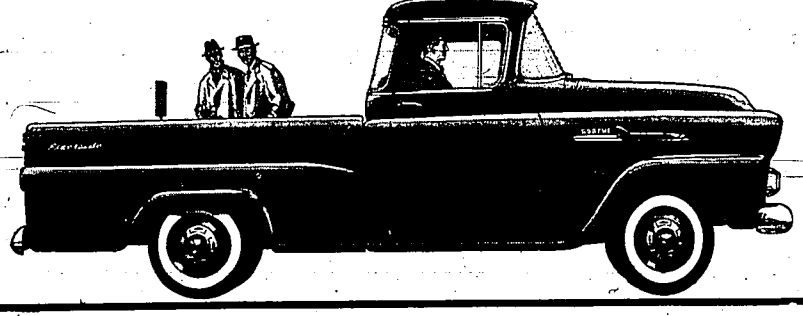

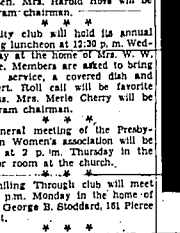

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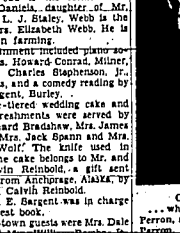

T.F. Man Takes Positive Step Against Current Trend of U.S. Toward Statism

A firm conviction the United States taxpayer is dangerously close to losing his economic, social, individual and political freedoms coupled with a driving desire to do something about it has led a Twin Falls man to take a positive step in obtaining "statism."

Thomas W. Silvers, 144 Juniper street—north—has purchased 11 volumes from Caxton Printers, Ltd., Caldwell, concerning the shift of power from the individual to the federal state, loose and erroneous use of political and economic terms, American governmental structure, liberalism, dangers of statism, and the constitution.

The books will be presented Monday at the Twin Falls public library. The books are part of 34 volumes printed and published by the Caldwell firm for its "Libertarian Library."

Asked why he purchased the books and why he will give them to the library, Silvers said, "For a long time I have been alarmed with our country's heading drift toward socialism and the fact we are currently raising an entire generation who are rapidly becoming imbued with the concept of the welfare state."

Silvers further explains that "many of today's sophistries and fallacies which plague us are from seeds planted in our schools and universities by liberals and social reformers to deliberately confuse and befuddle future generations and lull them to an acceptance of socialism."

He strongly recommends the reading of one of the books, "Political and Economic Structures" for a clear understanding of what is being taught students today.

"Briefly, I am genuinely alarmed at the students and younger generations' blind acceptance of the liberalistic fallacies of the welfare state. As I see it, the social is a parasite. He does not recognize the necessity of paying his own way, but why should he? We pay it for him," Silvers said.

He went on to say that the average American student did not know the difference between Democracy and a republic and if questioned, would answer that the American form of government is a democracy.

"This is not true. The American governmental structure is a republic. It is shown to be the most perfect type of republic ever developed. Our free enterprise, at one time, was the most modern and progressive economic system."

Silvers remarked that Webster's definition of republic and democracy drew a relatively fine line, but said that one of the books, "Political and Economic Structures," clearly explains the difference. The book was written by Bela Hubbard.

Webster defines a republic as "a state in which the sovereign power resides in a certain body of the people (the electorate) and is exercised by representatives elected by and to the people, responsible to them."

A democracy is defined as "Government by the people; a form of government in which the supreme power is retained by the people and exercised either directly or indirectly through a system of representation."

Other 10 books donated to the library are:

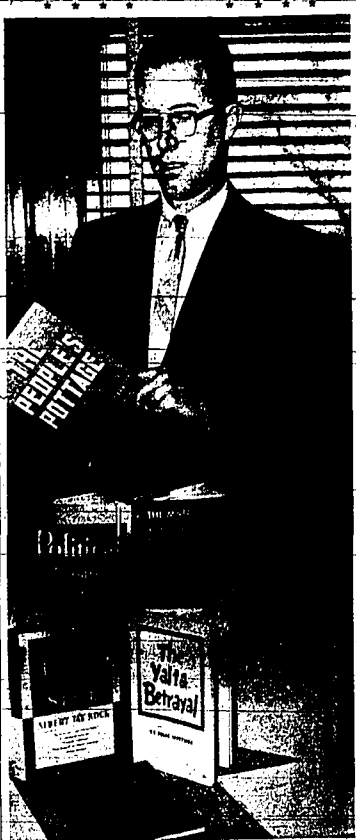
- "America at the Crossroads," "The American Inheritance," "Freedom in America," "Olive Ma Liberty," "Our Enemy, The State," "The Man Power," "The Constitution of the United States of America, A Bulwark of Liberty," "The People's Politics," and "Seven Psychological Principles Versus Power Politics."

Silvers visited the Caxton Printers publishing house last fall. He has known the president, J. H. Gibson, for many years and has long been interested in the firm's publications.

Gibson was described in a recent publication as "a liberate spirit who personifies all that is resourceful, self-reliant and imaginative in the saga of American individualism."

With his father, Gibson built Caxton Printers from a small beginning to its present dimensions and is handling today a volume of business estimated at 1½ million dollars annually.

Gibson began bringing out his books for his "Libertarian Library"

"One of the hobbies which we hope to see every year," Mrs. Dreyer says, "is Mrs. Francis Erickson's birds. These birds are always a crowd attraction. The exhibits are the famous talking mynahs and several cages of parakeets.

"One of the hobbies which will be included also will provide musical instruction for the bazaar. It is the stereophonic sound record which belongs to John Deweller. Made from the new equipment, it will be exhibited in the form of horse

which he has carved from pieces of Oregon pine. The finished product gives the listener the impression he is seated in front of a large orchestra.

All recordings for the new sound equipment are on tape. The tape has a dual track which can be played on a regular tape recording machine which is equipped with a special head.

The head has facilities to pick up the two different sound tracks which have been recorded on two different channels. From the pickup device, the sounds are sent to two different amplifiers which in turn relay to two speakers. One speaker is for "high" and the other for "low" sounds. If one speaker alone is played, the music sounds flat.

Although Deweller purchased kits to make the sound equipment, all wiring and installations have been assembled by him. Complicated instructions accompany the kits, but only a hobbyist or an electrical engineer would attempt to assemble such a gadget, Mrs. Dreyer notes.

Another hobbyist who will display his work of art at the bazaar is Willis W. Goly. Goly's hobby is wood sculpturing. Goly's talent will be exhibited in the form of horse

Students Welcome Course in Conservation, Weapons

The 1200 students at Twin Falls high school have enthusiastically received a three-hour course in conservation and weapons. The course is a part of the new curriculum and is being offered to all students.

The course, under the direction of four state fish and game conservation officers, consists of one-hour classes on three successive days. Classes consist of 200 students each and six classes run from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. in the junior high school auditorium.

The aid-of-films, charts and pictures students are taught the various parts of a gun, how each is used and the proper method of lining up the front and rear sight on the target.

Mr. O'Leary said all junior high school students were included in the course this year. The state fish and game department planned to limit the course to one grade in subsequent years.

Near year, the course would be restricted to seventh graders only. Seventh graders are usually 12 or 13 years old and state law prohibits anyone under 16 years of age from possessing a gun.

Mr. O'Leary said it is of prime importance to good hunting and good relations.

In addition, students are taught the proper method of handling a gun before shooting and the dangers of shooting across and over water. Emphasis is placed on what a gun is intended to do, and what it can do if handled improperly. The latter was demonstrated by a picture of hunting accidents.

The films show the right and wrong way to care and handle a gun. Students are taught respect for the land owner and the importance to good hunting and good relations.

The course is being given by Conservation Officers Marion Rhodes, Twin Falls; Russell C. Hart, Ontario; Mike Throckmorton, Boise; and Earl and Throckmorton are former teachers.

Occasional Excitement Breaks up Port of Entry Station Monotony

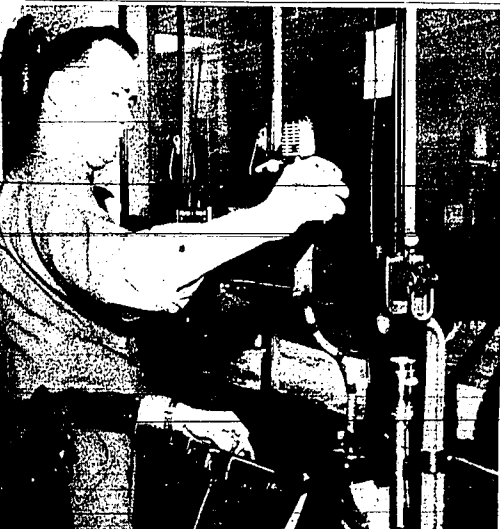
It's a long and lonely vigil but sometimes things get exciting at the port state patrolmen who man the Hollister port of entry station.

The trucks who form a constant stream in and out aren't usually the cause of the excitement. The trucks who cause excitement are those that come in from the north.

But that isn't the purpose of the port of entry. Show points out. The station is operated in which trucks are licensed, checked for weight, checked their licenses, checked brand inspections and issue licenses for out-of-state vehicles.

The port of entry is located on Highway 91 west of Juntura, Oregon.

The station serves as a dispatching point, he explains. The port of entry serves to dispatch police patrol cars by radio and the patrol cars keep the men at the port of entry notified of their location.

Apprehending speeders is usually accomplished by men at the station as they travel to aid from work in a police car. Or, if they notice an automobile driving past the port of entry at excessive speed, they radio to a patrol car who checks out the speeder. Shows explains.

Shows adds that many drunken drivers are nabbed because other drivers notify the station.

If a truck driver stops and tells of an accident, he calls the driver apparently drunk, then they try to flag the driver down or radio to a patrol car," he adds.

Truck drivers give the men at the station many tips about drivers, highway conditions and even report stolen cars.

Just recently, Show explains, a driver of a Garrett freightliner truck spotted a car which had been stolen in Twin Falls. The thief had left the car in the middle of the highway and the trucker almost hit it during a snowstorm.

It was the third stolen car that driver has spotted, added another Garrett driver who had stopped at the station.

An incident where officers at the station apprehended a fugitive which is most prominent in the minds of the men who work at the port of entry involved two cowboys who (Continued on Page 11, Column 1)

WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—A man who has known Ezra T. Benson for years said recently, partly in admiration and partly in bewilderment, that Benson "is a dedicated man, a dedicated man to his country, a stubborn man to his beliefs, a bulldozed man to his will, and a sometimes devious man to his enemies."

An example of the type of stubborn Benson usually provokes happened on the day after President Eisenhower's veto of the 300-ward Senate apportionment bill. Benson appeared before the senate agriculture committee accompanied by his pretty daughter, Beverly.

He also brought along a 24-page statement, but before he could enter one word of the 300-ward bill, Benson was interrupted by the committee chairman Allen J. Ellender, D. La., attacked the whole statement as full of errors and announced a plan to move or leave you down as you go along.

Sen. Ellender, D. Pa., protested the chairman's technique but was not heard. Yet Benson said his plan was to talk as hard as he could.

Benson, a 46-year-old, long-haired man with a white mustache, is a farmer and a legislator. He is known for his stubbornness and his ability to get his way.

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At 10:30 Benson had succeeded in getting 84 votes on the record. At 11:30 Sen. John Williams, R. Ind., broke in to say:

"The chairman, I was called out of the room about an hour ago, when we were at the bottom of page 10. Can you tell me where we are now please?"

"We are at the bottom of page 10," Benson said.

And so it went. With time out of joint, Benson finally struck out at the end of 3:24 p. m.

Along the way he had heard words like these:

"From Ellender: 'Inaccurate.'"

"From Sen. Stuart Symington, D. Mo.: 'Insufficient.'"

"From Sen. Robert Humphrey, D. Ala.: 'Public advertising.'"

Through all this Benson kept his temper, although a close observer might have noticed when the final vote was thrust out a fraction of an inch and the back of his neck reddened.

But his voice usually remained calm and patient like that of a missionary. "Public advertising," he said, "is not a matter what the health is."

This analogy was chosen deliberately, For Benson, following the custom of his father, once served as a missionary. From 1921 to 1923 he carried the message of the LDS church to the British Isles. By that time he had himself and 20 others and has a large family of 49.

Government service, he had become one of the Mormon's 12 apostles.

Nearly everyone who has studied Benson has pointed out that he has carried this zeal over to his politics.

He had scarcely sat down to be secretary of agriculture before his missionary zeal moved him to make statements like: "Too many Americans are calling on Washington to do for them what they should be willing to do for themselves."

Adults in the RUPERT area have indicated such a strong desire for further education that they have practically swamped the school system. Let's inspect high school principal, says the enrollment of this year is far beyond expectations of instructors who planned the classes which meet each Monday.

Plans are under way now to offer more subjects and to start classes earlier next year for MINIDOKA's eager adult students. One of the best attended is Howard Bruns' bookkeeping class with an enrollment of 54.

Another popular course is first year typing taught by Mrs. Edna Bowman. When 45 signed up she had to divide the class with one group meeting at 7 p.m. and the second at 8:30 p.m. so the typewriters would go around.

Mrs. W. E. Dabry, housewife, mother and grandmother, is taking typing to help her keep genealogical records for the LDS church. She does a lot of research and recording and thinks it would be easier to type than write. She has six children; four of whom are married. One of her daughters is a typewriter.

One lone man, Bill Woody, a self-construction employe, has signed up for advanced typing where speed and proficiency are taught. Woody says his typewriter stands some improvement. Among the 15 women students are Mrs. Rula Nelson and her daughter, Mike. Mike is a junior at Minico and is taking first year typing in regular school. This year she gets two years training in one.

Robert Larson teaches advanced typing and also has 13 pupils in a shorthand class. Eighteen others have signed up for a home economics course taught by Mary Lynn Wakelield.

One of the most interesting classes offered in American history and government taught by Harold Hirst for people preparing for citizenship. Of the 15 members in the class, four are from Holland; three from Germany; three from Denmark and the others from Spain, Italy and England.

Hirst says it is remarkable how these students cover the material and adds that it would be very hard to find 15 natural born citizens who could pass the examinations necessary for citizenship.

Mrs. Robert Riley teaches Spanish to 45, also in a divided class, with one group meeting early and the other later. Class members are taking this course partly for their own satisfaction and partly to deal with transient laborers who come into the community each year.

The really big response has been in the shop and welding classes, according to Ingersoll, where 100 persons will have participated when the last pieces are finished.

Taught by Keith Merrill and Mel DeWitt, there have been so many applications for this department that classes have been split into two groups meeting twice a week.

The men have been learning all-position welding, and both acetylene and arc methods are taught. Some men, who have had welding, learn other phases of shop work. DeWitt states that other shop procedures such as tractor maintenance will be included next year if possible.

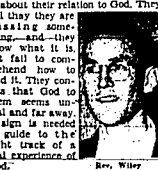

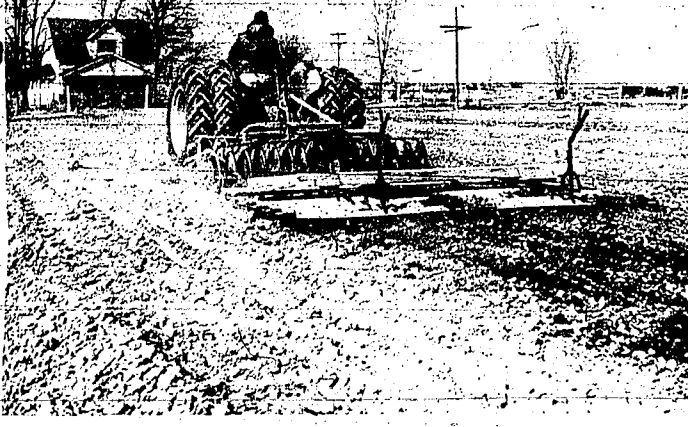

Farmer Designs, Builds New Headgate To Help Control Water on New Lands

The thought of trying to control water in new irrigation ditches with nothing more than a board, has prompted a Magic Valley farmer to design and construct a new concrete headgate for commercial sale.

Emmett Bauer, Piler, is building the headgate in a potato cellar at a farm near Piler, but plans to build a small factory near Paul later this year. He makes about 20 headgates each day.

Bauer says the need for such a headgate when he began irrigating a new farm resulted from the desert near Hazelton. "There wasn't any soil nearby to make dams and across dams were cumbersome, expensive and didn't suit me," Bauer says. "So I designed and built my own."

But the interest of his neighbors and their demand for similar headgates prompted Bauer to build headgates for sale.

"As Bauer explains, the problem is to keep building headgates is to have one big enough so an amount of water similar to that flowing in the ditch can pass through and yet

be inexpensive, easy to install, permanent and capable of holding the water year after year without leaking.

"I set my headgate meet those requirements," Bauer says.

Bauer's son, Wesley, helps build the headgates. Together the two have converted the potato cellar into a small factory with an overhead hoist, concrete mixing facility, steam-heated drying kiln, machine to cut reinforcing steel rods and to steel frames to mold the headgates.

Almost every special piece of equipment used in the process of making the headgate has been designed and built by Bauer.

The forms were of his own design and he built the first one having the other nine constructed by a commercial firm. He also points to the design for holding the steel reinforcing rods in the forms while the concrete is poured in as his own design and construction.

The headgates are two inches thick except at the bottom and next to the water opening which is three inches thick. They are five feet long and 19 inches high, Bauer says. The water opening is two feet long and 15 inches deep.

The water opening is designed so that regular one inch boards can be used—of the in-and-out-to-making a gate's special method of mooring the ends of the boards can make the opening adjustable for fine water control, Bauer says.

"When the headgates are installed in an irrigation ditch by a farmer,

an apron must be built on the downstream side according to Bauer to keep the water from washing away the dirt and making a hole next to the headgate.

Bauer describes the apron installation as simple and says the farmers need only smooth the ditch next to the headgate, place heavy chicken wire along the bottom of the ditch and then cover the wire with concrete.

Bauer has proved the headgate on his own farm. "They will not wash out and serve the purpose well," he explains.

He designed the headgate in 1954 and built several at that time for his own use. Since then he has been building the special equipment for the construction of the headgate and has secured a patent on the process and design.

Construction of a factory near Paul will begin later this year, Bauer hopes. He plans, however, to continue building the headgates at the present location until then, continuing his work through the summer while he is farming.

"It requires only about two and one-half hours to fill the 10 forms with concrete. Then they have to cure for 12 hours before we can do any more work," he says.

Bauer plans to have the factory in Paul because he believes that is the center of the area needing the new type headgate.

Lordly Moose Not Only Didn't Vanish In Idaho, He Didn't Even Lose Ground

The lordly moose didn't vanish from the Idaho scene after all, though many people once feared he would. Apparently he didn't even give ground as much as people once thought.

Solitary and aloof by nature, so massive of build that his name has come to be synonymous with unyielding size, the moose seems simply to have walked out the hazy pioneer days. Anyhow, he is still here, his great, hump-shouldered dark shape looming up plainly in morning mist as evening twilight as he stands knee deep in some mountain slope or bog.

The moose apparently is what the biologist calls a "climax species"—one that thrives best as a part of a plant-animal complex that is stable and self-perpetuating. In second, growth trees and brush that follow burning, logging or other large scale changes in a locality are fine for deer and elk. Herds build up fast in such situations, which are why we have more deer and elk in many areas than were present in the early days. Young second growth brush and timber is full of deer and elk forage.

However, as the re-growth matures it gradually gives way to the former "virgin forest" species and conditions. Such a forest is poor habitat for deer and elk, but its moist areas—meadows, swales, dampened slopes, lake shores with their patches of spruce, fir, hemlocks, and cedars—are just right for moose. These huge animals commonly summer in such areas then head uphill to open ridges, or down into marshy valleys, or even out into the desert to winter.

Present research indicates that Idaho never had a great moose hunt until 1914 when 30 percent of the mature bull moose were killed for a designated portion of eastern Idaho near "Panicum" park. The hunt was followed by a continued increase of moose, or an increase of knowledge as to their whereabouts, or both.

At any rate in recent years the hunt has been expanded to include several carefully selected areas in Idaho county—and the allowed-harvest has been increased to more than 100 animals per year. The population continues vigorously and in good numbers.

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They Kill Coordination Tranquilizing Pills Just As Bad as Drunk Driver

SEATTLE, March 3 (AP)—When you're taking one for the road, don't make it tranquilizing pills, says University of Washington researchers advise. The effects, they say, can be just as dangerous as operating an automobile while drunk.

Dr. Ted A. Loomis and Dr. T. C. West report a standard tablet of chlorpromazine (Thorazine) has the same effect on coordination and reaction as four shots of whiskey. Dr. Loomis is a professor of pharmacology at the university and Dr. West an assistant professor. They recently completed an intensive study on the comparative effects of a barbiturate and three widely used tranquilizers.

Loomis says the study answers from a previous investigation into the effects of alcohol on drivers.

"When we completed the study, we suspected that certain tranquilizers would have the same effect and decided to study them," said Loomis, who also is Washington state's official toxicologist and a medical-legal expert.

Loomis and co-workers designed and constructed an apparatus with controls similar to those of a standard car—steering wheel, foot brake and accelerator pedals.

The steering mechanism operated a model auto as it passed over a transparent nylon belt which, on its surface, had an inch-wide strip simulating a road bed. This belt would move beneath the car, its speed created by pressure on the accelerator pedal. A photoelectric cell emitting a directed beam of light from beneath the car accurately recorded the number of times the car was "off the road."

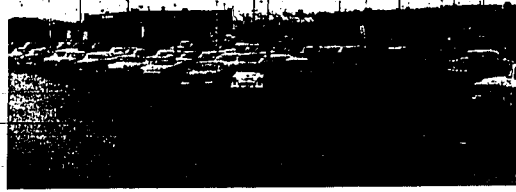

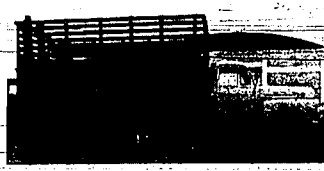

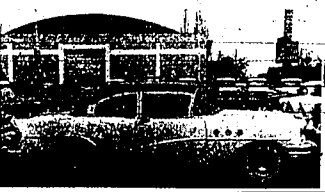
