**MANILA, March 11** (UP)—The Big Three foreign ministers of the United States, Britain and France meet tomorrow for the first time in three months to discuss the next step in settling an armistice conference with Russia, said Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

**WASHINGTON, March 11**—The House reached the amendment stage today on a big \$1.3-billion-dollar water projects authorization bill which Republicans and Democrats have some fundamental differences.

Republicans warned that unless their version of the bill is accepted, President Eisenhower is likely to veto it a second time. He vetoed one version of the bill in August, 1956. What the bill does is authorize future construction of about 160 projects costing slightly over \$1.3 billion dollars.

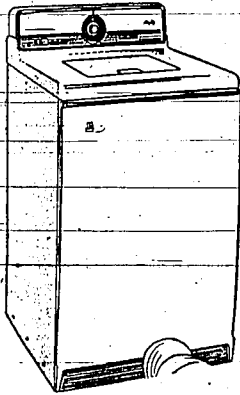
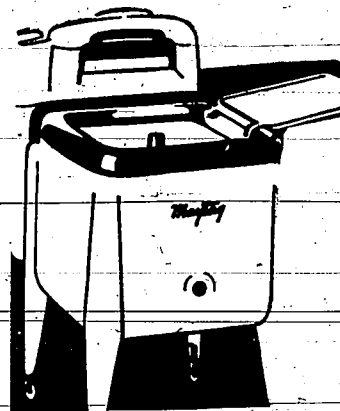

WASHINGTON, March 11 (AP)—The English language news column in the Eisenhower administration talks of the recession and unemployment. Some of those doing the talking: President Eisenhower, Vice President Nixon, Gabriel Heiser, Eisenhower's special assistant on economic affairs, and Robert E. Marriam, assistant director of the budget.

Eisenhower on Feb. 25 said after government figures showed January unemployment at 7.7 percent. He said: "I believe that we have had the most of our bad news disclosed in the past few weeks." Also on Feb. 12 Eisenhower said: "Every indication is that March will commence to see the start of a pickup in job opportunities; and that this should mark the beginning of the end of the downturn in our economy."

Did that mean things would start getting better in March or that the recession would stop by April? May be not. Apparently not. On Feb. 10 Heiser said Eisenhower's statement had been "misread." He volunteered one of his own: "Improved employment in March, reported in April, should constitute a good sign that the downturn was running out of steam."

### Eating 'Habit' Sending Food To New High

NEW YORK, March 11 (AP)—You have a habit, you like to eat well. That is why, restriction on no, leaders in the food industry say they expect in 1958 to eat equal past year's level.

Food companies look for as much as a 25 per cent gain in sales volume in 1958. The industry as a whole takes in about \$10 billion in food sales.

Current shortage figures are running well above the 1957 level, according to the trade publication, Food Business. It looks for new shortages in 1958, particularly in the area of the industrial product.

Some of the shortages that are expected to occur in 1958 are: sugar, flour, and other staples. The shortage of sugar is expected to be particularly acute.

Food companies are expected to raise prices in 1958. The increase is expected to be in the range of 5 to 10 per cent.

The nation has steadily upgraded its diet, says Charles H. Brill, president of General Mills of Minneapolis. The consumer demands better nutrition, more convenience and variety and isn't likely to change his ways in a mild recession.

Lyle C. Roll, president of Kellogg company, Battle Creek, Mich., says Americans will continue to spend a substantial portion of their income for food. His firm plans to build a new plant this year in Memphis.

Mrs. Kirk, pretty 40-year-old mother of seven, came out of hiding with her family yesterday. They had fled to Port Worth to escape publicity after the will of bachelor J. W. Sexton, 74, was published last week.

Sexton, who died Feb. 23, cut off his four nieces and a sister with \$100 each. He left the rest of his estate, estimated by most sources at five million dollars, to Mrs. Kirk. He was a patient in her Chaurme medical hospital six years ago.

"I'm still dumfounded and flabbergasted," Mrs. Kirk said of the windfall yesterday. "If I were a woman inclined to drink, I think I'd take a drink."

Expectations of a will fight were based on a previous gift of Sexton to Mrs. Kirk. While a patient he gave her a check for \$100,000 and told her to build a new rest home.

But his niece heard of it and had payment stopped on grounds the grantee oil billionaire was incompetent. They had him moved to a rest home in Jacksonville, Tex., where he died.

The Kirks returned here on advice of Sexton's attorney Gran Turner, to whom Sexton left \$10,000. Turner urged them to come back and "lead a normal life" until the estate is settled.

"Turner has strict orders to defend Sexton's will." In it, Sexton wrote: "I want my niece to have one penny in any way. I want him to drink all the hot holes and by hell and high water to see that my wishes are carried out."

### Senators for West Join in Job Request

WASHINGTON—March 11 (Special)—A bipartisan group of western senators joined Friday in urging increased appropriations for forest roads and trails.

Testifying before the senate public works committee, Idaho Sen. Henry C. Dworshak supported an amendment raising forest road spending by 10 million dollars to 40 million dollars for 1958-59.

Committee sentiment apparently favors the increase. Under present appropriations Idaho would get about 10 per cent of the new total, or four million dollars.

Senator Dworshak said federal action on such roads in the West is especially needed because of the high percentage of federal land ownership. In Idaho about 65 per cent of the land area is in federal hands, thus reducing the tax base of the state.

The position of large, sparsely-populated states in comparison to built-up Eastern areas makes road building highly uneconomical without federal payments, Dworshak said.

Long sections through empty country cannot be justified on local need, he added.

He also indicated that increased road building at the time could partly offset the increasing unemployment in Idaho and neighboring states.

Senators Wayne Morse, D. Ore.; Gordon Allott, D. Colo.; Frank B. Rowlett, R. Mo.; Wallace Bennett, R. Utah, joined in asking for road increases.

Senator Watkins termed the Western states "crown colonies" of the federal government, with more than two-thirds of the area in Utah, Nevada and Idaho federally-owned.

Bennett's statement quoted a report of the bureau of public roads made in 1954, estimating that expenditures of 2.7 billion dollars were needed to bring the forest highway system up to "suitable standards."

"It will take nearly a century" to reach present goals at that rate, he said. "We are hardly treading water."

In Utah, Bennett indicated, use of forest roads by tourists has increased by three times over the 1945 figure.

U. S. Aid Set  
WELLINGTON, New Zealand, March 11 (AP)—An American mission of atomic scientists will arrive March 22 to advise the government on nuclear research problems, the minister of scientific research said today.

The announcement said the U. S. offer to send a mission was made under the June, 1956, agreement providing U. S.-New Zealand cooperation in the peaceful uses of atomic energy. The mission will be led by Russell L. Kirk, assistant director of technical programs in the division of international affairs of the U. S. atomic energy commission.

### Pioneers of Idaho Are Paid Tribute In Boise Address

BOISE, March 11 (AP)—Secretary of State James H. Young paid tribute last night to Idaho pioneers who brought to this state "little more than their faith, their dreams and their own two hands."

"Most of what we see in Idaho today," he said in a speech prepared for a meeting of the Sons and Daughters of Idaho Pioneers, "has been created here, out of natural resources, by reason of the hard work and vision of such men and women."

"And it is largely with the aid and benefit of these same natural resources that we will build the future of the state's holdings of grain, wheat, mineral and timber lands; are from the federal grants made to Idaho at the time of school and are known as the endowment lands. As any of these are sold the money is invested in endowment bond accounts and only the income may be spent."

"The state's holdings are for the support of public schools, institutions of higher education and charitable institutions. Annual \$100-million endowments have allowed these endowments to be depleted but we can point with pride to Idaho's record on this score. The holdings of these accounts remain intact and are constantly increasing."

### CAB Hurting Airlines, Says Head of Firm

**NEW YORK, March 11**—Wall Street today cheered a blast by Robert E. Gross, chairman of Lockheed Aircraft corporation, against the civil aeronautics board in its handling of airline fares.

Market men held that similar blasts ought to be directed against other governmental agencies to stir up the needs of America's transportation facilities. There are held to be invaluable in time of war and neglect now would be serious in event of hostilities.

Gross, in a message to Lockheed stockholders along with their quarterly dividend checks said the CAB has starved the airlines.

"By giving a stone when the airlines are sorely in need of bread, by dragging out hearings and postponing action, by assuming an attitude of indifference to the airlines' efforts to put themselves on a more robust basis, the board is demonstrating one of the greatest dangers that confront us—cumbersome governmental procedures that block quick decisions," Gross said.

Gross said America needs a strong airline industry, particularly now in the face of Russian achievement in commercial aviation.

He pointed out that the airlines now are attempting to add 2 billion dollars worth of new prop-jet and straight-jet transports and held acquisition of these is critical since the military services are relying on a modern commercial jet fleet to augment airlift capability in event of war.

### Doctor Blasts At Courtroom Legal Tactics

**LOS ANGELES, March 11**—A Los Angeles neurosurgeon lambasted the legal profession last night for its treatment of medical witnesses and advised his fellow doctors to "come-out fighting" the lawyers with their own "tricks" and "cunning."

"When a doctor goes to court, what happens to him should not happen to a dog," Dr. Emil Seletz told about 2,000 members of the International Congress of Surgeons. His fellow doctors gave him thunderous applause.

Seletz is chief of neurosurgery at Los Angeles' Cedars of Lebanon Hospital and a member of the faculty at the University of Southern California medical school.

In a frankly fighting speech, he said that when a doctor takes the witness stand in court he is "brutally and unmercifully abused, humiliated and shouted down, impudently harassed, pushed against a wall, and finally accused of bearing false witness, or of lacking medical knowledge . . . or harboring prejudice . . ."

"His dignity in shreds, his honor questioned, his ability doubted, the doctor's famed equanimity becomes a jest for court jokers," he said.

"These indignities," he said, "are inflicted by a lawyer who views his business as 'cunning' his court appearance as 'a game' and is there 'for the sole purpose of making money'."

"Do as he does," Seletz advised the doctors, "shake hands and come out fighting."

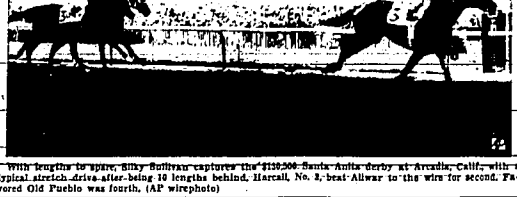

# Study of U.S. High Schools by Noted Educator Cites Need to Push Talent

NEW YORK, March 11—Dr. James D. Conant, once president of Harvard, has gone back to high school.

Conant, now in active retirement, for the past six months has been conducting a private survey of American public high schools under a two-year grant from the Carnegie Corporation.

His "casual" conclusion: Schools, communities and parents are not doing all they can to encourage and develop the brightest students, the academically talented

youngsters of today who will be the professional leaders of tomorrow.

Thus far, his studies have taken him through 40 high schools in 13 states. The schools were selected as "comprehensive" in that they are not specialized schools.

Dr. Conant, who refers to himself as a "three-X man—ex-chemist, ex-president of Harvard and ex-ambassador to West Germany," says he has found three specific matters for concern in secondary education:

"Not enough is being done to single out the academically talented stu-

dent—for special attention. The student often is not being guided into the course that fits his or her ability.

"The usual fear of what is sometimes called 'ability grouping' is that it would create a social stigma. This is not necessarily so; not if it's done carefully. It can be set up without rubbing noses in it."

The best way to avoid division, says Conant, is the home room system, where one calls gathered at random, remains together during his high school years for purposes of

general administration and student government—"like the home ward in politics."

A second matter for concern, Conant says, is that "too few girls are taking science and mathematics courses."

"This means they will not be able to continue those subjects on the college level and we will lose many potentially good science teachers at the high school level where we need them the most."

Conant is also worried over the high treatment given foreign language studies in high school.

"Our nation needs people who can speak foreign languages," he says. "Lack of such people hampers us in the world. I have been told the Russians have a great advantage over our people overseas because

they take pains to learn the native languages. Generally, they have two years of these at the most.

"These high schools are facing a big problem in getting their bright students to take these courses. Many of the students are taking extra courses—and not just because they are lazy."

"Many times the family doesn't see the importance of giving the student a challenging course. Sometimes the community spirit is against it. The community may feel some-thing like the basketball team is more important."

"A lot of people don't realize how important the superintendent of schools and the high school principal are in setting the standards of the community. I've been impressed by their influence."

"It would say a good high school

needs a chain of command like this: "An honest, intelligent and devoted school board to select a good superintendent to pick a good principal to recruit good teachers."

Conant plans to continue his study for another year, covering as many of the nation's comprehensive high schools as possible. He's not sure if there will be a formal report issued of his findings.

But, starting next fall, he has scheduled a series of talks based on his findings, mostly to civic groups, because, he says, if there's anything wrong with a high school "it's up to the community to improve it."
